"Down the road, there needs to be fewer organizations seeking donations, while still providing information and services to our residents more easily.'

Visitors Center to be taken in by RCSC

The Sun City Visitors Center will no longer be a standalone entity.

The Visitors Center, located in an office at Bell Recreation Center, 16820 N. 99th Ave., directly across from the Maricopa County Library branch, will be incorporated into the Recreation Centers of Sun City operations beginning Jan. 1, 2015. Paul Herrmann,

Visitors Center director, will continue to oversee the volunteer staff that provides the "first face" for many Sun City visitors and guests.

The Visitors Center will remain at its current location.

For years the Visitors Center in Sun

City was a standalone entity operated by a separate board of directors, unlike Sun City West. In that community, the Visitors Center is part of PORA, Sun City West's homeowners association.

The Sun City Visitors Center board of directors will be disbanded when the center is incorporated into RCSC.


The Visitors Center provides information about restaurants, hotels, area attractions and Sun City in general. The center also sponsored twice yearly expos at Sundial Recreation Center, 14801 N. 103rd Ave., and assisted in annual new resident orientation sessions put on by RCSC.

Visitors center director talks Sun City tours



Visitors Center bus gears up for tours

The Sun City Visitors Center will soon offer tours of the community to allow people to get acquainted with Sun City and what it has to offer residents.

The center's board of directors approved the purchase Nov. 21 of a 13-passenger Arrowlite El Dorado National bus for the tours. Center staff hopes to have the bus ready for tours after the first of the year, according to Paul Herrmann, Sun City Visitors Center executive director.

"We will take people to all the rec centers and some of the other highlights of Sun City," he said.

In addition to people visiting the community as prospective home buyers, the tours will be available for residents, new and old alike, who do not know all that is available to them.

"We get a lot of people who are residents that come in and ask us questions about the community that they should already know, but they don't," Mr. Herrmann explained.

The bus will be available on a set schedule, but frequency will depend on demand, according to Mr. Herrmann. He hopes to

Intrigued Boomers flock to Visitors Center

Sun City enthusiasts, when asked what makes their town so wonderful, often say the same thing: Sun City is the greatest retirement community in the world.

Lofty statements like that would usually be dismissed as hyperbole, but Paul Herrmann, executive director of the Sun City Visitors Cen-

ter, said he is pretty sure it is true.

"Sun City was way ahead of its time when it was built, and I believe it is still the best

today," Herrmann said. Why does Herrmann think that? Because his phone never stops ringing, and the calls are


coming from all over the globe.

"Just recently, I've given tours to groups from Korea, Japan, the Netherlands, Germany and France," Herrmann said. "They're all here because they want to learn about some aspect of what has made Sun City such a success."

The tours are not a new phenomenon. Herrmann said they have been going on for just about as long as Sun City has been open. They have, however, increased in frequency by quite a bit over the past few years, and Herrmann said he thinks he knows why.

"It's the Baby Boomer generation," Her-

rmann said.

"The Boomer phenomenon isn't just an American thing, it's a generational thing across the world. The Boomers are reaching retirement age and countries all over are trying to figure out what to do with them."

Different countries are interested in different things. Herrmann said Korea seems to be where America was when Sun

City was created.

They still have what we would have called old folks homes," Herrmann said. "They don't know about the whole 'active lifestyle' movement. Many of the groups I talk to from Korea are simply trying to get a handle on what services they need to offer to create an active retirement community."

For the Japanese groups he works with. Herrmann said there is a cultural difference that has to be addressed.

"I've learned from my experience that the concept of volunteerism is not very popular in Japan," Herrmann said. "There, if you work you get paid, and that's that. What I'm having to explain to them is that a community like Sun City will never work without the effort of volunteers."

Last summer alone, Herrmann said he gave tours to eight groups from Japan. Herrmann said typically he will be told in advance what the group is interested in, and will tailor

their visit accordingly.

"Recently I had a group of doctors and nurses from Korea who were interested in the healthcare aspect," Herrmann said. "So I got them into Royal Oaks (Lifecare Community) to meet with the staff there and get their questions answered. If they don't tell me ahead of time what they want, I give them just a general tour of Sun City."

Herrmann said the interest Sun City receives from around the world is a testament to the superb planning of the commu-

nity.

"I think it's a great testament to what was created here that after all these years, people around the globe still look to us," Herrmann said.

Herrmann said he has another tour scheduled for Feb. 16, this time with another

group from Japan.
