
## Sun City West's plans, schemes, faded dreams revealed during talk

Not all of Del Webb's dreams came to fruition - most notably the size, shape and some of the features of his first Sun City west of the Agua Fria River.

Ed Allen, who wrote the history of Sun City West for the community's 25th anniversary, will share little known stories from the past at the annual Spring Membership Meeting of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society at 1:30 p.m. Thursday April 11. The meeting will be held in the Heritage Traditions in Sun City West.

Ed will present a look back at what Sun City West might have been had all the original plans, schemes and dreams been realized. They included:

- A city of 75,000
- A major shopping mall
- A resort hotel
- Time shares



Originally planned to cover 13,000 acres, original plans for Sun City West called for it to be built in two phases and have 75,000 residents.

- A dinner/theater club overlooking Hillcrest
- A cemetery
- Much more

The meeting is open to the public, and refreshments will be served. It will be in the main meeting room in Heritage Traditions at 19303 N. New Tradition Road, Sun City West.

Message from the President


Spring season offers variety at Del Webb Sun Cities Museum

## Update on Exhibits

# Marinette exhibit is improved; to move to living room

Before there was Sun City, there were Marinette and cotton fields.

And because this pre-dated the nation's first active living community, the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum is placing its Marinette display so that museum visitors will see it first as they enter the front door.

Marinette is an important part of the past because it was the community and cotton plantation that preceded Sun City. It began in 1892 when two men from Marinette, Wis. obtained land grants and negotiated a water stop with the railroad being planned from Prescott to Phoenix. They named the stop after their Wisconsin home town.

The parcels passed through several hands, having failed at being subdivided into tiny lots, planted with sugar beets and alfalfa, and were bought by the Southwest Cotton Company, a subsidiary of Goodyear Tire in 1920. The Boswells acquired the holdings in the 1940s when tire construction shifted away from using cotton. They set up cotton gins, managers' homes and several businesses in the tiny community of Marinette.

But Marinette disappeared as Sun City opened in 1960. Although little black beetles popped up in people's yards when homes were built, the bugs disappeared as the cotton bolls gradually gave way to golf, tennis and bocce balls, and thousands of new homes.

The museum has always had a small exhibit featuring Marinette,




This early map from 1895 listed "Marinette" as a stop on the way to Phoenix.

but thanks to a \$1,000 grant from the Arizona Historical Society, a more comprehensive display is underway for a more prominent location. "Where It All Began –

Marinette" will now be put in its proper place, historically speaking.

The new Marinette display should be completed by March 31.

## HONORING SUN CITY VOLUNTEERS

### Bronze statue salutes community's philanthropic spirit

**B**ronzes, the dream of 'three steel magnolias' honor volunteers. Sculptors were Connie Perrin Turner, Kay Smith and Betty Jane Peters.

In the spring, many organizations honor their legions of volunteers with a breakfast, luncheon or dinner.

But the City of Volunteers has already honored its selfless workers in a more permanent and artistic fashion. And volunteers may drive buy it often and consider themselves immortalized in bronze every time they pass the "statue" - in reality four people, a bench, a bouquet of flowers, some books and a dog - located on the lawn to the left of the Lakeview Center main entrance on Thunderbird Road. It is titled "A Lifestyle of Giving" and is dedicated to all current, past and future volunteers in the community.

Connie Perrin Turner sculpted the first larger than life statue of the Sun City Posse Figure (representing 59,000 volunteer hours in 1998). It and a bench crafted by the Bell Metal Club were erected at the end of Sun City's 40th anniversary year on Dec. 16, 2000. The others - a P.R.I.D.E. and a Student, both sculpted by Kay Smith, a Smocked Lady by Connie, and a dog

named Sparky by Betty Jane Peters as well as a bouquet and the books - were installed March 17, 2001 during The International Year of the Volunteer.

The P.R.I.D.E.S. had donated 1,175,000 hours since 1950; the Smocked Lady represents 3,000 volunteers and 6,500 million hours donated since 1970 at Boswell Hospital and the books the 420,000 hours in 10 years by helpers at two private libraries in Sun City. The Student represents the future and volunteers who gave time and expertise at area schools. Sparky, sits in for 3,000 pets who had found homes since 1985 through Sun City Animal Rescue

(SCAR). The bouquet honors the Sun City Rose and Garden and the Sun City Agricultural Clubs for their generous activities in the community.

It was the climax of a dream for the three sculptors - Connie, Kay and Betty - dubbed the "three steel magnolias" for their hundreds of hours spent on this ambitious project. And in an ironic twist, March 17 was the day Snell Johnson, who was to have cast the figures at Bronze Works in Big Timber, Montana, died. The casting was done instead by his brother Lyle due to Snell's illness.

The idea of the statue sprang from a vision by Connie while at a S.C. 40th Anniversary Committee meeting. She teamed with Kay and Betty Jane to complete the project commemorating 40 years of volunteering. They raised the \$100,000 in cash and sponsorships with the help of a Volunteer Statue Committee of 19 chaired by Betty Jane with Connie as Art Director and Kay as Consultant.

The P.R.I.D.E was sponsored by Curt and Maronee Ulman, the Student by Margaret C. Ptolemy, and Sparky by Don E. Hutchings and Gilbert M. Haake, who named the piece after a beloved pet. Community donations, collected by the Sun City Foundation, paid

for The Posse Figure and the Smocked Lady. (Sparky had to be replaced after he disappeared in 2005, and the three sculptors went to work and raised \$2,500 to complete their new Scotty in 2008.) At the sixth anniversary of the statue the ladies festooned their creations with balloons.

Speaking at the Posse Figure installation in 2001 attended by hundreds of people, Connie said, "This has been almost a spiritual experience. We have had many things to overcome, but it was meant to be. It was well worth it."


## SCW raising money for mural to honor those who donate talents

Sun City West is preparing to honor its hundreds of volunteers with a mural. But first they must raise the money to do it

The Recreation Centers of Sun City West is collecting donations for the creation of a 10 by 20-foot wall mural recognizing its volunteers. It will be painted on the east side of the Lapidary Club room across from the Member Services office at the R.H. Johnson Center, and is scheduled for completion by summertime.

The design features two rounded archways inscribed "Sun City West Volunteers" and "Heart of our Community" with "Thank You" in a small connecting arch above and between them. The arches frame a stylized scene of palm trees, fountain in a pool, planted fields, tall pointed shrubs, trees and a sunburst. It was designed by members of the Sun West Art Club and is expected to cost about \$7,000. (Photo above right.)

The artwork honors the time contributed by individuals to the Recreation Centers' facilities: the Library, Village Store and chartered clubs, as well as all the community's groups including PORA, The Posse, P.R.I.D.E.S., Community Fund, Foundation, the churches, Meals on Wheels and Banner Del Webb Medical Center.



"We want to honor all individuals, including those who simply do good works on their own, helping their neighbors grocery shop, or getting them to doctors' appointments," said Jack Steiner, RCSCW public relations chairman. He added, "This is in addition to honoring those volunteer-based organizations for all that they do."

Steiner's committee plans is raising money for the mural through donations by individuals or organizations. Members also will be available at regularly scheduled events. A canister for donations is in the Member Services Office, and donations will be accepted at governing board workshops and board meetings.

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
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
