### An Interview with SCW Doctor Joe T. Hayashi

JOE T. HAYASHI, M.D., General Practice-Internal Medicine was born in Seattle, Washington and graduated St. Louis Medical School, Missouri in 1978. Dr. Hayashi did his residency at St. Joseph's Hospital, Phoenix during 1978-1981. He has established a private practice at the SCW Medical building located at 132902 Meeker Blvd. S.C.W. since 1981.

How To Select A Personal Physician

Dr. Hayashi advises that if you don't already have a personal physician, it is recommended that you seek one among internists or general practitioners. Many people devote more effort to choosing new clothes than to choosing physicians.

He further recommends that there be diligence in your search. The quality of your health care is at stake.

Look for a certified physician. Certification means that the doctor has undergone several years of additional training and passed a qualifying examination. That is valuable in itself; it is more so if it reflects a habit of continued learning.

Upon arrival in Arizona, Dr. Hayashi practiced as an independent contractor for Emergency Physicians Irc. This was prior to going into private practice. He is enjoying the Arizona climate and has decided to practice in the state of Arizona.

Consider hospital affiliations when selecting a personal physician. Dr. Hayashi is affiliated with Boswell Hospital exclusively. Needless to say hospitals afford a doctor contacts with colleagues and informal consultations. Most of a doctor's continuing education takes place in the hospital.

When considering a doctor, you might visit his or her office. Make an appointment for treatment of a routine problem or specifically for an exploratory talk. The conduct of doctor and staff, and the appearance of the office itself may help you decide.

This other physician does take responsibility during his absence and they work very well together. And how about staff members — are they trained, sympathetic, willing and able to listen, to explain, to instruct? Yes, the staff housed at SCW Medical Center meet all those qualifications.

The staff can be relied upon to relay messages and to reach the doctor in the event of need.

Quality is not assured by a prestigious address, ornate surroundings or the size of a fee, but rather by competence and commitment of the entire office to your care.

Dr Hayashi says "Don't rely on medical sub-specialists for general care. A yearly check by a gynecologist, for example, is fine, but not for general advice. A gynecologist should prescribe medications for you only after discussing with your personal physician to avoid any drug interaction of duplication of therapy."

In considering a personal physician you will ultimately have to judge whether he regards medicine as more than the large and complicated business it has become in recent decades and whether his concern goes beyond the monetary aspects.

Dr. Hayashi does take the time to discuss test results with patients both on the phone and in person.

Lastly, he suggests checking with Health Services for background info about physicians and their affiliations, and for general information relating to your search for a personal physician.

Dr. Hayashi approves of physical fitness programs for the elderly. He states it helps them to stay physically fit as long as possible.

The residents of Sun City West are fortunate to have a highly-qualified dedicated doctor like Dr. Hayashi in the community.

TMG was explained as pain and headaches caused by dental problems.



### Community to get 1st nursing home By Susan Felt

SUN CITY WEST — An Ohio-based nursing-home company plans to break ground for Sun City West's first nursing home by the first of next year.

Americare Corp. has purchased 3.87 acres at the northwest corner of Camino del Sol and Meeker Boulevard to build a 120-bed nursing home, pending financing and agency approval.

The \$3.65 million project already has been endorsed by Sun City West developer, the Del E. Webb Development Co., said Pamela Johnson, assistant director of development for Americare.

Americare, through a limited partnership called Sun

City West Health Care Co., received preliminary approval last week from Maricopa County Industrial Development Authority for a bond sale to finance construction of the complex the company wants to have completed by December 1984, Johnson said.

PORA will not endorse the project until board members review Americare's feasibility study and its financial record, PORA President Bob Williams said.

The nursing home will accommodate patients needing skilled, intermediate and personal care, Johnson said. In addition to nurses and a physician, foot, eye and dental doctors will be available on a consultant basis, she said.

She also said physical, recreational and occupational

therapy would be provided along with dietary, laundry and housekeeping services.

She quoted \$82 a day for semiprivate skilled care, \$38 a day for semiprivate personal care and \$60 a day for semiprivate intermediate care. The Sun City West nursing home is certified for Medicare insurance, she said.

A subsidiary of First Ohio Investment Group, Americare operates 19 nursing homes in Ohio, West Virginia and New Mexico, she said.

Johnson said research has indicated a need for 30 to 50 nursing home beds for every 1,000 residents in the surrounding health analysis region.

Although Williams won't dispute the need, he lamented "the event overtaking the planning."

Williams has been among those pushing for orderly growth of the 4-year-old retirement community to avoid the nursing home crisis Sun City faced when its residents needed nursing homes and none had been built, resulting in rampant building of facilities all at

However, before Sun City West could find out when, where and what kind of nursing homes were needed, a developer was at the doorstep with plans in hand, Williams said.

"We can't stop our planning . . . but we need orderly growth of this community," he said.

### Paramedic unit to start service for SC West

Arizona Medical Transport will station a paramedic unit with an ambulance on duty round-the-clock in Sun City West beginning June 1, said Larry Mullins, vice president for operations.

Emergency medical services will be headquartered in the Boswell Hospital building recently moved to a site at the outer edge of the developed community, off Johnson Boulevard.

Hospital personnel are in the process of refurbishing that building for physicians' offices and firefighters' headquarters as well as emergency medical personnel.

ed to two paramedics as demand there increases, Mullins said.

Cost of the operation, between \$200,-000 and \$250,000 annually, will be borne by the non-profit corporation, AMT, and will not be a part of the Sun City West Fire Board budget.

User fees of \$69 for basic calls, plus fees for specific additional services, will be charged. AMT's decision to begin serving Sun City West was based on a commitment to the area rather than the number of calls expected, Mullins said.

AMT is the parent corporation of Associated Ambulance, which will be The initial AMT staff will consist of the entity running the new operation, and of Survival Flight, an emergency helicopter service.

## Land acquired in SCW

Plans for medical office facilities in Sun City West moved forward this week with the completion of negotiations for land acquisition by a subsidiary of the company that owns Boswell Memorial Hospital.

A 9.8-acre parcel south of Johnson Boulevard, on the east side of Meeker Boulevard between Johnson and Camino del Sol, will be used for the Sun City West Medical Arts Facility. The complex is to be patterned after Sun City's Thunderbird Medical Arts Center.

A temporary, portable building will be set up soon until the permanent facility can be constructed.

The land is being acquired from the Del E. Webb Development Co. by Western Maricopa Health Care Facilities Inc., a newly formed division of Inter-Community Health Care of Arizona, which owns and operates Boswell and the Lakeview and Thunderbird centers.

Services will include physicians' offices, a pre-admit office for Boswell, laboratory, radiology, physical therapy and emergency treatment. The property acquisition was announced jointly by John Meeker, president of Webb, and John Mead, president of Inter-Community Health Care. "This step opens up many opportunities for Western Maricopa Health Care Facilities to bring to Sun City West in the near future a range of planned services," Mead said.

Under the terms of the agreement, Webb will handle the management and leasing of the permanent facility. Leasing information is available from Phil Brant, 974-7390.



# Boswell plans facility in SCW

Boswell Hospital plans tentatively to expand its services to Sun City West with the development of a medical office complex next year and construction of a hospital there by 1985, said Austin Turner, hospital administrator.

In a meeting kicking off the Tower Four Fund Campaign in Sun City West last week, Turner explained that hospital officials are exploring with the Del E. Webb Development Co. the feasibility of providing physicians' offices, a pre-hospital admittance office and oth-Johnson Center library. Home care

apy programs were examples of the kinds of services that could be provided, he said.

In addition, Turner explained that Boswell is in the process of updating growth studies in preparing for a new application to the Arizona Department of Health Services for a hospital that would be built on the Johnson Road site. Boswell applied in 1978 for state approval for both a 120-bed hospital in Sun City West at the same time it applied for state approval for the 84bed addition of the fourth tower onto er supporting medical services on a the main plant. The fourth tower was site across Johnson Road from the approved, but the proposed Sun City West hospital was rejected then.

The rate of population growth will determine how soon the hospital will be approved and built in Sun City West, Turner said, "but I would think we could expect to have a facility there by 1985," he added.

Turner said that the corporation that owns Boswell changed its name recently, from the Sun City Community Hospital to Inter-Community Health Care of Arizona, to reflect its intention to serve all of the surrounding communities.

The fourth tower and remodeling are expected to cost approximately \$13.5 million, \$1.5 to \$2 million is to be raised through contributions in the next few weeks.
