SCW Rotary Club cultivates meditation garden idea

In its quest to work on community projects, the Rotary Club of Sun City West is partnering with the Recreation Centers of Sun City West on a meditation garden at Beardsley Park.

Rotary President Bob Murray said a letter was sent to the Rec Centers governing board about a year ago stating that the club was interested in doing community projects.

From a list of potential projects, Murray said Thursday in an interview, "we've selected a few of them that we're going to try to put through."


The meditation garden was the top choice.

During Monday's general manager operations meeting, Cindy Knowlton, recreation manager for the RC-SCW, discussed the plans for the project with the governing board.

The meditation garden will have a meandering walkway that is currently a dirt path behind the entertainment pavilion, Knowlton said. The path will lead to a center circle with a fountain.

She said the brick circle will give people an opportunity to buy memorial bricks. There will be vegetation of seasonal flowers, a hedge lining the path, new trees and more.

The estimated costs for the Rotary Meditation Garden are more than \$65,000, offi-

cials said, and it will be funded by donations, leaving about \$15,700 to be a shared cost between the Recreation Centers and the Rotary.

tary embraced the project and "now it's kind of in their court in terms of developing a scheme for getting the funds together to make it hapnon" The Rotary has its portion of the \$15,700, according to Knowlton. "The rest of it needs to be funded."

Murray said the meditation garden will be bigger than it was originally designed. "During the process, we wanted to embellish it and give people an opportunity to donate" some of the trees, bushes and flowers.

In return, Murray said donors will receive a plaque with whatever they want written on it

"We want to keep the cost of the project down as much as we can," and, Murray said, other clubs in the community could become involved.

Board Director Diane Cheney said this "could be a model for other community organizations to step up."

"This is the culmination of Lake Westphal's dream," said board director Jack Steiner.

Westphal, 92, a former board director, was working to establish a memorial garden, Steiner said.

"I'm really excited about the prospects for this," Steiner added.

Director David Wilson, who is also the chairman of the Sun City West Fire District, said the fire district has been involved with the Rotary and "they've been a really good partner in promoting community issues, notably smoke alarms," which Wilson said the Rotary helps sponsor.

Murray said Rotary likes it when Rotary clubs work with communities and other clubs. "It shows a kindred spirit, rather than just Rotary alone."

Sunshine Serenaders

Her web site is GOSPEL/PIANO LADY, so you know right off you better be on your best behavior whenever she's around.

And best behavior is exactly what the diminutive Gospel/Piano Lady, a.k.a. Frances Decker, expects from her musical troupe, the Sunshine Serenaders. "I tell them no swearing and no dirty stories", says Decker.

Decker started the troupe as an offshoot of the Sun City West Westernaires in November 1981. Since then her Serenaders have performed over 400 concerts for all kinds of occasions in Sun City and Sun City West. Their focus, however, is mainly on nursing home performances because, as Decker likes to relate, "I promised the Lord that when I retired I would dedicate my life to entertaining those in nursing homes."

Beverly Manor, Sun Valley Lodge and the Glendale Care Center are just a few of the nursing homes whose residents look forward to Serenaders' performances. "We like to spread cheer and sunshine," says Decker, "that's why we're called the 'Sunshine Serenaders'."

Her Serenaders are also popular performers at club doings, anniversary parties and church group functions. They've entertained for the SCW Friends of the Library, as well as at the Westernaires' Ice Cream Social and Potluck Suppers. And they've also graced the Sundome stage for one of SCW most anticipated events of the year – the Annual Holiday Variety Show.

Decker, who doesn't read music, plays piano and organ by ear. She records her music for a show, then gives tapes to her Serenaders and tells them, "Please practice at home and, if you want to rehearse with me, call me." Her troupe is so talented they come up with their own ideas for solo singing, dancing or comedy sketches based on her musical selection. Some months there's a specific holiday theme (Valentine's Day, St. Patrick's Day, Halloween, Christmas). And some months they "just go Western, Hawaiian or Roaring 20's". All Serenaders design their own costumes at their own expense.

In 2002, the Sunshine Serenaders were: Bob Bennett, Rosa Detamore, Sig Hjermstad, Diane King, Anne Kirk, Ray Lorek, Ron McColler, Evelyn Sturm, Betty Vissat, Frances Decker and stage manager, Floyd Vissat.

"I'm proud of my group," says Decker. "We're a happy group".







Dear Edson.

My name is Frances Decker - purchased our home in June 1979, our furniture moved to SCW - July 1979. We retired from Eastman Kodak in March 1980 after my 60th Birthday to receive my Kodak pension, and THEN we drove from Fairport, New York (near Rochester, N.Y.) to our lovely home, and here we will stay until the Lord calls me home. Rawleigh passed away January 6, 2000 after a long illness. But when he was healthy, The Lion's Club, Lapidary and Silver Clubs were a part of his life.

I have been a Westernaire since I arrived in 1980. We had a little group called Westernaire's Sunshine Troup of which I was the Assistant Program Director under Polly Harbert, our Westernaire's Director. But as November 18, 1981, I became the

originator, Director/Pianist of the Sun City West Sunshine Serenaders, and as of

August 29th when we will do a program at Immanuel Gardens, we will have performed 395 times, in the Sun Cities and the area.

We, although not a Chartered Club (only having 11 people), have been I think, an important part of this community. Most of my people have been with me a long time:

Ray Lorek - since 1984; Anne Kirk and Sig Hjermstad - since 1986; Betty Vissat - since 1987: Diane King - Since 1988. Rosa Detamore - 1992; Ron McCollor - 1996;

Bob Bennet - 1997; Evelyn Sturm - 1998. (Floyd Vissat is our Stage Manager and when he married Betty, he became a Serenader)., and I started the Serenaders - 1981. At that time, I had 16-20 people, and as time went on either illness, death, moving away etc., I find it wonderful what my little group can do. I have many newspaper clippings - from the beginning to the present.

I also have the original Activity Sheets of Sun City West since 1979-1989 and some of 1990, so there is history right there because at that time, a lot of pictures were on the Activity Sheets, and as you know, a picture is worth a million words - or something like that.

I am also a photographer and have over 30 books filled with my pictures, and many of them are from activities in Sun City West.

I saw your article in the Rec Center News and wanted you to know about my wonderful group - we entertain not only in nursing homes, but wherever we are asked to do so, and I hope we can be a part of the 25th Anniversary in February 2003

At the present time, Sig Hjermstad is preparing input about Westernaires and I gave him some of the input including the Activity Sheet informing the readers about joining the Westernaires, and one copy had a picture of an early Westernaire rehearsal.


