Westernaires prepare for annual holiday concerts

Despite any inferences deduced from its name, the Westernaires Chorus is not a group of singers who croon cowboy and western tunes while dressed in clothes fit for the rodeo.

Although they have been singing popular-style music for over 20 years in Sun City West, it is not out of the realm of possibilities for a citizen new to the area to make incorrect assumptions on what kind of chorus the Westernaires is — especially since its current director made the mistake when he first moved into the community seven years ago.

"We went to a concert of the Westernaires, my wife Lois and I, and found out lo and behold that they didn't sing western music," said Carrol Stiles, chorus director since 1998.

Made up of over 80 individuals with a broad range of singing backgrounds, the Westernaires Chorus is a chartered club with the Recreation Centers of Sun City West.

The chorus will be performing four Christmas Concerts — Dec. 14-17 — at the Stardust Theatre in the Kuentz Recreation Center.

The concerts will mix Christmas, Hanukkah and other holiday songs in an 1 1/2 hour long program.

Ticket sales for the four performances at the 300-seat venue have been brisk, with sellouts expected well in advance of all four shows. Mac McQuade, publicity chairman and a chorus member for the last 14 years, believes the popularity in the show reflects the quality of performance expected by audience members.

"We have a good reputation," Mr. McQuade said. "People

know we do a good job entertaining them for their money's worth."

The Westernaires perform two different programs annually, one for the winter holiday season and another during spring.

Practices have been ongoing for the Christmas shows since September.


Although male chorus members will be wearing tuxedos and female chorus members will be wearing equally fine apparel for the upcoming performances, Mr. Stiles believes the shows to be informal.

"We're shooting for something we think will give everybody an enjoyable evening," Mr. Stiles said. "It's not like a symphony orchestra program. We hope (the audience) feels a little bit of a relationship with the chorus."

This will be the 11th year in which the Westernaires perform a Christmas Show and the final one under the direction of Mr. Stiles who will retire from the chorus following the last performance.

The concerts will take place 7:30 p.m. Dec. 14, 15, 17 and 2 p.m. Dec. 16 at the Stardust Theatre located in the Kuentz Recreation Center at 14401 R.H. Johnson Blvd.
