

# Saints alive, accept

history of women's softball. The Saints last fall reportedly lost their "home," Sun City Stadium, due to a Dei F. Webb Development Co. econo-my move in which Devco ended its relationship-more specifically, its sub-sidization program-with the softballers.

The parent Del E. Webb Corp., Known to be beset by a cash crisis, had directed Devco to cut off any fund drain brought about by Saints' activities.
 BUT A NEW development, a \$1 lease arranged by Devco for the 1962 season, was worked out in sub rosa sessions. An ad hoc committee, meeting in United Bank's Sun City West office Monday night, agreed to accept conditions of-tered by the Webb firm.
 Joe Davisson, the bank branch's manager and longtime driving force in the Saints Booster Club, chaired the meeting in which Saints supporters, most of them Booster Club members, participated.

most of them buyster that mindely participated. Stapley announced that Michelle Thomas, who hurled the Saints to a national Amateur Softball Association championship in 1979, wrote him of her interest in renewing her softball activi-

ty. SHE RETIRED after her one season SHE RETIRED after her one season with the Saints, having won the national tourney's outstanding pitcher trophy with a remarkable performance-a 4-0 tournament won-lost record with a per-fect 0.90 earned run average. The coach said Miss Thomas, resid-

ing in Des Moines, plans to talk with him when she arrives Jan. 23 for a oneweek visit in the Valley. She plans to

investigate enrolling at Arizona State University for post-graduate studies. If Michelle does return, she will join Debbie Doom, the 6-foot-plus teenager who won the most valuable player trophy as a rookie in the 1980 national tourney. In that series Debbie's only loss came after pitching seven straight victories and then on a no-hitter in which three errors in one inning produced a 1-0 defeat.

THE WEBB COMPANY patiently worked through several attempts to keep the Saints alive as a Sun City-based team before the current, apparently workable arrangement was worked out.

These are the provisions to which the

These are the provisions to which the committee agreed: 1. For use of the stadium from April 5 to the end of August 1982 Saints will pay Devco \$1 plus reimbursement of operating expenses, not to exceed the figures given in each of the following accounts. (Costs may be pro-rated by one-fourth of the monthly cost each week the Saints use the stadium.)

2. SAINTS WILL, provide their own insurance in amounts agreeable to Webb.

3. Saints will hold Webb harmless and not liable.

4. Saints will provide grounds main tenance, ticket and concession help, game equipment and supplies and all production personnel necessary for stadium operation.

5. SAINTS WILL bear all costs in connection with tickets, admissions and concessions and will keep all revenue



from tickets, admission, concessions, stadium rentals, etc. 6. Webb reserves the right to approve all subleases and/or stadium

rentals. 7. Saints agree to make every rea-sonable effort to provide stadium time for the Senior Softball League.

8. WEBB WILL CHARGE an over-

head fee of \$590 per month as shown below. This fee will allow for a part-

time person to look after Webb's inter-est at the stadium. However, this person will not be involved in stadium operation inasmuch as the Saints are concerned

The pact will require the Saints to reimburse Devco for operating expenses of \$4,720 per month, broken down as follows:

Overhead \$590. Electric and gas \$1,-Overhead \$500. Electric and gas \$1, 300, water \$1,150 and trans removal \$140 for a utilities total of \$2,590. Repairs and maintenance of \$850, including \$100 for building, \$600 for equipment and \$150 for rolling stock. Operating supplies of \$500, including \$600 in general operating supplies and \$90 for telephone. DAVISSON \$AID the Saints budget, in round figures, would be \$45,000 for 1982, with \$20,000 for stadium use and \$25 000. for Saints season expenses

\$25,000 for Saints season expenses. Much of the season expenses involve travel costs, including those of visiting teams.

Devoc executive vice president Joe Aubin and general counsel Gerald Wil-liams had contributed numerous hours and made voluminous records on stadi-um operations available to the ad hoc committee in an effort to produce any reasonable solution to the Saints' housing problem which would not require an

ing problem which would not require an actual outlay of Webb funds. The ad hoc committee vowed to examine every possible avenue for cost cutting available to them and Monday's session ended with Boosters Club mem-bers beginning to delegate responsibil-tes for various fund-raising activities.

THEY ALREADY HAVE been as-sured of an attractive arrangement with Lions clubs for the manning of refresh-ment stands. Last season the Saints generated \$35,000 in gate receipts plus a

\$7,300 net in refreshment stand sales, with Lions handling refreshments on a paid basis with Devco.

None of those funds were available to the Saints; they went to the Webb company to offset their costs plus a \$10,000 subsidy going directly to the Saints treasury. The Saints were to receive a share in proceeds after Devco costs were covered, but Webb never did recover all its outlays since the stadium was built and was used as the Saints home field.

The born-again Saints hope to realize more profits from refreshment sales and have pledges of volunteers in many areas, such as ticket-taking. Cost-cutting efforts will include post-game cleanup of the stadium by team members, a chore which required paid labor in the past. STAPLEY WAS anxious to gain

guick approval of the Devco offer in order to keep his player force in-tact—his players planned to seek spots with other teams in the event the Saints disbanded—and to firm up a schedule

disbanded-and to firm up a schedule for the season. He said he had been contacted by the national champion Orlando (Fla.) Rebels about a possible three-day week-end series in Sun City. The Rebels suggested double-headers on a Thurs-day, Friday and Saturday, but not all against the Sun Citias. Stapley said he hoped to set up Thursday and Friday double-headers featuring the Rebels and Saints, plus a Saturday double-header with a Califor-nia team, which then would stay on for a Sunday doubleheader against the

An ad hoc committee. representing the never-say-die group that refused to accept the sev-ering of the Saints' Sun City connection, including Joe Da-visson, longtime Boosters Club leader and Coach Gerald Stapley, agreed Monday to accept Webb's offer of a \$1 lease for

The Saints supporters who wouldn't give up; the Webb company, which gave its coop-eration; Davisson and Stapley—they all merit plaudits. But all that hard work, and the planning that must now go on for a successful Saints season, will go for naught if one very important ingredient is lacking. at games and with the kind of volunteer help the organization needs to reduce costs, there will be an agonizing reappraisal of the situation in the fall-and perhaps a real funeral march next time.

Saints funds needed

to resolve contingency EDITOR: As indicated in the News-Sun, we have been involved in a series of negotiations with Del E. Webb Development Co. regarding usage this year of the Stadium, and apparently a workable arrangement has been worked out. However, this has not been finalized, and clarification is in order.

There is a contingency to be resolved before our agreement can be signed, and it is quite understandable due to present economic conditions. Since projected stadium expense for the four-month Saints season is \$20,000, we must have \$15,000 up-front money on hand before final agreement is reached. Devco is under a mandate that there be no deficit at the

that there be no deficit at the stadium. Certainly this is un-derstandable. We wish to make it. perfectly clear that Devco more than fair. Devco Officials have fully cooperated with us; we have negotiated in good faith also. Devco should in no way be faulted if an agreement is not reached. In reached. Bis officials 515,000 required: Plan A calls for a \$500 dona-tion by any company or individ

tion by any company or individ-ual. Monies will be held in a

special fund with Devco as beneficiary. If there is no defi-cit, monies will be returned to donors at the season's end. If we raise \$10,000 or more, monies will be invested in Money Market Certificates and accrued interest pro-rated to do-nors. Any deficit will be paid to Webb and the remainder pro-

Webb and the remainder pro-rated to donors. We are happy to report that \$4,500 already has been raised in a short time by this plan. We invite companies, individuals, service clubs and other groups

service clubs and other groups to send in their donations. In Plan B, donors may give any amount. These monies will be used to defray stadium ex-pense. When that is assured, the remainder will be applied to Schütchergenergt

When it became known that the Sun City Saints, written off as an ex-Sun City fixture during make \$500 of that money avail-able to "Save Our Saints." It is the fall, had a chance to obtain a \$1-a-season lease on Sun City Stadium, a lot of things hap-

pened. But not enough. The Del E. Webb Develop-ment Co., under orders from the parent company not to in-cur any indebtedness through Saints activities, indicated that Saints activities, indicated that maintenance and operating ex-penses (water, for example, costs money and the Saints would have to reimburse Devco for water) would run in the vicinity of \$20,000. Devco said it would need "unfrost!" monor to duarateo

Devco said it would need "upfront" money to guarantee that this \$20,000 would be cov-ered. Possibly Webb would go ahead with the deal if three-fourths of that amount were put up in advance. Many individuals and busi-ness firms in the area already have responded. The \$15,000 mark now has been reached, with a very sizable contribution from the Lions clubs. Another \$5,000 virtually would assure a

5.000 virtually would assure a Sun City Stadium contract. Many service clubs and other local organizations have set aside several hundreds of dollars for emergency or some other special occasion. As Ed-die Cantor said during the Great Depression, "Why save for a raimy day when it's pour-ing like blazes right now?" Now is the time-right 85372.

pouring like blazes right now; it is unlikely that your group can foresee anything better to commit its reserve funds for in the near future.

Remember, this is "guaran-tee" money only. The Saints anticipate being able to live within a specific budget and have examined all possible ways of increasing revenues to budget. The guarantee fund, therefore, not only would be returned to the contributor but it would be returned with inter-est at going bank rates.

est at going bank rates. Only 10 more groups need to advance \$500 to fill in the \$5,000 gap. That means your club's involvement would solve 10 per-cent of the problem right now. The Saints have proved them-

The saints have proved them-selves to be a worthy communi-ty institution. In the last half-dozen years they have finished in the top four nationally a half-dozen times and even brought a national women's softball championship to Sun City. The prospects are good that they can bring home another title

The Sun City Saints will be playing in the stadium again this year IF ... in the Boosters can come up with \$15,000 front-money as collateral to gauartee payment to DevCo for the basic outof-pocket expenses required to operate the facility

By cutting all their operating charges to the bone, the Del Webb Development Co. has agreed to make the stadium available for the entire Saints' season at a total cost of \$20,000

The corporation feels that, without collateral assurance of \$15,000, by the first of April, they cannot commit to any contract for the facility

The Saints' Boosters have already raised over \$5,000 of this requirement through individual solicitations. Each Lions Club has been asked to contribute \$250 - for a total of \$2,500. Contributions from individuals, organizations and businesses are now being solicited.

These contributed funds will be deposited in an escrow account. When sales of advertising, promotional materials, programs, etc. - plus gate receipts - exceed the \$20,000 guarantee, these escrow funds will be returned to the contributors. When the fund exceeds \$10,000 it

will be invested in money market certificates, and accrued interest will be pro-rated to donors.

Unless \$15,000 up-front money is raised by April 1, the Saints will not be playing in the Sun City stadium. Neither will the Sun Citians Senior Softball teams.



We're having a mixed-up deal this year," Stapley said. "It's different from what we've had in the past. But this is a more compatible team. Some years, they'd meet at the park, but they'd have no interest in each other. This year, they socialize. You've got to be friends on and off the field."

Stapley, a postal worker from Mesa with 10 children, apparently contributes to the atmosphere. He drives the team through three-hour practices every Wednesday and is a stickler for repeated execution of fundamentals. Still, the players like his easygoing approach.

"He's real supportive," Ritchey said. "He gets us thinking about the game. The other coach (of the San Diego team) didn't have one good thing to say. Gerald's the opposite. He's nothing but positive." . . .

The Saints were nearly the Aints this year, as far as playing in their own ballpark was concerned. The Del E. Webb Corp. owns Sun City Stadium, where the Saints have played since the park was built in 1971. But running the Saints was a money-osing proposition, with total expenses running in the 355,000-340,000 range, according to some estimates. Last fall, the company announced the team would have to move. The Saints were being ticked out. kicked out.

"We had placed an ad in the paper announcing the dissolution of the booster club," said Joe Davisson, the club president. "If we had played, it would have been at Diablo Stadium (in Teempe) or in Peoria. There wouldn't have been much support."

But not so fast. Negotiations, spearheaded by Stapley and Davisson, led to an agreement with the Webb Corp. The Saints could remain, but only if the costs were otherwise assumed.

#### Sunday, June 20, 1982

The result was a massive volunteer effort. Members of the Sun City senior slow-pitch softball league maintain the field and the stadium in exchange for the right to play their own games there. The Sun City Sheriff Posse provides one of two accurity guards. The Lions Club sells the tickets and concessions.

Revenue comes from ticket and souvenir sales, program advertisements, fund-raising activities and from donations from the booster club. So far, attendance has been better than last year. Through 14 home dates (the Saints play double-headers on Saturday and Sunday nights, starting at 7:30), the Saints had drawn 12,566 fans. Last year, the 14-date figure was 10,083.

One player was missing from the Saints during their series with San Diego last week, Debbie Doom. Under Doom's picture on the back of the Saints' program are the words, "Ace Pitcher." That about covers it.

Doom wasn't there because she was finishing up her freshman year at UCLA. This spring, Doom pitched the Bruins to the National Collegiate Athletic Association championship. In 41% innings of the NGA tournament, she allowed one earned run and struck out 63. Doom, who lives in Tempe, is a two-year veteran of the Saints.





# Saints' dilemma highlights

By STEVE HAWLEY Sports Editor The Sun City Saints always have managed to make news on the soitball field. But it was an October announcement, two months after the season had ended, that grabbed the most attention this past year

Year. A financially troubled Del E. Webb Development Co, announced that it would not lease Sun City Stadium to the Saints in 1982. Economic conditions at the time and cost of maintaining the playing field were reasons given by Webb for its decision.

"THIS ACTION WAS taken only after thorough study and long discussion with the Saints Booster Club," said Joseph Aubin, then president of Webb. "Believe me, it was a difficult decision to make." Three months later the Saints had been resurrect-

ed. After long discussions, Webb and the Saints Booster Club reached an agreement that would allow the team to use the stadium this season.

IN RETURN FOR A \$1 lease, the booster club IN RETURN FOR A SI lease, the booster club would be responsible for grounds maintenance and personnel needed for stadium operation. Under the agreement, the boosters also would pay Webb 84,720 a month to cover utilities and other expenses. Area residents also came to the Saint's aid. They donated several thousand dollars to help cover expenses, which the booster club promised to

eventually pay back. Boost club promised to Another important story involving Webb took place earlier this month when the company an-nounced that the Sun City Classic golf tournament would not return to Sun City West Hillcrest Golf Course in 1983.

THE DEMISE OF THE Ladies Professional Golf

SUN CITY — A searing sun, on its descent but still plenty strong, roasts the empty ballpark. The nearly empty ballpark, that is. It is game day, and Chuck Currier, Uncle John Poja and a few others are working hard.

We work pretty hard on our image. "We work pretty hard on our image," Rau said. We don't just pick a player on athletic ability but her attitude, too. Desire to play. Hustle, You won't play every game or every inning. You might be the freatest ahortstop in the world, but you might not play there. You've got to accept that.

"I'm not saying we have a better class of girl than anyone else, but off and on the field, they're just nice kids. It's the girl-next-door image."

This year's team displays a real togetherness, Stapley said. It has been a difficult year. The Saints' shortstop, Deanna Dinota of New York, lost her sister in an automobile accident. Paula Stufflebeam broke her thumb. Then her father died. The Saints also were without Arizona State players Susie Gaw and Ritchey, because the ASU coach wouldn't let them play during the Sun Devil season. Pitcher Debbie Doom was off at UCLA and could pitch in just three games for the Saints.

"We're having a mixed-up deal this year," Stapley said. "It's different from what we've had in the past. But this is a more compatible team. Some years, they'd meet at the park, but they'd have no interest in each other. This year, they socialize. You've got to be friends on and off the field."

Stapley, a postal worker from Mesa with 10 children, apparently contributes to the atmosphere. He drives the team through three-hour practices every Wednesday and is a stickler for repeated execution of fundamentals. Still, the players like his easygoing approach.

"He's real supportive," Ritchey said. "He gets us thinking about the game. The other coach (of the San Diego team) didn't have one good thing to say. Gerald's the opposite. He's nothing but positive."

But not so fast. Negotiations, spearheaded by Stapley and Davisson, led to an agreement with the Webb Corp. The Saints could remain, but only if the costs were otherwise assumed.

The result was a massive volunteer effort. Members of the Sun City senior slow-pitch softball league maintain the field and the stadium in exchange for the right to play their own games there. The Sun City Sheriff's Posse provides one of two security guards. The Lions Club sells the tickets and concessions.

Revenue comes from ticket and souvenir sales, Revenue comes from ticket and souvent sales, program advertisements, fund-ansing activities and from donations from the booster club, So far, attendance has been better than last year. Through 14 home dates (the Saints play double-headers on Saturday and Sunday mights, starting at 7:30), the Saints had drawa 12,546 fams. Last year, the 14-date figure was 10,083. . .

One player was missing from the Saints during their series with San Diego last week, Debbie Doom. Under Doom's picture on the back of the Saints' program are the words, "Ace Pitcher." That about covers it.

Doom wasn't there because she was finishing up her freshman year at UCLA. This spring, Doom pitched the Bruins to the National Collegiate Athletic Association championship. In 1413 in innings of the NCAA tournament, she allowed one earned run and struck out 63. Doom, who lives in Tempe, is a two-year veteran of the Saints.

the Sports Festival, with the Saints post-ing a 2-0 record against the Rebels and a 2-1 mark versus the Brakettes.

"THE SAINTS look like they have a heckuva chance to win it." said Bill Plummer, communications coordinator for the Amateur Softball Association. "They have a formidable pitching staff with (Debbie) Doom and (Michelle) Thomas."




