





AMAZING ARIZONA

ARIZONA SOCIETY OF TOPICAL PHILATELISTS

Mankind inhabited what is now Arizona as early as 20,000 years ago. First inhabitants, Cochise Man, formed a primitive agricultural community in the Sulphur Springs Valley of southeastern Arizona. Numerous other prehistoric races occupied various parts of this vast area, the evidence of which is still preserved in National Monuments.

Early civilization was destroyed by a 23-year drought ending in 1299 A.D. Franciscan Priest Fray Marcos de Niza in 1539, was the first white man to visit Arizona and the ancestors of our present day Indians. He was followed by Coronado with his Spanish soldiery. Most notable Spanish missionary work over a period of years was accomplished by Padre Eusebio Francisco Kino, who established many missions and worked 25 years to bring Christianity to Arizona.

Padre Kino died in 1711 and the area was neglected until 1737 when a fabuolus silver strike brought about frenzied mining operations. But there was still little Spanish colonization and when Mexican independence from Spain was declared in 1821, Arizona was under the Mexican flag.

Southern Arizona was purchased by the United States from Mexico in 1853, under terms of the Gadsden Treaty and became a territory in 1863. Hostile Indians and the war between the states delayed the territory's progress, but the period of 1880-1910 witnessed the growth of mining, sheep and cattle industries. There were bloody battles between cattlemen and sheepmen, between outlaws and lawmen, but it was during this period Arizona became of age.

Arizona became the Union's 48th state in 1912 and until statehood was granted Alaska and Hawaii, it remained the "Baby State". Now known as the "Grand Canyon State", Arizona today is the fastest-growing state in the Nation. Manufacturing has become the principal source of income for the State's more than 1.3 million residents, followed by agriculture and livestock, tourism and mining.

Aging Together Commemorative Stamp

A 20-cent commemorative stamp paying tribute to our nation's elderly persons was issued May 21 in Sun City, Arizona. The first day of issue ceremony was held at the Sundial Recreation Center. A philatelic seminar was held after the ceremony.

The Aging Together stamp is intended to bring to the American people an awareness that older persons are highly valued for their contributions to society. They bring a wealth of experience and creative energies to an endless variety of endeavors. Issuance of the stamp is intended also to focus attention on Older Americans Month which was celebrated in May.

The design of the stamp was unveiled on December 3, 1981, at the White House Conference on Aging at the Sheraton Washington Hotel in Washington, DC. The horizontally-oriented stamp depicts an older woman holding an infant. Looking on are an older man and a young girl, whose head is resting on the woman's shoulder. The design in intended to portray love, dignity and respect between the generations.

In developing the design, artist Paul Calle reviewed his 15-year collection of photographs featuring people. He then executed his pencil line drawing using composite images from the photographs and not depicting actual persons.

SUN CITY, ARIZONA -- A first-day-of-issue ceremony to dedicate a 20-cent commemorative stamp bearing the legend "Aging together" will be held here May 21.

The ceremony will take place at 11 a.m. at the Sundial Center.

Assistant Postmaster General Gordon C. Morison will deliver the dedication address and I.A. Langford, Postmaster of Sun City, will preside. Also speaking on the program will be Lennie-Marie P. Tolliver, U.S. Commissioner on Aging.

The design features an inter-generational portrait depicting four people. It shows an older woman holding an infant. Looking on are an older man and a girl of about ten years of age, whose head is resting on the woman's shoulder.

The stamp was designed by Paul Calle of Stamford, Connecticut. In preparing his original pencilline drawing, Calle reviewed a collection of photographs of people he has accumulated during the past 15 years. The individuals portrayed in the design are composite images from the photographs and do not depict actual persons.

New 'Aging Together' Stamp Will Honor SC and Seniors

America's new 20-cent "Aging Together" stamp is a commemoration that recognizes the millions of older people in our society.

Sun City, including West, is our "capital" of these millions of parents and grandparents in the U. S. of A.

It is therefore appropriate that a lot of local, state, and national celebrities will gather here May 21 at 11 a.m. in the Sundial Recreation Center, at 103rd Ave, where it crosses Boswell Blvd., in this attractive community of seniors that Del E. Webb conceived and founded for the active retired.

The U. S. Post Office will have a special booth for the sale of the new 'tamp and the "first day" special cancellation on the cachet envelopes. Stamp collectors go big for these "covers," so that at least 200 thousand are expected to be cancelled here and in Washington, D. C., the first day.

The first-day cachet covers will be available after the ceremonies and for several weeks from the Sun City Stamp Club.

Each person attending will receive a 5 x 7" souvenir program now being printed in Washington, as are the stamps.

Although the doors will open at 10 a.m. and close at 2:30, the program beginning at 11 o'clock in the auditorium will be of general interest and fast moving. Sun City Postmaster Ike Langford will preside, and Bill Close of TV Channel 10's news staff will help make introductions.

Among the local persons on the program will be the SC pom-pom girls who will serve as ushers, and more than 250 dignitaries have received invitations to attend.

The Luke Air Force Base will furnish the color guard, and the Sun City Desert-aires will entertain and include the national anthem.

Bylaw Vote Opens Board Meetings

The Board of Directors April 22 changed a bylaw to open its regular meetings.

Previously in January, February, and March the board already had been voting to open each next meeting by separate motion.

The board voted to amend Article IV of the bylaws by adding Section 3, part (b): "The regular monthly meetings of the Board of Directors, with a prepared agenda, shall be open to the members and the press. At the close of each of these monthly meetings, a specified time shall be allotted for the members and the press to ask questions on topics of concern to be answered by the directors and/or operating personnel."

Six members of the nine, all present, voted yes on Len Haynes' motion; two abstained, and one voted no.

Several members at the end of the meeting congratulated the board on the quiet conduct of the session and said they were pleased by the peaceful and courteous atmosphere, the lack of which had kept the meetings closed last year.

The board approved the concept of providing Marinette Center with total fitness facilities for residents near there.


The general manager was directed to consider hiring a fulltime professional supervisor to make full use of the Sun Bowl and develop it toward its highest potential.

The Board of Directors approved these cost-saving projects:

(1) Seal coating machine, for use on cart paths and parking lots, \$12,183, annual savings \$7,900.

(2) Evaporative cooling equipment, Bell therapy, \$40,850, annual savings \$3,750.

FIRST DAY OF ISSUE CEREMONY AGING TOGETHER STAMP

SUN CITY, ARIZONA MAY 21, 1982 THANK YOU BILL, AND GOOD MORNING LADIES AND GENTLEMEN. I STAND BEFORE YOU THE VICTIM OF A CLICHE. SO MANY SPEAKERS HAVE OPENED OVER THE YEARS WITH THE DECLARATION THAT "I AM HAPPY TO BE HERE" THAT THE PERSON WHO <u>REALLY</u> MEANS IT IS PENALIZED BY THE FAMILIARITY OF THE PHRASE. WELL, I REALLY <u>AM</u> HAPPY TO BE HERE, FOR SEVERAL REASONS.

FIRST OF ALL, IT IS A GREAT PLEASURE TO REPRESENT THE U. S. POSTAL SERVICE AT THIS CEREMONY DEDICATING THE COMMEMORATIVE STAMP WHICH CALLS ATTENTION TO THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF OLDER AMERICANS TO OUR NATION. I THINK IT IS MOST APPROPRIATE THAT THIS CEREMONY IS TAKING PLACE DURING OLDER AMERICANS MONTH --AND I CANNOT THINK OF A MORE APPROPRIATE PLACE FOR THE STAMP TO BE ISSUED THAN HERE IN SUN CITY.

SECOND. I FIND IT MOST GRATIFYING TO KNOW THAT THERE ARE SO MANY STAMP COLLECTORS IN THIS AUDIENCE TODAY. I AM DELIGHTED TO SHARE THIS OCCASION WITH YOU ... AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE POSTAL SERVICE ... AND ALSO ONE WHO SHARES YOUR LOVE OF PHILATELY. AND I DO NOT THINK "LOVE" IS TOO STRONG A WORD TO USE IN DESCRIBING WHAT STAMP COLLECTING MEANS TO MOST OF US.

For many of us, it is more than a hobby ... it has become a major (and in many cases) a lifelong interest. In fact, President Roosevelt (himself an avid collector) once called it a "life-saving" interest. Perhaps those of you in this room understand what he meant by that better than anyone else in the world.

STAMP COLLECTING ENGAGES THE MIND. THE STUDY OF STAMPS. THE THOUGHTFUL ACQUISITION AND DISPLAY OF THEM ... WRITING ABOUT THEM ... SHARING INFORMATION ABOUT THEM ... ORGANIZING AND PARTICIPATING IN STAMP SHOWS ... THESE ARE ONLY SOME OF THE ASPECTS OF WHAT I LIKE TO CALL THE ART AND SCIENCE OF STAMP COLLECTING.

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AND THIRD, IT IS A DELIGHTFUL EXPERIENCE FOR ME TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO SAY "HELLO" TO SO MANY OLD FRIENDS AND ACQUAINTANCES, PARTICULARLY THOSE OF YOU FROM ARIZONA WHOM I HAVE NOT SEEN IN SOME TIME.

I THINK SOME CONGRATULATIONS ARE IN ORDER. I KNOW HOW MUCH HARD WORK AND EFFORT GOES INTO MAKING THESE CEREMONIES SUCCESSFUL, AND I OFFER MY CONGRATULATIONS TO EVERYONE WHO WAS INVOLVED. THERE ARE FAR TOO MANY FOR ME TO MENTION ALL OF THEM THIS MORNING, BUT I DO WANT TO OFFER SPECIAL THANKS TO CHARLIE CRATSENBERG, BOB CORLESS, LOUIE KOSSUTH (KO-<u>SUTH</u>) AND FRED SWANSON, WHO SERVED ON THE PLANNING COMMITTEE.

AND I WOULD BE REMISS IF I DID NOT THANK POSTMASTER IKE LANGFORD -- WHO ALSO SERVED ON THE COMMITTEE -- AND ALL THE OTHER POSTAL PEOPLE IN THE SUNLAND POSTAL DISTRICT WHO CONTRIBUTED THEIR EFFORTS TOWARD MAKING TODAY'S PROGRAM A REALITY.

As many of you know, the design of the stamp we are dedicating today was unveiled in Washington, D. C. Last December during the White House Conference on Aging. Our Postal Service_speaker was Senior Assistant Postmaster General Joseph F. Morris on that occasion, and I think a couple of the Points he made are well worth repeating here this Morning. MR. MORRIS NOTED THAT "THE AGING TOGETHER STAMP WILL FOCUS NATIONAL AND EVEN INTERNATIONAL ATTENTION ON THE FACT THAT LIFE DOES NOT END AT ANY CHRONOLOGICAL POINT: THAT -- WHILE THE NEEDS OF YOUTH MUST BE MET -- SO TOO SHOULD THE NEEDS OF THE ELDERLY BE ASSURED.

"AGING IN AMERICA SHOULD NOT BE A TRAGEDY, BUT RATHER A TRIUMPH -- A TRIUMPH EXEMPLIFYING WHAT HUMAN BEINGS CAN DO WITH AND FOR ONE ANOTHER. AMERICANS HAVE NEVER BEEN SATISFIED WITH SHEER SURVIVAL. THE AMERICAN DREAM HAS ALWAYS BEEN THAT OF SURVIVAL <u>PLUS</u> -- PLUS A SENSE OF INDIVIDUAL PURPOSE AND INDIVIDUAL DIGNITY." HE CONCLUDED.

POET JOHN DONNE SAID IT SO BEAUTIFULLY MORE THAN 350 YEARS AGO: "NO MAN IS AN ISLAND ANY MAN'S DEATH DIMINISHES ME BECAUSE I AM INVOLVED IN MANKIND."

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NO MAN -- NO WOMAN -- IS AN ISLAND. HUMAN BEINGS HAVE RESPONSIBILITIES TOWARD ONE ANOTHER -- SIMPLY AS HUMAN BEINGS. THIS IS PART OF WHAT IDENTIFIES US AS HUMAN BEINGS, AND IT HAS LONG BEEN RECOGNIZED THAT ONE OF THE WAYS A CIVILIZATION IDENTIFIES ITSELF IS BY THE WAY IT TREATS ITS ELDERLY.

WE WILL PRODUCE ABOUT IGO MILLION STAMPS WITH THIS DESIGN. MILLIONS OF AMERICANS -- AND OTHERS AROUND THE WORLD -- WILL SEE IT, USE IT AND SOMETIMES EVEN SAVE IT.

IT IS OUR WAY OF PUBLICLY DECLARING -- IN THE STRONGEST WAY WE CAN -- THAT THE U. S. POSTAL SERVICE RECOGNIZES AGING AS A FIELD OF PUBLIC CONCERN IN WHICH WE SHOULD, WE CAN AND WE MUST CONTINUE TO INVEST OURSELVES AS A NATION.

IN SO DOING, WE ARE HONORING OUR MOTHERS AND OUR FATHERS, AND WE ARE SHOWING THE WAY TO THE YOUTH WHO WILL FOLLOW.
