ORGANIZATIONS

Sun City is an unincorporated community located in Maricopa County, Arizona, U.S.A. It is dependent upon the County for available government services and, it depends on local non-profit and private businesses for other services. The theme for Sun City is to have a residential community where a variety of housing which is well built and constructed. The costs are affordable and a good quality of life is provided.

Every community must have formal and informal organizations relative to producing guidance in the conducting of necessary tasks and to produce necessary decisions.

One of the first to occur was the "Community Center Association". It had the responsibility to plan and manage the "Recreation Centers Facilities" (pools, auditoriums, clubs, etc.) which are owned by the Rec. Centers as they were assigned by Del Webb to the residents of Sun City. The bottom line, of course, is "How do we live together satisfactorily, fairly and peacefully?"

Since these early days of urban pioneering, the County has accepted and provided for the streets, R.O.W., curb and gutters, the sidewalks, the roadway surfaces, the traffic signals and the storm water drainage; a special Fire District was established and it provides fire protection; some 72 Special Street Light Districts have been provided and established which provide street lights to our residents; Citizens Utilities Co. has a franchise to provide sewer and water service and fire hydrants; Park and Son provides trash removal;

In addition to these services, the private Public Service Co. (gas, electric, phone, T.V.), four private golf and social clubs, some 33 churches, 70 service clubs, 250 additional friendship, social and special interest clubs, we have some 50 non-profit public organizations. The latter group includes "Home Owners Assoc., TaxPayers Assoc., Prides, Sun Health, Possie, Historical Society, Ambassadors and others, which as a group, are very important and provide the Volunteer structure forthe Sun City Community decision making and work. Approximately 10,000 volunteers participate.

From 50 years ago...hello!

It is November 15, 1976, and we, your ancestral Sun Citians, are gathered in the Del Webb Memorial Garden to dedicate our Liberty Bell, and to mail this letter to you in a capsule to be opened 50 years from this date. In reading, you will note that some of the capsule ingredients anticipate exposure in 2000. That was our first intention, but your 50-year retrospect is clearer than a 24-year review would have been.

Why write at all? Vanity...no. Pride...yes! We want you to know about us. We can't tell you about us, because we don't know all about us. We're a variant people in a unique community. There's never been anything like the Sun City of November 15, 1976.

Probably, when Del Webb looked across the Boswell cotton fields in the late 50's and saw his vision, even his genius couldn't foresee the ultimate... a carefully and affectionately designed metropolis populated entirely by folks who had lived at least a half-century (most, older), able to live in reasonable comfort on savings, investments, pensions, and Social Security, and anxious to continue lives of active productivity and self-development. Society had never produced a generation like that before, so there had never been a reason for a Sun City until we came along.

We, your Sun City "ancestors" of '76, are motley ingredients in a mixing bowl--with no inclination toward becoming the homogenized product of a melting pot. From every State in the Union, and many foreign countries, we left friends, families, social and business affiliations, familiar surroundings, accustomed routines...just as you have done...and came here to experiment aggressively with a totally new way of making a life. There are 38,000 of us now, and long before you read this letter, Sun City's projected 55,000 will have been reached.

We are looking back on 16 years of expanding experimentation. You are reviewing 66 years of accomplished development. Our view has to be somewhat more limited than yours, because you are standing on our shoulders. You can see us clearly in the records; we can see you vividly in our plans and our hopes.

Where will you have come from? What will you have brought with you? Will our nation, and the world, be at peace in your time? We can't know these things, but we can dream our dreams and plan our exciting "tomorrow"

to your enlivening "today". You are playing where we played...you are enjoying the mega-volumed library which our contributed treasures began... you are walking the clean streets we walked...you are pedalling the 3-wheelers, or thrumming the Yamahas and Harleys we cruised... you are feeling the inexpressible, almost physical impact of our golden sunrises and purple sunsets...you, too, are finding re-creation in recreation...and probing the paths of new friendships, new aspirations, new involvements.

We see that in many visible ways, your Sun City is different from ours. The desert around you is verdant, with an endless flow of fresh water piped from desalinating plants on the Pacific Coast and the Gulfs of Mexico and California. The "Wines of Arizona" are being decantered from vineyards which we gleaned. A multitude of small free-enterprise businesses, derived from the products and skills of our Crafts "n" Hobby shops are dotting the face of Arizona and the West. Our embryo college campus is now a "seat of learning", where the multiple talents of your neighbors are utilized in creative research. The medical and community-care facilities we devised are the prototype for a concerned nation. Your Sun City is now the Charter Founder of "The League of Active Retirement Communities" -- a significant economic, social, and political force, amalgamating the concentrated capacities of The New Generation. Electrical energy, with conveying lines, is being broadcast into your homes and industries from solar and nuclear installations throughout the State. All this, and so much more, we have envisioned and you are enjoying.

Yes, the physical body of your living is different, in many ways, from ours! But the spirit of your Sun City is the same as ours. We would feel "at home" with you today... November 15, 2026.

It would be easy for us to look around and feel that we have reached a conclusion; but we know that we are a beginning. We trust that you will never have reason to think back upon our Sun City as "the good old days". We prefer to see you in our mind's eye as the good new Sun City. Otherwise we've failed.

You see, we have tried to conduct this experiment--not merely to leave a pleasant place for you, but to set a goal for a whole society. If all we've done is build an attractive structure, we will not have earned the right to be remembered. If, on our tentative foundation, you are continuing to invent and project a way of life in which the accumulated energies and talents of the growing-older are progressively utilized, then we shall have succeeded--and we'll be grateful.

Del Webb built a challenge and called it Sun City. We accepted that challenge...and we pass it along to you.

Thank you for receiving us into 2026. Thank you for making our dream a reality.
