New softball field at Kuentz center will be dedicated

The new softball field at the Fred Kuentz Recreation Center in Sun City West will be formally dedicated at 10 a.m. Oct. 19.

And former Del E. Webb Communities executive Fred Kuentz has been invited to throw out the first ball to launch the season for the Sun Cities Senior Softball League, according to Axel Olson, league president.

All 12 teams of the league will then participate in a two-inning, round-robin tourney to initiate the field, at Stardust and R.H. Johnson boulevards.

The new softball field has been under construction for almost a year. It has an electronic scoreboard and enclosed dugouts with water fountains in each.

Bleachers have been moved from the players' old field at Grand Avenue and Meeker Boulevard to the new site. Fences are placed 270 feet from home plate, about 30 feet farther than at the old field.

The public is invited to attend the Oct. 19 dedication, said Don Goble, a past president of the senior softball league.

Use of the field is not limited to the league, according to its officials. Sun City West recreation center card holders and their guests also are eligible to use the park.

The first major event scheduled at the field is the fifth annual Del Webb Senior Softball Tournament March 9-11, 1990.





Bob Rentner hit the first home run, a 255-foot blast over the left-center field fence.




That started out as a sag in the has grown into a major snag those using facilities at the ntz Recreation Center in Sun City West.

The entire center, located at 14401 R.H. Johnson Blvd., was closed last Wednesday after officials discovered structural damage to the roof. Some of the classrooms and facilities will reopen this week but the metal shop, wood shop, meeting room and several craft rooms remain closed.

The first signs of trouble were spotted a few weeks ago in the metal shop. Officials noticed the roof sagging — in some places as much as eight to 12 inches. Additional signs of trouble were then found in the adjoining wood shop.

"We've been working with the developer and we've decided to close the entire facility down for further investigation," said Les Hicks, general manager of the Recreation Centers of Sun City West, at the board's Oct. 12 workshop meeting.

"It was a difficult decision, but we feel it's really in everybody's best interest to do so.

The building's architects and structural engineers have concluded a preliminary examination of the facility, which opened in January 1989.



SUN CITY WEST - The community's third recreation center opened Friday afternoon with its namesake cutting a red ribbon and thousands of residents coming to tour the center.

The Fred Kuentz Recreation Center, on 13.6 acres of land at Stardust and R.H. Johnson boulevards, is the final recreation center to be built in Sun City West. It joins the R.H. Johnson Recreation Center and the Beardsley Park Recreation Center to serve the recreation needs of the approximately 25.000 people who will live in Sun City West once it is finished.

"The opening of the Fred **Kuentz Recreation Center marks** a milestone in the development of Sun City West," said Chuck Roach, executive vice president of Del Webb Communities and manager of Sun City West, at the dedication ceremony.

He said the center marks the cooperation between Del Webb, the Sun City West Recreation Centers Advisory Board and the residents of Sun City West.

Residents were involved in the planning of the center. Three years ago three members of the centers advisory board president advisory board and three other Jack O'Connor cut the ribbon.

residents formed a committee that reviewed about 45 requests for space in the new center.

"The job was not easy nor was it glamorous, but it was necessary," Roach said.

The center is named after Fred Kuentz, retired chairman of the Del Webb Development Co. Kuentz worked for the Del Webb Corp. for 37 years.

Kuentz and former recreation

officially opening the new center in front of hundreds of spectators.

The center has five buildings totaling almost 40,000 square feet and cost about \$5 million to build. It has a wood shop, a metal shop, an outdoor pool. jogging track, six tennis courts. five multi-purpose rooms, the only softball field in Sun City West and a 300-seat performing arts theater.

Residents got a chance Friday to try out the theater for size during several free performances by Theatre West and the Musicians Club.

Carl Easterbrook, author of "Class Reunion," which was performed Friday, said he likes the size of the theater because it is intimate and gives a performer a feeling of being closer to the audience.

"I think a lot of our players here would rather play in this kind of environment as opposed to a huge hall and if necessary repeat the show," he said.

He has watched one rehearsal in the theater and the acoustics seem to be excellent, he said.

"There isn't a bad seat in the house," Easterbrook said.

The new center means several changes for the R.H. Johnson Recreation Center.

The art and weaving clubs from R.H. Johnson Recreation Center will move to Kuentz. A model railroad club will move into in R.H. Johnson and the center will be remodeled to expand the sewing club, the Village Store and the recreation centers administration.

The metal club is a new club that will have a metal shop in the Kuentz center. People in the club will be doing repairs and making things such as metal ornaments. Maurice Griffin is the club president.

"I think it's great. It's just a great facility," he said of the center.

He and members of his club met with advisory board members and the center's architect to plan for the metal shop.

There are 138 club members and Griffin said the number will grow now that the club has a home in the Kuentz center.

"I anticipate we'll have at least 200 members by the end of the year," Griffin said.

The plans for the center were modified in early 1988 when the cost of building the center started to overrun the proposed budget. Most of those changes in the plans were changes in the decorative features of the center.



as the permanent home for the Sun Cities Senior Softball League and will be the site of the annual Sun Citics Invitational Softball Tournament, which attracts senior softball teams from

across the country.


Mr. Roach says a great deal of time and creativity went into the planning of the center.

\$5 million recreation center to be finished in January

SUN CITY WEST — Construction is on schedule for the final recreation center planned by Del Webb Corp.

The \$5 million project is expected to be completed by January.

The Kuentz Recreation Center at R.H. Johnson and Stardust boulevards will complete a trio of centers for residents. The other centers are R.H. Johnson and Beardsley.

The new center was named for Fred Kuentz, Del Webb Communities' retired chairman of the board and chief executive officer.

Ken Plonski, Webb's manager of public affairs, said the completion of the Kuentz facility "will fulfill the master agreement" offered by Del Webb.

"While the demand is not there at the

present time (for the center) we make it our practice to build out in front of demand. This one is in anticipation of the demand," he said.

Plonski said the center is in a part of the community that he expects will be built out soon.

Development around the center now includes the Sun Cities Community Service office and the Sun City West sheriff's posse headquarters.

A seventh community golf course also is in the vicinity. "And we're beginning to build some homes in that area," the public relations manager said.

One addition to the new center that the other centers lack is a 300-seat performing theater. The center also will have a metal shop, Plonski said.

The facility, to be a series of adjoining

buildings, will include several multipurpose rooms in one building.

There will be six outdoor tennis courts and an outdoor 5,000-square-foot swimming pool.

Other amenities include an art room, weaving room, woodworking shop, physical fitness center, a women's club, a therapy pool, a softball field and a one-quarter-mile jogging track.

Plonski said the design of the single-story center will keep to the area's Mediterraneanstyle architecture.

"It will continue in that mode but will have a little more dramatic architecture, such as the use of tile, incorporating arches and there will be a little more lush landscaping," he said. "We really wanted to make it a very visually attractive center."



Construction to begin in fall on new SCW recreation center

SUN CITY WEST - Westers will have \$5 million worth of sidewalk tending to do come fall.

That's when the Fred Kuentz Recreation Center goes under construction.

Sun City West's newest and last recreation centers will be built on the northeast corner of Stardust and R. H. Johnson Boulevards, ·across the street from the Community Service Building and the Sun City West Sheriff's Posse Building, which now under construction.

The new center will feature-Southwestern architecture, with liberal use of tile and stucco. Desert landscaping will complement the lines of the structure.

Earlier this year a special New Recreation Center Advisory Board was created. Chairman is Jack O'Connor, president of the Recreation Center Advisory Board. Advisory board members Faye Fiorelli and James Muth also belong to the committee, as do Virginia Ritson, Ray Shrewsbury, Jack Tuerk and Jerry Welch.

The committee sifted through requests coming from town groups and meeting with Sun City and Sun City West club members. Members also visited both cities' recreation centers.

Of 45 requests for recreation center space, only 15 didn't makefinal recommendation, and of those, a few only because of high costs, said O'Connor.

The final plan was approved by Del E. Webb Communities Inc., the planning committee and the advisory board.

The building is named after Fred Kuentz, retired Webb chairman of the board and chief executive officer.

The center will include a 300seat theater, space for a women's club, an art room, a weaving room, woodworking shop, metal shop, physical fitness center, a therapy pool and a 7,000-square-foot outdoor pool.

The center also will feature five

multi-purpose rooms, including space for Leather Crafters, Computer West, classroom facilties, Folk and Decorative Art, encore Needle and Crafts, Creative Silk Flower, Basketers and the Palo Verde Patchers.

Final features are:

• A nine-hole mini-golf course.

• Eight tennis courts, four with lights.

• A ¼-mile jobbing track with par course.


• A softball field. Building the center will take

approximately a year.


