

Museum launches new initiative to expand into Sun City West

he Del Webb Sun Cities Museum has announced plans to expand its outreach in Sun City West this year by partnering with the Recreation Centers of Sun City West on several projects that aim to provide a greater sense of community history to those living in Sun City's sister-city to the west.

Plans for the initiative were announced at the museum's annual meeting, held Jan. 24 at the Palm Ridge Recreation Center in Sun City, West. In addition to several exhibits already on display in Sun City West, a key aspect to the

initiative is the creation of historical signs to be installed at each of the community's four recreation centers.

The signs will provide background information on the creation of each facility.

Bret McKeand, president of the museum's Board of Trustees, called the initiative a "major step" in the museum's efforts to reach a wider audience in pursuit of its mission to "preserve and promote the history of the Sun Cities."

"For our friends in Sun City West who may not be able to visit the museum in Sun City, we're now able to bring history directly to you," said Mr. McKeand.

The museum is owned by the Sun Cities Area Historical Society and located in the one of the first five model homes opened to the public when Sun City opened on Jan. 1, 1960. The museum is located at 10801 W. Oakmont Drive.

Several rooms in the house have been restored to their 1960's condition. Revolving exhibits explain the story of both Sun City and Sun City West, as well as its founder Del E. Webb. The museum expanded three years ago and today, a number of new exhibits showcase the stories

of local clubs, service organizations and community groups.

The museum has always had a permanent exhibit highlighting the development of Sun City West, but the new initiatives with the Recreation Centers of Sun City West mark the museum's most ambitious efforts ever to expand its services outside of the museum and into another community.

"These projects are going to make it so easy for Sun City West residents to learn more about their community, and we're anxious to hear their reactions," said Mr. McKeand.

Among the projects in place or planned this year in Sun City West:

A continual slide show of Sun City West historical photographs are shown on a television monitor at the R.J. Johnson Library. Several wall placards explain the development of Sun City West, "These projects are going to make it so easy for Sun City West residents to learn more about their community, and we're anxious to hear their reactions."

and the slide show runs during library operating hours.

- An exhibit of Sun City West historical artifacts and photographs from the museum's archives will also be on display all year at the CC&R office at the R.H. Johnson Recreation Center. The museum will change the exhibit every quarter.
- A monthly "Walk Through History" column that provides

historical information about the community is published monthly in the Rec Center News.

■ The annual PORA Resource Guide to be published in 2023 will also include a history of the community provided by the museum.

The most significant project involves the creation and installation of permanent signs at the entrance of each of the community's four recreation centers. Those signs will explain the history of each center, and in the case of the Johnson, Beardsley and Kuentz centers, provide biographical information on the person for which the center was named for.

The museum is creating the signs while the Recreation Centers of Sun City West will install and maintain all four signs. The metal signs are approximately 3 feet wide by 4 feet tall and expected to be installed sometime this spring.

Friendship Force visits the museum!

n Sunday February 19, the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum welcomed a large group from the Milwaukee Chapter of Friendship Force International.

The Wisconsin group, along with their local hosts from Sun City and neighboring areas, had the museum stop as their second activity on their itinerary for a week-long stay exploring Sun City, Phoenix and other areas and attractions in the West Valley.

Our local chapter of FFI coordinated the plan for the week and selected the museum as a perfect way to introduce their new Milwaukee friends to "active retirement" and its origins in Sun City and Sun City West.

Five of our volunteer docents were on hand to organize, guide, explain, educate, and answer questions from our visitors.

After the 90-minute tour, the group gathered outside for a picture and to express their gratitude to their museum hosts. A sample of comments heard included:

"Just awesome! I had no clue! I loved the stories about Marinette, WI, the Sun City Pom Poms, and

Our happy guests waved goodbye and headed off to Sundial Recreation Center for a quick lesson on how to play bocce and then engage in some spirited competition under the watchful eye of other local volunteers.

What our visitors did not know was that our museum would be represented at their first dinner in Sun City as well, as their local hosts arranged for Historian Ben Roloff from the museum's Speakers Bureau to entertain with interesting, and often amusing, stories of inventing "active retirement" here in the Sun Cities.

For readers unfamiliar with Friendship Force, it is an international organization that connects people from different areas of the country and from around the world on a personal basis, when local hosts open their homes to visitors from other states and countries.

For instance, Milwaukee is one of 105 Friendship Force Clubs in the United States and are being


hosted by The Friendship Force of Central Arizona that has many of its members living in Sun City and Sun City West.


Museum hosts joyous reunion of Sun City Poms/Saints players

o Saints Go!
That might have been an early cheer led by the newly formed Sun City Poms at two fast-pitch softball games played between squads representing the best women's teams in the USA. Our Sun City Saints were hosting their rivals the Buena Vista (California) Dusters at Sun City Stadium in a double-header before a large and raucous crowd at Sun City Stadium on June 21, 1979.

On hand were several camera crews from NBC TV's popular network program "Real People." Of all the film shot that day for use in September, the between-game performance of the Sun City Poms was described by the program's director as stunning! The Sun City Independent's reporter described the Pom Poms performance as characterized by "high kicking and low dipping" moves unexpected from women ranging in age from 55-80 something. "Real People's" director said, "I've never seen anything like it. I tried to keep up with them. I need to go back to California to rest. They're too much!"

In early 1979, Ray and Corinne



Leslie were well-known show-biz dancers/choreographers who had retired to Sun City. It was their idea of training a group of high stepping cheerleaders. Stories of forming the Sun City Pom Poms had been reported by an assortment of newspapers and even *Sports Illustrated Magazine*. But "Real People" catapulted the new group into the national spotlight. The Saints already had national acclaim—even representing the U.S. State Department on tours to foreign countries as "Goodwill Ambassadors."

Three months after that special night in June 1979, the Saints

returned to Sun City with the National Women's Softball Championship trophy in hand. It was an exceptionally good year for the two groups and for Sun City.

Fast forward!

On Friday Nov. 4, the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum hosted a reunion for Saints players who circled the bases in Sun City between 1966-1984. What made the day more special for the gathered Saints was a surprise visit from 18 members of the Sun City Poms performance squad for 2022. Both groups have played a major role in our community's history, and both have significant displays at your museum to commemorate their importance.

The museum hopes to host the Saints again someday for a reunion, but in the interim continues its long-standing relationship with the Poms, who joined us at your museum on the evening of Nov. 30. It was the museum's second annual Christmas at the Museum celebration. The Poms performed as part of the evening's entertainment for a large crowd of delighted celebrants. If you missed the Christmas party this year, be sure to get it on your calendar next year.


Museum goal for 2023: Expand our reach and impact!

Behind the scenes: Museum projects seeks to digitize historical documents

Members and visitors come to the museum to see our house, exhibits and learn about our history. But have you ever thought about what goes on behind the scenes?

Let's turn to our Mission Statement to answer that question.

"The mission of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society is to promote public awareness and appreciation of the history of Sun City and Sun City West. The Society collects, preserves, and displays materials and artifacts striving to inform present and future generations of the pioneering heritage of these unique active retirement communities."

Through our public events, it is obvious we "promote public awareness" and by entering our doors, you will observe we "collect" and "display" artifacts. But what is it that we "preserve?"

In the spring of 2021, research was started to learn the best processes to

preserve our paper documents and scrapbooks. These items are available at the museum, but not very easily accessible. After the research about the digitizing process and the equipment needed was completed, a scanner was purchased by The Nixon Group, realtors, Amy and Tim Nixon. Also purchased was a camera and stand to capture the large scrapbooks in our collection.

In April, 2022, eight people comprising of four teams started digitizing our paper documents. Gary Belanus, Sandee Donahue, Deb Kloehn, Marlene Kozlowski, Connie Castillo, Gary Greer, Nancy Foy and Marci Knipschield volunteered to devote time and energy to this project. As of January, 2023, these eight volunteers have already worked 93 days totaling 330 hours of scanning and capturing 6,167 pages.

Our content is uploaded to the Arizona Memory Project at https:// azmemory.azlibrary.gov/. The Arizona Memory Project is under the umbrella of the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records. This site providing access to researchers, historians and the general public to locate and discover information related to the history and government of Arizona archives, museums, libraries, and other cultural institutions. Visitors to the site will find some of the best examples of government documents, photographs, maps, and multimedia that chronicle Arizona's past and present.

You can also find a wealth of material about Sun City and Sun City West on our museum website at www. delwebbsuncitiesmuseum.org and you can find the direct links to our digitized documents and scrapbooks under the subject Research Sources and Arizona Memory Project.

There is so much more material to digitize, that it is going to take at least two years to complete this project. We invite you to check out our materials on our website and come back as we add more throughout the year.

SC Posse colebrates 50 years!

Salute by President Reagan in 1982 remains historical highlight

un City Resident Ronald Reagan Elected 40th President of the United States!

The headline above paraphrases a story appearing in a local newspaper in November 1980, shortly after Ronald Reagan defeated Jimmy Carter to become the nation's 40th president. Of course, there is a back story explaining the headline.

Governor Reagan finished his second four-year term as governor of California in 1975 and began testing voter interest in him as a primary challenger to President Gerald Ford -- an "accidental President."

Before the G.O.P. convention in 1976, Sun City Republicans invited Reagan to speak at the Sun Bowl,

and a large crowd turned out to lend cheers to his effort. After his address that afternoon, the former governor was given a certificate proclaiming him an "Honorary Resident of Sun City, Arizona."

Fast forward four years. Reagan didn't win his party's nomination in

1976, but did in 1980 and went on to defeat President Jimmy Carter in the fall election.

The headline above followed that success. Now jump ahead to May 1983. President Reagan's advance team and the Secret Service visit the Valley to prep for the president's address to the National Rifle Association at its annual convention in Phoenix on May 6, 1983.

Additionally, President Reagan's staff had a proclamation ready for his signature noting the beginning of "The Month of Volunteerism." Arrangements were made to have the signing in front of a group of volunteers who were nationally famous: the Sun City Posse.

What a day! After his major address in Phoenix on the topic of protecting the Second Amendment,

Museum pays tribute to Posse's service to Sun City

When Commander Sarah Davis called the February open meeting of the Sun City Posse to order on Feb. 7, 2023, she noted that three guests from the museum were on hand who would play a major role in the agenda for the day.

Office Manager Linda Borton brought along portable displays of Sun City history to share. Board Vice President Paul Herrmann brought a 3-by-4-foot display board with pictures and comments on highlights of posse history as a gift from the museum along with a donation check for over 30 years of night patrol security checks at the museum.

Ben Roloff from the Museum's Speakers Bureau was introduced as the keynote speaker and shared the story of the creation of the Sun City Posse in 1973 as a result of a vote on whether or not to incorporate Sun City.

For those interested in more of the details about the creation of the posse as an unexpected outcome of the battle of incorporation, can visit the museum's website and view a video recording of Ben Roloff's 25-minute presentation on the creation of the Sun City Posse.

President Reagan was helicoptered out to Sun City and landed in a church parking lot, and then convoyed to the Posse Headquarters, which was packed with members of both the Sun City and Sun City West Posses.

The proclamation was signed. President Reagan heaped praise on posse volunteers, and the president received the customary gifts of hats and shirts from posse leaders. A team of volunteers from the two posse squads then entertained the president with a short demonstration of proper "handcuffing" techniques.

Local press noted the Secret Service had spent an entire day in Sun City thoroughly checking for possible hiding spots where an illwilled foe of the President might hide, including the ventilation shafts in the Posse Headquarters.

Additionally, emergency evacuation routes were planned -- just in case. All of that for a short Presidential visit.

The entire event took 20 minutes, and President Reagan was on his way via a Marine helicopter awaiting him in for a flight to Sky Harbor. Air Force One was refueled and ready for the President's return

to Washington D.C.

Posse members had "their 20 minutes of fame" and our most famous resident was soon airborne and winging his way east to tend to the world's affairs.

Looking back at seminal events in the 50-year history of the Sun City Posse, it would be hard to find an event to top a visit from a sitting President of the United States, who made a special trip to honor our posse members for the example they set and at the same time signing a National Proclamation Encouraging Volunteerism.

People, meeting needs of people is what Sunshine Service is all about. Sunshine Service lends medical and children's equipment to residents of Sun City and we have been doing so for over 52 years. We are a charitable non-profit Arizona corporation and are funded by voluntary contributions and memorial gifts.

While the equipment is available for the use of all residents or visitors staying with residents, the equipment must not be taken out of Sun City on a permanent basis. As a matter of control, equipment is loaned only to Sun City residents.

Records show that as the population of Sun City grew, so did use of our medical equipment. Savings for Sun City residents have been calculated periodically; in 2015, it was estimated that residents saved over two million dollars in cost of equipment for that year alone.

Sunshine Service, Inc has received local, state and national recognition. Awards received include the George Washington Honor Medal for services to the sick and handicapped from the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge in Pennsylvania.


