Dot Wilkinson named to Hall of Fame


Famed Phoenix catcher and long-time softball great Dot Wilkinson was selected this year to the National Softball Women's Hall of Fame.

Dot retired from the game in 1965 after a long career as player and manager with the PBSW Ramblers of Phoenix. Considered the greatest catcher in women's softball, Dot played for a quarter of a century and was selected for a record of 19 times to All-American teams. One of the all-time great hitters in the game, she led her Ramblers to three National Championships and many winning seasons.

The 1969 season was one which will be remembered by players and fans alike. Thus far, it was the winningest year for the Saints with 66 victories against only 17 defeats.

The team was faced with serious injuries in the early part of the season when both Jeri Scheer and Sharon Austerman received broken ankles at second base. Losing these two players for the season presented a major problem to the team. But the team spirit and unity did not drop with this serious loss of personnel. The players met with the new challenge and Jeri and Sharon were back supporting the team as quickly as they were released from the hospital.

1969 was the first season the Saints were playing without a sponsor. With the tremendous support of Sun Citians it was realized that park and team expenses could be met from gate receipts. Attendance was up from past seasons and the team was delighted to receive the additional support and enthusiasm.

One of the early season highlights for the Saints was their successful series against the leaque-champion, Orange Lionettes. The Saints took three out of four games from Orange in the league openers. Although the Lionettes evened the score by blanking the Saints later in the season, it was nevertheless a strong factor in getting the team off to a flying start. The Saints finished the 1969 P.C.L. campaign in second place which was their best effort thus far.

Winning the 1969 Cactus Regional Tournament entitled the Saints to represent Sun City in the first National Softball Tournament ever to be held in Arizona. Playing in Tucson, before many home town fans proved to be an asset to the team as they placed sixth in competition with the nation's 18 top teams. This was

not only their best effort in tournament play, but a strong incentive for future success

strong incentive for future success.

Saints individual efforts were recognized during the 1969 season with Marilyn Rau and Betty McIlvain receiving all-star honors for Pacific Coast League play. Marilyn also received the League Youth Award. Lou Kostelney received the M.V.P. vote from her teammates. Lynn Mooney received the Rookie Award for her outstanding play in her first season with the team. Paula Miller received the Sparkplug Award being voted as the player who exhibited the most spirit and enthusiasm.

All told 1969 was a season for over-coming hardships, improving season records, the building team organization, all of which gives the Saints reason to believe in looking ahead to more success in '70.
