Calif Portland, Oregon, and





In the prime of women's softball, the Ramblers played to a crowd of 8,000 to 10,000. But lack of interest and financial troubles caused the women to give up their lease at Ram-bler Field and admit defeat.

A few hung on, however, and the new team was adopted by Sun City residents and renamed the Sun City Saints in 1965. Nearly 2,000 Sun City

fans signed petitions in 1968 when the Saints faced possible loss of their field to a proposed shopping center.

And now the team draws players like pretty Andie Ervin, 24, an Or-ange County, Calif., physical educa-tion teacher who also plays league basketball and field hockey.

Andie, a veteran of six years in league softball, came to the Valley just to play outfield with the Saints after she found that the Orange Coun-ty Lionettes' roster was full.

She plays in leagues because "I like competition," has a .400 exhibi-tion game batting average and a .270 league average.

The team ranges in age from Trudy Davis, 17, an outfielder and a senior at West High School, to Miss Keith, 34.

Their spring training starts in Feb-ruary, with practices two nights a week until the season starts in April. The Saints play 72 scheduled games between April and August, then go to the regional tournament and, it is hoped, the nationals.

It puts a cramp in their social lives, especially when they have to give up weekend activities to be ready for doubleheader games Saturday and Sunday nights.


But their dates understand, said Andie. "If they don't understand, then they're not worth it."
