Dear Ms. Jones:

Reference is made to the agreement ("Agreement") between us relating to your services as a performer on "Real People".

We may desire to offer programs in the "Real People" series for broadcast in half-hour rather than the one-hour form originally produced.

You shall receive for each half-hour program the compensation for the applicable run that would have applied to the hour show, and it is agreed that each half-hour program shall be considered in the same run as would have applied to the hour show (e.g. an hour show has been run twice and then is edited into two half-hour programs, the next run for each half-hour program is deemed the third run). In the event a half-hour program was originally part of a 90-minute show, then the payment for such half-hour program shall be at the same amount as though the original program had been one hour in length.

You agree to join with us in any request for a waiver to AFTRA, and the terms and conditions applicable shall be as stated above or as AFTRA requires, whichever is more beneficial to you.

Except as amended herein, the parties ratify and affirm the Agreement.

With agility and grace, these spirited ladies perform acrobatics, tap, modern jazz and their famed “Pom Pom” routine.

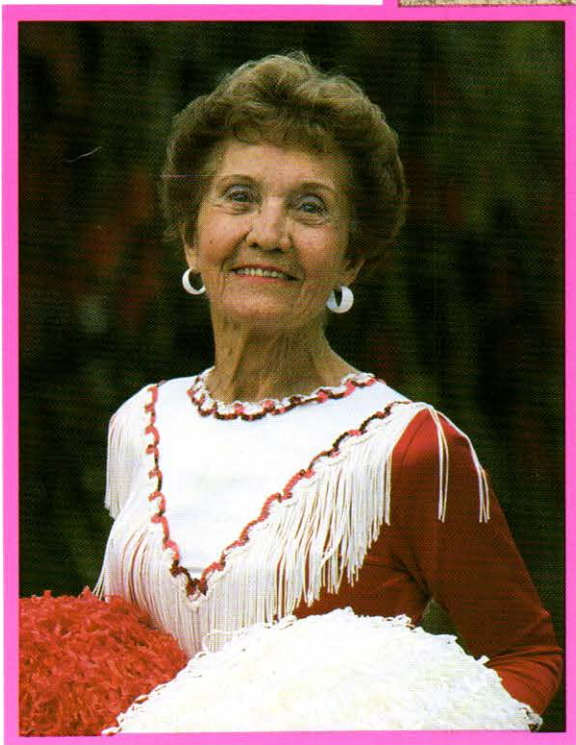
The group’s talents have been inspired under the expert direction of Corinne and Ray (now deceased) Leslie, a professional dance team for more than 50 years. They retired to Sun City where they taught dancing. The Pom Poms evolved from their dance classes and the group performed publicly for the first time in 1979 at a community softball game.

“I just wanted to continue dancing and enjoy myself. The travelling we’ve done, the people we’ve met and the acceptance we’ve received along the way have all been unexpected joys.”

When time permits, Corinne golfs, plays pool, and swims to keep herself in shape. She is also a supporter of the arts and is active in the Lioness Club, her church and the Alzheimers Support group.



Regina Sonnenleiter (left)

Age: 75

Born in Chicago, Illinois, this former physical education teacher comes from a family of gymnasts and qualified for the United States Olympic gymnastic team in 1936 and 1948. She's been dancing with Corinne for 11 years, first as a student and now as a Pom Pom. Her hobbies include synchronized swimming, square dancing, bowling, golfing, silvercraft and macrame.

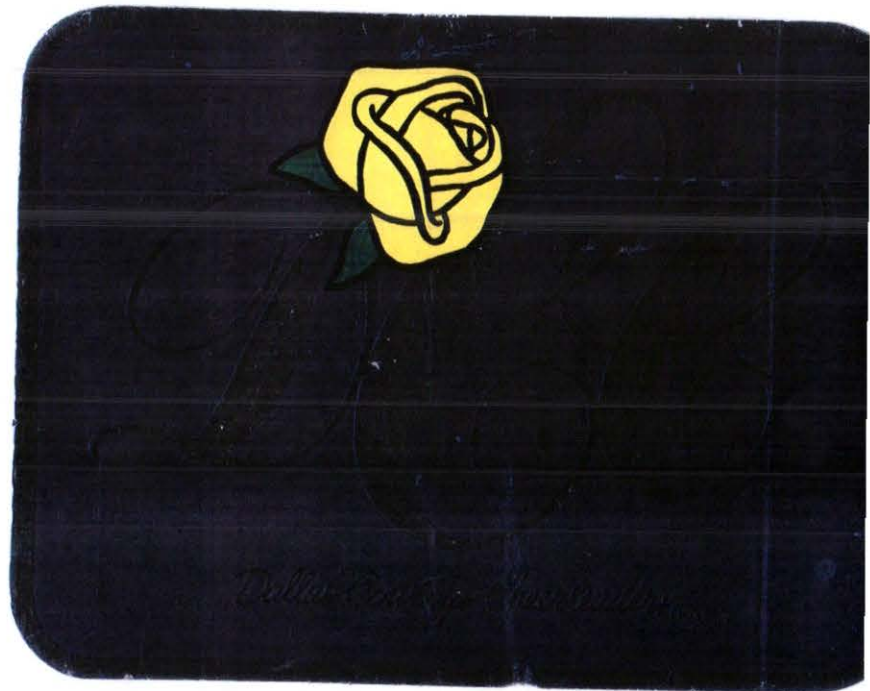

H I S T O R Y

Though the Dallas Cowboys have always had sideline cheerleaders, the phenomenon as it is today really didn't begin its rise until about six years ago.

In the 1960's the cheerleaders for the Cowboys were high school students from the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex and very small in number.

The 1970's saw an upswing with the introduction of young women 18 years and older and a new idea in uniforms.

Super Bowl X in January 1976 seemed to be the turning point as TV cameras found their way to the sidelines and a new attraction was added to professional football.

The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders thus became the leaders in a new form of entertainment for the football fan whether in the stands or the television audience.

The Dallas Cowboys saw the opportunity and a decision was made to increase the number of the cheerleading squad by holding open auditions in the Spring of 1976. Approximately 250 young women made their way to Texas Stadium that year and the number of applicants has increased significantly over the past six years as over 2,000 ladies made application for the auditions of the

1981-82 squad.

The auditions are held over a month and one-half beginning late March, and are based on a three-stage system: Preliminaries, Semi-Finals and Finals. The basic requirements to become a Dallas Cowboys Cheerleader are as follows: (a) You must be at least 18 years of age at the time of the auditions (there is no age limit); (b) You must be a high school graduate; (c) You must be going to school full-time or working full-time; and (d) If selected and you do not live in this area you must re-locate yourself in the Dallas/Fort Worth area. We have had young ladies come from all over the United States to audition -- by plane, bus, train and car they come to Texas Stadium in search of a dream -- to become a member of the most popular group of young women in the world today. Ohio, New Mexico, Illinois, Louisiana, Florida, New Jersey, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Washington, Indiana, North Carolina, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Tennessee, Arkansas, Utah, California, New York, Michigan, Mississippi, Oregon, Georgia, Alabama, Arizona, Kansas, Kentucky, Missouri and Canada were represented during the preliminary auditions in April for the 1981 squad. Generally the auditions are held the same time each year, but interested ladies should call our office after January 1st for definite information concerning the try-outs.

Each year present squad members are given a bye into the Finals where they then must compete once again in the hopes of reclaiming a position for the current year. As with the football team, no one is ever secure about a position from year to year.

1977 was a World Championship year for the Cowboys and the Cheerleaders reaped a portion of the benefits. A majority

of the country seem to make them the sweethearts of America as the name "Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders" has become almost a household word.

Thousands upon thousands of people congregate wherever it is announced that two or more Cowboys Cheerleaders will appear -- whether in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Hobbs, New Mexico; or outside the United States. The story is always the same ... the people gather from 2,000 to 75,000 for a photograph, autograph, or a hello from a Dallas Cowboys Cheerleader. They have truly become the darlings of the National Football League.

The 1977 squad completed two major television appearances on national networks in the Spring of 1978 -- the NBC Rock n' Roll Sports Classic and the Osmond Brothers Special on ABC. In August of 1978, the '78 squad completed a television commercial for Fabrege shampoo. In September of 1978 the Cheerleaders kicked off the season for Monday Night Football by hosting their own one-hour Special on ABC entitled "The 36 Most Beautiful Girls in Texas". A two-hour made for television movie was filmed in November of 1978 on location in Dallas which aired January 14, 1979. Taking a 48% share of the television audience, this movie became the second highest viewed movie made for television in the history of television. A sequel to that 1979 movie was aired on television on January 13, 1980. The Cheerleaders have performed the last three years on the Academy of Country & Western Music Awards Show and they have sailed twice on The Love Boat. A charity appearance by the Dallas Cowboys and Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders on behalf of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America was made on the Family Feud Show in June 1980.

In order to get closer to the people, the Cheerleaders for the past three years have appeared in state and county fairs all across the country -- Portland, Oregon; Springfield, Illinois; Chattanooga, Tennessee; Springfield, Massachusetts; Clearfield, Pennsylvania; Grey, Tennessee; Pensacola, Florida; Knoxville, Tennessee; Duquoin, Illinois -- with more planned in 1981.

A very successful 10-day tour of Japan was completed in December 1978. Millions of Japanese people saw the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders perform in theaters, in parades, on national television shows and at the Mirage Bowl football game. They also completed several television commercials for Mitsubishi Motor Company.

In December 1979, the U. S. Department of Defense requested the Cheerleaders' presence on a USO Christmas tour of Korea where the ladies performed for thousands of American troops. So successful was this first tour, the Cheerleaders were sent to West Germany in March 1980, returned to Korea during Christmas 1980 and Spring 1981 they made a two-week tour of U. S. bases in Greece. Now a tradition, they will return to Korea for Christmas 1981.

The purpose of the USO tours was to boost the morale of the troops. The ladies performed one hour shows that brought standing ovations and tears to the eyes of both the audiences and the entertainers. The ladies have meals with the soldiers in their mess halls and share close conversations about the Cowboys, happenings in the United States and loved ones at home. The Cowboys organization is extremely proud of the high regard this

nation has for the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders.

There is perhaps a uniqueness about the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders in that each young lady is so different. The concept is that each person in the stadium and the television audience has a mental picture of their ideal girl. The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders offer someone for everyone to identify with, as they are individuals in their own right. These young ladies are all bright, energetic, and intelligent contributors to society.

The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders squad as in the past represents almost every phase of the American woman: teachers, secretaries, company executives, homemakers, nurses, students, medical technicians, fashion coordinators, accountants, models, sales persons, file clerks, receptionists, advertising representatives, cashiers, dental hygienists, flight attendants, etc. Some are single, some are married -- several have children.

You have to really want to be a Dallas Cowboys Cheerleader before you'll subject yourself to the rigorous physical conditioning, exhaustive practice schedule and stringent rules and regulations that govern their part-time life. From May until late July, and three nights a week thereafter, this elite corps rehearse almost every evening for four hours or more at a time under the trained eye of their choreographer, Texie Waterman. Four-year Cheerleader veteran, Shannon Baker Werthmann, has been named assistant choreographer for the 1981 season.

Rehearsals of the 50-odd song and dance numbers in each season's repertoire are mandatory. If a Cheerleader misses a

rehearsal prior to a home game, she will not be allowed to perform at that game. Anyone missing two rehearsals prior to a home game without an acceptable excuse will be dropped from the squad.

The set of rules which govern their appearance, performance and moral character is lengthy and explicit. The famous uniform may not be worn in public, except when on an approved personal appearance for the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, Inc. and the uniform is trademarked making it unlawful to duplicate it in any way.

The Cheerleaders do not travel with the Cowboys team. They only perform at home games and Super Bowl games and are not allowed to fraternize with the players. In fact, many of them have never even met a Cowboys player.

Being a Cheerleader means a great deal -- one Cheerleader even passed up her graduation exercises so she wouldn't miss a game. When the girl's dean and the Cowboys learned about the conflict, they arranged a most unusual pre-game show before 65,000 people at the game. Dressed in cap and gown over her Cheerleader uniform, she received her Master's Degree in Education.

The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, Inc. organization has complete control over all activities. All requests for interviews, photographs and appearances are carefully screened. Hundreds are rejected for a variety of factors which make them unsuitable by Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders standards.

All appearances are arranged by contract, and if the stipulations are not met, the Cheerleaders don't appear. The client stipulation list is lengthy and demanding.

When the Cheerleaders are on overnight trips, either their Director, Suzanne Mitchell, or Choreographer, Texie Waterman, accompany them. They travel in a group and return as a group and are not allowed to go out on their own.

All of the many precautions are to protect the image of the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders as a whole and of the Cheerleaders as individuals. "People want a clean, American, apple pie image", Suzanne says. "They want someone to look up to, someone who's upfront and first-class. The Cowboys are that kind of organization and always have been, and the Cheerleaders are a reflection of that image."

For appearances in which extra money is involved, the girls making the appearance share the fee, but many of their non-game outings are done for charity. Charity appearances have included the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon, the George Lindsey Celebrity Golf Tournament to benefit the Special Children's Olympics, the Association of Hearing Impaired Children, Veteran Administration Hospitals across the nation, March of Dimes, American Heart Association, Arthritis Foundation, Cancer Society, the United Way and Variety Club Telethons in Dallas, St. Louis and Winnipeg, Canada for handicapped children.

January 31, 1981 will always be a memorable day as the Cheerleaders welcomed Marine Sgt. Johnny McKeel home after his long ordeal in Iran.

While serving as stern disciplinarian, mediator, consultant, business manager and all-around friend to her charges, Suzanne Mitchell, Vice President & Director, has probably come to know the mystique of the Cowboys Cheerleaders better than anyone

else. "What we look for in our cheerleading squad is simply something for everyone -- a cross-section of the American woman. We want everyday ladies. Many on the squad have never been out of their home state and this offers them a chance to broaden their lives as they will have the chance to travel throughout the Country and possibly even outside the United States.

They must be full-time employed, students or homemakers. They must be educated, well-informed women who represent the Dallas Cowboys in a first-class manner.

"The question most often asked is why the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders are considered number one. There is only one answer, yet it is often overlooked -- The Dallas Cowboys Football Team."

"A cheerleading squad will only be as popular as the team it represents and these young ladies are lucky enough to represent the best."
