



Two California teams will test their desert luck in six softball games against the Saints at Sun City Stadium this weekend.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. each night. Admission is \$1. The Fresno Rockets, who will open the series with doubleheaders tonight and tomorrow night, are members with the Saints in the Pacific Coast Women's Amateur Softball League. The doubleheaders are vital games where the Saints' league record is concerned. THE SAINTS enter tonight's contest sporting a 16-8 league mark, good for second place, but Fresno is right behind in third.
