
After months of anticipation, the final phase

"I think it's wonderful," Chapman said. "We've been waiting for this for a long time."

Hlavna said she loved the openness of the space and was particularly pleased with the number of treadmills facing the wall-mounted televisions.

"They did a good job," Hlavna said.

"I love the pool, I love the gym, and I love the walking area," Chapman added. "I'll use all three."

After several delays over permit requirements for the pool area, Wellman said RCSC has a tempo-

rary certificate of occupancy for the building. RCSC staff gave tours of the new construction Tuesday before the building opened for use. Wellman said he hopes RCSC will have a full occupancy certificate soon, and RCSC will plan an official open house event in the coming weeks.

There are still several small projects to complete. Wellman said, including the installation of the shade sails over the pool.

Cletus Peck, who visited the facility with his parents Bill and Hilda, said Sun Citians get a great value for the money with facilities like Fairway.

"The price is right," Peck said, explaining that outside the community, people spend much more

money for gym memberships at facilities that are not as nice as Fairway, or even the other centers.

RCSC facilities attendant Jean Crawford didn't even know that she would be working at Fairway on Tuesday until Monday night, and she was so excited, she said she barely slept.

"There's something here, I'm telling you, for everyone," Crawford said. "What could be better for Sun City than an inside walking track. rather than driving to the mall?"

While Fairway can't compare to their regular center at Mountain View, friends Melva Hemmer and Ann-Marie Tennessen still praised the new building.

"It's very pretty. I like it," Tennessen said.

A line of visitors extended 50 feet out the door of the Fairway Recreation Center Friday morning, a huge turnout for an open house meant to give residents a look at the new facility.

With guided tours conducted by RCSC staffers, Sun Citians were given a lengthy introduction to what the new facility has to offer.

Many of the clubs have begun to move into their dedicated spaces, although they sit mostly empty. It will be a while before the clubs are completely moved in, but for now, they

Upstairs, an expansive music room showed promise as a perfect venue for local music lovers.


All in all, there did not seem to be a single person who came away unimpressed.

With sheet rock installed in most of the building, painting began this past month. Several rooms are fully painted. As the clubs move into the new building, RCSC will begin planning Phase 2 of the project, which will include the swimming pool, locker rooms, indoor walking track and fitness area.

Razing Fairway starts in June

The Fairway Recreation Center renovation project will begin June 16 after more than three years of discussions and planning.

"Although we will not be immediately demolishing the Phase 1 buildings at Fairway, we will begin decommissioning these buildings in preparation for demolition in the months ahead," RCSC Assistant General Manager Jim Wellman said Thursday.

Those buildings scheduled for Phase demolition include the Arizona Room. the billiards room, the music room, the auditorium, the library and the pool and spa. All clubs affected by Phase 1 demolition have been notified regarding their temporary locations, and will receive additional notification soon regarding their move date.

The decommissioning process includes asbestos inspections and removal, removing/relocating equipment,

moving of designated clubs to other locations and verifying, disconnecting and relocating utility services to support the club room buildings that will remain on the property until Phase 2 begins.

The Fairway renovation will be paid for out of the RCSC Preservation & Improvement Fund. Fairway, the secondoldest recreation center in Sun City, is scheduled to be rebuilt with new club rooms and newer amenities, including an indoor walking track, walking pool,

swimming pool, spas, expanded Arizona Room and fitness center, using a twophase construction process. The new facility will offer RCSC cardholders and chartered club members a safer and updated center.

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"We know this will be an inconvenience to some RCSC cardholders," said RCSC Board of Directors President Denny Nichols. "But their patience throughout this process will be rewarded with a brand-new facility."

Fairway Rec Center to be demolished, replaced

Sun City's Fairway Recreation Center is being demolished and a new center built, with recreation managers citing the decaying facility as "beyond repair."


The facility has an old roof and has experienced equipment failures and false fire alarms due to possible faulty wiring, Sun City Recreation Centers President Don Schordie said.

"In previous years, (management) never invested the money for proper maintenance ... the repairs here are starting to cost more than the center," he said.

The center consists of four separate buildings and a pool area.

The rebuilding will occur in two phases.

In the first phase, developers will demolish the current center's library, large meeting room and pool area, to accommodate a large two-story building. Recreation managers estimate that the first phase will cost anywhere from \$6 million to \$8 million. The goal is to complete Phase One by the end of 2008, Schordje said. Management will shut down portions of the center for that period.

"(Fairway) will be without a pool for 18 months to two years, but we will find accommodations to keep clubs operating," Schordje said. Management plans to start construction on the first phase in the first half of 2007.

In Phase Two, local clubs and classes will occupy the completed part of the new building while the rest of the structure is finished. Schordje said the cost of Phase Two is contingent on the amount

of time it takes to complete Phase One. Original estimates predicted that the entire renovation would cost about \$15 million.

Schordje said. Management plans to start construction on the first phase in the first half of 2007.

In Phase Two, local clubs and classes will occupy the completed "We can't predict two to three years down the road how much the construction will cost, and anyone who does that is just taking a stab in the air," he said.

Money from Sun City's capital preservation fee, a \$2,100 one-time fee paid by all new residents, will fund the new center.

"There's a misconception that our annual dues are funding the project, but that is nowhere near the truth," Schordje said.

Sun City residents pay \$360 for dues each year.

"We are paying for this without going to our members and asking for money or raising fees. This is paid for by new people moving into Sun City, and they will be the beneficiaries of this new facility," Schordie said.

Built more than 40 years ago, Fairway is Sun City's second-oldest recreation center. A complete fitness center will replace outdated stationary exercise bicycles. The new complex also will feature an indoor running track, a new outdoor pool and Jacuzzis, new locker rooms, a multipurpose room with full-service kitchen, a library and classrooms to accommodate local clubs.

The classrooms, library, multipurpose room and most electrical work will be part of Phase One. Everything else will be finished in Phase Two.

The indoor walking track was a feature requested by residents. It will go on the center's second floor and overlook the pool area. "(Residents) that don't go away for summer are not able to walk outdoors due to heat, so it was a high priority to include (an indoor track) in this new facility," Schordie said.

Others are not as taken with new plans, however. Some residents are concerned because a lift for the handicapped is not planned for the new pool. Another concern is that the new pool will not have a deep end to accommodate those with back problems in need of deep-water therapy.

Schordje said the depth of the new pool has not been determined.

At the center on 107th and Peoria Avenues, the exterior paint on each building is fading. Formerly white door signs have yellowed.

"It just looks old," Dorothy Herceg said as she sat on the edge of the pool, talking to a friend and dangling her legs in the water.

"Realtors are starting to not show property properly down in Phase One. ... It's time we put a facility down there that will draw Realtors south of Grand Avenue to draw prospective buyers to Sun City," Schordje said.

At a meeting in Town Hall Center offices on May 6, the Articles of Incorporation of Sun City Community Association were officially signed as specified in the Consolidation Agreement executed between Sun City Town Hall Center and Sun City Civic Association, Incorporated on Feb. 8.

The incorporators signing the articles of incorporation and becoming members of the board of directors for the balance of 1968 are Leo J. Wilson, Lin Price, George C. Wilson, James M. Cullum, Esther R. Morris, Bertha M. Cox, Alfred R. Voelker, John W. Prather, Gerald W. McCarty, John R. Mord Welter F. Schott and Bill T. France. John R. Mead, Walter F. Schott and Phil T. Ewan.

The articles of incorporation were filed with the Arizona Corporation Commission on May 6 and the advice given that the new corporation was permitted to function immediately. As a result of the incorporation of "The Sun City Community Association", the Sun City Civic Association, Incorporated and Town Hall Center automatically cease to function or exist as Corporations.

The first meeting of the board of directors of the lights and canopy cover like the new court at Town Hall May 9, at Town Hall Center Directors Room. The first order of business was the election of officers to serve for the balance of 1968. The following officers were elected to serve, Lin Price, president; Alfred R. The new committee will work closely with J. Titus who has been given a new contract as the Sun City Community Association Manager. Titus will serve in his new position as he has formerly at Town Hall with added responsibilities and hority. He will report directly to the board of directors. Owen Childress, vice-president and project manager, Del E. Webb Company, Sun City, stated the first phase of the modernization construction at the Town Hall north (Community Center) started May 8. This modernization construction consists of a new shuffle board court with



It has been decided by the board of directors that the by-laws of the new corporation will also published in order that all Sun Citians will have an become opportunity to acquainted with their new

corporation. All Sun Citians automatically become the members of corporation and renew their membership each year by payment of their their payment membership dues. For the balance of 1968, current holders of 1968 Town Hall cards and current holders of Community Center cards are members of the new corporation and their cards will be honored at all functions, Price said. It is urged that all Sun Citians try to attend as many functions at all locations as possible. Participation of members in all functions will establish closer relationship for progress toward a greater Sun City, Price said.

Member ship Cards Honored At Both Centers

Effective April 15, membership cards of both Community Center and Town Hall Center will be honored by all activities, according to Leo J. Wilson, president of Community Center, and Lin Price, president of Town Hall

Center. They advised that it will be necessary to display your 1968 membership card at all places and events to gain admittance. This is necessary since it has been learned that too many outsiders are enjoying privileges to which they are not entitled. This reciprocity does not affect clubs until legal and other matters are consumated. It is estimated that complete consolidation will be effective no later that July 1, Wilson and Price stated

In a joint statement on April 4 by Leo Wilson and Lin Price, it was announced that consolidation papers were started April 1, one month ahead of schedule. To date nearly 1900 signed facility agreements have been received by Community Center.

Plans Made For Merger

At a recent executive meeting of the Town Hall Board and the Community Center Board, its respective presidents, Lin Price and Leo J. Wilson, issued the following joint statements:

"The overwhelming approval March 8 by Town Hall and Community Center property owners for consolidation, and the signing by Community Center property owners of Facilities Agreements far in excess of the number required under the Plan and Agreement for consolidation, has given us the go-ahead to now assemble the many details involved, and complete the legal structure for the now combined corporation to be known as the Sun City Community Association,

A m o n g s u c h considerations engaging our attention are the new Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, Inventories and Tri-Party Agreement with the Webb Development Corporation restructural improvements and repairs.

Town Hall and Community Center committees are already at work marshalling that data.

Announcements will be made when incorporation is effected. Rallies will be held of all Sun City residents commemorating the occasion. Every effort will be made to consumate consolidation on or before July 1, 1968."

PROPOSED PRESENTATION TO SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER
MEMBERS OF AGREEMENT SUBMITTED BY DEL E. WEBB DEVELOPMENT
CO. FOR PROVIDING ADDITIONAL GROUNDS AND FACILITIES, AND
ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO PRESENT TOWN HALL CENTER FOR
ADDING 1,700 RESIDENCES BEYOND PRESENT CONTRACT OF 3,500.

I. REASONS FOR MEETING AND PROPOSAL

PRESIDENT'S INTRODUCTION

In our May Town Hall Center Corporation meeting and subsequent newspaper articles, you were advised of negotiations being carried on between the Del E. Webb Development Co., and Town Hall Center. You were told that the Webb Company expect to build approximately 1,700 more residences in new units South of Peoria Avenue in a ddition to the 3,500 residences being attached to Town Hall Center under the present agreement.

In their planning they had set aside about seven acres at 107th Avenue and Mountain View Road for additional recreational facilities. They have however, been very anxious to avoid building another separate recreation center serving only the new units to be built, thus compounding the problems that now exist with Community Center and Town Hall Center operating independently and with separate memberships. As a result they ask us if Town Hall Center would consider the combining of the new facilities under the management and ownershup of Town Hall Center on consideration of adding the additional 1,700 residences to the 3,500, thus making a total then of 5,200 so a negotiating committee was appointed from your Board to try and work out with the Del E. Webb revelopment Co., a fair and equitable solution for presentation to the Town Hall Board and, if approved by the Board, to the Town Hall members for vote.

On August 22, 1966, Del E. Webb Development Co., officials presented to our negotiating committee an agreement for consideration of what they propose to do if Town Hall Center will accept the 1,700 additional residences. This agreement is very much in line with the recommendations submitted to them by our negotiating committee.

We are here today to present this agreement to you for your consideration.

I do want to comment on the negotiations, Hundreds of hours were spent in investigations and conferences with many Town Hall clubs and people and in vistitations to other retirement facilities in order to most accurately determine our needs

now and in the future and the best solutions for meeting those needs. We believe the Webb proposed agreement is not only fair and equitable but also meets our recommendations for future needs and expansion in a very excellent manner. The proposed alterations and additions will be of great benefit to all present and future members of Town Hall Center and Sun City, Arizona.

As the result of the above efforts the committee can now inform the residents of Town Hall Center of their results. This will be done in a brief resume in Exhibit A and Exhibit B following:

MODIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO TOWN HALL FACILITIES - 107th AND PEORIA AVENUE

- 1. LIBRARY: Library to be relocated in the present sewing room space. Part of the dark room space to be partitioned off for a library storage room.
- 2. SEWING ROOM: Enlarge the sewing room by installing a pair of swinging doors into the present ceramics and art room. Replace and build additional storage cabinets in the storage room.
- 3. DARK ROOM: Relocate partitions, door and cabinets in the dark room.
- 4. REST ROOMS AND SHOWER ROOMS: Remodel present shower room. The janitor storage and basket storage area will be partitioned to enlarge the shower and dressing acilities by eight shower and dressing spaces. Add adequate water heater in the janitor storage area.
- 5. COPPER ENAMELING MOSAICS JEWELRY MAKING, ETC.: The storage room partitions between present library and enameling room will be removed. Storage shelving will be added along the north and east walls.
- 6. WOODWORKING: Install a door in the partition between the present woodworking shop and lapidary storage room and use all of the combined facilities for woodworking.
- 7. ARTS AND CRAFTS BUILDING: Construct a new building with underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system, adequate air conditioning, approximately 32' x 125', to keep all arts and crafts facilities at present Town Hall Center location. The new structure will provide space and facilities for:
 - A. Lapidary room;
 - B. Ceramics and firing room;
 - C. Art and music room;
 - D. Janitor and equipment storage.
- 8. SHUFFLEBOARD: New canopies will be built at the shuffleboard courts with revised lighting and equipment racks.
- 9. SNACK BAR: A snack bar will be located east of the existing swimming pool. The building to have necessary plumbing and electrical facilities for a short order snack bar. Kitchen equipment to be furnished by Town Hall Center.
- 10. No repainting will be done except that required by relocation of equipment or partitions.

- 1. NEW AUDITORIUM: Construct an auditorium building with adequate air conditioning to seat between 1,000 and 1,200 people, with a stage dressing rooms, chairs and a projection booth. Covered and open terraces will overlook the pool area flor dining, dancing and lounging. An underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system will be installed in this building.
- 2. SWIMMING POOL: A swimming pool will be constructed in a completely landscaped, recessed area, with kool-decking surrounding the pool. Cabanas will be located in the southwest corner of the pool area, with toilet, shower room and basket storage building on the north side. Certain pool and terrace furniture will be provided. The recessed pool area will be accessible by two ramps from the terraces. The pool equipment will be located in the equipment area referred to in paragraph 7 of this exhibit.
- 3. HEALTH AND EXERCISE FACILITIES: A building with adequate air conditioning will be constructed to enclose a therapeutic pool, exercise room with mertain equipment, toilet facilities and dressing rooms. This thuilding will also include a kitchen facilities for serving catered banquets or parties. A snack bar space with necessary plumbing and electrical will be provided, kitchen equipment to be furnished by Town Hall Center. This building will have an underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system.
- 4. BOWLING GREEN: A bowling green with proper lighting will be provided.
- 5. SHUFFLEBOARD: Twelve shuffleboard courts with canopies, lighting and equipment racks will be provided. Toilet facilities will be located in a building between the shuffleboard courts and the bowling green, along with a general storage room for use in connection with the recreation area.
- 6. CROQUET: Four croquet courts will be located in the recreation area.
- 7. EQUIPMENT STORAGE: A recessed equipment yard accessible only by a service road from Mountain View Road. The pool equipment will be located in this equipment yard. A covered area will be provided for equipment storage.
- 8. PARKING: Parking area will be provided with ingress and egress to and from 107th Avenue and Mountain View Road.

Following Exhibit A and Exhibit B, herein is a breakdown of our present Town Hall area and a breakdown of the New Proposed Additions.

On September 1, 1966 your Town Hall Board of Directors voted favorably on this Agreement and on certain amendments and changes in the By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation which are required to proceed with this agreement. While the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws give the Town Hall Board the authority to enter into contracts or agreements, in order to increase the residential areas or number of residences attached to Town Hall Center these By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation changes have to be made.

Motion was made and seconded that the Articles of Incorporation be amended as follows:

"ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER and its principal place of business shall be at Sun City, Maricopa County, Arizona, but the board of directors may designate other places within the State of Arizona where other offices may be established and maintained and corporate business transacted. Members of the corporation shall be residents of Sun City Units 2,

3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue as shown on a map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit "C" attached hereto." (Explained later)

ARTICLE III, Paragraph 2. Amend to read: "2. To coordinate, implement and aid the various recreational and social clubs within Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue, and shown on map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit C.

ARTICLE III, Paragraph 3. Amend to read: "3. To promote cooperation in all matters of interest and benefit to the residents of Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue, as shown on map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit C."

The following changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws were approved:

In all instances where reference is made to "Units 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6" or "Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6", such geographical identifications shall be changed to read "Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional units or other geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue."

ARTICLE III, Section 2. Amend the first paragraph by adding the following sentence: "No member shall be denied the use of any facility of Sun City Town Hall Center, even though he has no membership in any recognized club and no recognized club shall have any rule or regulation prohibiting the use of any facility by such member."

ARTICLE III, Section 3. Add following sentence to paragraph 1: "This assessment will entitle each member to a membership card in all Town Hall activities."

BALLOT

"The proposed contract between the Del E. Webb Development 'Company and the Sun City Town Hall Center for the expansion of the area to be serviced by the said Town Hall Center from the present 3,500 Units to 5,200 Units and the recreational facilities be expanded as set forth in Exhibits "A" and "B" is approved."

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A YES VOTE will include the necessary changes to our Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws which will have to be amended to honor the proposal.

VF - RECREATION CANTERS - FAIRWAY BY-LAWS
(TOWN HALL) (as amended)
SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER
(Hereinafter known as "Town Hall")

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ARTICLE I - OFFICE

The principal office for the transaction of business of Town Hall shall be located in Sun City, Arizona.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. (a) Members shall be homeowners and/or residents occupying a house or apartment which is located as designated in the Articles of Incorporation.
 - (b) Mombership shall not be transferable.
- (c) A member must be current in the payment of the annual assessments to validate the membership and to entitle the member to all rights and privileges of same.

 SECTION 2. (a) Privileges of members shall be to vote, to hold office, to use all available facilities, subject to the rules and regulations of Town Hall or approved for the chartered clubs, and to participate and become members of all activities and clubs of Town Hall. Members shall have certain guest privileges as provided in the "Rules and Regulations".
- (b) No member shall be denied the use of any facilities of Town Hall even though he has no membership in any chartered club, and no chartered club shall have any rule or regulation, except those for the safety of persons and/or protection of property, prohibiting the use of any facility by such member.
- (c) No member or group of members, whether or not sponsored by a chartered club, or any other person or persons, shall so conduct themselves in or on Town Hall property as to violate any local, county, state or federal law and/or jeopardize the rights and privileges of other Town Hall members, their guests or any other person or persons. A cease and desist order shall be issued by the Town Hall Board of Directors against such infractions and, upon failure of such infractors to comply with said order, denial of the use of Town Hall property for such practices shall be ordered by the Board.

 SECTION 3. (a) The assessments for all members for each fiscal year (January 1 through December 31) shall be determined by the Board of Directors of this Corporation. Such assessments shall be due and payable January 1st of each year. Payment will entitle each member to a card which is valid in all Town Hall facilities. If home ownership should be established during the fiscal year, the assessment shall be prorated on a monthly basis until the end of the current fiscal year.
- (b) An admission or re-admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars for application or restoration to membership after a delinquency of six (6) months in the payment of assessments due, or after withdrawal from membership, shall obtain.

 SECTION 4. (a) A membership may be suspended or the member expelled by the Board of

Directors, after a hearing by the Board, for non-compliance by such member with the provisions of the Articles, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations.

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- (b) Application for reinstatement may be filed with the Board of Directors after such suspension or expulsion has been effective for thirty (30) days. During the period of suspension or expulsion such member shall have no rights to utilize any of the facilities of Town Hall.
- SECTION 5. (a) Regular corporation membership meetings shall be held during the months of January, May, September and November, at a place, date and hour to be set by the Board of Directors.
- (b) One hundred (100) members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board of Directors for a special meeting, stating the reasons for the meeting. The President shall call such a special meeting within ten (10) days after receiving such request. A quorum for any meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) members and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall prevail, except as provided in the By-Laws. A quorum shall be presumed in the absence of a challenge.

ARTICLE III - OFFICERS

- SECTION 1. The officers of the Corporation shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- SECTION 2. President. The President shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors and shall preside at an conduct all meetings by a formal order of business. He shall have general supervision and direction of the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the By-Laws, shall have authority to administer all matters not otherwise expressly delegated, shall appoint all committees (with the consent and approval of the Board) except the Nominating, Balloting and Executive Committees, and shall call all special meetings of the Corporation and/or the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President during the latter's absence.
- SECTION 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes of the meetings, shall send out notices of meetings and shall keep the members informed by bulletins from time to time as occasion warrants and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- SECTION 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Corporation and shall collect and disburse the same and keep a financial record thereof as prescribed by the Board of Directors and deposit them in the bank or banks designated by the Board of Directors; shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors; shall issue financial statements when required and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- SECTION 6. All officers, Board members, Committee chairmen and members, and employees who are in any way involved in the handling of Corporation funds, and the paid manager of

the Corporation, shall be bonded in a sum to be determined by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 7. Term of office. The term of office of all elected officers shall be one
year. Elected officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- SECTION 1. There shall be eleven (11) directors, including the four elected officers, none of whom shall receive a salary for his service to the Corporation.
- SECTION 2. The four officers shall be elected annually; the other seven directors shall be elected for two year terms, three of them being elected in odd-numbered years, four in even-numbered years.
- SECTION 3. Regular meetings shall be at Town Hall on the first Monday of each month at 9:00 AM, unless otherwise specified by the President, who shall preside at all meetings. Two-thirds of the members shall constitute a quorum. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the By-Laws and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, except as provided in the By-Laws.
- SECTION 4. The Board of Directors shall hold and administer the assets, and shall direct, control, manage, and supervise the business and affairs of the Corporation.
- SECTION 5. The Board of Birectors shall have authority to make rules and regulations as deemed expedient and to incorporate in the By-Laws such rules and regulations by reference.

ARTICLE V - VACANCIES

- SECTION 1. Removal. Action for removal of any elected officer or member of the Board of Directors may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) members of the Corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. The request for recall shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, after which and within seven (7) days the members of the Corporation may vote on the recall by secret ballot, according to Article IX of these By-Laws and the Rules and Regulations. Two-thirds of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be necessary for the recall of an elected officer or Board member.
- SECTION 2. Vacancy. The Board of Directors may declare vacant the position of any officer or director who, without good and sufficient reasons acceptable to the remaining members of the Board, is absent from three or more consecutive regular meetings of the Board.
- SECTION 3. Replacement. A vacancy on the Board of Directors or in any office, because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, shall be filled by the Board of Directors, subject to the approval of the members of the Corporation, by appointment of a member of the Corporation to serve until the next annual election. A director appointed to fill a vacancy shall serve for the unexpired term of his predecessor.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The President shall be empowered to appoint, with the consent and approval of the Board, such committees as he may deem necessary to properly and effectively carry on the affairs of the Corporation. This authority shall include all committees, standing and special, except the Nominating, Balloting, and Executive committees, which are specifically provided for in Articles VIII and IX of these By-Laws and/or the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE VII - CHARTERED CLUBS

SECTION 1. A chartered Town Hall club is one approved by the Board of Directors. Requirements for chartering, as well as the duties, responsibilities and authorities of such clubs are outlined in the "Club Organization" section of the Rules and Regulations. There shall be no conflict of club rules and regulations with the Articles of Incorporation and/or the By-Laws, and/or Rules and Regulations of this Corporation.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

- SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee shall submit a slate of officers and directors for consideration by the Board of Directors, consisting of at least two (2) candidates for each of the offices and director openings in accordance with approved procedure in the Rules and Regulations.
 - SECTION 2. The slate shall be announced at the regular November meeting of the Corporation and thereafter published and posted.
 - SECTION 3. The Board of Directors shall set the date and conduct the election in December not later than the 15th of that month.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. Voting on all matters of business, whether by secret ballot or otherwise, shall be in accordance with the procedure as specified in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified or revoked by the Board of Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first regular Corporation membership meeting following such Board action.
- (b) In cases where the members initiate the action or where the Board submits the matter to a vote before making any changes and/or amendments, the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be given to the Board at least ten (10) days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the Corporation, at which meeting the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be read and voted upon.
- (c) Voting shall be according to Article IX and the procedure outlined in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

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SECTION 1. No Article, Section or Sub-section in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.

TO ALL MEMBERS OF SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER:

In the January Corporation meeting for Town Hall members, we outlined certain important things we expected to do in 1967. The FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT was to appoint a special committee to study our entire operation and to recommend such revisions of our By-Laws as will provide a business-like, modern and efficient set of standards for the operation of Town Hall Center.

It is hard to realize, but within the next few months when we take over all the new facilities being built for us under our contract with Del E. Webb Development Company, Town Hall Center will own and operate approximately a MILLION DOLLARS worth of facilities and will have nearly six thousand members.

THIS IS NO LONGER A SMALL ENTERPRISE, but one requiring professional, paid management and operation to provide all of the constantly increasing services that are desired and required by the many members and organizations using the facilities.

Because of the many weaknesses, conflicts and omissions of our present By-Laws, over four month's study was made and as a result, on April 26, 1967, the Town Hall Board approved a complete new revision of our By-Laws. On May 8, 1967, these were presented in detail to the members at the regular Corporation meeting at Town Hall.

MONDAY, JUNE 5, 1967 was officially set as the date on which these By-Laws are to be voted on by the Town Hall members. So that each Town Hall member can be familiar with the new By-Laws, we are attaching them to this announcement and briefly giving you a few reasons why these new By-Laws are necessary.

In 1963, when Sun City Town Hall Corporation was formed and most of our present By-Laws were written, the entire Town Hall Center facilities were owned, operated and maintained by the Del E. Webb Development Company, who collected the membership fees, paid the bills and operated under their own Corporation Articles, by-laws, rules, etc. There were only some ten or eleven clubs, the total membership comparatively small, and the demands for facilities likewise. The Town Hall By-Laws primarily dealt with and were used in governing the Club operations and advisory maspects only.

And yet, on January 1, 1965, when these facilities were deeded over to the Sun City Town Hall Center and the members became solely responsible for its operation, those same Town Hall By-Laws had to be used to govern Town Hall, and its unpaid members were required to manage and operate the entire facilities. In 1965, as in the rapidly growing year of 1966, members of the Board and the Town Hall committees, who, you must remember, were serving without pay, found it had become an increasingly demanding job to run Town Hall and that the By-Laws did not spell out any provisions or rules for a paid manager and employee type operation. Believe us, it was only because of the many hours and intelligent work put in by such dedicated people as Lan Atkins, Chairman of the 1965 House Committee, and Clyde Wells, who held the same job in 1966, and others serving on the Board and Committees, that the job got done. Week after week, they put as much or more time in for Town Hall than they had on their jobs before retiring. This was asking too much from people who came here to retire.

As a result, in the spring of 1966, a professional manager was hired to run the physical operations of Town Hall, and for the first time under Town Hall ownership, the Board came face to face with the necessity for devising a set of rules spelling out the responsibilities and authority of a paid manager. Believe it or not, there was not one word in the entire By-Laws that mentioned an employee or provided any guide for the manager or operation with paid employees -- remember, prior to 1965, the Webb Company ran it themselves with their own manager and paid employees.

Space does not permit outlining all of the many other reasons for the new By-Laws, but many of them are self-explanatory, and these By-Laws, together with the Rules and Regulations mentioned, are contained in several books available for your inspection in the Town Hall offices.

FELLOW MEMBERS OF TOWN HALL:

Since Town Hall was incorporated in 1963, a great many changes have occurred and the by-laws which sufficed then, when Del Webb operated Town Hall, don't do a job for us now. Today we are three times as big as then, with over a million dollars in property and it takes a six-figure budget to run the place. So we must update our by-laws to fit our present operation with a full time professional manager.

Your By-Laws Revision Committee - Phil Campbell, Earl Holmes, George Jacobs, Art Mathis, Chris Nelson, Lin Price, Clyde Wells and Jack Jackley, chairman - has compiled a revised set of By-Laws which fully comply with our own Articles of Incorporation and with the Arizona Code, and which provide a vehicle for the smooth, efficient and economical operation of Town Hall in all its aspects. Here are the salient features:

Almost any corporation you can name - profit making or non-profit, from General Motors to our own local Home Owners' Association - votes for its directors and they, in turn, choose the officers. Under the proposed by-laws, Town Hall will adopt this standard procedure.

A professional manager to operate all facilities will be responsible to the Board thru the President, who is also required to appoint a Finance-Budget Committee to guard the finances, a Properties Committee to maintain constant vigilance over our physical properties, and a Committee on Committees to safeguard the nominating procedure of all candidates for the Board. No member of the Board may serve on the Nominating Committee.

Under current by-laws the recognized clubs name all candidates for the Nominating Committee; the new by-laws provide that only five members of this committee shall be chosen from names submitted by the clubs, and the other four members shall be chosen from the membership at large by the Committee on Committees.

At the tabulation of votes, the current by-laws permit as observers only persons designated by the clubs. The revised by-laws will allow any member of Town Hall in good standing to be an observer. The section on amendments to by-laws is now in full conformity with our own Articles of Incorporation and with the Arizona Code governing such matters.

Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation (see back of last page) cover the 2-year term for directors which was voted overwhelmingly last winter; the change-over to the system of voting for directors who will choose their own officers; and certain specific wording in Article XI which is necessary to conform to the Arizona Code.

We hope all of you will take time between now and September 25 to read over the entire set of proposed revisions and amendments and familiarize yourselves with them. Then, if you have any questions, drop in at the office at 10600 Peoria Avenue any day - Monday thru Friday - 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and a member of the By-Laws Committee will be there to discuss such items with you.

These Articles of Incorporation, as amended, and the Revised By-Laws were submitted by the By-Laws Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at a special meeting called for that purpose at Town Hall Center on Monday, August 21, 1967; and will be presented to the Town Hall members to be voted on at 1:30 p.m. Monday, September 25, 1967, in the new Town Hall South auditorium. Come and bring your neighbor (and be sure both of you bring along your Town Hall membership cards to provide identification for voting).

Article VII is hereby amended to read as follows:

The affairs of the Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors and such officers as the Board may elect or appoint. The number of Directors shall not be less than three (3) nor more than twenty-five (25), and shall be elected by the members at the annual meeting of the members of the Corporation, to be held on the first Thursday in December of each year, beginning with 1963; provided, however, that such date may be changed from time to time by the Board of Directors. The Directors shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. The following directors shall continue to serve until the annual Corporation membership meeting to be held on the first Thursday in December, 1968: Mrs. Bertha Cox, George H. Jacobs, John W. Prather, Alfred R. Voelker. All directors shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall elect annually from their own number the four officers for the current year.

The directors, subject to approval or veto by the members of the Corporation, shall have the power to adopt By-Laws for the Corporation. The By-Laws may be amended, modified, revised or revoked by the directors or by the members. In the event of conflict concerning the By-Laws as amended, modified, revised or revoked by the directors, the action of the members shall prevail. The procedure for the changing of any by-laws shall conform to and be consistent with the procedural method outlined in Article XI of the Articles of Incorporation.

The directors shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in the board or in any office, subject to approval or veto by the members. The Board may appoint from its own number an executive committee and invest such committee with such powers as may be approved by the directors.

The by-laws of the Corporation shall prescribe the qualifications of members and the terms of admission to membership, provided that the voting rights of all active members shall be equal and all active members shall have equal right and privileges and be subject to equal responsibilities. Such by-laws shall also provide the fees of admission, dues and assessments to be paid by the members and the grounds for and the manner in which members may withdraw, be suspended or expelled.

Article XI is hereby amended to read as follows:

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any meeting of the members called for that purpose (by the Board of Directors or by at least one hundred (100) members of this Corporation who petition for such a meeting), by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the corporation present at the meeting. Notice of any proposed amendment or amendments shall be given by written notice to the directors at least ten (10) days prior to a regular Board meeting, and by publication once a week for two consecutive weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting, in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in the county wherein the Articles of Incorporation were published; and by posting on the Town Hall bulletin boards two weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting.

These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the members called for that purpose (by the Board of Directors or by at least one hundred (100) members of this Corporation who petition for such meeting) by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members present at the meeting. Notice of any proposed amendment or amendments shall be given by written notice to the Directors at least ten (10) days prior to a regular Board meeting, and by publication once a week for two consecutive weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting, in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in the county wherein the Articles of Incorporation were published, and by posting upon the Town Hall bulletin boards two weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting.

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(c) Voting procedures outlined in Article IX shall apply.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

SECTION 1. No Article, Section or Sub-Section in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation, as amended.

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BY-LAWS (As Revised Sept. 25, 1967)

SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER (Hereinafter known as "Town Hall")

ARTICLE I - OFFICE

The principal office for the transaction of business of Town Hall shall be located in Sun City, Arizona.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. (a) Members shall be homeowners and/or residents occupying a house or apartment which is located as designated in the Articles of Incorporation, as amended. Residents of Sun Valley Lodge who were members in good standing at the time of moving to the Lodge may continue their memberships by payment of the current annual assessments.
- (b) Membership shall not be transferable. (c) A member must be current in the payment of the annual assessments to validate the membership and to entitle the member to all rights and privileges of same.
- SECTION 2. (a) Privileges of members shall be to vote, to hold office, to use all available facilities, subject to the rules and regulations of Town Hall or approved for the chartered clubs, and to participate and become members of all activities and clubs of Town Hall. Members shall have certain guest privileges as provided in the "Rules and Regulations".
- (b) No member shall be denied the use of any facilities of Town Hall even though he has no membership in any chartered club, and no chartered club shall have any rule or regulation, except those for the safety of persons and/or protection of property, prohibiting the use of any facility by such member.
- (c) No member or group of members, whether or not sponsored by a chartered club, or any other person or persons, shall so conduct themselves in or on Town Hall property as to jeopardize the rights and privileges of other Town Hall members, their guests or any other person or persons. A cease and desist order shall be issued by the Town Hall Board of Directors against such infractions and, upon failure of such infractors to comply with said order, denial of the use of Town Hall property for such practices shall be ordered by the Board.
- SECTION 3. (a) The assessments for all members for each fiscal year (January 1 through December 31) shall be determined by the Board of Directorsof this Corporation. Such assessments shall be due and payable January 1st of each year. Payment will entitle each member to a card which is valid in all Town Hall facilities. If membership should be established during the fiscal year, the assessment shall be prorated on a monthly basis until the end of the current fiscal year.
- (b) An admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars shall be charged any person who delays more than six (6) months in applying for membership after becoming eligible for same. A re-admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars may be charged for restoration to membership after default of membership due to delinquency of six (6) months in the payment of assessments due, or after withdrawal from membership.
- SECTION 4. (a) A membership may be suspended or the member expelled by the Board of Directors, after a hearing by the Boad, for non-compliance by such member with the provisions of the Articles, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations.

(b) Application for reinstatement may be filed with the Board of Directors after such suspension or expulsion has been effective for thirty (30) days. During the period of suspension or expulsion such member shall have no rights to utilize any of the facilities of Town Hall. January Odmone

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SECTION 5. (a) Quarterly corporation membership meetings shall be held each year on the second Monday during the months of January, May, September and November. The annual corporation membership meeting shall be held on the first Thursday in December, at which time the election will be held for the directorships.

(b) One hundred (100) members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board of Directors for a special meeting, stating the reasons for the meeting. Within ten (10) days after receiving such request, the President shall call a special meeting to be held within thirty (30) days. A quorum for any meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) members and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall prevail, except as provided in the By-Laws. A quorum shall be presumed in the absence of a challenge.

ARTICLE III - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. There shall be nine (9) directors, including the officers, none of whom shall receive compensation of any kind for his service to the Corporation. At the regular Board meeting in January of each year the newly elected directors shall be installed and the members of the Board shall then select from their own number the four officers listed in Article IV, who shall serve during that calendar year and until their successors are chosen and installed.

SECTION 2. At the first meeting of the Board of Directors a temporary chairman shall be appointed and the first order of business at this meeting shall be the election of officers. Election procedure shall be as follows:

Each member of the Board of Directors shall be given a list of all

directors, alphabetically arranged.

Each director shall mark on his list his choice for President, for Vice-President, for Secretary and for Treasurer.

A committee of tellers appointed by the temporary chairman shall collect and tally the votes as indicated on these lists and the temporary chairman shall, upon receiving the tally, announce the results and shall declare the one receiving the most votes for each office duly elected to that office to serve during the current year or until a successor has been elected and qualified.

Whereupon the temporary chairman shall turn the meeting over to the newly

elected President.

SECTION 3. Term of office. All directors shall be elected for a two-year term; four being elected in each even-numbered year and five in each odd-numbered year.

SECTION 4. Regular meetings shall be at Town Hall on the first Monday of each month at 9:00 AM, unless otherwise specified by the President, who shall preside at all meetings. Two-thirds of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the By-Laws and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, except as provided in the By-Laws.

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SECTION 5. The Board of Directors shall hold and administer the assets, and shall direct, control, manage, and supervise the business and affairs of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The Board of Directors shall have authority to make rules and regulations as deemed expedient and within the authority as outlined in the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws as amended. There shall be copies of the complete Rules and Regulations available to all members of Town Hall in the Town Hall offices at all hours when such offices are open for business, but such copies may not be removed from the premises.

SECTION 7. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to hire a manager and such other employees as are deemed necessary for the proper operation of Town Hall and its facilities, including the authority to dismiss such employees when deemed advisable. The manager's principal duties are as outlined in the Rules and Regulations, but the Board of Directors shall have authority to prescribe such additional duties for the manager as may be required for the best operation of Town Hall. The manager shall report through the President to the Board of Directors. The manager shall give a complete written report of the state of affairs concerning the operation of Town Hall at each regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors, and to the members at each quarterly Corporation meeting.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

- SECTION 1. The officers of the Corporation shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- SECTION 2. President. The President shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors and shall preside at and conduct all meetings by a formal order of business. He shall have general supervision and direction of the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws, shall have authority to administer all matters not otherwise expressly delegated, shall appoint all committees (with the consent and approval of the Board) except the Nominating and Balloting Committees, and shall call all special meetings of the Corporation and/or the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President during the latter's absence.
- SECTION 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes of the meetings, shall send out notices of meetings and shall keep the members informed by bulletins from time to time as occasion warrants and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- SECTION 5. (a) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Corporation and shall collect and disburse the same and keep a financial record thereof as prescribed by the Board of Directors, and deposit them to the account of Sun City Town Hall Center in the bank or banks designated by the Board of Directors; shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors; shall issue financial statements when required, including regularly scheduled Corporation meetings, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office. His financial records shall be audited at the close of the fiscal year by a certified public accountant, as selected by the Board of Directors.
- (b) The Board of Directors may appoint an assistant treasurer to serve at the discretion of the Board. Such assistant treasurer shall, in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, have the powers, duties, and the responsibilities of the Treasurer, but shall receive no compensation therefor.
- SECTION 6. All officers, Board members, Committee chairmen and members, and employees who are in any way involved in the handling of Corporation funds, and the paid manager of the Corporation, shall be bonded in a sum to be determined by the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 7. The term of office of all officers shall be one year, as provided in Section 1 of Article III. Elected officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE V - VACANCIES

SECTION 1. Removal. Action for removal of any elected officer or member of the Board of Directors may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) members of the Corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. The request for recall shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, after which and within seven (7) days the members of the Corporation may vote on the recall by secret ballot, according to Article IX of these By-Laws. An affirmative vote equal to two-thirds of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be necessary for the recall of an elected officer or Board member.

SECTION 2. Vacancy. The Board of Directors may declare vacant the position of any officer or director who, without good and sufficient reasons acceptable to the remaining members of the Board, is absent from three or more consecutive regular meetings of the Board.

SECTION 3. Replacement. A vacancy on the Board of Directors, or in any office, because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, shall be filled by the Board of Directors by appointment of a member of the Corporation to serve for the unexpired term of his predecessor, subject to the approval of the members of the Corporation at the next quarterly Corporation meeting.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

- SECTION 1. (a) The President shall be empowered to appoint, with the consent and approval of the Board, such committees as he may deem necessary to properly and effectively carry on the affairs of the Corporation, but it shall be mandatory, at the next regular board meeting after election of the President, that a Finance-Budget Committee, a Properties Committee, and a Committee on Committees of not less than five (5) nor more than nine (9) members, with a member of the Board as chairman of each, be included in these appointments. This authority shall include all committees, standing and special, except the Nominating and Balloting Committees which are specifically provided for in Articles VIII and IX, respectively, of these By-Laws.
- (b) FINANCE-BUDGET COMMITTEE Will have general control of the financial policy, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including ways andmeans for obtaining funds necessary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the Corporation. Will present in writing, not later than December 15 of each year, an itemized estimate of the income and expenses for the ensuing year which, upon approval of the Board of Directors, shall become the authorized budget for that year, and no obligation beyond the amount thus authorized shall be incurred by any committee or agent of the Corporation unless specially authorized by the Board of Directors. The Rules and Regulations shall outline methods for periodic audits and inventory checks by this committee.
- (c) PROPERTIES COMMITTEE Will be composed of members particularly skilled in the various technical requirements to function properly. This committee shall conduct at least once every sixty (60) days a complete inspection of all the Town Hall physical properties, including the buildings, equipment and grounds, to determine if same are safe, are being properly cared for, and are in good condition. After each inspection, the chairman shall make a report in writing to the Board of Directors of the status of the facilities, including any recommendations that may be necessary for the better preservation and care of the facilities, or replacements of equipment as needed. The Committee shall have no other authority.

(d) COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES - Will recommend qualified persons to the President for committee membership, and conduct nominating procedure as outlined in Article VIII of these By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII - CHARTERED CLUBS

SECTION 1. A chartered Town Hall club is one approved by the Board of Directors. Requirements for chartering, as well as the duties, responsibilities and authorities of such clubs are outlined in the "Club Organization" section of the Rules and Regulations. There shall be no conflict of club rules and regulations with the Articles of Incorporation and/or the By-Laws, and/or Rules and Regulations of this Corporation, as amended. These Club Rules and Regulations shall be posted at all times on the Town Hall bulletin boards and will be available to all clubs and organizations and individuals using Town Hall facilities.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

- SECTION 1. A Nominating Committee of nine (9) members shall make nominations at the Corporation membership meeting in November of each odd-numbered year for the five (5) directors of the Board to be elected in that year; and in each even-numbered year for the four (4) directors to be elected in that year.
- SECTION 2. The Nominating Committee shall consist only of Town Hall residents, who are members in good standing, to be chosen as follows:
- (a) Not later than September 15 of each year, each chartered Town Hall club shall submit in writing the name of one of its members to the Chairman of the Committee on Committees, for consideration as a member of the Nominating Committee.
- (b) The Committee on Committees shall transmit to the Board of Directors
- not later than October 1, at least fifteen (15) of the submitted names.
- (c) The Board of Directors, at their regular October meeting, shall select five (5) names from the list submitted and, in addition, the Committee on Committees shall select four (4) names to represent the membership at large. These nine (9) persons shall serve as the Nominating Committee and the Board shall arrange appropriate announcement of the same.
- announcement of the same.

 (d) The President shall call the first meeting of the Nominating Committee, at which time he will outline the duties and responsibilities of the Committee. The Committee will elect its chairman and the President will then retire from the meeting place.
- SECTION 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of not less than two (2) persons for each board seat to be filled at the upcoming election. This slate and any nominations from the floor at the November meeting shall be publicized in the same manner as for amending the Articles of Incorporation and shall be posted by listing the names of the nominees in alphabetical order on the official bulletin boards immediately after the slate has been announced at the November meeting. Announcement shall also be made at this meeting of the hours and place for voting.

- SECTION 4. A candidate and/or nominee must be a Town Hall member in good standing and a resident of the Town Hall area. Any member of the Nominating Committee, if requested by the Committee, may be nominated. Any person nominated shall declare his availability for attendance at necessary meetings of the Board and shall make himself available for any office to which the Board may elect him.
- SECTION 5. There shall be no members of the Board on the Nominating Committee.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. A voice or standing vote or show of hands shall prevail on all matters of business, except as follows when a secret ballot will be required:

(a) The election of all directors.

- (b) Recall of any officer and/or any member of the Board of Directors.
- (c) When a majority of the Board of Directors request a secret ballot.
- (d) When a secret ballot is requested by a majority vote of the eligible members of the Corporation at any meeting.

SECTION 2. When a secret ballot is required on (a), (b), or (c) above, the following will apply:

(a) The subject shall be voted on in direct accordance with the procedures as outlined in Articles VII or XI of the Articles of Incorporation as they may apply.

(b) Voting shall proceed under supervision of the Balloting Committee composed of five (5) members of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board. No nominee may serve on or assist the Balloting Committee. Ballot boxes and election procedure shall be prepared by this Committee.

(c) At least two (2) members of the Balloting Committee shall be in attendance at all times during voting and they shall determine eligibility (Article II of the By-Laws) of all voters, issue all official ballots and witness the casting of the ballots.

(d) Ballot boxes shall remain sealed until all votes are cast, then opened and votes tabulated in the presence of at least three (3) members of the Balloting Committee. Upon completion of the tabulation of ballots, the results shall be certified by balloting chairman to the Board and officially posted on Town Hall bulletin boards.

(e) Any Town Hall member may be present as an observer at the tabulation of votes.

SECTION 3. (a) An eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) if he will be absent from Maricopa County on the date set for balloting, may cast an absentee ballot at the place or time, or by mail, as designated by the Balloting Committee, but not more than fourteen (14) days nor less than three (3) days prior to the voting date.

(b) When requested by an ill or incapacitated eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) not more than five days nor less than two days prior to the voting date, any two members of the Balloting Committee shall take an official ballot and a sealed ballot box to his home and witness the casting of his absentee ballot.

(c) Ballot boxes containing absentee votes shall be opened and the ballots tabulated at the same time and place and under the same conditions as the regular ballots.

(d) Following tabulation, all ballots will be sealed and stored for a period of thirty (30) days, in custody of the Board of Directors.

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ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified, revised or revoked by the Board of Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first quarterly Corporation membership meeting following such Board action, or at a meeting called for that purpose.

He shall have general supervision and direction of the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws, shall have authority to administer all matters not otherwise expressly delegated, shall appoint all committees (with the consent and approval of the Board) except the Nominating and Balloting Committees, and shall call all special meetings of the Corporation and/or the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President during the latter's absence.
- SECTION 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes of the meetings, shall send out notices of meetings and shall keep the members informed by bulletins from time to time as occasion warrants and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- SECTION 5. (a) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Corporation and shall collect and disburse the same and keep a financial record thereof as prescribed by the Board of Directors, and deposit them to the account of Sun City Town Hall Center in the bank or banks designated by the Board of Directors; shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors; shall issue financial statements when required, including regularly scheduled Corporation meetings, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office. His financial records shall be audited at the close of the fiscal year by a certified public accountant, as selected by the Board of Directors.
- (b) The Board of Directors may appoint an assistant treasurer to serve at the discretion of the Board. Such assistant treasurer shall, in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, have the powers, duties, and the responsibilities of the Treasurer, but shall receive no compensation therefor.
- SECTION 6. All officers, Board members, Committee chairmen and members, and employees who are in any way involved in the handling of Corporation funds, and the paid manager of the Corporation, shall be bonded in a sum to be determined by the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 7. The term of office of all officers shall be one year, as provided in Section 1 of Article III. Elected officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE V - VACANCIES

- SECTION 1. Removal. Action for removal of any elected officer or member of the Board of Directors may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) members of the Corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. The request for recall shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, after which and within seven (7) days the members of the Corporation may vote on the recall by secret ballot, according to Article IX of these By-Laws. An affirmative vote equal to two-thirds of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be necessary for the recall of an elected officer or Board member.
- SECTION 2. Vacancy. The Board of Directors may declare vacant the position of any officer or director who, without good and sufficient reasons acceptable to the remaining members of the Board, is absent from three or more consecutive regular meetings of the Board.
- SECTION 3. Replacement. A vacancy on the Board of Directors, or in any office, because rof death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, shall be filled by the Board of Directors by appointment of a member of the Corporation to serve for the unexpired term of his predecessor, subject to the approval of the members of the Corporation at the next quarterly Corporation meeting.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

- SECTION 1. (a) The President shall be empowered to appoint, with the consent and approval of the Board, such committees as he may deem necessary to properly and effectively carry on the affairs of the Corporation, but it shall be mandatory, at the next regular board meeting after election of the President, that a Finance-Budget Committee, a Properties Committee, and a Committee on Committees of not less than five (5) nor more than nine (9) members, with a member of the Board as chairman of each, be included in these appointments. This authority shall include all committees, standing and special, except the Nominating and Balloting Committees which are specifically provided for in Articles VIII and IX, respectively, of these By-Laws.
- (b) FINANCE-BUDGET COMMITTEE Will have general control of the financial policy, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including ways andmeans for obtaining funds necessary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the Corporation. Will present in writing, not later than December 15 of each year, an itemized estimate of the income and expenses for the ensuing year which, upon approval of the Board of Directors, shall become the authorized budget for that year, and no obligation beyond the amount thus authorized shall be incurred by any committee or agent of the Corporation unless specially authorized by the Board of Directors. The Rules and Regulations shall outline methods for periodic audits and inventory checks by this committee.
- (c) PROPERTIES COMMITTEE Will be composed of members particularly skilled in the various technical requirements to function properly. This committee shall conduct at least once every sixty (60) days a complete inspection of all the Town Hall physical properties, including the buildings, equipment and grounds, to determine if same are safe, are being properly cared for, and are in good condition. After each inspection, the chairman shall make a report in writing to the Board of Directors of the status of the facilities, including any recommendations that may be necessary for the better preservation and care of the facilities, or replacements of equipment as needed. The Committee shall have no other authority.
- (d) COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES Will recommend qualified persons to the President for committee membership, and conduct nominating procedure as outlined in Article VIII of these By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII - CHARTERED CLUBS

Requirements for chartering, as well as the duties, responsibilities and authorities of such clubs are outlined in the "Club Organization" section of the Rules and Regulations. There shall be no conflict of club rules and regulations with the Articles of Incorporation and/or the By-Laws, and/or Rules and Regulations of this Corporation, as amended. These Club Rules and Regulations shall be posted at all times on the Town Hall bulletin boards and will be available to all clubs and organizations and individuals using Town Hall facilities.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

- SECTION 1. A Nominating Committee of nine (9) members shall make nominations at the Corporation membership meeting in November of each odd-numbered year for the five (5) directors of the Board to be elected in that year; and in each even-numbered year for the four (4) directors to be elected in that year.
- SECTION 2. The Nominating Committee shall consist only of Town Hall residents, who are members in good standing, to be chosen as follows:
- (a) Not later than September 15 of each year, each chartered Town Hall club shall submit in writing the name of one of its members to the Chairman of the Committee on Committees, for consideration as a member of the Nominating Committee.
- (b) The Committee on Committees shall transmit to the Board of Directors not later than October 1, at least fifteen (15) of the submitted names.
- (c) The Board of Directors, at their regular October meeting, shall select five (5) names from the list submitted and, in addition, the Committee on Committees shall select four (4) names to represent the membership at large. These nine (9) persons shall serve as the Nominating Committee and the Board shall arrange appropriate announcement of the same.
 - (d) The President shall call the first meeting of the Nominating Committee, at which time he will outline the duties and responsibilities of the Committee. The Committee will elect its chairman and the President will then retire from the meeting place.
- SECTION 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of not less than two (2) persons for each board seat to be filled at the upcoming election. This slate and any nominations from the floor at the November meeting shall be publicized in the same manner as for amending the Articles of Incorporation and shall be posted by listing the names of the nominees in alphabetical order on the official bulletin boards immediately after the slate has been announced at the November meeting. Announcement shall also be made at this meeting of the hours and place for voting.
- SECTION 4. A candidate and/or nominee must be a Town Hall member in good standing and a resident of the Town Hall area. Any member of the Nominating Committee, if requested by the Committee, may be nominated. Any person nominated shall declare his availability for attendance at necessary meetings of the Board and shall make himself available for any office to which the Board may elect him.
- SECTION 5. There shall be no members of the Board on the Nominating Committee.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

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- SECTION 1. A voice or standing vote or show of hands shall prevail on all matters of business, except as follows when a secret ballot will be required:
 - (a) The election of all directors.
 - (b) Recall of any officer and/or any member of the Board of Directors.
 - (c) When a majority of the Board of Directors request a secret ballot.
 - (d) When a secret ballot is requested by a majority vote of the eligible members of the Corporation at any meeting.
- SECTION 2. When a secret ballot is required on (a), (b), or (c) above, the following will apply:

(a) The subject shall be voted on in direct accordance with the procedures as outlined in Articles VII or XI of the Articles of Incorporation as

they may apply.

(b) Voting shall proceed under supervision of the Balloting Committee composed of five (5) members of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board. No nominee may serve on or assist the Balloting Committee. Ballot boxes and election procedure shall be prepared by this Committee.

(c) At least two (2) members of the Balloting Committee shall be in attendance at all times during voting and they shall determine eligibility (Article II of the By-Laws) of all voters, issue all official ballots and witness the casting of the ballots.

(d) Ballot boxes shall remain sealed until all votes are cast, then opened and votes tabulated in the presence of at least three (3) members of the Balloting Committee. Upon completion of the tabulation of ballots, the results shall be certified by balloting chairman to the Board and officially posted on Town Hall bulletin boards.

(e) Any Town Hall member may be present as an observer at the tabulation of

votes.

SECTION 3. (a) An eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) if he will be absent from Maricopa County on the date set for balloting, may cast an absentee ballot at the place or time, or by mail, as designated by the Balloting Committee, but not more than fourteen (14) days nor less than three (3) days prior to the voting date.

(b) When requested by an ill or incapacitated eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) not more than five days nor less than two days prior to the voting date, any two members of the Balloting Committee shall take an official ballot and a sealed ballot box to his home and witness the

casting of his absentee ballot.

(c) Ballot boxes containing absentee votes shall be opened and the ballots tabulated at the same time and place and under the same conditions as the regular ballots.

(d) Following tabulation, all ballots will be sealed and stored for a period of thirty (30) days, in custody of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified, revised or revoked by the Board o Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first quarterly Corporation membership meeting following such Board action, or at a meeting called for that purpose.

(b) These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the members called for that purpose (by the Board of Directors or by at least one hundred (100) members of this Corporation who petition for such meeting) by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members present at the meeting. Notice of any proposed amendment or amendments shall be given by written notice to the Directors at least ten (10) days prior to a regular Board meeting, and by publication once a week for two consecutive weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting, in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in the county wherein the Articles of Incorporation were published, and by posting upon the Town Hall bulletin boards two weeks prior to the Corporation membership meeting.

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(c) Voting procedures outlined in Article IX shall apply.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

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SECTION 1. No Article, Section or Sub-Section in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation, as amended

Today we are three times as big as then, with over a million dollars in property and it takes a six-figure budget to run the place. So we must update our by-laws to fit our present operation with a full time professional manager.

Your By-Laws Revision Committee - Phil Campbell, Earl Holmes, George Jacobs, Art Mathis, Chris Nelson, Lin Price, Clyde Wells and Jack Jackley, chairman - has compiled a revised set of By-Laws which fully comply with our own Articles of Incorporation and with the Arizona Code, and which provide a vehicle for the smooth, efficient and economical operation of Town Hall in all its aspects. Here are the salient features:

Almost any corporation you can name - profit making or non-profit, from General Motors to our own local Home Owners' Association - votes for its directors and they, in turn, choose the officers. Under the proposed by-laws, Town Hall will adopt this standard procedure.

A professional manager to operate all facilities will be responsible to the Board thru the President, who is also required to appoint a Finance-Budget Committee to guard the finances, a Properties Committee to maintain constant vigilance over our physical properties, and a Committee on Committees to safeguard the nominating procedure of all candidates for the Board. No member of the Board may serve on the Nominating Committee.

Under current by-laws the recognized clubs name all candidates for the Nominating Committee; the new by-laws provide that only five members of this committee shall be chosen from names submitted by the clubs, and the other four members shall be chosen from the membership at large by the Committee on Committees.

At the tabulation of votes, the current by-laws permit as observers only persons designated by the clubs. The revised by-laws will allow any member of Town Hall in good standing to be an observer. The section on amendments to by-laws is now in full conformity with our own Articles of Incorporation and with the Arizona Code governing such matters.

Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation (see back of last page) cover the 2-year term for directors which was voted overwhelmingly last winter; the change-over to the system of voting for directors who will choose their own officers; and certain specific wording in Article XI which is necessary to conform to the Arizona Code.

We hope all of you will take time between now and September 25 to read over the entire set of proposed revisions and amendments and familiarize yourselves with them. Then, if you have any questions, drop in at the office at 10600 Peoria Avenue any day - Monday thru Friday - 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and a member of the By-Laws Committee will be there to discuss such items with you.

These Articles of Incorporation, as amended, and the Revised By-Laws were submitted by the By-Laws Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at a special meeting called for that purpose at Town Hall Center on Monday, August 21, 1967; and will be presented to the Town Hall members to be voted on at 1:30 p.m. Monday, September 25, 1967, in the new Town Hall South auditorium. 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BY-LAWS (As Revised Sept. 25, 1967)

SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER (Hereinafter known as "Town Hall")

ARTICLE I - OFFICE

The principal office for the transaction of business of Town Hall shall be located in Sun City, Arizona.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. (a) Members shall be homeowners and/or residents occupying a house or apartment which is located as designated in the Articles of Incorporation, as amended. Residents of Sun Valley Lodge who were members in good standing at the time of moving to the Lodge may continue their memberships by payment of the current annual assessments.
 - (b) Membership shall not be transferable.
- (c) A member must be current in the payment of the annual assessments to validate the membership and to entitle the member to all rights and privileges of same.
- SECTION 2. (a) Privileges of members shall be to vote, to hold office, to use all available facilities, subject to the rules and regulations of Town Hall or approved for the chartered clubs, and to participate and become members of all activities and clubs of Town Hall. Members shall have certain guest privileges as provided in the "Rules and Regulations".
- (b) No member shall be denied the use of any facilities of Town Hall even though he has no membership in any chartered club, and no chartered club shall have any rule or regulation, except those for the safety of persons and/or protection of property, prohibiting the use of any facility by such member.
- (c) No member or group of members, whether or not sponsored by a chartered club, or any other person or persons, shall so conduct themselves in or on Town Hall property as to jeopardize the rights and privileges of other Town Hall members, their guests or any other person or persons. A cease and desist order shall be issued by the Town Hall Board of Directors against such infractions and, upon failure of such infractors to comply with said order, denial of the use of Town Hall property for such practices shall be ordered by the Board.
- SECTION 3. (a) The assessments for all members for each fiscal year (January 1 through December 31) shall be determined by the Board of Directorsof this Corporation. Such assessments shall be due and payable January 1st of each year. Payment will entitle each member to a card which is valid in all Town Hall facilities. If membership should be established during the fiscal year, the assessment shall be prorated on a monthly basis until the end of the current fiscal year.
- (b) An admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars shall be charged any person who delays more than six (6) months in applying for membership after becoming eligible for same. A re-admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars may be charged for restoration to membership after default of membership due to delinquency of six (6) months in the payment of assessments due, or after withdrawal from membership.
- SECTION 4. (a) A membership may be suspended or the member expelled by the Board of Directors, after a hearing by the Board, for non-compliance by such member with the provisions of the Articles, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations.
- (b) Application for reinstatement may be filed with the Board of Directors after such suspension or expulsion has been effective for thirty (30) days. During the period of suspension or expulsion such member shall have no rights to utilize any of the facilities of Town Hall.

- SECTION 5. (a) Quarterly corporation membership meetings shall be held each year on the second Monday during the months of January, May, September and November. The annual corporation membership meeting shall be held on the first Thursday in December, at which time the election will be held for the directorships.
- which time the election will be held for the directorships.

 (b) One hundred (100) members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board of Directors for a special meeting, stating the reasons for the meeting. Within ten (10) days after receiving such request, the President shall call a special meeting to be held within thirty (30) days. A quorum for any meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) members and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall prevail, except as provided in the By-Laws. A quorum shall be presumed in the absence of a challenge.

ARTICLE III - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- SECTION 1. There shall be nine (9) directors, including the officers, none of whom shall receive compensation of any kind for his service to the Corporation. At the regular Board meeting in January of each year the newly elected directors shall be installed and the members of the Board shall then select from their own number the four officers listed in Article IV, who shall serve during that calendar year and until their successors are chosen and installed.
- SECTION 2. At the first meeting of the Board of Directors a temporary chairman shall be appointed and the first order of business at this meeting shall be the election of officers. Election procedure shall be as follows:

Each member of the Board of Directors shall be given a list of all directors, alphabetically arranged.

Each director shall mark on his list his choice for President, for Vice-President, for Secretary and for Treasurer.

A committee of tellers appointed by the temporary chairman shall collect and tally the votes as indicated on these lists and the temporary chairman shall, upon receiving the tally, announce the results and shall declare the one receiving the most votes for each office duly elected to that office to serve during the current year or until a successor has been elected and qualified.

Whereupon the temporary chairman shall turn the meeting over to the newly elected President.

- SECTION 3. Term of office. All directors shall be elected for a two-year term; four being elected in each even-numbered year and five in each odd-numbered year.
- SECTION 4. Regular meetings shall be at Town Hall on the first Monday of each month at 9:00 AM, unless otherwise specified by the President, who shall preside at all meetings. Two-thirds of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the By-Laws and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, except as provided in the By-Laws.
- SECTION 5. The Board of Directors shall hold and administer the assets, and shall direct, control, manage, and supervise the business and affairs of the Corporation.
- SECTION 6. The Board of Directors shall have authority to make rules and regulations as deemed expedient and within the authority as outlined in the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws as amended. There shall be copies of the complete Rules and Regulations available to all members of Town Hall in the Town Hall offices at all hours when such offices are open for business, but such copies may not be removed from the premises.

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SECTION 7. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to hire a manager and such other employees as are deemed necessary for the proper operation of Town Hall and its facilities, including the authority to dismiss such employees when deemed advisable. The manager's principal duties are as outlined in the Rules and Regulations, but the Board of Directors shall have authority to prescribe such additional duties for the manager as may be required for the best operation of Town Hall. The manager shall report through the President to the Board of Directors. The manager shall give a complete written report of the state of affairs concerning the operation of Town Hall at each regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors, and to the members at each quarterly Corporation meeting.

. ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

- SECTION 1. The officers of the Corporation shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- SECTION 2. President. The President shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors and shall preside at and conduct all meetings by a formal order of business. He shall have general supervision and direction of the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws, shall have authority to administer all matters not otherwise expressly delegated, shall appoint all committees (with the consent and approval of the Board) except the Nominating and Balloting Committees, and shall call all special meetings of the Corporation and/or the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President during the latter's absence.
- SECTION 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes of the meetings, shall send out notices of meetings and shall keep the members informed by bulletins from time to time as occasion warrants and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- SECTION 5. (a) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Corporation and shall collect and disburse the same and keep a financial record thereof as prescribed by the Board of Directors, and deposit them to the account of Sun City Town Hall Center in the bank or banks designated by the Board of Directors; shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors; shall issue financial statements when required, including regularly scheduled Corporation meetings, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office. His financial records shall be audited at the close of the fiscal year by a certified public accountant, as selected by the Board of Directors.
- (b) The Board of Directors may appoint an assistant treasurer to serve at the discretion of the Board. Such assistant treasurer shall, in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, have the powers, duties, and the responsibilities of the Treasurer, but shall receive no compensation therefor.
- SECTION 6. All officers, Board members, Committee chairmen and members, and employees who are in any way involved in the handling of Corporation funds, and the paid manager of the Corporation, shall be bonded in a sum to be determined by the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 7. The term of office of all officers shall be one year, as provided in Section 1 of Article III. Elected officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE V - VACANCIES

- SECTION 1. Removal. Action for removal of any elected officer or member of the Board of Directors may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) members of the Corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. The request for recall shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, after which and within seven (7) days the members of the Corporation may vote on the recall by secret ballot, according to Article IX of these By-Laws. An affirmative vote equal to two-thirds of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be necessary for the recall of an elected officer or Board member.
- SECTION 2. Vacancy. The Board of Directors may declare vacant the position of any officer or director who, without good and sufficient reasons acceptable to the remaining members of the Board, is absent from three or more consecutive regular meetings of the Board.
- SECTION 3. Replacement. A vacancy on the Board of Directors, or in any office, because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, shall be filled by the Board of Directors by appointment of a member of the Corporation to serve for the unexpired term of his predecessor, subject to the approval of the members of the Corporation at the next quarterly Corporation meeting.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

- SECTION 1. (a) The President shall be empowered to appoint, with the consent and approval of the Board, such committees as he may deem necessary to properly and effectively carry on the affairs of the Corporation, but it shall be mandatory, at the next regular board meeting after election of the President, that a Finance-Budget Committee, a Properties Committee, and a Committee on Committees of not less than five (5) nor more than nine (9) members, with a member of the Board as chairman of each, be included in these appointments. This authority shall include all committees, standing and special, except the Nominating and Balloting Committees which are specifically provided for in Articles VIII and IX, respectively, of these By-Laws.
- (b) FINANCE-BUDGET COMMITTEE Will have general control of the financial policy, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including ways andmeans for obtaining funds necessary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the Corporation. Will present in writing, not later than December 15 of each year, an itemized estimate of the income and expenses for the ensuing year which, upon approval of the Board of Directors, shall become the authorized budget for that year, and no obligation beyond the amount thus authorized shall be incurred by any committee or agent of the Corporation unless specially authorized by the Board of Directors. The Rules and Regulations shall outline methods for periodic audits and inventory checks by this committee.
- (c) PROPERTIES COMMITTEE Will be composed of members particularly skilled in the various technical requirements to function properly. This committee shall conduct at least once every sixty (60) days a complete inspection of all the Town Hall physical properties, including the buildings, equipment and grounds, to determine if same are safe, are being properly cared for, and are in good condition. After each inspection, the chairman shall make a report in writing to the Board of Directors of the status of the facilities, including any recommendations that may be necessary for the better preservation and care of the facilities, or replacements of equipment as needed. The Committee shall have no other authority.

(d) COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES - Will recommend qualified persons to the President for committee membership, and conduct nominating procedure as outlined in Article VIII of these By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII - CHARTERED CLUBS

SECTION 1. A chartered Town Hall club is one approved by the Board of Directors. Requirements for chartering, as well as the duties, responsibilities and authorities of such clubs are outlined in the "Club Organization" section of the Rules and Regulations. There shall be no conflict of club rules and regulations with the Articles of Incorporation and/or the By-Laws, and/or Rules and Regulations of this Corporation, as amended. These Club Rules and Regulations shall be posted at all times on the Town Hall bulletin boards and will be available to all clubs and organizations and individuals using Town Hall facilities.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

- SECTION 1. A Nominating Committee of nine (9) members shall make nominations at the Corporation membership meeting in November of each odd-numbered year for the five (5) directors of the Board to be elected in that year; and in each even-numbered year for the four (4) directors to be elected in that year.
- SECTION 2. The Nominating Committee shall consist only of Town Hall residents, who are members in good standing, to be chosen as follows:
- (a) Not later than September 15 of each year, each chartered Town Hall club shall submit in writing the name of one of its members to the Chairman of the Committee on Committees, for consideration as a member of the Nominating Committee.
- (b) The Committee on Committees shall transmit to the Board of Directors not later than October 1, at least fifteen (15) of the submitted names.
- (c) The Board of Directors, at their regular October meeting, shall select five (5) names from the list submitted and, in addition, the Committee on Committees shall select four (4) names to represent the membership at large. These nine (9) persons shall serve as the Nominating Committee and the Board shall arrange appropriate announcement of the same.
- (d) The President shall call the first meeting of the Nominating Committee, at which time he will outline the duties and responsibilities of the Committee. The Committee will elect its chairman and the President will then retire from the meeting place.
- SECTION 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of not less than two (2) persons for each board seat to be filled at the upcoming election. This slate and any nominations from the floor at the November meeting shall be publicized in the same manner as for amending the Articles of Incorporation and shall be posted by listing the names of the nominees in alphabetical order on the official bulletin boards immediately after the slate has been announced at the November meeting. Announcement shall also be made at this meeting of the hours and place for voting.
- SECTION 4. A candidate and/or nominee must be a Town Hall member in good standing and a resident of the Town Hall area. Any member of the Nominating Committee, if requested by the Committee, may be nominated. Any person nominated shall declare his availability for attendance at necessary meetings of the Board and shall make himself available for any office to which the Board may elect him.
- SECTION 5. There shall be no members of the Board on the Nominating Committee.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

- SECTION 1. A voice or standing vote or show of hands shall prevail on all matters of business, except as follows when a secret ballot will be required:
 - (a) The election of all directors.
 - (b) Recall of any officer and/or any member of the Board of Directors.
 - (c) When a majority of the Board of Directors request a secret ballot.
 - (d) When a secret ballot is requested by a majority vote of the eligible members of the Corporation at any meeting.
- SECTION 2. When a secret ballot is required on (a), (b), or (c) above, the following will apply:
 - (a) The subject shall be voted on in direct accordance with the procedures as outlined in Articles VII or XI of the Articles of Incorporation as they may apply.
 - (b) Voting shall proceed under supervision of the Balloting Committee composed of five (5) members of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board. No nominee may serve on or assist the Balloting Committee. Ballot boxes and election procedure shall be prepared by this Committee.
 - (c) At least two (2) members of the Balloting Committee shall be in attendance at all times during voting and they shall determine eligibility (Article II of the By-Laws) of all voters, issue all official ballots and witness the casting of the ballots.
 - (d) Ballot boxes shall remain sealed until all votes are cast, then opened and votes tabulated in the presence of at least three (3) members of the Balloting Committee. Upon completion of the tabulation of ballots, the results shall be certified by balloting chairman to the Board and officially posted on Town Hall bulletin boards.
 - (e) Any Town Hall member may be present as an observer at the tabulation of votes.
- SECTION 3. (a) An eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) if he will be absent from Maricopa County on the date set for balloting, may cast an absentee ballot at the place or time, or by mail, as designated by the Balloting Committee, but not more than fourteen (14) days nor less than three (3) days prior to the voting date.
 - (b) When requested by an ill or incapacitated eligible voter (Article II of By-Laws) not more than five days nor less than two days prior to the voting date, any two members of the Balloting Committee shall take an official ballot and a sealed ballot box to his home and witness the casting of his absentee ballot.
 - (c) Ballot boxes containing absentee votes shall be opened and the ballots tabulated at the same time and place and under the same conditions as the regular ballots.
 - (d) Following tabulation, all ballots will be sealed and stored for a period of thirty (30) days, in custody of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified, revised or revoked by the Board of Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first quarterly Corporation membership meeting following such Board action, or at a meeting called for that purpose.

TO ALL MEMBERS OF SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER:

In the January Corporation meeting for Town Hall members, we outlined certain important things we expected to do in 1967. The FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT was to appoint a special committee to study our entire operation and to recommend such revisions of our By-Laws as will provide a business-like, modern and efficient set of standards for the operation of Town Hall Center.

It is hard to realize, but within the next few months when we take over all the new facilities being built for us under our contract with Del E. Webb Development Company, Town Hall Center will own and operate approximately a MILLION DOLLARS worth of facilities and will have nearly six thousand members.

THIS IS NO LONGER A SMALL ENTERPRISE, but one requiring professional, paid management and operation to provide all of the constantly increasing services that are desired and required by the many members and organizations using the facilities.

Because of the many weaknesses, conflicts and omissions of our present By-Laws, over four month's study was made and as a result, on April 26, 1967, the Town Hall Board approved a complete new revision of our By-Laws. On May 8, 1967, these were presented in detail to the members at the regular Corporation meeting at Town Hall.

MONDAY, JUNE 5, 1967 was officially set as the date on which these By-Laws are to be voted on by the Town Hall members. So that each Town Hall member can be familiar with the new By-Laws, we are attaching them to this announcement and briefly giving you a few reasons why these new By-Laws are necessary.

In 1963, when Sun City Town Hall Corporation was formed and most of our present By-Laws were written, the entire Town Hall Center facilities were owned, operated and maintained by the Del E. Webb Development Company, who collected the membership fees, paid the bills and operated under their own Corporation Articles, by-laws, rules, etc. There were only some ten or eleven clubs, the total membership comparatively small, and the demands for facilities likewise. The Town Hall By-Laws primarily dealt with and were used in governing the Club operations and advisory maspects only.

And yet, on January 1, 1965, when these facilities were deeded over to the Sun City Town Hall Center and the members became solely responsible for its operation, those same Town Hall By-Laws had to be used to govern Town Hall, and its unpaid members were required to manage and operate the entire facilities. In 1965, as in the rapidly growing year of 1966, members of the Board and the Town Hall committees, who, you must remember, were serving without pay, found it had become an increasingly demanding job to run Town Hall and that the By-Laws did not spell out any provisions or rules for a paid manager and employee type operation. Believe us, it was only because of the many hours and intelligent work put in by such dedicated people as Lan Atkins, Chairman of the 1965 House Committee, and Clyde Wells, who held the same job in 1966, and others serving on the Board and Committees, that the job got done. Week after week, they put as much or more time in for Town Hall than they had on their jobs before retiring. This was asking too much from people who came here to retire.

As a result, in the spring of 1966, a professional manager was hired to run the physical operations of Town Hall, and for the first time under Town Hall ownership, the Board came face to face with the necessity for devising a set of rules spelling out the responsibilities and authority of a paid manager. Believe it or not, there was not one word in the entire By-Laws that mentioned an employee or provided any guide for the manager or operation with paid employees -- remember, prior to 1965, the Webb Company ran it themselves with their own manager and paid employees.

Space does not permit outlining all of the many other reasons for the new By-Laws, but many of them are self-explanatory, and these By-Laws, together with the Rules and Regulations mentioned, are contained in several books available for your inspection in the Town Hall offices.

BY-LAWS (as amended) SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER (Hereinafter known as "Town Hall")

ARTICLE I - OFFICE

The principal office for the transaction of business of Town Hall shall be located in Sun City, Arizona.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. (a) Members shall be homeowners and/or residents occupying a house or apartment which is located as designated in the Articles of Incorporation.
 - (b) Membership shall not be transferable.
- (c) A member must be current in the payment of the annual assessments to validate the membership and to entitle the member to all rights and privileges of same.

 SECTION 2. (a) Privileges of members shall be to vote, to hold office, to use all available facilities, subject to the rules and regulations of Town Hall or approved for the chartered clubs, and to participate and become members of all activities and clubs of Town Hall. Members shall have certain guest privileges as provided in the "Rules and Regulations".
- (b) No member shall be denied the use of any facilities of Town Hall even though he has no membership in any chartered club, and no chartered club shall have any rule or regulation, except those for the safety of persons and/or protection of property, prohibiting the use of any facility by such member.
- (c) No member or group of members, whether or not sponsored by a chartered club, or any other person or persons, shall so conduct themselves in or on Town Hall property as to violate any local, county, state or federal law and/or jeopardize the rights and privileges of other Town Hall members, their guests or any other person or persons. A cease and desist order shall be issued by the Town Hall Board of Directors against such infractions and, upon failure of such infractors to comply with said order, denial of the use of Town Hall property for such practices shall be ordered by the Board.

 SECTION 3. (a) The assessments for all members for each fiscal year (January 1 through December 31) shall be determined by the Board of Directors of this Corporation. Such assessments shall be due and payable January 1st of each year. Payment will entitle each member to a card which is valid in all Town Hall facilities. If home ownership should be established during the fiscal year, the assessment shall be prorated on a monthly basis until the end of the current fiscal year.
- (b) An admission or re-admission fee of one hundred (100) dollars for application or restoration to membership after a delinquency of six (6) months in the payment of assessments due, or after withdrawal from membership, shall obtain.

 SECTION 4. (a) A membership may be suspended or the member expelled by the Board of

Directors, after a hearing by the Board, for non-compliance by such member with the provisions of the Articles, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations.

- (b) Application for reinstatement may be filed with the Board of Directors after such suspension or expulsion has been effective for thirty (30) days. During the period of suspension or expulsion such member shall have no rights to utilize any of the facilities of Town Hall.
- SECTION 5. (a) Regular corporation membership meetings shall be held during the months of January, May, September and November, at a place, date and hour to be set by the Board of Directors.
- (b) One hundred (100) members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board of Directors for a special meeting, stating the reasons for the meeting. The President shall call such a special meeting within ten (10) days after receiving such request. A quorum for any meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) members and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall prevail, except as provided in the Py-Laws. A quorum shall be presumed in the absence of a challenge.

ARTICLE III - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Corporation shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

SECTION 2. President. The President shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors and shall preside at an conduct all meetings by a formal order of business. He shall have general supervision and direction of the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the By-Laws, shall have authority to administer all matters not otherwise expressly delegated, shall appoint all committees (with the consent and approval of the Board) except the Nominating, Balloting and Executive Committees, and shall call all special meetings of the Corporation and/or the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President during the latter's absence.

SECTION 1. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes of the meetings, shall send out notices of meetings and shall keep the members informed by bulletins from time to time as occasion warrants and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

SECTION 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds of the Corporation and shall collect and disburse the same and keep a financial record thereof as prescribed by the Board of Directors and deposit them in the bank or banks designated by the Board of Directors; shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors; shall issue financial statements when required and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

SECTION 6. All officers, Board members, Committee chairmen and members, and employees
who are in any way involved in the handling of Corporation funds, and the paid manager of

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the Corporation, shall be bonded in a sum to be determined by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 7. Term of office. The term of office of all elected officers shall be one

year. Elected officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- SECTION 1. There shall be eleven (11) directors, including the four elected officers, none of whom shall receive a salary for his service to the Corporation.
- SECTION 2. The four officers shall be elected annually; the other seven directors shall be elected for two year terms, three of them being elected in odd-numbered years, four in even-numbered years.
- SECTION 3. Regular meetings shall be at Town Hall on the first Monday of each month at 9:00 AM, unless otherwise specified by the President, who shall preside at all meetings. Two-thirds of the members shall constitute a quorum. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the By-Laws and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, except as provided in the By-Laws.
- SECTION 4. The Board of Directors shall hold and administer the assets, and shall direct, control, manage, and supervise the business and affairs of the Corporation.
- SECTION 5. The Board of Directors shall have authority to make rules and regulations as deemed expedient and to incorporate in the By-Laws such rules and regulations by reference.

ARTICLE V - VACANCIES

- SECTION 1. Removal. Action for removal of any elected officer or member of the Board of Directors may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) members of the Corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. - SECTION 3. The Board of Directors shall set the date and conduct the election in December not later than the 15th of that month.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. Voting on all matters of business, whether by secret ballot or otherwise, shall be in accordance with the procedure as specified in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified or revoked by the Board of Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first regular Corporation membership meeting following such Board action.
- (b) In cases where the members initiate the action or where the Board submits the matter to a vote before making any changes and/or amendments, the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be given to the Board at least ten (10) days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the Corporation, at which meeting the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be read and voted upon.
- (c) Voting shall be according to Article IX and the procedure outlined in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

SECTION 1. No Article, Section or Sub-section in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.

- SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee shall submit a slate of officers and directors for consideration by the Board of Directors, consisting of at least two (2) candidates for each of the offices and director openings in accordance with approved procedure in the Rules and Regulations.
 - SECTION 2. The slate shall be announced at the regular November meeting of the Corporation and thereafter published and posted.
 - SECTION 3. The Board of Directors shall set the date and conduct the election in December not later than the 15th of that month.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. Voting on all matters of business, whether by secret ballot or otherwise, shall be in accordance with the procedure as specified in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- SECTION 1. (a) Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) members of the Corporation. These By-Laws may be amended, modified or revoked by the Board of Directors or by the members, but such action by the Board shall be subject to approval by vote of the members at the first regular Corporation membership meeting following such Board action.
- (b) In cases where the members initiate the action or where the Board submits the matter to a vote before making any changes and/or amendments, the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be given to the Board at least ten (10) days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the Corporation, at which meeting the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be read and voted upon.
- (c) Voting shall be according to Article IX and the procedure outlined in the Rules and Regulations.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

<u>SECTION 1.</u> No Article, Section or Sub-section in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.

Says Titus, "There are no pools in the entire county that excell our own in cleanliness and inpurity of water, and this includes those at the luxury resort hotels." Full credit must be given to our pools supervisor, Jack Jackley, and his staff of dedicated monitors who start the day at 6:00 AM in order to be ready for the 10 o'clock opening.

Total attendance at all pools is now running over 500 per day and is expected to increase to well over 1,000 during the summer months. This makes the pools by far the most used facility in Sun City. We appreciate your fine work, fellows.

PROPOSED PRESENTATION TO SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER
MEMBERS OF AGREEMENT SUBMITTED BY DEL E. WEBB DEVELOPMENT
CO. FOR PROVIDING ADDITIONAL GROUNDS AND FACILITIES, AND
ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO PRESENT TOWN HALL CENTER FOR
ADDING 1,700 RESIDENCES BEYOND PRESENT CONTRACT OF 3,500.

I. REASONS FOR MEETING AND PROPOSAL

PRESIDENT'S INTRODUCTION

In our May Town Hall Center Corporation meeting and subsequent newspaper articles, you were advised of negotiations being carried on between the Del E. Webb Development Co., and Town Hall Center. You were told that the Webb Company expect to build approximately 1,700 more residences in new units South of Peoria Avenue in a ddition to the 3,500 residences being attached to Town Hall Center under the present agreement.

In their planning they had set aside about seven acres at 107th Avenue and Mountain View Road for additional recreational facilities. They have however, been very anxious to avoid building another separate recreation center serving only the new units to be built, thus compounding the problems that now exist with Community Center and Town Hall Center operating independently and with separate memberships. As a result they ask us if Town Hall Center would consider the combining of the new facilities under the management and ownershup of Town Hall Center on consideration of adding the additional 1,700 residences to the 3,500, thus making a total then of 5,200 so a negotiating committee was appointed from your Board to try and work out with the Del E. Webb pevelopment Co., a fair and equitable solution for presentation to the Town Hall Board and, if approved by the Board, to the Town Hall members for vote.

On August 22, 1966, Del E. Webb Development Co., officials presented to our negotiating committee an agreement for consideration of what they propose to do if Town Hall Center will accept the 1,700 additional residences. This agreement is very much in line with the recommendations submitted to them by our negotiating committee.

We are here today to present this agreement to you for your consideration.

I do want to comment on the negotiations. Hundreds of hours were spent in investigations and conferences with many Town Hall clubs and people and in vistitations to other retirement facilities in order to most accurately determine our needs

now and in the future and the best solutions for meeting those needs. We believe the Webb proposed agreement is not only fair and equitable but also meets our recommendations for future needs and expansion in a very excellent manner. The proposed alterations and additions will be of great benefit to all present and future members of Town Hall Center and Sun City, Arizona.

As the result of the above efforts the committee can now inform the residents of Town Hall Center of their results. This will be done in a brief resume in Exhibit A and Exhibit B following:

MODIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO TOWN HALL FACILITIES - 107th AND PEORIA AVENUE

- 1. LIBRARY: Library to be relocated in the present sewing room space.

 Part of the dark room space to be partitioned off for a library storage room.
- 2. SEWING ROOM: Enlarge the sewing room by installing a pair of swinging doors into the present ceramics and art room. Replace and build additional storage cabinets in the storage room.
- 3. DARK ROOM: Relocate partitions, door and cabinets in the dark room.
- 4. REST ROOMS AND SHOWER ROOMS: Remodel present shower room. The janitor storage and basket storage area will be partitioned to enlarge the shower and dressing facilities by eight shower and dressing spaces. Add adequate water heater in the janitor storage area.
- 5. COPPER ENAMELING MOSAICS JEWELRY MAKING, ETC.: The storage room partitions between present library and enameling room will be removed. Storage shelving will be added along the north and east walls.
- 6. WOODWORKING: Install a door in the partition between the present woodworking shop and lapidary storage room and use all of the combined facilities for woodworking.
- 7. ARTS AND CRAFTS BUILDING: Construct a new building with underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system, adequate air conditioning, approximately 32' x 125', to keep all arts and crafts facilities at present Town Hall Center location. The new structure will provide space and facilities for:
 - A. Lapidary room;
 - B. Ceramics and firing room;
 - C. Art and music room;
 - D. Janitor and equipment storage.
- 8. SHUFFLEBOARD: New canopies will be built at the shuffleboard courts with revised lighting and equipment racks.
- 9. SNACK BAR: A snack bar will be located east of the existing swimming pool.

 The building to have necessary plumbing and electrical facilities for a short order snack bar. Kitchen equipment to be furnished by Town Hall Center.
- 10. No repainting will be done except that required by relocation of equipment or partitions.

- 1. NEW AUDITORIUM: Construct an auditorium building with adequate air conditioning to seat between 1,000 and 1,200 people, with a stage dressing rooms, chairs and a projection booth. Covered and open terraces will overlook the pool area flor dining, dancing and lounging. An underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system will be installed in this building.
- 2. SWIMMING POOL: A swimming pool will be constructed in a completely landscaped, recessed area, with kool-decking surrounding the pool. Cabanas will be located in the southwest corner of the pool area, with toilet, shower room and basket storage building on the north side. Certain pool and terrace furniture will be provided. The recessed pool area will be accessible by two ramps from the terraces. The pool equipment will be located in the equipment area referred to in paragraph 7 of this exhibit.
- HEALTH AND EXERCISE FACILITIES: A building with adequate air conditioning will be constructed to enclose a therapeutic pool, exercise room with mertain equipment, toilet facilities and dressing rooms. This building will also include a kitchen facilities for serving catered banquets or parties. A snack bar space with necessary plumbing and electrical will be provided, kitchen equipment to be furnished by Town Hall Center. This building will have an underwriter's approved fire sprinkler system.
- 4. BOWLING GREEN: A bowling green with proper lighting will be provided.
- 5. SHUFFLEBOARD: Twelve shuffleboard courts with canopies, lighting and equipment racks will be provided. Toilet facilities will be located in a building between the shuffleboard courts and the bowling green, along with a general storage room for use in connection with the recreation area.
- 6. CROQUET: Four croquet courts will be located in the recreation area.
- 7. EQUIPMENT STORAGE: A recessed equipment yard accessible only by a service road from Mountain View Road. The pool equipment will be located in this equipment yard. A covered area will be provided for equipment storage.
- 8. PARKING: Parking area will be provided with ingress and egress to and from 107th Avenue and Mountain View Road.

On September 1, 1966 your Town Hall Board of Directors voted favorably on this Agreement and on certain amendments and changes in the By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation which are required to proceed with this agreement. While the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws give the Town Hall Board the authority to enter into contracts or agreements, in order to increase the residential areas or number of residences attached to Town Hall Center these By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation changes have to be made.

Motion was made and seconded that the Articles of Incorporation be amended as follows:

"ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER and its principal place of business shall be at Sun City, Maricopa County, Arizona, but the board of directors may designate other places within the State of Arizona where other offices may be established and maintained and corporate business transacted. Members of the corporation shall be residents of Sun City Units 2,

3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue as shown on a map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit "C" attached hereto." (Explained later)

ARTICLE III, Paragraph 2. Amend to read: "2. To coordinate, implement and aid the various recreational and social clubs within Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue, and shown on map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit C.

ARTICLE III, Paragraph 3. Amend to read: "3. To promote cooperation in all matters of interest and benefit to the residents of Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue, Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue, as shown on map of Sun City, Arizona, identified as Exhibit C."

The following changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws were approved:

In all instances where reference is made to "Units 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6" or "Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6", such geographical identifications shall be changed to read "Units 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and such additional units or other geographical designations as may be formed, created or zoned within the bounds of Peoria Avenue, 99th Avenue Olive Avenue and a boundary line west of lllth Avenue."

ARTICLE III, Section 2. Amend the first paragraph by adding the following sentence: "No member shall be denied the use of any facility of Sun City Town Hall Center, even though he has no membership in any recognized club and no recognized club shall have any rule or regulation prohibiting the use of any facility by such member."

ARTICLE III, Section 3. Add following sentence to paragraph 1: "This assessment will entitle each member to a membership card in all Town Hall activities."

BALLOT

"The proposed contract between the Del E. Webb Development 'Company and the Sun City Town Hall Center for the expansion of the area to be serviced by the said Town Hall Center from the present 3,500 Units to 5,200 Units and the recreational facilities be expanded as set forth in Exhibits "A" and "B" is approved."

The shovel with a suitable inscription was then presented to Mr. Welch and will be given a place of honor in the Town Hall.

Present plans call for work on the new complex to start in January, 1967 with the possible completion by May 15. A progress chart (billboard) will be installed on the site to keep residents up to date on its progress.

FOR CONSIDERATION OF TOWN HALL FINANCE COMMITTEE

Assumptions:

Income from operation of activities at Town Hall during the years 1962 and 1963 have produced net profit of a few hundred dollars per year. The amount is not considered sufficient to consider in forecasting future income under local ownership.

For the present, at least, we are assuming that the area to be served by Town Hall will consist of Units 2, 3, 4 and 5 - containing, in all, 2,470 housing units.

It appears reasonable to assume that the percentage of annual assessments which will be currently collected will range between 90% and 98%. Obviously the smaller the population in the area to be served, the higher will the assessments have to be; and this could present a problem in collections. On the other hand, if the population of the area becomes too large, the Town Hall facilities will become so over-crowded that perhaps many of the residents will refuse to pay their assessments in protest. A reasonable mid-point is required for the best prospects of satisfied Town Hall members and the maximum in current collection of assessments at all times.

There are three factors which will influence Town Hall income, and which cannot be determined precisely at present. One of our jobs will be to approximate them as closely as we can. They are:

- 1. The average number of residents per housing unit, which may vary slightly from time to time.
- 2. The number of delinquencies.
- 3. The amount of annual assessment per resident.

There is attached a schedule showing an assortment of combinations of the three factors mentioned above and the resulting annual income to Town Hall in such cases. Our principal task in forecasting the income will be to decide upon the most highly probable combination of these factors. The 20% Federal Tax on these assessments is disregarded, as it goes out of the Town Hall Treasury nearly as soon as it comes in.

Webb Development Company in the Valley of the Sun, here in Sun City, the purchase included his proportionate share of Sun City privileges, all of the facilities swimming pool, shuffleboard courts, lawn bowling, putting greens, Town Hall facilities, Art and Craft Center and Agricultural Center:
- Whereas Each purchaser of a home in Town Hall Center area signed a Community Facilities Agreement in which he assumed responsibility for his proportionate share of the operation and maintenance expenses of Town Hall Facilities;
- Whereas At a regular meeting of Sun City Town Hall Center, the members voted to accept from Del E. Webb Development Company the complete ownership, operation and maintenance of Town Hall Center including grounds and all facilities;
- Whereas On January 1st, 1965, and thereafter, all expenses connected with the operation and maintenance of Town Hall Center became the financial and management responsibility of all residents residing in Sun City Town Hall Center area;
- And Whereas All resident members who have not paid their dues by March 1st of each year shall be considered to be delinquent;
- Therefore Be It Resolved That such delinquent members of Sun City Town Hall area shall be notified, and if their membership dues for the current year are not paid by April 1st, their names shall be posted on an Official Bulletin Board in Sun City Town Hall Center.

Webb Development Co. until such time as there are sufficient home owners so that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) of annual operating costs of the community facilities are attributed to each resident home owner, or if transferred before said time by Webb, Webb agrees to pay the actual operating costs over \$20.00 per resident home owner. |
| Until the transfer mentioned above has taken place, I agree to pay annually and in advance to the Del E. Webb Development Co., or the non-profit corporation mentioned above, the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) per month for each resident in the home which I am purchasing until the property is transferred to the non-profit group and different arrangements are made by the governing body of that group. This annual payment shall be on a calendar year basis and the first payment shall cover the period commencing with the home owner's pro-ration date and shall be paid through escrow. |
| I further agree that in the event of any future sale of my home that the above understanding and agreement will be made a part of the Sales Contract and an obligation of the buyer. |



At the regular November meeting of the Sun City Town Hall Center the members voted to accept from the Del E. Webb Development Company, the complete ownership and operation of Town Hall Center including all facilities. This means that land and improvements estimated to be worth about \$450,000 becomes the property and the responsibility of we the people of Town Hall Center.

As of January 1st, all expenses connected with the maintenance and operation of Town Hall Center shall become the financial and management responsibility of we the people of Town Hall Center.

Considerable discussion has been directed, by your Town Hall Center Board of Directors, to the fact that while some members of Town Hall Center are charged a \$12.00 fee for an activity card, other members must pay \$20.00 for the same privileges. Also since your Board of Directors has no basis upon which to estimate accurately the cost of operation and maintenance to Town Hall facilities, it was decided by your Board that the fee be equalized at \$20.00 per person in order to keep accounts in the black, and provide proper and efficient management.

The Sun City Town Hall Center as it now stands will become the property of the people of Town Hall Center on January 1st, 1965. The additional building and the remodeling of Town Hall granted by the Webb Company will be completed within a few months. The second swimming pool is also to be added to our facilities by the Webb Company.

Your Town Hall Center Board of Directors believe that we the people can be justly proud to own and operate facilities of the calibre we shall have when these additions have been made.

Won't you aid your Board by cheerfully accepting your responsibilities? Whether or not you personally avail yourselves of the many opportunities offered at Town Hall, it still remains an asset to the Community and to your personal property value.

For your information we are attaching a copy of your Community Facilities Agreement. Activity cards are now being issued in the Town Hall Lounge.

The facilities of Town Hall Center are for the use of all persons holding current Town Hall Center Membership Cards.

Members of Recognized Town Hall 'lubs shall not have special advantages over non-club members in the use of Craft Facilities.

For the Safety and Protection of all Town Hall ^Center members, the Recognized Clubs shall folmulate rules and safety regulations covering the use of tools and/or equipment utilized by Club Members and Non-Club Members. (Per By Laws of Sun City Town Hall Center, Article VII, Section 1. paragraph d) All such rules and regulations must be submitted to the CLUB ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE for their approval. Approved rules and regulations must be posted in the area used by the Club.

The facilities in the Arts and Craft Rooms are for hobbies and not for the manufacture of articles to be sold by individuals for private gain.

Recognized Clubs may offer for sale, articles made in the Arts and Craft Rooms provided the profit is retained by the Club.

Recognized Clubs may employ instructors, entertainers, etc., for the benefit of and by the request of its members. Fees, if any, are to be collected by the club.

RESOLUTION REGARDING UNPAID MEMBERSHIP DUES.

- Whereas When each purchaser bought a home from the Del E. - And Whereas All resident members who have not paid their dues by March 1st of each year shall be considered to be delinquent;
- Therefore Be It Resolved That such delinquent members of Sun City Town Hall area shall be notified, and if their membership dues for the current year are not paid by April 1st, their names shall be posted on an Official Bulletin Board in Sun City Town Hall Center.

SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER

BY-LAWS

(Adopted September 9, 1963) (Amended December 8, 1964)

ARTICLE I - NAME

SECTION 1. The name of this non-profit corporation shall be SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES

SECTION 1. The name of this non-profit corporation be identical to those set forth in Article III of the Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Classification of membership shall be active and associate. Active members shall be home owners, beneficial and/or legal, and/or spouses and other members of the household living in Units 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6, or subsequent beneficial and/or legal owners living within these units who have paid the required assessments.

Associate members shall be renters or lessees of property in Units 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6 and shall have paid the required assessments for their classification.

Membership shall not be transferable.

SECTION 2, Privileges of active members shall be to vote, to hold office, to use all available facilities, subject to the rules and regulations of the recognized clubs, and to participate and become members of all activities and clubs of the Sun City Town Hall Center. They shall have guest privileges as provided by each recognized club.

Privileges of associate members shall be the same as those of active members except to vote or to hold office.

SECTION 3. The assessments shall be determined and collected by the Del E. Webb Company until they formally transfer the properties to this corporation. Thereafter, the assessments for active members for each fiscal year, January 1 through December 31, shall be determined by the Board of Directors of this corporation. Such assessments shall be due and payable prior to January 1 of each year.

If home ownership should be established during the fiscal year, the assessment shall be pro-rated on a monthly basis until the end of the current fiscal year.

Assessments for associate members shall be determined by the Board of Directors on a quarterly, semi-annual or annual basis, payable as of the beginning of their residence.

SECTION 4. Any membership may be suspended by the Board of Directors, after a hearing before the Board, for gross misconduct or violation of the rules or regulations of Sun City Town Hall Center.

SECTION 5. Regular meetings shall be held on the second Monday of the months of January, May, September and November, at 1:30 P.M. at Town Hall, unless otherwise changed by the Board of Directors. One hundred (100) active members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board of Directors for a special meeting, stating the reasons for the meeting. The President shall call such a special meeting within ten (10) days after receiving the request. A quorum for any meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) active members and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall prevail.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer.

SECTION 2. They shall be elected by secret ballot for the term of one year by the active members of the corporation, according to Article IX, sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 3. Action for removal of any elected officer may be initiated by not less than one hundred (100) bonafide active members of the corporation, who shall submit their reasons in writing to the Secretary. The request for recall shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, after which and within seven (7) days, the members of the corporation may vote on the recall by secret ballot, according to Article IX, section 2 and 3. Two-thirds of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be necessary for the recall of an elected officer.

SECTION 4. In case of a vacancy in an elected office, the Board of Directors, subject to the approval of the members, may appoint an active member of the corporation in good standing to serve the unexpired term.

SECTION 5. The duties of the elected officers shall be to:

a. The President

- Preside at all meetings of the corporation and Board of Directors.
- (2) Enforce the By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation.
- (3) Enforce all policies, rules, and regulations as determmined by the Board of Directors.
- (4) Call special meetings of the Board of Directors, when necessary.
- (5) Appoint all committees, except the Nominating Committee and the Balloting Committee, with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.
- (6) Call special meetings of the corporation according to Article III, section 5, or with approval of the Board of Directors.

b. The Vice President

 Assume all the powers and duties of the President, in his absence.

c. The Secretary

- Issue notices of all meetings, keep minutes and necessary records of the corporation and of the Board of Directors.
- (2) Conduct all corespondence relating to the corporation
- (3) Maintain a roster of all members of the Corporation.

d. The Treasurer

(1) Receive all monies payable to the Corporation.

- (2) Make all disbursements, authorized by the Board of Directors, by check countersigned by the President or such other officers or Board members as may be designated by the Board of Directors.
- (3) Deposit all funds in a bank, designated by the Board of Directors, to the account of Sun City Town Hall Center.

- (4) Report the financial standing of the corporation at all regular Board of Directors and Corporation meetings.
- (5) Submit his financial records on July 1 and January 2 to the Finance Committee for audit.
- (6) a. All officers and board members designated to handle corporation funds shall be bonded.
 - b. The fiscal year of the corporation shall be January 1 through December 31, of each year.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. There shall be eleven (11) directors, including the four elected officers, none of whom shall receive a salary for his service to the corporation.

SECTION 2. They shall be elected for the term of one year by the active members of the corporation, according to Article IX, sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 3. They may be removed in the same manner as described in Article IV, section 3.

SECTION 4. A vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as described in Article IV, section 4.

SECTION 5. Regular meetings shall be at Town Hall on the first Monday of each month at 9:00 A.M., unless otherwise specified by the President who shall preside at all meetings. Two-thirds of the members shall constitute a quorum. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the By-Laws and Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised.

SECTION 6. The duties of the Board of Directors shall be to:

- a. Govern the proper use of all of the facilities of the corporation including the following:
- (1) Determination of policies governing the use of all facilities by the recognized clubs and/or other groups.
- (2) Management of all financial affairs of the corporation.
- (3) Preservation and control of all physical equipment, in cluding health and safety provisions.
- (4) Approval and supervision of all necessary committees as provided in Article VI, section 2.
- (5) Perform all other duties as may be necessary or desirable..
- b. Coordinate the activities of all committees and clubs.
- c. Conduct all elections as provided in Article IX, sections 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Only residents of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 holding active membership cards shall be eligible to serve on any committee.

SECTION 2. Standing committees shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3. The standing committees and their duties shall be as follows:

- a. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES To recommend qualified persons to the President for committee membership. It shall consist of not less than seven (7) active members.
- FINANCE COMMITTEE To have general control of the finances, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including ways and means for obtaining funds nec-

essary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the corporation.

To present in writing, not later than December 15 of each year, an itemized estimate of the income and expenses for the ensuing year, which upon approval of the Board of Directors shall become the authorized budget for that year, and no obligation beyond the amount thus authorized shall be incurred by any committee or agent of the corporation unless specially authorized by the Board of Directors.

To receive on July 1 and January 2 from the treasurer of the corporation his financial record and not later than July 31 and January 31 audit and report their findings to the Board of Directors who shall have it reported to the members of the corporation at their next regular meeting.

It shall consist of not less than nine (9) active members. The chairman shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and make such reports as necessary or as requested by the President.

c. HOUSE COMMITTEE - To have general management, subject to the Board of Directors, of the use of the facilities and equipment of Sun City Town Hall Center and adjoining buildings and grounds, except that which is under direct supervision of recognized clubs.

To receive and consider requests from recognized clubs and/or other groups and organizations within and without Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, who desire to use the facilities and equipment; issue permits according to the rules and regulations governing Sun City Town Hall Center; and make available such facilities and equipment as needed to cover the terms of the permit.

To determine all charges and fees for use of facilities and equipment, collecting same from any group subject to such fees.

To remit promptly to the Treasurer of the corporation all monies received from any source.

To schedule and coordinate all activities and events in which buildings, facilities and equipment of the corporation is involved in and about Sun City Town Hall Center.

To determine, organize, promote and supervise all special entertainment other than that of recognized clubs which will be of interest and benefit to the members of the corporation.

To maintain an inventory and review the use and care of all power and hand tools, equipment facilities, furniture fittings and appliances, and requisition new or replacement materials from the Finance Committee.

To form such sub-committees as properties, scheduling and special entertainment, determining their duties and functions in order to accomplish the purposes and duties of the committee.

To hold regular monthly meetings and assume such duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

It shall consist of not less than nine (9) active members, including the Vice-President of the corporation. The Chairman shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and make such reports as necessary or as requested by the President

d. SAFETY COMMITTEE - To survey and recommend to the Board of Directors rules and regulations regarding safety precautions and elimination of hazards in the entire Sun City Town Hall Center.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) active members.

e. CLUB ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE - To receive, review and recommend to the Board of Directors applications that conform to Article VII, sections 1 and 2, for new and/or recognized clubs and to assist in their organization and functions.

To review annually all recognized clubs and to report to the Board of Directors any changes in their program, operation and/or By-Laws.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) actice members.

f. PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE - To provide information to all residents of Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 concerning the available facilities, activities and purposes of the corporation, through appropriate publicity.

To maintain good public relations between all residents of Sun City.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) active members plus the publicity chairman of each recognized club.

SECTION 4. Special committees may be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5. All committee members shall declare their availability and willingness to attend the necessary meetings of their respective committee,

SECTION 6. All committee chairmen shall report at least quarterly to the Board of Directors, or when requested by it. They shall attend all corporation meetings and be prepared to make a report, if requested by the President.

ARTICLE VII - RECOGNIZED CLUBS

SECTION 1. A recognized Sun City Town Hall Club is one recommended by the Club Organization Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. The minimum requirements shall be as follows:

- a. It shall have at least 25 members, who shall meet regularly. A list of members shall be made available for inspection upon request of the Club Organization Committee.
- It shall have By-Laws approved by the Club Organization Committee, stating its purposes and functions.
- c. It shall be organized with at least three officers: a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer, all of whom shall be active members of the Sun City Town Hall Center.
- d. Membership shall be open to all assessment paying residents of Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 who may use the equipment and facilities as provided by the club rules and regulations.
- e. Membership shall consist of at least 65% of assessment paying residents of Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, while the remaining membership may consist of residents holding current membership cards from other activity centers of Sun City, provided there is sufficient room for all, as determined by the Club itself.
- It shall maintain an inventory, accept and be responsible for tools and equipment under its custody.
- g. All club chairmen shall attend all corporation meetings and be prepared to report, if requested by the President.

SECTION 2. There shall be no conflict between club rules and regulations with the Articles of Incorporation or the By-Laws of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. A nominating committee of nine (9) active members shall make nominations at the November meeting of the Corporation for the eleven directors of the Board, including the four elected officers.

SECTION 2. The nominating committee shall consist only of Sun City Town Hall Center residents to be chosen as follows:

- a. Not later than September 15 of each year, each recognized Sun City Town Hall club shall submit in writing the names of two of its members to the Chairman of the Committee on Committees.
- b. The Committee on Committees shall transmit to the Board of Directors not later than October 1, at least fifteen (15) of the submitted names.
- c. The Board of Directors, at their regular October meeting, shall select nine (9) names from the list submitted to them to serve as the Nominating Committee and shall arrange appropriate announcement of the committee.

SECTION 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of not less than two (2) persons for each of the four (4) elected officers, listed alphabetically. They shall also prepare a slate of at least twelve (12) persons, listed alphabetically, for the other seven (7) Directors of the Board. This slate shall be published in the local newspapers and posted on the official bulletin board of the corporation after it is announced at the November meeting.

SECTION 4. Any member of the Nominating Committee, if requested by the committee, may be nominated for any office.

SECTION 5. A person nominated for any office shall declare his availability for attendance at necessary meetings of the office.

SECTION 6. Not less than twenty-six (26) days, nor more than forty (40) days following announcement and publicity of the slate, the Board of Directors shall conduct an election as provided in Article IX, sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 7. Nominations for the eleven directors of the Board, including the four elected officers, may be made from the floor at the November meeting of the Corporation.

SECTION 8. There shall be no members ex-officiis on the Nominating Committee.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. A voice or standing vote shall prevail on all matters of business except as follows:

- a. The election of all officers and directors.
- b. Amendments to the By-Laws.
- Recall of any officer and/or any member of the Board of Directors.
- d. When a majority of the Board of Directors request a secret ballot.
- e. When a secret ballot is requested by a majority vote of the eligible members of the corporation at a regular meeting.
 - (1) The question or questions to be voted on shall be open for discussion in at least one Corporation meeting and publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days nor more than forty (40) days prior to the date designated for voting.

(2) Voting date shall be decided by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2. Procedure for voting by secret ballot shall be as follows:

- a. Voting shall proceed under supervision of the Balloting Committee composed of five (5) members of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board. Ballot boxes and election procedure shall be prepared by this Committee.
- b. Voting shall be in the Sun City Town Hall area and polls shall be open from ten o'clock (10:00) A.M. to seven o'clock (7:00) P.M. on date set for voting.
- At least two members of the Balloting Committee shall be in attendance at all times during voting and they shall determine eligibility (Article III, section 1) of all voters, issue all official ballots and witness the casting of the ballot.
- d. Ballot boxes shall remain sealed until polls are closed, then opened and votes tabulated in the presence of at least three (3) members of the Balloting Committee.
- Any recognized club of Sun City Town Hall Center may designate one watcher to be present at the tabulation of the votes.
- f. The person receiving the highest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected by the Chairman of the Balloting Committee.
- SECTION 3. An absentee ballot may be cast as follows.

 An eligible voter (Article III, section 1) if he will be absent from Maricopa County on the date set for balloting, may cast an absentee ballot at the place and time, or by mail, as designated by the Balloting Committee, but not more than fifteen (15) days nor less than three (3) days prior to the voting date.
- When requested by an ill or incapacitated eligible voter (Article III, section 1) not more than five (5) days nor

- less than two (2) days prior to the voting date, any two members of the Balloting Committee shall take an official ballot and a sealed ballot box to his home and witness the casting of his absentee ballot.
- c. Ballot boxes containing absentee votes shall be opened and the ballots tabulated at the same time and place and under the same conditions as the regular ballots.

SECTION 4. The newly elected officers and members of the Board of Directors shall take office at the regular January meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by the Board of Directors or by petition of at least one hundred (100) active members of the Corporation. In either case such proposed changes and/or amendments shall be given to the Secretary of the Board of Directors at least ten (10) days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the corporation at which meeting the proposed changes and/or amendments shall be read. Immediately following such public reading, the Secretary shall post a facsimile of the proposed changes and/or amendments on the official bulletin board of the corporation and provide for its publication in the local newspapers. Such proposed changes and ½ or amendments shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, nor more than forty (40) days prior to voting on them.

SECTION 2. Voting shall be according to Article IV, section 2 and 3. A two-thirds vote of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be required to change or amend the By-Laws.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

SECTION 1, No article in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.

- a. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES To recommend qualified persons to the President for committee membership. It shall consist of not less than seven (7) active members.
- b. FINANCE COMMITTEE To have general control of the finances, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, including devised ways and means for obtaining funds necessary to meet the authorized budget for carrying out the work of the corporation.

To present in writing, not later than December 15 of each year, an itemized estimate of the income and expenses for the ensuing year, and upon approval of the Board of Directors, it shall become the authorized budget for that year, and no obligations beyond the amount thus authorized shall be incurred by any committee or agent of the corporation unless especially authorized by the Board of Directors.

To receive on July 1 and January 2 from the treasurer of the corporation, his financial record and not later than July 31 and January 31, audit and report their findings to the Board of Directors who shall have it reported to the members of the corporation at their next regular meeting.

It shall consist of not less than nine (9) active members. The chairman shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and make such reports as necessary, or as requested by the President.

c. HOUSE COMMITTEE - To have general management, subject to the Board of Directors, of the use of the facilities and equipment of Sun City Town Hall Center and adjoining buildings and grounds, except that which is under direct supervision of recognized clubs.

To receive and consider requests from recognized clubs and/or other groups and organizations within and without Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5, who desire to use the facilities and equipment; issue permits according to the rules and regulations governing Sun City Town Hall Center; and make available such facilities and equipment as needed to cover the terms of the permit.

To determine all charges and fees for use of facilities and equipment, collecting same from any group subject to such fees.

To remit promptly to the Treasurer of the corporation all monies received from any source.

To schedule and coordinate all activities and events in which buildings, facilities and equipment of the corporation is involved in and about Sun City Town Hall Center.

To determine, organize, promote and supervise all special entertainment other than that of recognized clubs which will be of interest and benefit to the members of the corporation.

To maintain an inventory and review the use and care of all power and hand tools, equipment facilities, furniture, fittings and appliances, and requisition new or replacement materials from the Finance Committee.

To form such sub-committees as properties, scheduling and special entertainment, determining their duties and functions in order to accomplish the purposes and duties of the committee

To hold regular monthly meetings and assume such duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

It shall consist of not less than nine (9) active members, including the Vice-President of the corporation. The Chairman shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and make such reports as necessary or as requested by the President.

d. SAFETY COMMITTEE - To survey and recommend to the Board of Directors, rules and regulations regarding safety precautions and elimination of hazards in the entire Sun City Town Hall Center.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) active members.

e. CLUB ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE - To receive, review and recommend to the Board of Directors, applications that conform to Article VII, sections 1 and 2, for new and/or recognized clubs and to assist in their organization and functions.

To review annually all recognized clubs and to report to the Board of Directors any changes in their program, operation and/or By-Laws.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) active members.

f. PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE - To provide information to all residents of Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 concerning the available facilities, activities and purposes of the corporation, through appropriate publicity.

To maintain good public relations between all residents of Sun City.

It shall consist of not less than five (5) active members plus the publicity chairman of each recognized club.

SECTION 4. Special committees may be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5. All committee members shall declare their availability and willingness to attend the necessary meetings of their respective committee.

SECTION 6. All committee chairmen shall report at least quarterly to the Board of Directors, or when requested by it. They shall attend all corporation meetings and be prepared to make a report, if requested by the President.

ARTICLE VII - RECOGNIZED CLUBS

SECTION 1. A recognized Sun City Town Hall Club is one recommended by the Club Organization Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. The minimum requirements shall be as follows:

- a. It shall have at least 25 members, who shall meet regularly.
- b. It shall have By-Laws approved by the Club Organization Committee, stating its purposes and functions.
- c. It shall be organized with at least three officers: a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer.
- d. Membership shall be open to all assessment paying residents of Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 who may use the equipment and facilities as provided by the club rules and regulations.
- e. Membership may consist of at least 65% of assessment paying residents of Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5, while the remaining membership may consist of residents holding current membership cards from other activity centers of Sun City, provided there is sufficient room for all, as determined by the Club itself.
- f. It shall maintain an inventory, accept and be responsible for tools and equipment under its custody.
- g. All club chairmen shall attend all corporation meetings and be prepared to report, if requested by the President.

SECTION 2. There shall be no conflict between club rules and regulations, the Articles of Incorporation, and the By-Laws of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VIII - NOMINATION PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. A nominating committee of nine (9) active members shall make nominations at the November meeting of the Corporation for the eleven directors of the Board, including the four elected officers.

SECTION 2. The nominating committee shall be chosen as follows:

- a. Not later than September 15 of each year, each recognized Sun City Town Hall club shall submit in writing the names of two of its members to the chairman of the Committee on Committees.
- b. The Committee on Committees shall transmit to the Board of Directors not later than October 1, at least fifteen (15) of the submitted names.

c. The Board of Directors, at their regular October meeting, shall select nine (9) names from the list submitted to them to serve as the Nominating Committee and shall arrange appropriate announcement of the committee.

SECTION 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of not less than two (2) persons for each of the four (4) elected officers, listed alphabetically. They shall also prepare a slate of at least twelve (12) persons, listed alphabetically, for the other seven (7) Directors of the Board. This slate shall be published in the local newspapers and posted on the official bulletin board of the corporation after it is announced at the November meeting.

SECTION 4. Any member of the Nominating Committee, if requested by the committee, may be nominated for any office.

SECTION 5. A person nominated for any office shall declare his availability for attendance at necessary meetings of the office.

SECTION 6. Not less than twenty-six (26) days, nor more than forty (40) days following announcement and publicity of the slate, the Board of Directors shall conduct an election as provided in Article IX, sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 7. Nominations for the eleven directors of the Board, including the four elected officers, may be made from the floor at the November meeting of the Corporation.

SECTION 8. There shall be no members ex-officits on the Nominating Committee.

ARTICLE IX - VOTING PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. A voice or standing vote shall prevail on all matters of business except as follows:

- a. The election of all officers and directors.
- b. Amendments to the By-Laws.
- Recall of any officer and/or any member of the Board of Directors.
- d. When a majority of the Board of Directors request a secret ballot.
- e. When a secret ballot is requested by a majority vote of the eligible members of the corporation at a regular meeting.
 - (1) The question or questions to be voted on shall be open for discussion in at least one Corporation meeting and publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days nor more than forty (40) days prior to the date designated for voting.
 - (2) Voting date shall be decided by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2. Procedure for voting by secret ballot shall be as follows:

- a. Voting shall proceed under supervision of the Balloting Committee composed of five (5) members of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board. Ballots, ballot boxes and election procedure shall be prepared by this Committee.
- b. Voting shall be in the Sun City Town Hall area and polls shall be open from ten o'clock (10:00) A.M. to seven o'clock (7:00) P.M. on date set for voting.
- c. At least two members of the Balloting Committee shall be in attendance at all times during voting and they shall determine eligibility (Article III, section 1) of all voters, issue all official ballots and witness the casting of the ballot.
- d. Ballot boxes shall remain sealed until polls are closed, then opened and votes tabulated in the presence of at least three (3) members of the Balloting Committee.

- e. Any recognized club of Sun City Town Hall Center may designate one watcher to be present at the tabulation of the votes.
- f. The person receiving the highest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected by the Chairman of the Balloting Committee.

SECTION 3. An absentee ballot may be cast as follows:

- a. An eligible voter (Article III, section 1) if he will be absent from Maricopa County on the date set for balloting, may cast an absentee ballot at the place and time, or by mail, as designated by the Balloting Committee, but not more than fifteen (15) days nor less than three (3) days prior to the voting date.
- b. When requested by an ill or incapacitated eligible voter (Article III, section 1) not more than five (5) days nor less than two (2) days prior to the voting date, any two members of the Balloting Committee shall take an official ballot and a sealed ballot box to his home and witness the casting of his absentee ballot.
- c. Ballot boxes containing absentee votes shall be opened and the ballots tabulated at the same time and place and under the same conditions as the regular ballots.

SECTION 4. The newly elected officers and members of

the Board of Directors shall take office at the regular January meeting of the Corporation.


ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Action on changes and/or amendments to the By-Laws may be initiated by petition of at least one hundred (100) active members of the Corporation. It shall be given to the Secretary of the Board of Directors at least ten (10) days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the corporation at which meeting the petition proposing changes and/or amendments shall be read. Immediately following such public reading, the Secretary shall post a facsimile of the petition on the official bulletin board of the corporation and provide for its publication in the local newspapers. Such petition shall be publicized for not less than twenty-six (26) days, nor more than forty (40) days prior to voting on it.

SECTION 2. Voting shall be according to Article IX, sections 2 and 3. A two-thirds vote of all votes cast at the last annual election in December shall be required to change or amend the By-Laws.

ARTICLE XI - RESTRICTION

SECTION 1. No article in these By-Laws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.



Webb Development Co., or the non-profit corporation mentioned above, the sum of Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per year for each resident in the home which I am purchasing until the property is transferred to the non-profit group and different arrangements are made by the governing body of that group. This annual payment shall be on a calendar year basis and the first payment shall cover the period commencing with the home owner's possession and shall be paid through escrow. |

AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into at Sun City, Maricopa County,

Arizona, this _____day of _____1964, by and between DEL E.

WEBB DEVELOPMENT CO., an Arizona corporation, hereafter referred to as "Grantor," and SUN CITY TOWN HALL CENTER, an Arizona non-profit corporation, hereafter referred to as "Grantee,"

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Grantor holds legal title to the real property described in the Warranty Deed attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, there are located on said real property certain improvements, equipment, facilities and appurtenances consisting of a community center, related activities and facilities, including but not limited to lawn bowl area, swimming pool and shuffleboard court, all of which are surrounded by a land-scaped area; and

WHEREAS, the Grantor agrees to convey and transfer said property and facilities to the Grantee and the Grantee agrees to accept said property and facilities,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The Grantee accepts said property, improvements and facilities and agrees to operate and maintain thereon a community center and recreation facility, without pecuniary gain or profit, for the benefit of the property owners and residents in the area described in said Warranty Deed attached hereto as Exhibit "A."
- 2. The parties hereto agree that the said property and facilities shall be operated and maintained for the owners and residents of three thousand five hundred (3,500) residential units in Sun City Units two (2), Three (3), four (4), five (5) and six (6).

- 3. The Grantee agrees to permit the Grantor, its agents and employees to enter into and upon said property and facilities at all reasonable times for the purpose of exhibiting the same and acquainting prospective purchasers with the many advantages and worthwhile activities afforded residents of Sun City Town Hall Center.
- 4. Grantor agrees that it will provide a perpetual easement from the date hereof for parking facilities in the parking area south of Peoria Avenue and east of 107th Avenue for the parking of one hundred (100) cars or automobiles, approximately opposite the Town Hall, said parking not to be exclusive or separated from the general parking in the proposed shopping center area.
- 5. The Grantor will secure and furnish title insurance of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) on said property and facilities, each of the parties hereto to pay one-half of the cost of the said policy.
- 6. The Grantor agrees to remove the east walls of the men's and ladies' card rooms in the Town Hall, replace them with movable partitions or dividers and install a door for emergency exit in the south wall of Town Hall facing Peoria Avenue.
- 7. The Grantor agrees to build and construct a building thirty-two feet by seventy-six feet (32'/76') on the vacant property to the east of the Lounge Building, in keeping with present architecture and construction in accordance with plans and specifications, attached hereto as Exhibit "B." Two (2) sets of movable partitions or dividers shall be installed to make three (3) rooms when in place. Construction on said building to begin within thirty (30) days following the signing of this agreement.
- 8. The parties agree that they will, concurrently herewith, enter into a letter agreement setting forth a list of things that Grantor agrees to do in order to recondition and properly equip said facilities.
- 9. The Grantor agrees to construct and place in operation a second swimming pool adjoining the present swimming pool, size, shape, layout and specifications to be in accordance with the plans attached hereto and marked Exhibit "C," said pool to be constructed following the acceptance of the three

thousand fifty-first (3,051st) residential unit by Grantee into its membership.

- 10. The Grantor will assign and transfer to the Grantee all rights and interest in and to all Community Facilities Agreements with purchasers of residential units made and entered into at the time of transfer of title to home purchasers and owners, both present and future, including resales under the control of the Grantor, pertaining to the area covered by the said Warranty Deed and this agreement. The assignment and transfer of the said Community Facilities Agreements in no way relieves the Grantor of his obligations under the terms of said Agreements.
- 11. The Grantor agrees to collect for the Grantee the first year's membership fees provided for under the terms of the said Community Facilities Agreements, upon the transfer of title to each purchaser of a residential unit after the date hereof in the area described in said Exhibit "A."
- 12. The Grantor will pay to the Grantee the unused portion of all Community Facilities Agreement membership fees, on the date the operation and maintenance of Sun City Town Hall property and facilities are turned over to the Grantee.

The name of this organization shall be The Hall Recreation Activities of Sun City, hereinafter ed to as Town Hall Center.

ARTICLE 2

Membership in Town Hall Center shall consist residents of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4 and 5.

ARTICLE 3

The Town Hall Center shall be administered on 1.

ARTICLE 6

Any elected officer may be removed from for cause by a two-thirds vote of Town Hall Center bers voting at a called meeting. Such action shall be mplished as provided for in Article 11 of the By-laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1

THE TOWN HALL ACTIVITIES BOARD

The Town Hall Activities Board shall hold on 1. meetings at least once a month.

The duties of the Activities Board shall be to nister and coordinate the activities of the various Clubs, use all the facilities in the Town Hall area, and shall de the following-

etermination of policies governing the use of all facilities.

- b. Control and management of financial assets the Town Hall Center.
- c. Preservation and control of physical equipment.
- d. Custody of Club funds turned over to the Board for safe
- e. Appointment and supervision of Committees.
- f. Responsibility for safety provisions.
- g. Scheduling and coordinating of all Activities.
- h. Supervision of Club organizations.
- i. Such other administrative and coordinating duties as may be necessary.

ARTICLE 2

THE CHAIRMAN

It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preside Section 1. at all meetings and to direct the activities of the Board. The Chairman shall call special meetings of Section 2. the Board when he deems it necessary, or upon request of at least one-third of the members of the Activities Board. The Chairman shall be responsible for the Section 3. appointment of all committees, subject to the advice and approval of the Activities Board.

ARTICLE 3

THE VICE-CHAIRMAN

In the absence of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall have the powers, prerogatives and duties of the Chairman.

ARTICLE 4

THE SECRETARY

Section 1. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all meet-

ings.

Section 2. The Secretary shall conduct all correspondence relating to the Town Hall Center, maintain necessary files, issue all notices of meetings, and keep a register of members of the Town Hall Center.

Section 3. The Secretary shall post on the Bulletin Boards the minutes of all meetings.

ARTICLE 5

THE TREASURER

All monies payable to the Town Hall Center Section, 1. shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Board.

Section 2. All disbursements by the Board shall be made by checks signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the Chairman, or shou other member as may be designated by the Board.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall receive, keep an account of, and be responsible for all Town Hall Center funds, The Treasurer shall be bonded when deemed necessary by the Activities Board.

He shall disburse Town Hall Center funds only Section 4. on directive of the Activities Board.

He shall deposit all Town Hall Center funds to the account of the Town Hall Recreation Activities of Sun City in a bank designated by the Board.

Section 6. He shall make a report of the Town Hall Center financial standing at each meeting of the Board.

He shall submit his records on July first and Section 7.

January second of each year to the Board for audit.

He shall post a statement of financial condi-Section 8. tions, after approval of the audit by the Board, on the Town Hall Center bulletin boards.

Section 9. He may receive for deposit and disbursement monies from the various Clubs as they may direct. Special accounting shall be made of above funds.

ARTICLE 6

COMMITTEES

Section 1. All residents of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4 and 5 shall be eligible to serve on any committee.

Standing Committees shall be appointed as Section 2. follows, whose general duties shall be to make recommendations to the Activities Board as outlined below:

- a-Committee on Committees-To ascertain persons whose qualifications and availability are such as to recommend them for duty on certain committees.
- -Finance Committee—All financial functions pertaining to Town Hall Center.
- c-Safety Committee-To provide rules and regulations regarding safety precautions and the elimination of hazards.
- d-Equipment and Hand Tools Committee-To review the use and care of Hand Tools and equipment, and to recommend the necessity for purchase of new equipment.
- e-Scheduling and Coordinating Committee-To schedule and coordinate all Activities in the Town Hall area.
- f-Entertainment Committee-To recommend special entertainment.
- g-Club Organization-To receive applications and to assist in the organization of recognized Clubs.
- h-Public Relations-To recommend means to create better relations between all residents of Sun City, and to provide information to new residents as to the facilities available.

Section 3. Special committees may be appointed as required.

ARTICLE 7 RECOGNIZED CLUBS

In order for a Club to be recognized by the Activities Board, such Club shall comply with the following minimum requirements-

a-It shall have at least ten members.

b-It shall be organized with at least three officers, namely-Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer.

c—It shall hold regular meetings.

d-Membership shall be open to all residents of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4 & 5.

e-It shall not deny the use of its equipment and facilities to any resident of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4 and 5, provided such individual complies with the Rules and Regulations established by the Club.

f—It shall be responsible for drawing up and enforcing Rules and Regulations for governing the use of tools, equipment

and areas assigned to them for their activity.

g-It shall inventory, accept and be responsible for tools and equipment turned over to them. ARTICLE 8

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. A nominating committee of five shall be selected by residents of Sun City Units 2, 3, 4 and 5 at a called meeting in October of each year. They shall elect their own chairman, and shall serve for a period of one year. They shall prepare a slate of not less than Section 2.

three persons for each office listed alphabetically. Section 3. Within fifteen days after the October meeting, a copy of this slate shall be posted on the Town Hall Bulletin

Board and published in the local newspaper. Within thirty days following the publication of the slate, a general meeting shall be held for the election of officers, at which time those having write-in candidates shall present them to the Nominating Committee at Town Hall. The slate as prepared by the Nominating Committee shall be listed on the blackboard, and all write-in

Election of officers shall be by secret ballot,

candidates shall be listed alphabetically thereafter.

and the one receiving the highest vote for each onice shall be declared elected.

Section 7. Elected officers and newly elected Club Chairmen shall take office at a joint meeting with the retiring Activities Board members at the first meeting in January.

ARTICLE 9

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF DRIECTORS

Section 1. The seven directors shall be elected by a majority vote of all club chairmen, from among the chairmen of the recognized clubs, and a meeting of the club chairmen shall be called by the chairman of the Activities Board during the first week in December for the purpose of electing the seven Directors.

Section 2. Newly elected Directors shall take office at a joint meeting the second Monday in January with the retiring

Activities Board members.

ARTICLE 10 VACANCIES

In case of vacancy in elected office, without Section 1 sufficient reason acceptable by the Board, the Activities Board of Directors may appoint a member of the Town Hall Center in good standing to serve the unexpired term.

Section 2. In case of vacancy in the seven directors, exceeding two months, or by reason of a director becoming ineligible because of retiring from his office as club chairman, a replacement shall be elected by a majority vote of all club chairmen at a meeting called by the Chairman of the Activities Board.

ARTICLE 11

RECALL OF AN OFFICER

Action on removal of any one of the four Section. 1. officers may be initiated by not less than fifty members of Town Hall Center, who shall submit their grievance in writing to the Chairman of the Activities Board. The Chairman ot the Board shall publicize such request for a period of thirty days, within seven days after which a meeting shall be called of the Town Hall Center members for the purpose of voting on recall by secret ballot. In case the officer involved should be the Chairman of the Board, action shall be initiated by the Vice-Chairman. Two-thirds majority of members present and voting shall be necessary for recall.

Section 2. In event of recall, motion shall be taken in

accordance with Article 10 of the By-laws.

ARTICLE 12 **AMENDMENTS**

Section 1. Action on changes and/or amendments to this Consititution and By-laws may be initiated in writing to the Activities Board by petition of at least fifty members of Town Hall Center. Such petition shall be publicized by the Activities Board for a period of thirty days.

Within sixty days after publication of the pro-Section 2. posed change and/or amendment, a general meeting shall be called for the purpose of voting by secret ballot on such

change and/or amendment.

ARTICLE 13 QUORUM

Section 1. Two-thirds of the members of the Activities Board shall constitute a augrum at all Board meetings. Section 2. A minimum of fifty members shall be required as a quorum for any membership meeting.

ARTICLE 14 **MEETINGS**

Section 1. Fifty members may file a request with the Secretary of the Board or the Chairman for a Town Hall Center membership meeting for any purpose. The Board shall call such a meeting within ten days after receiving such a request.

ARTICLE 15 PROCEDURE

All meetings of the Activities Board shall be Section 1. conducted in accordance with this Constitution and By-laws, and Roberts' Rules of Order as revised.




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BUILDING LAYOUT UNDER ROOF OF NORTH TOWN HALL



Since January 1, 1965, Town Hall Center has become a private club, owned by its members and operated for their benefit. Membership consists of those Town Hall area home owners who signed the Facilities Agreement and have paid the 1965 membership dues. In other words, through their membership in the Town Hall Center, a non-profit corporation, they own the \$450,000 Town Hall Complex, which in itself adds much to the value of their home.

The estimated cost of operating the Town Hall Center for 1965, is \$80,000 which includes \$15,000 in case the Federal Government requires us to pay the 20% excise tax. You no doubt have noticed how nice the grounds and buildings appear, I am sure you will agree your House Committee has kept them in excellent condition since we took over on January 1. The grounds are maintained in fine condition by a reputable company on a contract basis.

Our total payroll expense is for two maintenance men, one janitorial service (mostly night work) and our office secretary (Mrs. Helen Foster). Our only source of income to operate the Town Hall Complex is annual membership dues, of \$20.00 per Town Hall resident. A very low membership fee for a private club, of the Country Club caliber, something we can be justly proud to show our friends and visitors.

The Town Hall members who received their keys after the 1st of February, 1964, only pay the dues for the period of 1965 remaining. For instance if you received your keys on April 1, 1964, your 1965 dues will be prorated for the nine months between April 1 and December 31, 1965. Thereafter your dues will be on an annual basis. Payable on or before January 1. In checking our records recently we note your 1965 dues are not paid, perhaps you have overlooked this. Your dues for the balance of 1965 are \$

We now have about 30 craft and social clubs and all the officers of these clubs contribute their time and efforts to provide activities that will be of interest to all the members. Your cooperation in maintaining your membership helps to carry on this work, and to expand it to new activities.

Who Are The Owners Of Town Hall?

A little over a year ago the Del E. Webb Corporation turned the facilities of Town Hall over to the home owners of Units 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 or subsequent beneficial and/or legal owners living within these units. This means that each and every one of us residing in the above mentioned area is a part owner of the Town Hall facilities, lock, stock and barrel; the land, the buildings, swim pool, and all fixtures and equipment.

In view of the fact that we are not a legally organized community or legal political sub-division, there can be no tax levied to defer the cost of operation and maintenance of the facilities for the enjoyment and use of the members, as well as for the enhancement of the value of our individual homes. It is necessary therefor, to levy a fee for that purpose. At present that fee is \$20.00 for each person living in the area. As the population of the area grows, this fee could be lowered. This is the fee that we agreed to pay at the time we signed the other contracts and agreements for the purchase of our homes.

Each year when we pay our dues to the organization, we receive a membership card which entitles us to the use of the facilities without

(Per By-Law of Sun City Town Hall Center, Article VII, Section 1, paragraph d). All such rules and regulations must be submitted to the CLUB ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE for their approval. Approved rules and regulations must be posted in the area used by the club.

The facilities in the Arts & Crafts Rooms are for hobbies and not for the manufacture of articles to be sold by individuals for private gain.

Recognized clubs may offer for sale, articles made in the Arts & Crafts rooms provided the profit is retained by the club.

Recognized clubs may employ instructors, entertainers, etc., for the benefit of and by the request of its members. Fees, if any, are to be collected by the club.

A RECOGNIZED CLUB is a group of 25 or more Town Hall residents who have formed a club for a specific purpose. Their bylaws are approved by the Club Organization Committee as being not restrictive to other members of Town Hall.
