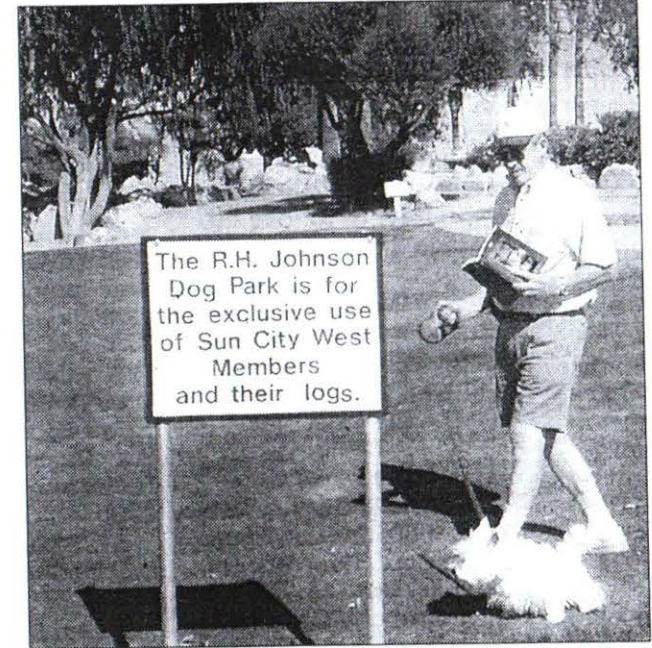

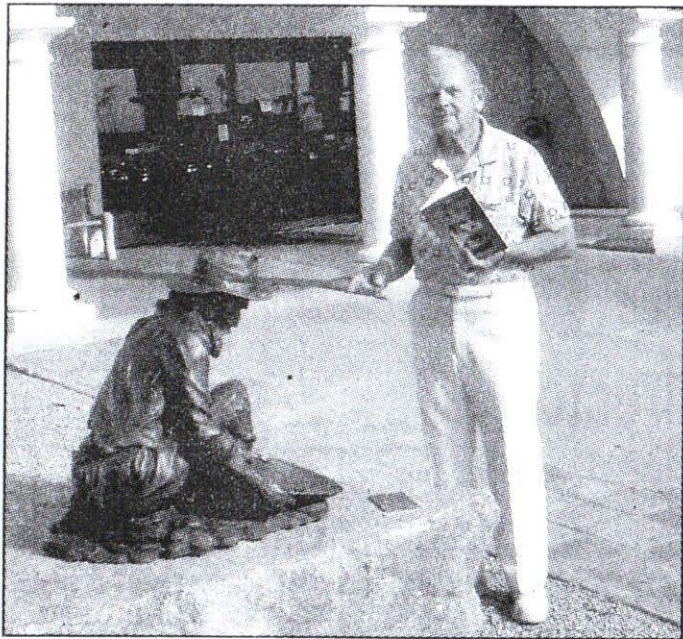

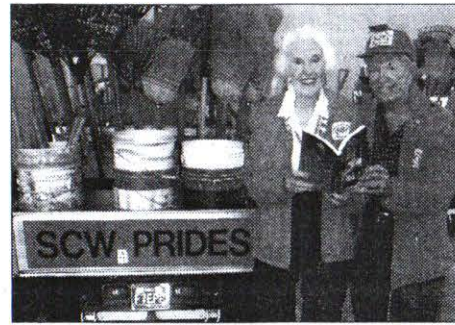

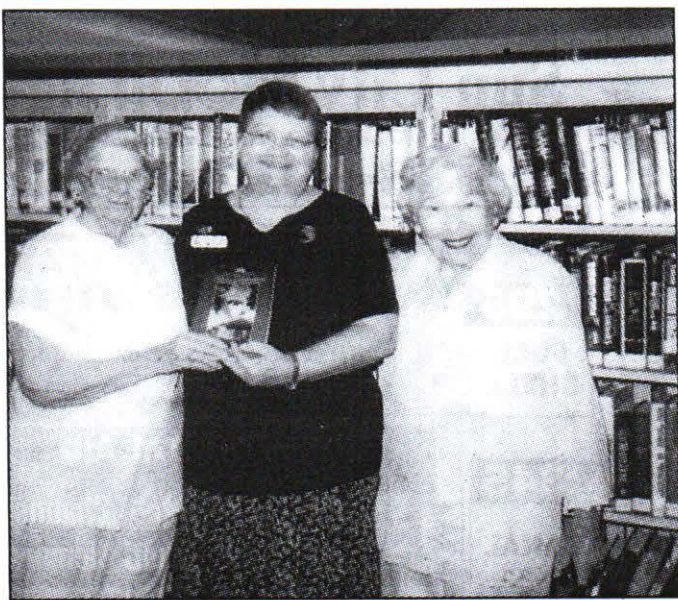

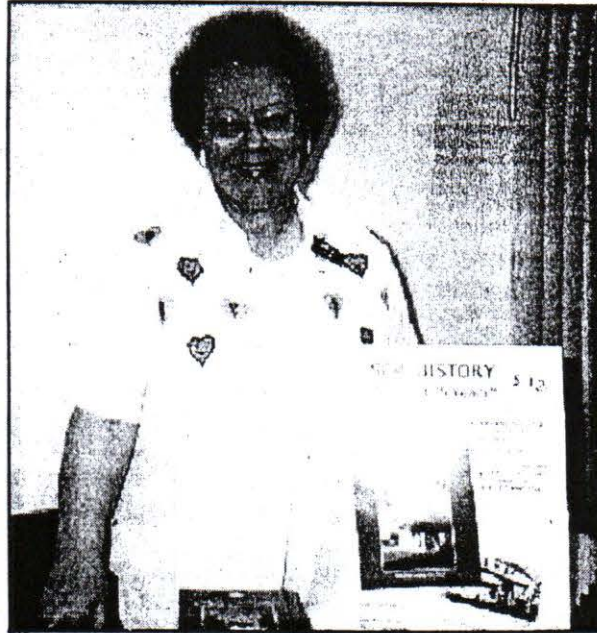
At a recent meeting of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society, it was revealed that many of the major attractions of Sun City West were built early in the community's development so as to lure new retirees away from buying resales in Sun City.

Said Don Tuffs, "SCW needed to compete with SC and to lure buyers to the new area. As a result, R. H. Johnson Rec Center, Hillcrest Golf Course, and the Sundome were constructed to draw people to Webb's newer development."

Tuffs, then senior vice-president of the Del Webb Corporation and manager of the Sundome, spoke of the outstanding programs that were initially offered at the facility: the entire cast of the Lawrence Welk

Show, total ensembles from the Big Band era, and top stars of the period such as Red Skelton.

"Audiences were thrilled at the performances and magnificence of the Sundome, whose area consists of almost two football fields," said Tuffs.

"People came from all over the country to see the performances and then were invited to view the model homes. Many sales were consummated in that way," added the former Webb exec.

He reminisced about his favorite performers. When Red Skelton was here, he always visited the hospital, and made a point of walking around and talking to residents. Revealed Tuffs, "Red never wanted to eat at restaurants, preferring to join the Tuffs family at our home for meals."

"Gerald Ford lectured here and showed that his demeanor was that of 'just a regular guy.'"

He noted that "Steve and Edie" demanded outrageous perks and that his limo ride from Sky Harbor with Henry Kissinger was difficult because he couldn't understand his English.

His great hope is that, in the future, Broadway shows presented at Gammage will also come to the Sundome for performances which can be enjoyed by homeowners in the booming West Valley.

Available at the meeting was a new brochure written by the staff of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society which contained a short historical perspective with interesting anecdotes of the area we

call home.

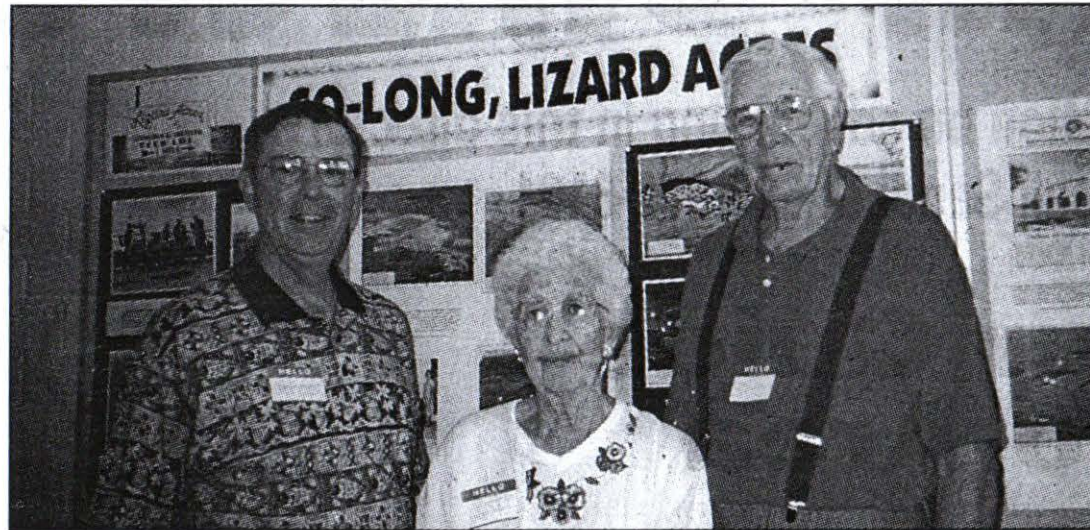
According to the publication, long before Del Webb risked a fortune proving that older people could find happiness in a retirement community in the desert, other men had gambled fortunes developing the area.

R. P. Davie, a business tycoon, tried farming sugar beets between the Agua Fria and New Rivers, naming the area Marinette. When the business failed, he sold to Goodyear Tires, and Marinette became a settlement for Goodyear's cotton company.

When cotton was no longer used in making tires, the Marinette Ranch was sold to Webb whose genius transformed the desert into the most successful retirement community in the world.

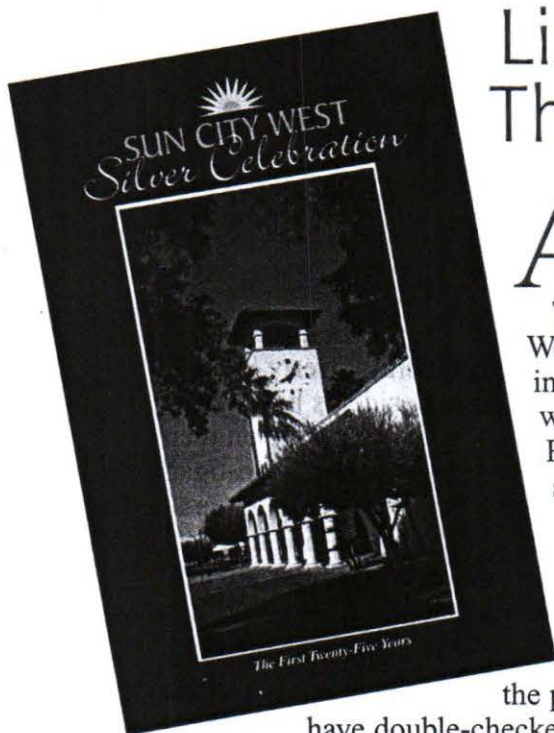
Webb's business acumen then motivated him to develop SCW. Looking at the desolate desert, an early rancher declared, "This country isn't fit for raising anything but lizards."

That area now consists of approximately 30,000 residents. For information, call 974-2568.

Lizard Acres to Lush Oasis – The History of Sun City West

A history project begun two years ago under the auspices of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society has resulted in an informative new book: *Sun City West Silver Celebration-The First 25 Years*.

Twenty-four chapters span the quarter century in which Sun City West has grown from "Lizard Acres" to lush oasis. Historical facts are interspersed with personal anecdotes to liven the story. Early residents will find much that will remind them of their "pioneering" years. Recent residents will find a helpful and entertaining basis for understanding all that has gone into making Sun City West what it is today.

In 2000, two Historical Society board members, Ed Allen and Phyllis Street, initiated the project to document the 25-year history of Sun City West. Volunteers were sought to help research, conduct interviews and to write portions of the history. More than two dozen people have worked on various stages of this project over

the past two years. Many others in the community have contributed and

have double-checked the material presented.

With more than 300 pages, the book contains 140 illustrations and a detailed index to help readers quickly locate subjects or persons of interest to them. Typeface, type size and spacing, and margins were carefully selected to make this as easy to read as possible. While many history works of similar scope and size sell for \$19.95 or more, this book is priced at only \$12. For the convenience of residents, the book will be on sale at the various events planned by the Sun City West Anniversary Committee.

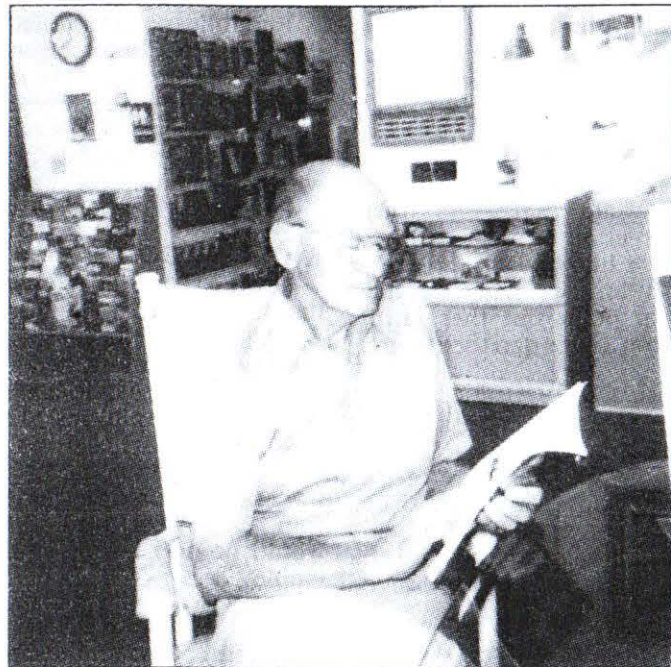

SCW history book sales soar

It is an interesting experience to visit the Sun Cities Area Historical Society, not only because it is the museum which contains the archives of the Sun Cities, but also because it is located in the first model home built by Del Webb in 1960.

Kitchen and bath cabinets, even fixtures, exist as they were 43 years ago. The original refrigerator still works—its interior shelves are cast in retro bright

pink.

There is room in the kitchen for a clothes washer but not a dryer. Drying fabrics was done on clothes lines in the back yard.

Because Sun City West's 25th anniversary celebrations began on Feb. 15, special exhibits at the Society chronicle Sun City West from its very beginnings in 1978 to the present. Early residents are often present to recall their first days in the community and regale visitors with accounts of their memorable adventures.

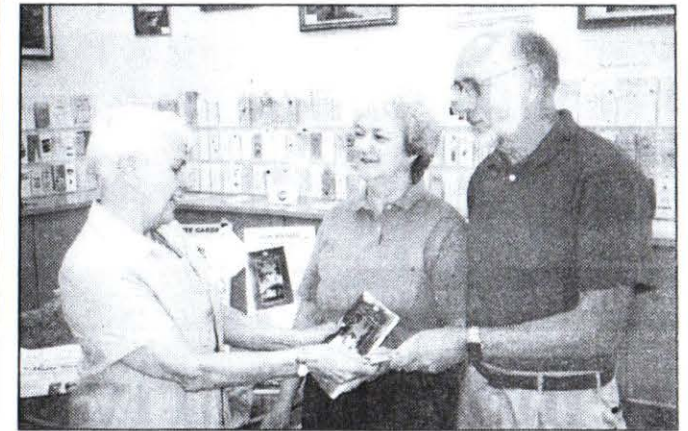
"before and after" photos. A detailed index helps the reader to find the subject of choice. The 300-page book sells for \$12.

Before there was a Sun City West, there was only the scrub foliage of the Sonoran Desert. Rattlesnakes in abundance; the railroad running by on the south, and cattle.

The place was west of Marinette, west of Surprise, and was called Lizard Acres.

They grew cotton in Marinette, which is now Sun City; they fattened cattle for the market in Lizard Acre, which is now Sun City West. A sign with the Lizard Acres still marks a spur on the Santa Fe railway a few blocks west of Bell Road.

Abe Harris remembers Lizard Acres well. The Buckeye resident drove hay to the area to feed the cattle, truckload after truckload.

"They had big pens there, a little way north of the railroad," he said.

"We'd haul in feed from all over the Valley, hay mostly, sometimes milo.

"We had to be careful in the desert because you could get bogged down in the sand on the way to the cattle. There wasn't a road, just a track."

Grand Avenue was paved and a main thoroughfare, as it had been since the turn of the century. Still, Harris said, it was only two lanes. Most other roads were dirt tracks.

Like many others in the area, Harris had been recruited from Texas by the cotton farmers, including J. G. and Walter O. Boswell, who raised the fiber on land that is now Sun City.

Harris picked cotton initially, then followed his father into the trucking business.

"I don't know what they did with the cattle," he said.

"After they got them up to market size, they sold them. There was a slaughterhouse in Phoenix, but I didn't know if they were butchered there or sent away on the railroad or in trucks."

Then came Del Webb, buying the Boswell lands and building the first parts of Sun City, which soon crossed Grand Avenue, then crossed Bell Road, and, 25 years ago was renewed under a new name across the Agua Fria River in Lizard Acres — Sun City West.

Clarice Uhl remembered that. So did Mary Wick. Both were the first to receive keys to their new homes and move into them. The date was Oct. 16, 1978.

Both got keys from John Meeker, at the time president of Del Webb Development Co.

"The shaping of Sun City West will be a cooperative venture between Devco and the new residents," Meeker said at the ceremony on Oct. 15, 1978.

He also pledged to encourage cooperation between Sun City and Sun City West.

When Sun City West started, Devco was putting up 80 dwellings a week. The community was expected to have 32,000 residents "in the first phase, north of Grand Avenue."

And it was to have taken less than 10 years to build.

Didn't happen. Recession stalled that. It took 20 years to build all of Sun City West.

Expansion of the original community didn't come to the south but to the north when Webb was able to buy 1, 257 acres north of Deer Valley Drive in the early 1990s at bargain-basement prices. The 3,250 homes there are in what is commonly called the Expansion Area.

Expansion to the south, in what is now Sun City Grand, started five years later.

Clarice Uhl and Mark Wick have watched it all.

"I think it's grown into a very gracious community," Wick said in 1998 on the occasion of Sun City West's 20th anniversary.

She and her husband watched it grow, she said, "and in the very early days you needed a pioneer spirit."

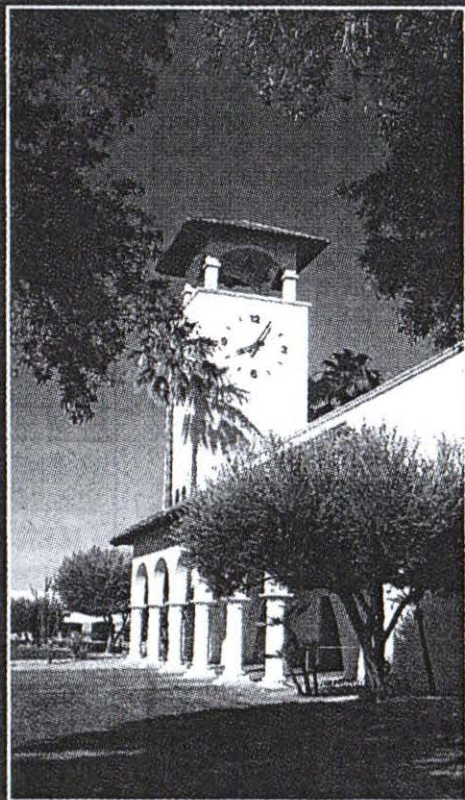
The Uhls liked moving, and liked new models, so they bought seven homes in total in Sun City West, moving from one to the other as development progressed.

And they moved to the brand-new community from the original Sun City where they also had owned several houses.

The Uhls liked being first: Clarice was the first person to check out a book from the new R.H. Johnson Library — on Oct. 16, 1979, a year after they moved into their new home.

Clarice also attended the grand opening of the new Safeway, and the first LPG tournament held in Sun City West.

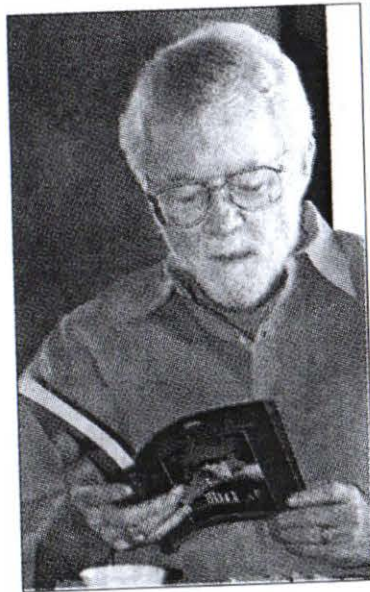

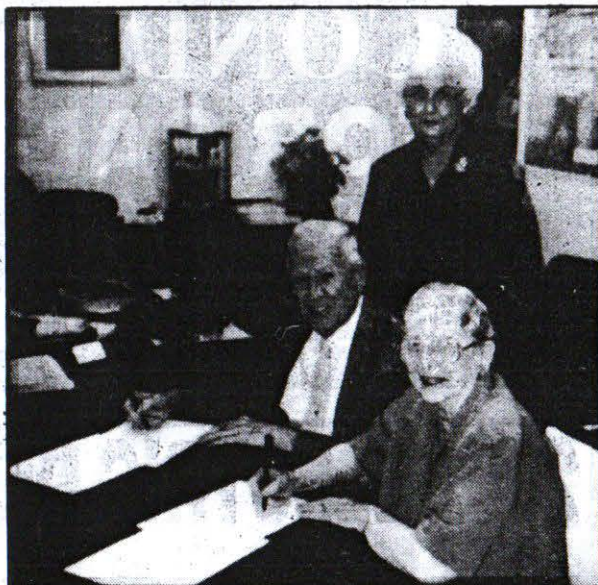

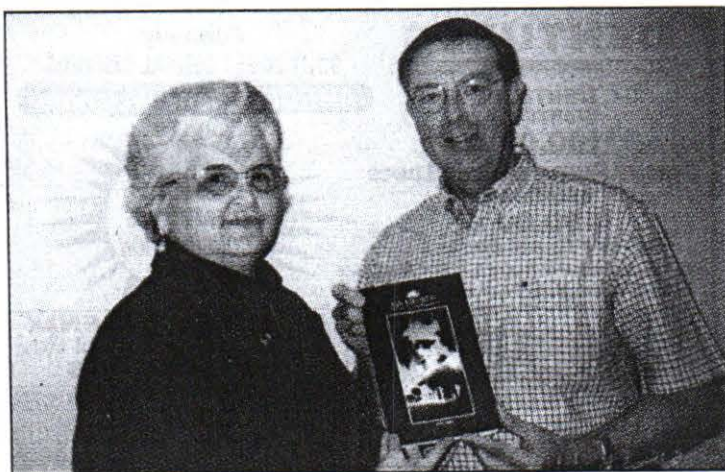

Work began on "Sun City West Silver Celebration 1978-2003" during the summer of 2000 by members of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society.

Underwritten by the Historical Society, the purpose of the book is to document the community's first quarter century.

Since the project's beginnings, over two dozen volunteers have examined histori-

cal documents, researched community landmarks and interviewed numerous individuals to create an accurate account of Sun City West's history and evolution.

"I feel very confident that what we have in the book is accurate," Mr. Allen said.

"I anticipate people will come to us and say we overlooked this or that they remembered the history differently," Mr. Allen added. "But we've sought out lots of people on any given subject. We ran copy by a number of people in the know (to ensure accuracy)."

While the book does not detail every single event in the community's history, it provides a good perspective on how Sun City West has become what it is today, according to Connie McMillin, the Historical Society's president.

"In this fast-paced media world, the book presents a core record of how the community evolved and came together," Ms. McMillin said.

Approximately 300 pages in length, the book will include 140 illustrations, personal anecdotes and historical facts.

The 24-chapter book is expected to be printed in December and available for purchase in January for \$12.

"The book is priced where it should be reasonable for most people in the community," Mr. Allen said. "We're planning to print 7,500 copies."

Proceeds from book sales will go to the Historical Society.

A complete list of vendor locations has yet to be released. It is anticipated that the books will be available at events celebrating the community's anniversary.

Work continues throughout the summer on the SCW 25th Anniversary history book. At his summer home in Wisconsin our Board member, Edson Allen, is putting the book into chapters with the reports from the committees who are working on different sections. By E-mail, telephone, and the postal service, members of the committee are all working to make the history of the first 25 years of Sun City West a best seller!

Ed reports, "We are closing in on our goal. The book is expected to have 24 Chapters, be about 250 pages in length and contain 80 or more illustrations. Thirteen of the chapters have been completed and the remainder chapters are in varying stages of completion. Bruce Ellison, formerly with the Daily News-Sun, has volunteered his services to edit the book to ensure grammatical accuracy and consistency of style.

And, it will clear up the matter of a commuter train station at Grand Avenue and R.H. Johnson Boulevard.

Group works toward chronicling SCW's history

With a little over seven months remaining until Sun City West's 25th anniversary observance, officials from the Sun Cities Area Historical Society anticipate a book chronicling the community's history will be ready in time to mark the occasion.

Efforts to document the community's first quarter century began in the summer of 2000.

Since then, over two dozen volunteers have sifted through historical documents, researched landmarks of the community and interviewed numerous individuals in an effort to record how Sun City West has progressed to its current state.

"We tried to gather information as broadly as possible because I personally have two concerns in overseeing this project: I want to make sure that it (the book) is done in a way that it is as complete and thorough as possible and that it is as accurate as possible," said Ed Allen, board member of the historical society and project leader for the creation of the book.

"We know we're going to overlook things but please let it not be something significant," he continued.

In an effort to be as complete and accurate as possible, volunteers sorted through 25 years of newspapers, newsletters, activities calendars, photos and additional source materials.

Others working on the project interviewed original homeowners, past community leaders, officials from the community's developer and other pertinent individuals.

Patterned after a similar book published in 1985 to commemorate Sun City's first 25 years, "Jubilee," this publication is projected to include 24 chapters that trace the pre-history of the community through the present and even look toward Sun City West's future.

So far, 13 chapters have been written and are currently being edited. The final 11 chapters are expected to be finished by August, according to Mr. Allen.

"Our target date all along is to have the book ready by Feb. 15, 2003, the 25th anniversary of the

groundbreaking," Mr. Allen said.

The book is being created completely by volunteers, residing in both Sun City West and Sun City.

One of those volunteers is Barbara Brozman, one of two Sun City residents working on the project.

"It's been fun and exhausting," Ms. Brozman said.

When agreeing to volunteer, Ms. Brozman thought she would take a few notes on some historical documents and be done with the project. She ended up doing more and, although it was time consuming work, she enjoyed doing it.

"The old newsletters and calendars are a lot of fun to read," Ms. Brozman said. "It was very interesting watching things develop and grow."

Prompting the project's creation was an article in the Sun Cities Area Historical Society's summer 2000 newsletter, asking for a volunteer to start it.

Written by Sun City West resident Phyllis Street, then president of the organization, the article recanted a dream that someone organized a group to write the community's growth.

Mr. Allen was the only one to respond to the article.

"He just picked it up and got the ball rolling," Ms. Street said. "I'm really grateful that he was willing to tackle this."

The Historical Society is underwriting the project. All proceeds from the book will benefit the non-profit organization.

Beyond the desire that the book provide a good historical documentation of the community, Ms. Street hopes that it will be a promotional tool for the Historical Society.

"It's one way to alert (residents of Sun City West) to the fact that they are part of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society," she said.

The price and all vendor locations for the book have yet to be determined.

Mr. Allen is working on a marketing plan, trying to determine ways to get the book in as many hands as possible.

"I want to make it easy for people to obtain it and I want to price it so many people will buy it," Mr. Allen said.

Historical book committee needs help in solving mysteries

Del E. Webb made a fortune building hotels in Las Vegas. He risked that fortune by building Sun City—taking a chance that retirees would find happiness in a desert community which featured affordable housing, unique amenities and which provided a desirable lifestyle. He was, of course, immediately successful.

Then Webb, originally a carpenter, continued to prove the American Dream existed by developing Sun City West. He thus created a flourishing community from the parched land known as "Lizard Acres."

And now, because of the genius of his foresight, Sun City West, a flourishing town of more than 17,000 homes, businesses, places of worship and health facilities, will celebrate its 25th anniversary in 2003.

In order to chronicle the growth of the community, the Sun City West History Committee has been gathering research from a plethora of sources and writing a history of Sun City West. "The final product of the committee's effort will be a published book ready for distribution during 2003," said Ed Allen, committee chair.

But the committee has encountered some missing pieces, and it is looking for individuals to solve the following mysteries:

First, the earliest health care in Sun City West was provided in 1981 from a temporary structure on the site of the former ABCO supermarket. According to the first physician, Dr. Alan Miles, the facility was very primitive. Does anyone recall visiting this makeshift building? Or does anyone have a photo of the structure?

The second mystery involves Crestview Restaurant. When was it renamed "Terrace on the Green"? Was it when the Webb Corp. sold the building? Was there a reason for the change? When did it take place?

In October, 1984 (this is really

an Orwellian mystery), a newspaper photo shows a Restaurant-Bakery-Ice Cream Parlor-Lounge named GrandmaOs in the Mercado del Sol shopping center. It was to be located in the space currently occupied by Lakeside Florist, with the owner hoping to sell 35 shares of GrandmaOs in a limited partnership venture. But the restaurant never opened. Does anyone recall what happened?

Nearly two years of research and writing have led to a completed manuscript. Bruce Ellison is serving as editor, and has reviewed all twenty-four chapters. Bruce knows Sun City West's history from having covered it during his many years with the *Daily News-Sun*. His comments and corrections have all been incorporated and the book's text is complete.

During the research phase, many newspaper clippings, newsletters and activity calendars provided a wealth of photos of life in Sun City West. Approximately 125 photos were selected for the book. Now comes the task of writing captions, sizing the photos for reproduction in the book and locating originals.

With text and photos of life in hand, the next step will be to lay out the book. For reasons of economy, a 6" x 9" size with soft covers was selected. The twenty-four chapters will be set in the proper type and the 125 illustrations woven into the content.

We expect to be giving that final CD to a printer in early December, with the goal of having printed copies ready for distribution by late January. Watch for it—I know you are going to enjoy the story of how Lizard Acres became a lush oasis in just 25 years!

Group works to compile Sun City West's history

Compilation expected in time for community's 25th anniversary celebration

Although the celebration of Sun City West's 25th anniversary is still nearly two years away, the Sun Cities Area Historical Society has already begun the process of creating a book to document the history of the community. A book that Ed Allen hopes will be ready the silver jubilee.

"The 25th Anniversary is less than two years away and we need to find people in Sun City West to start the project now. It will be difficult to start in 2003," said Mr. Allen, board member of the historical society and project leader for the creation of the book.

The historical society is seeking volunteers to help in all aspects of

the book's creation. "We need volunteers of different types," Mr. Allen said. "We need volunteers who like to interview. We need others who will transcribe or type up notes ... and we need writers."

The book, sponsored by the Sun Cities Area Historical Society, will trace the community's evolution from before its groundbreaking on Feb. 13, 1978, through current issues that may have a far-reaching affect on the community's future.

"Roughly 1,000 residents moved in during the first two years and formed an organization called the Pioneers. As they leave us, some history is leaving as well," said Mr. Allen, who estimates there are slightly more than 300 pioneers still

SCW man seeks book help

SILVER ANNIVERSARY:
Group wants to publish community history in time for celebration

When Sun City West turns 25 on Feb. 19, 2003, residents hope to note the silver anniversary with a book detailing the community's first quarter of a century.

That's what happened in Sun City back in 1985 with the publication of the 272-page paperback titled "Jubilee: The 25th Anniversary of Sun City, Arizona."

Jane Freeman and Glenn Sanberg were the principal authors of the Sun City book.

"It was a hell of a lot of work," Freeman recalled this week. "But if they have this much of a head start on the Sun City West effort, and can get people interested in the project, they can do it."

Ed Allen knows that: "Before there can be a book, considerable historical research needs to be completed."

Allen, a board member at the Sun Cities Area Historical Society, is one one of those spearheading the search for Sun City West information.

"While we don't yet know what a committee might be planning to celebrate the

25th anniversary, we do know that we'd like to get the book out" that year, Allen said. "We'd like to document the community's history, and we'll need help from residents, from the Pioneers, from those who have records and memories."

Ground was broken for Sun City West Feb. 19, 1978. It was to be a continuation of the highly successful and then almost-complete Sun City.

Pioneers are those who moved into Sun City West in its first two years, 1978 and 1979.

"It's a club that once had a thousand members," Allen said. "But with deaths and people moving away, they're down to about 300. It's somewhat amazing that although they have good documentation of their own meetings, they have very little background on the community."

"We want to contact all the clubs, all the community organizations, the churches, the service groups, and ask them to start thinking about their history so they can make a contribution to us that will be included in the bigger book."

The book group, which doesn't yet have a name, also is seeking an endorsement for its effort from both the Recreation Centers of Sun City West and the Sun City

West Property Owners and Residents Association, two early organizations.

Del Webb Corp. built both Sun City, with about 25,000 dwelling units, and Sun City West, with about 18,000. The company now is developing Sun City Grand in Surprise, as well as other Sun City active-adult retirement communities in several states.

People interested in helping need not be historians or researchers, Allen said, "just interested folks, maybe who can write. What's best are the contacts, the idea that they may know where to go or who to ask" about some early developments.

Freeman said the Sun City book, "Jubilee," was written with a lot of informal help from Del Webb Corp.

"They were under orders to clean out the junk in the main office, and they literally emptied Sun City's history into the trash bins," she said. "We grabbed that stuff up, and it took almost a year to sort it all out and make sense of it."

That situation isn't likely to recur, so the Sun City West effort will be more work, she said.

Allen is a part-time resident of Sun City West, he said. His family still lives in Wisconsin seven months of the year. But interested residents can reach him now at 975-1815, or his colleague Phyllis Street, also a Historical Society board member, at 584-0323, for details or to volunteer.

Del Webb is the name most people associate with the dramatic change in senior retirement living across the country. With the creation of Sun City, the Webb name became synonymous with an active retirement life built around a community created with that end in mind.

Mr. Webb would be the first to admit, however, that his idea of planned retirement living was given life by the talented

people with which he surrounded himself.

Nowhere was that more evident than in Sun City West, which was built after Mr. Webb's death in July 1974. Sun City West, created 25 years ago by Mr. Webb's visionaries, kept alive the idea of a healthy, active retirement. And three of those visionaries, Robert H. Johnson, Fred Kuentz and John Meeker, have been immortalized in Sun City West by having their names attached to streets or recreation centers.

Sun City West: A brief history

1978-2003

From the vision of an idyllic retirement lifestyle that began with the opening of Sun City in 1960, to the reality of the country's finest active adult community, Sun City West sits as one of the crown jewels of Del Webb's planned developments.

With groundbreaking on Feb. 15, 1978, to the first residents—our pioneers—who moved into their homes later that year, Sun City West has grown into a paradise in the southwest.

One of the factors that made Sun City West as appealing as its older sister city to new home buyers was the planning of recreation centers prior to actual housing. Even though the houses were finished first, many of those new buyers made their purchase based upon the continuing growth of the recreation centers. The R.H. Johnson recreation complex, part of John Meeker's idea making the community a premier place to live for the new generation of seniors, opened on Oct. 20, 1979, joining

Hillcrest Golf Club as the first recreational facilities created for enjoyment of Sun City West homeowners.

However, it was not just physical facilities that residents appreciated. They soon began creating clubs, joining music groups, establishing chapters of service organizations and founding churches and synagogues.

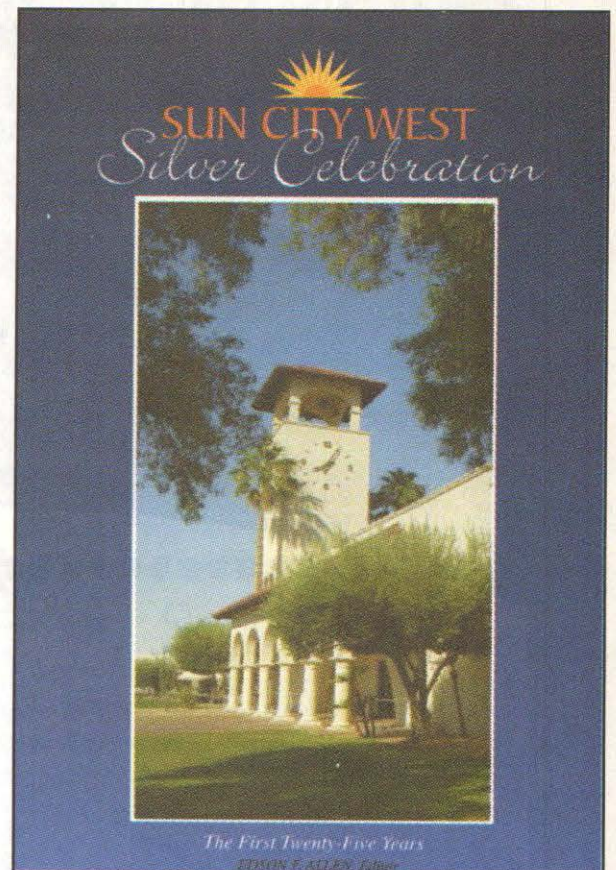
One of those community creations was the Sun City West Foundation, which gave residents a name under which they could raise funds to sponsor housing for community projects. The SCWF currently provides facilities for Helping Hands, meeting rooms, AARP Tax Services, Thrift Shop, Interfaith Adult Day Care Center, Luminarias, PRIDES and Voluntary Placement Services. These organizations allow Sun City West residents to borrow medical equipment, get help on tax preparation or go to a shelter in case of emergency.

In November of 1979, the SCW Rec Center's first golf course,

Pebblebrook, was unveiled. Eventually Pebblebrook would be joined by six other

courses for private use by Rec Center mem-

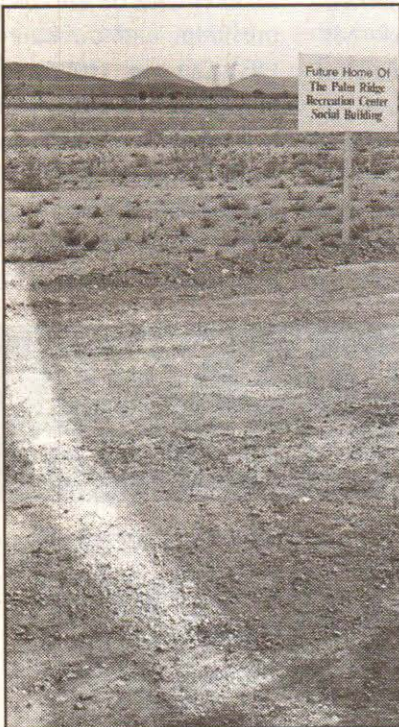

bers: Stardust, Grandview, Echo Mesa, Trail Ridge, Desert Trails and, finally in 1996, Deer Valley.

As the community grew, so did recreational facilities. Beardsley Park Rec Center was opened in June of 1985. As more residents moved into their

homes, Kuentz Center opened. Palm Ridge was added to the Rec Center roster with the addition of homes north of Deer Valley Drive.

Today, more than 32,000 people call Sun City West their home. The community is pleased to celebrate 25 years of incomparable living in the Valley of the Sun.

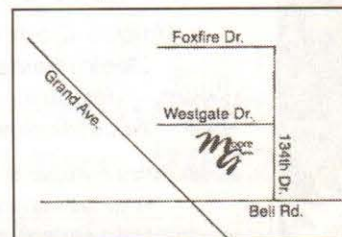

Center, 19803 R.H. Johnson Blvd.

Mr. Johnson was still a student at Phoenix Business College when he met Mr. Webb in 1935. He began working for the Del E. Webb Development Company (DEVCO) at that time as the timekeeper, responsible for making sure construction projects were built on time and within budget. From this inauspicious beginning, Mr. Johnson ended up becoming Chairman of the Board of Del E. Webb Corp., retiring in 1981 to create the philanthropic Del E. Webb Foundation in Wickenburg, founded in

1960.

Mr. Johnson has often been called, "... the driving force in the development of Sun City West."

While Mr. Johnson was the driving force, Mr. Webb called Fred Kuentz "... the great negotiator."

Mr. Kuentz joined the DEVCO team in 1949 as the director of electrical design and cost control. He quickly moved through the company ranks and, by 1965, was vice president of property management and senior vice president of corporation operations. When he was offered the seat of president of DEVCO in 1983, he took control of Sun City West development and was largely responsible for the con-

tinued growth of the community.

Fred R. Kuentz Recreation Center, 14401 R.H. Johnson Blvd., is named for this visionary. Mr. Kuentz passed away Oct. 29, 2001.

Visitors driving through Sun City West will eventually come upon a street named Meeker Boulevard. This roadway is named for John Meeker, who added the personal touch to the community by looking at the development through homeowners' eyes. It was Mr. Meeker who gambled on projects others thought were foolish, like creating the Sundome Center for Performing Arts, or supplying free garden plots for residents, or supplying

land at reasonable cost to churches wanting to locate within the community.

Mr. Meeker originally was Mr. Webb's golf caddie prior to World War II. He became part of the DEVCO family in 1946 as a junior clerk. After working as an operations clerk and supervisor of design and engineering, Mr. Meeker took on the role of president and director of DEVCO in 1965. He passed away Feb. 5, 2000.

These visionaries added to the original Webb idea and created Sun City West, which celebrates its 25th anniversary in 2003.

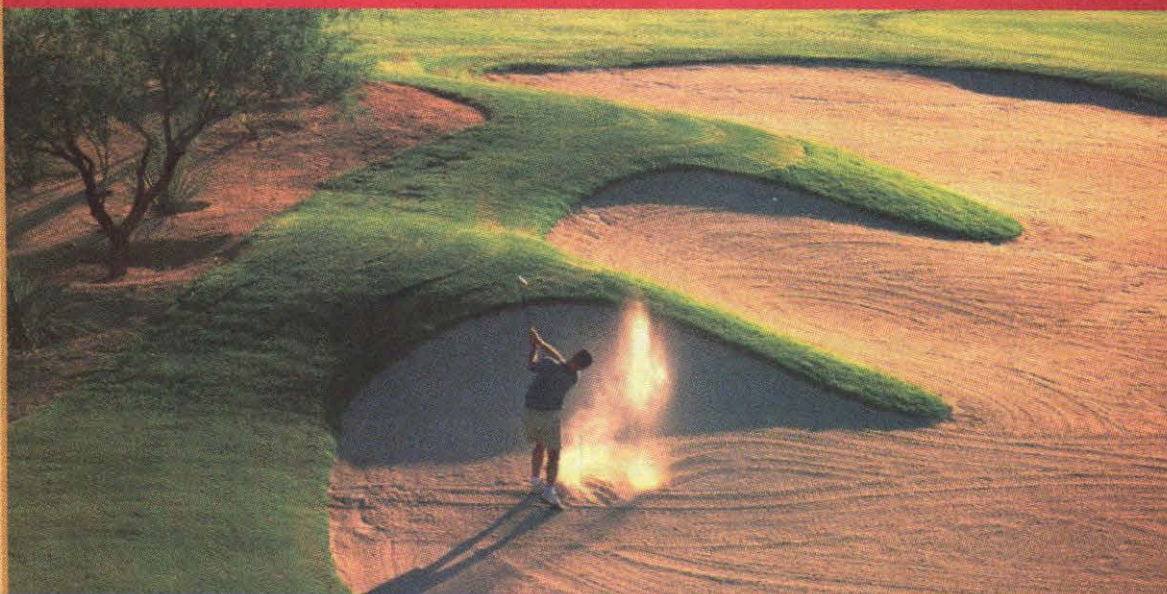

Feb. 15, 1978: an auspicious day in Sun City West history

It started Feb. 15, 1978 with about 200 ceremonial shovelfuls of soil and turned into the 7,000-acre master-planned community known as Sun City West. Now home to some 28,000 residents, more than 1,200 homes were built during the community's first year, providing homes to about 1,000 people.

Sun City West was created by Del Webb Corporation. Learning and making improvements from their first west Valley community, Sun City, Sun City West Phase I was originally planned to have "... six full-length golf courses, three recreation centers and approximately 17,000 housing units."

Now 25 years later, residents enjoy four regulation and three executive golf courses, 27 tennis courts, indoor and outdoor walking tracks, racquet and handball courts, bocce and lawn bowling, shuffleboard, billiards, softball, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, a 30-lane bowling center, and four multi-million dollar recreation centers.

In addition to amenities provided by the community, Sun City West residents are

members of over 100 clubs. From arts and crafts to home-state clubs and chapters of most national and international service clubs, retirees are finding themselves busier than ever enjoying their own personal interests.

The official groundbreaking ceremony was held Feb. 15, 1978. On hand digging the first shovelfuls of dirt were John W. Meeker, president of the Del E. Webb Development Co., Senator Dennis DeConcini, J.G. Boswell Co. Vice President Hank Raymond, Webb Corporation Chairman and CEO Robert H. Johnson and Governor Wesley Bolin. Almost 200 civic and business

leaders followed, digging in on their own.

Eight months later another ceremony was held to welcome the first residents. Present at that ribbon-cutting ceremony were DEVCO Executive Vice President Joe Aubin, resident Clarice Uhl, DEVCO President John Meeker, residents Mary and Luman Wick, DEVCO Vice President and Operations Manager Bob Cannon and DEVCO Senior Vice President and Engineering Manager Tom Ryan.

The Wicks became Sun City West's first residents Oct. 16, 1978. Formerly of Topeka, Kans., the pair noted they enjoyed the area's freindly and

relaxed atmosphere.

Clarice and Edward Uhl also were initial residents of the new community. The pair moved to Arizona from Alameda, Calif.

Sales topped \$92 million during the first half of 1979. Of that amount, more than \$51 million in new sales was recorded during the year's second quarter. Over 1,250 new homes were sold during the six-month period.

Sun City West celebrated its seventh birthday Oct. 16, 1985 with the announcement that 12,500 people were now residents of the new community. Originally, community officials were aiming at a final population of 25,000.

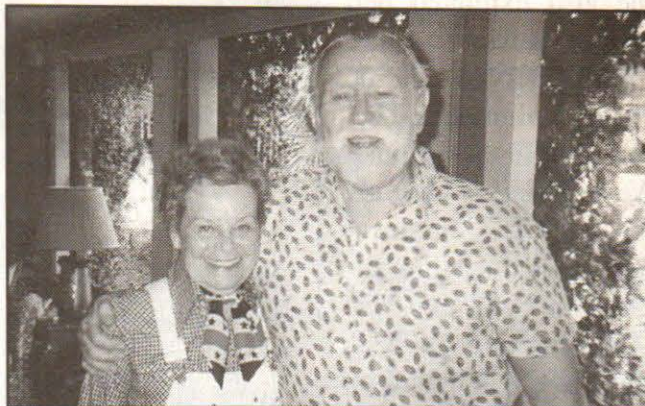

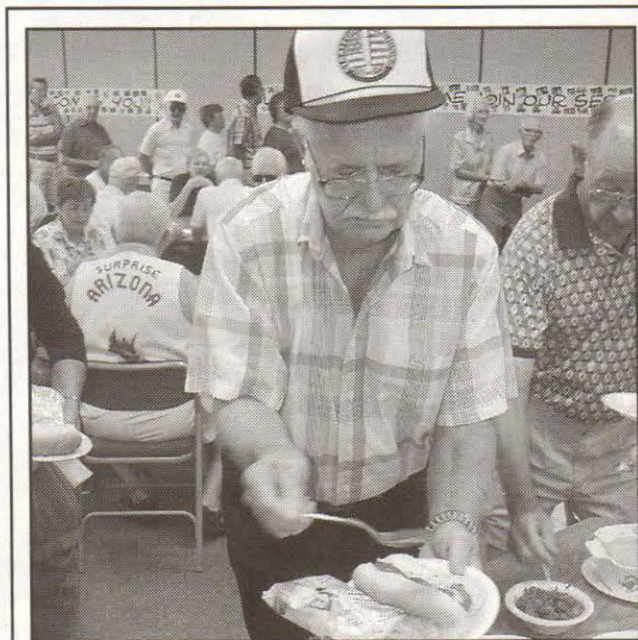

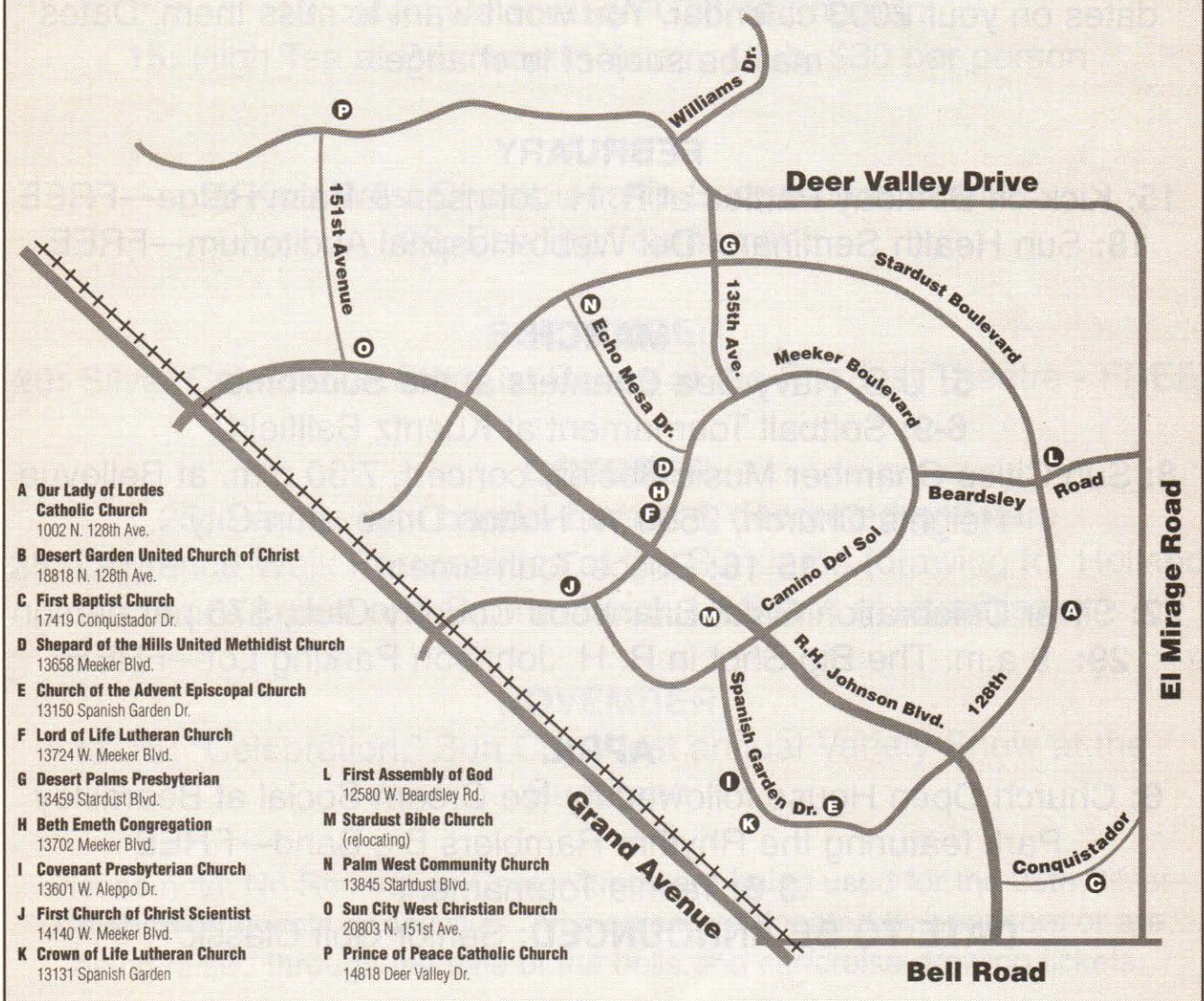

PORA: working for Sun City West residents since 1980

The idea for the Sun City West Property Owners and Residents Association originally sparked in February 1979 so future residents could officially oppose a \$27.5 million bond program passed in the Dysart Unified School District June 1978 election.

The organization successfully rescinded the bond program in Oct. 1980 after officially forming in January 1980. Committees also formed to review utility rates, add traffic control signs, begin Friday Night Bingo, and to separate Sun City West from the Dysart Unified School District. It was

through the election of four Sun City West residents to the district board and a vote in May of 1981 that separated Phase I of Sun City West from the school district.

PORA also has proposed the formation of a community fire district and opposed a county landfill location off El Mirage Road north of Deer Valley Road.

Since then, anything proposed by government organizations has had an alternative proposal. PORA initiatives have been realized through the creation of such organizations as Community Fund, Meals on Wheels, the

Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital

Responsive to west Valley needs for 15 years and beyond

More than 10 years were invested in the planning of Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital prior to its opening in January 1988. Sun Health, the community-based, non-profit parent company that also operates Boswell Memorial Hospital in Sun City, formulated the plan with the realization that patient-care demands eventually would surpass Boswell Hospital's capacity to serve the entire northwest Valley area. The vision was that together, these non-profit healthcare facilities would serve the healthcare needs of the entire area.

Sun Health representatives took their case before the Central Arizona Health Systems Agency in 1984. Although there was overwhelming evidence that Boswell Hospital's capacity would be exceeded even before completion of a new hospital in Sun City West — and despite endorsements such as the unanimous support of the Sun City West Property Owners and Residents Association — the CAHSA hearing board voted to deny the project by a narrow 5-4 vote.

Undaunted, Sun Health continued efforts to bring the needed hospital to the area. The Arizona

Legislature permitted the state's certificate-of-need law to expire in 1985. That also ended CAHSA authority to limit ready access to hospital care that was needed by Sun City Westers and other west Valley residents.

The necessary permits at last were obtained. On Oct. 7, 1985, a colorful groundbreaking ceremony launched construction of the \$42 million hospital. Among those taking part in the event was baseball Hall of Fame slugger Mickey Mantle, a member of the powerhouse New York Yankees during the dynasty years when Mr. Webb was part owner of the American League team. The ceremony also was the setting for a special announcement by

William A. Chapman, vice chairman of the hospital's volunteer board of directors: In consideration of a \$3 million grant from the Del E. Webb Foundation, the new, five-story healthcare center in Sun City West would be named the Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital.

On January 4, 1988, the doors of Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital opened, thanks to generous community support totaling over \$9 million that helped to fund construction. Community support, from volunteers and donors alike has continued through the years during each phase of development, and it is as vitally necessary today as ever.

In recognition of spe-

cial community needs, planning for Del E. Webb Hospital also included the introduction of an inpatient, medical/psychiatric program. The SAGE (Support, Adaptation, Growth and Enrichment) Program provides medical management of the cognitively impaired patient, including assessing and treatment.

In 1996, a demonstrated need for a cardiac catheterization service was recognized at Del E. Webb Hospital. Today, the cardiac catheterization service complements existing heart services available at the Sun Health Heart Center at Boswell Hospital.

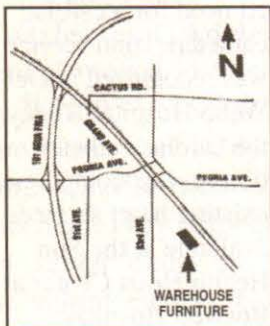
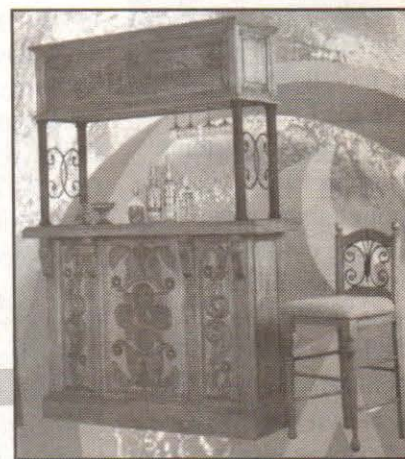
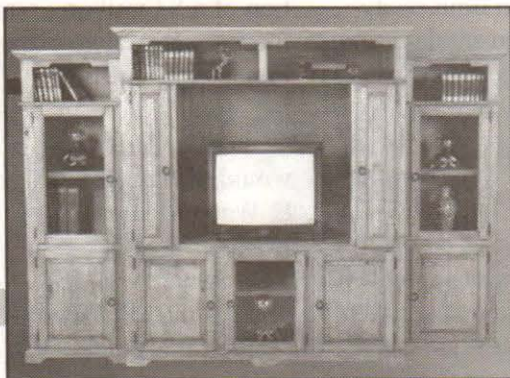
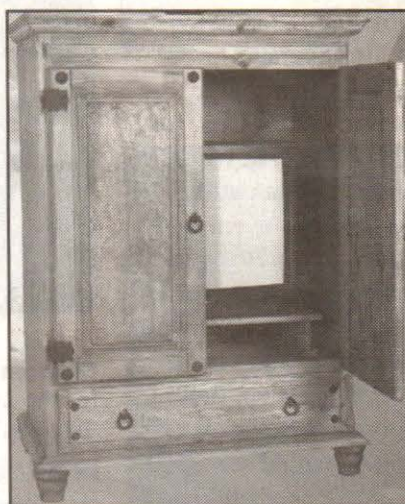

Metamorphosis of a lizard

From cattle ranch to retirement community

In early 1940, cattle ranchers E.S. Spurlock and J.C. "Charlie" Wetzler drove through an area several miles north of Peoria.

"Jumpin' Jehosaphat," Mr. Spurlock is rumored to have said. "This country is not fit for raising anything but lizards."

Tradition says that is how Lizard Acres, the nickname of Circle One Livestock Company, came into being. Lizard Acres was one of the lots purchased to create Sun City West. It was purchased by the Del Webb Corporation in late 1971 and became what is now the southeast corner of the retirement community celebrating its silver anniversary this year.

Lizard Acres was an 1,800-acre cattle feedlot, owned by Messieurs Spurlock and Wetzler, and employing Mark Gemmill as foreman. Mr. Gemmill, his wife, Gloria, and their infant son moved to the ranch and built their home at Lizard Acres,

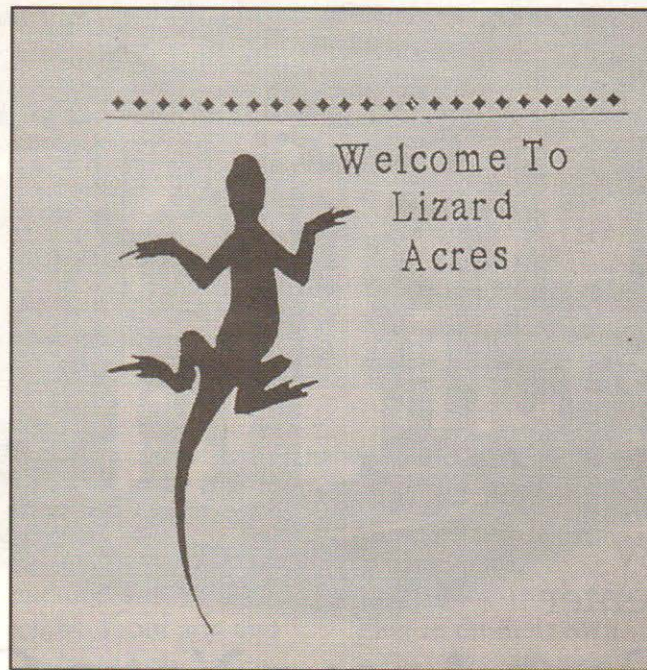

one of three main houses and a dozen trailers that housed the 45 employees working there at the ranch's peak.

Cattle were fed out on 800 acres, while corn, alfalfa, wheat, vegetables and fruit were grown on the remaining 1,000 acres. Grain sorghum, also grown on the property, became silage to further fatten the cattle before selling them to local grocery stores for butcher and sale. In its 30 years of operation, Lizard Acres housed up

to 25,000 head at a time.

Dick Mastin, who worked for Del Webb Corporation, had fond memories of his dealings with the Lizard Acres ranchers. He

recalled Mr. Wetzler climbing out of his brand-new car with boots covered in cow manure. He also spoke of moving dirt with "...over 30 scrapers working to move 45,000 cubic yards of dirt, some generated from the demolition of Lizard Acres."

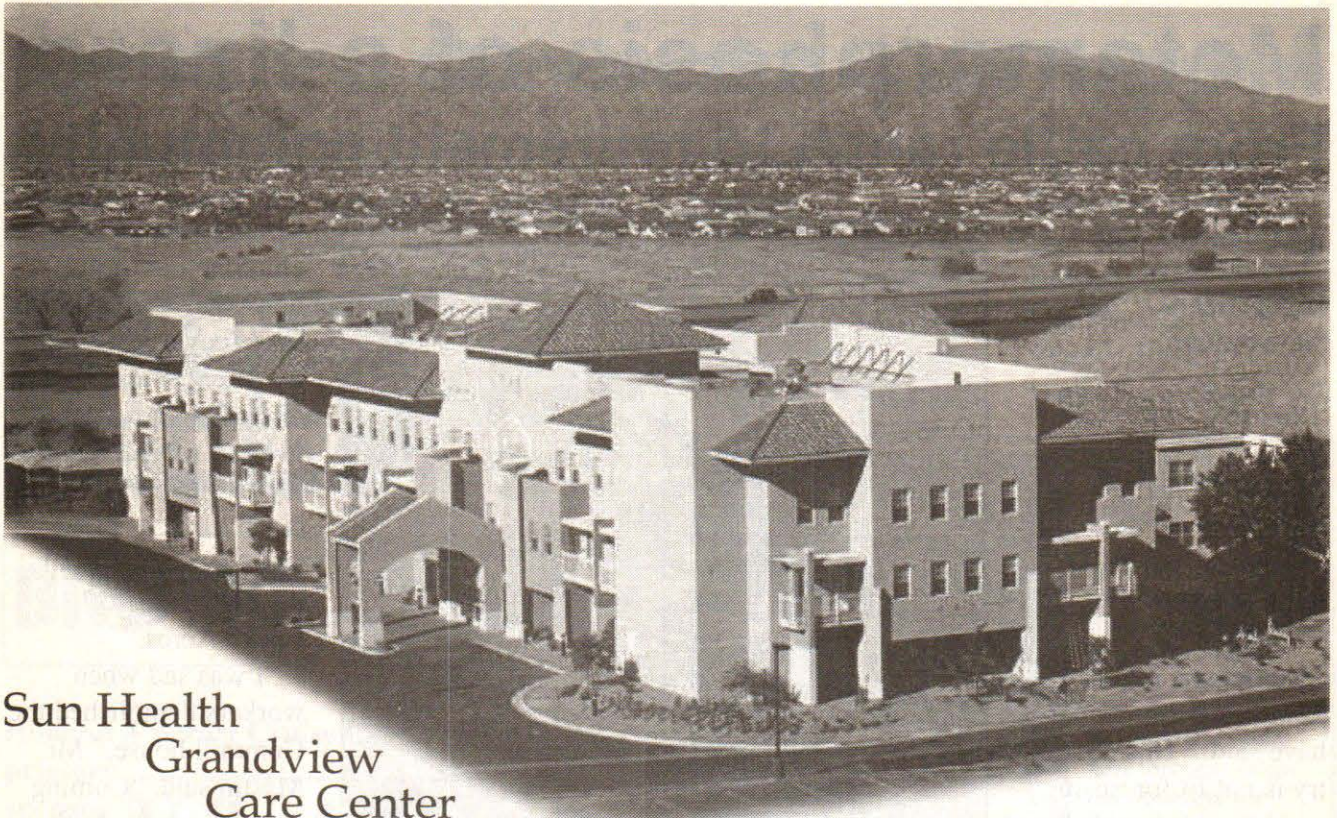
"I was sad when workers demolished the Gemmill house," Mr. Mastin said. "Coming from a farming background, I knew how much work it was."

The Gemmill family had lived in the Lizard Acres house for 30 years before moving to make room for the new retirement community of Sun City West.

The legacy remains: three irrigation and two domestic wells still provide water for the community.

Man of the Year, 1959

Charlie Wetzler, one of the owners of Lizard Acres, came from a pioneering Arizona family. His grandfather, I.E. Solomon, founded the Gila Valley Bank in 1899. The bank was a forerunner of Valley National Bank, which eventually became Bank One. Mr. Wetzler, who worked cattle since 1920, was selected Man of the Year in Arizona Agriculture in 1959 for his innovative farm design at Lizard Acres.

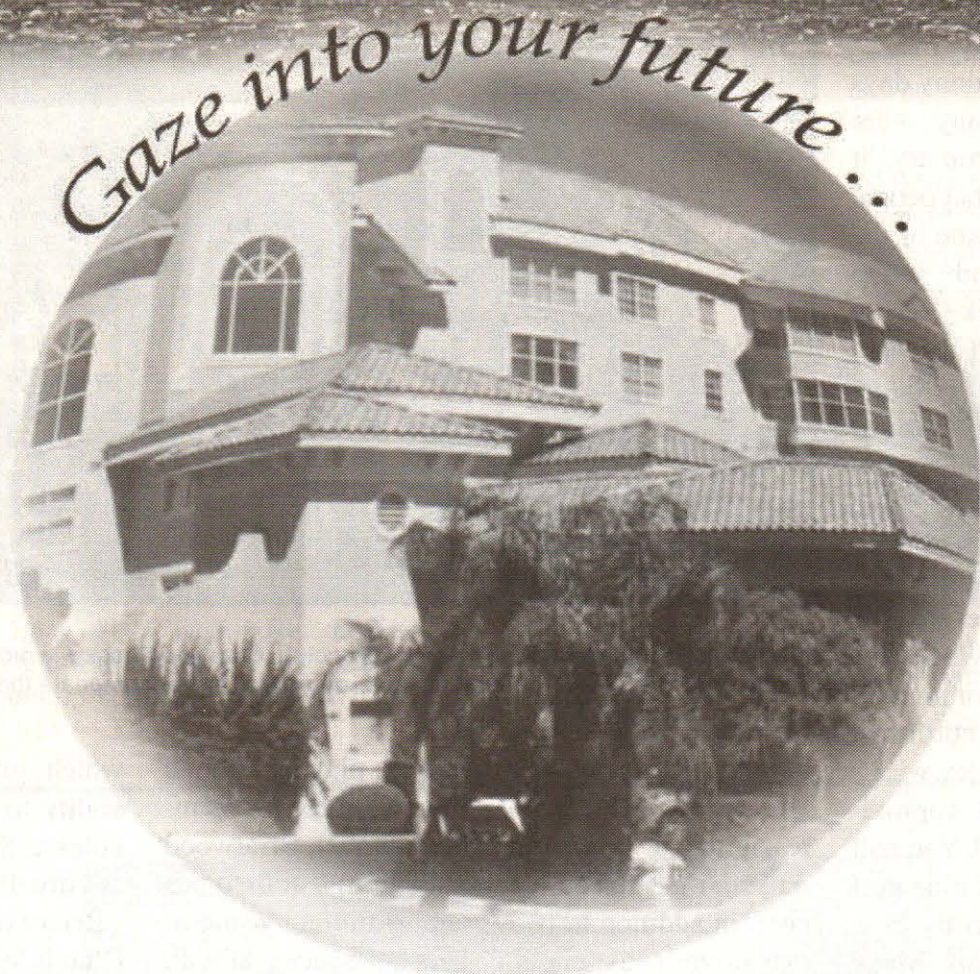

Flying the colors

When American Legion Post 94 member Lloyd Kilmer moved to Sun City West from Omaha, Neb. in 1986, he was told the city "... had anything anyone would want." So when the first national holiday arrived, he told his wife he was going to take a walk to look at the flags.

"I went up and down R.H. Johnson Boulevard and didn't see a single one," he said.

That walk started a plan in Mr. Kilmer's mind, a plan with a vision of flags flying all along Sun City West's main thoroughfare.

The plan came to

fruition in 1987. After discussing it with his American Legion Post and being asked to organize the project, Mr. Kilmer contacted Arizona Public Service to gain permission to install flag brackets onto Sun City West lightpoles.

"APS had never received such a request," Mr. Kilmer recalled. "There was quite a discussion, but it was allowed."

Funds to purchase the original 100 flags were received from individuals and businesses. The flags came from Sen. John McCain, who made sure they were flown over the

Taking PRIDE in Sun City West

Sun City West was established in 1978, and residents started moving in to the development in 1979. The streets were not even finished when a handful of residents decided the main boulevards needed some attention.

Sun City West PRIDES Particular Residents Involved Doing Environmental Services was established with the express purpose of aiding the public and, to be more specific, the Maricopa County Highway Department, in the maintenance of public areas of county streets and high-

ways within Sun City West.

A preliminary meeting was held Feb. 24, 1982. Representatives from the Property Owners and Residents Association and a representative from the Recreation Centers, plus interested volun-

teers, were in attendance. This resulted in an organizational meeting held March 8, 1982, at which Joan Barnett was elected president. Articles of Incorporation were adopted and officially approved May 5, 1982.

Del E. Webb

Corporation donated a 1978 Ford van and agreed to pay for the first six months of insurance. The corporation also donated miscellaneous tools. Originally, 50 volunteers cleaned 11.2 miles of streets. The equipment swelled to two Ford vans, one safety golf cart, one spray wagon, two utility cars and two golf cars. MCHD donated safety vests, trash bags, gloves, cones and additional tools. Eight patrolling sections were established.

PRIDES now patrol 15 sections and cover over 22 miles of county roads in Sun City West with

From golf carts to patrol cars

SCW Posse has come a long way in 24 years

The Sheriff's Posse of Sun City West has come a long way since its inception in 1979.

While the organization now totes a small fleet of patrol cars, a brick and mortar headquarters and a state of the art communication system, things were not always this way.

During the early days, the organization's headquarters was a living room or a garage until the Del Webb Corp. gave the Posse a trailer to work out of — located just outside the community's border. In 1987, the group got its current digs at the Sun City West Foundation Building, but after many years of hard work.

In the organization's formative years, Posse members wore yellow jumpsuits while patrolling the community in their own cars or golf carts.

"We used (citizen band) radios in the beginning to communicate with one another," said Duty Officer Neal Coffman. A former Posse commander, Mr. Coffman has been volunteering with the Posse since its formation.

"What we did in the early days was to establish four duty officers

that each individually took one week and was on duty 24 hours a day for seven days," Mr. Coffman added.

If the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office needed assistance, they would call the duty officer at home.

"When the duty officer was on patrol, they would leave the CB radio at home so that if we got a call from MCSO, our wives could call us," Mr. Coffman said. "I would receive calls at 1 or 2 a.m. sometimes."

Although many things have changed over the years for the Posse, its main purpose has not waned, according to Mr. Coffman.

"We protect and we serve the community,"

Mr. Coffman said. "Our primary function at the beginning was crime prevention. We've grown from (that) and added so many different services, like block watch and traffic control."

Working under the auspices of the MCSO, the Posse patrols the community, acting as the "eyes and ears" of the MCSO.

In addition, the Posse conducts traffic control, checks homes for vacationing residents, watches homes for individuals rushed to the hospital, helps locate lost residents and provides other assistance to the MCSO and the community.

Today the Posse has some 40 duty officers in charge of individual

shifts and numerous other volunteers helping the Posse patrol Sun City West's streets 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Operated completely by volunteers, the Posse is funded through community-based donations and money earned by providing traffic control at local events.

The Posse provides an invaluable service to the community, according to Zoe Schreiber, the Posse's public information officer.

"Because of the Posse, people feel safe ... to walk at night and feel comfortable in their homes," Mrs. Schreiber said. "

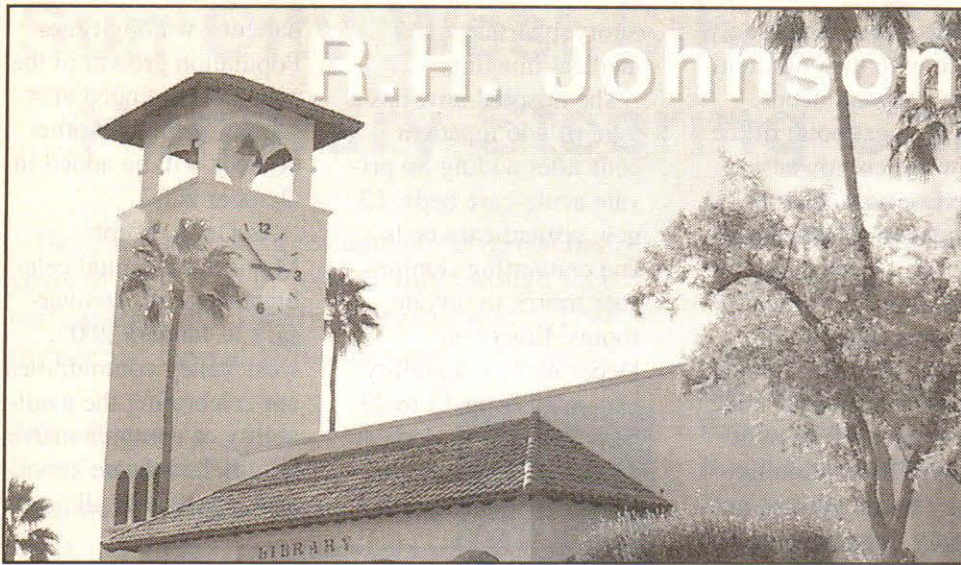

(OPAC) and traditional card catalog make finding just the right reading material easy.

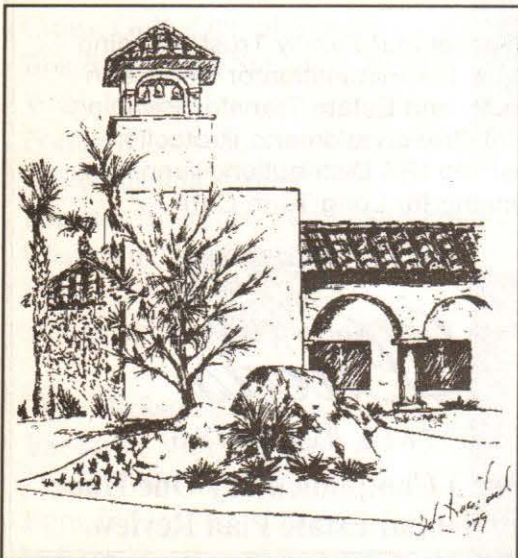

The original drawing of the R.H. Johnson Library shows the distinctive clock tower.

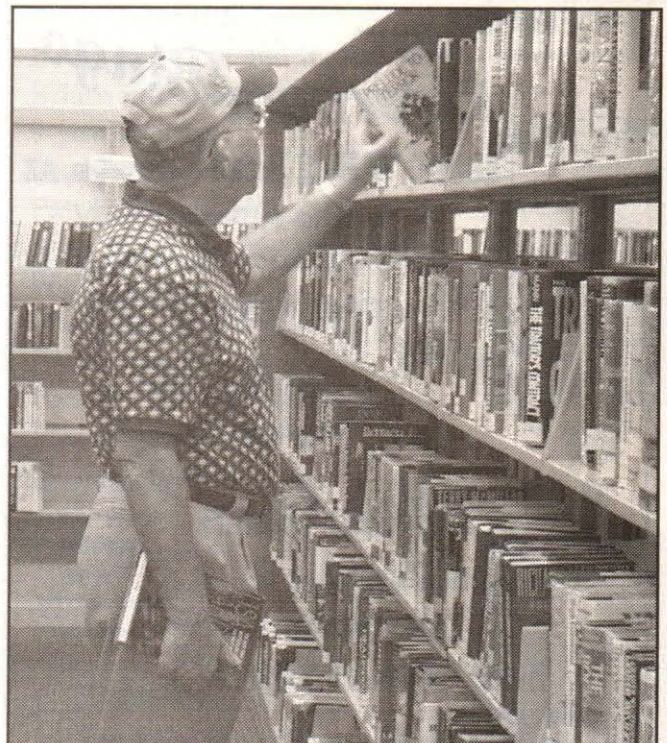

Cardiac services were further enhanced at Del E. Webb Hospital in 2001 with the addition of percutaneous transluminal coronary angioplasty (PTCA) and stenting services that open blocked heart arteries.

Original plans for Del E. Webb Hospital called for the introduction of obstetrical care as soon as the service was warranted and feasible. A decade later, it became apparent that it was time to introduce this care; it was added as part of the \$46.5 million expansion that began in 2000. The entire area was experiencing rapid growth, and

it was necessary to keep pace with the communities' growing needs.

The focal point of the new patient tower was the Louisa Kellam Center for Women's Health, offering specialized care for women of all ages. The Nesting Place Obstetrical Suites opened on Feb. 2, 2002 with the birth of twin boys. The continuing baby boom made it necessary to put the entire 16-suite unit into use ahead of schedule in the fall of 2002.

In addition to new acute-care beds, the expansion enlarged the Emergency Department, added Urgent Care and enlarged other vital services such as clinical labo-

ratory, pharmacy and medical imaging.

The hospital now has a total of 246 inpatient beds after adding 80 private acute-care beds, 12 new critical-care beds and converting semiprivate rooms to private rooms. Emergency Department availability expanded from 15 to 23 beds including a dedicated urgent-care area to reduce non-emergency

patients' waiting times. Population growth in the area has continued at such a rate that another 40 beds will be added in October 2003.

As Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital celebrates its 15th anniversary in January 2003, west Valley communities are celebrating the availability of comprehensive, quality healthcare services for people of all ages.

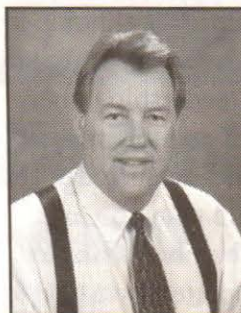

this sign stood at the entrance of Sun City West.

"The program met with great success," Mr. Kilmer said. "As Sun City West continued to develop, we thought it might be a good idea to continue the flag row by adding a Memorial Boulevard of Flags, made up entirely of casket flags."

Casket flags are given to families losing a loved one during a war. "We were hoping to receive 35 or 40 flags," he said. "We ended up with over 200 people volunteering casket

flags from the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. Some of the flags only had 48 stars."

A year or two later, Sun City West had five miles of flags flown on each of the six mentioned holidays. Since that time, Pearl Harbor Day and 9-11 have been added to the list.

"It is quite a significant job," Mr. Kilmer said. "It takes four teams of men to raise and lower the flags on those days."

approximately 300 volunteers. MCHD still furnishes safety vests, trash bags, gloves, cones and tools. The inventory shows 22 utility carts, power tools, computers and miscellaneous tools. Financial assistance comes from donations by residents, businesses and clubs.

The Sun City Foundation Cameron Center houses two garages full of PRIDES equipment needed for their work, which includes landscape trimming, painting of citrus tree trunks, picking up trash within the work area, taking care of irrigation systems and other incidental work. PRIDES works under the Maricopa County Adopt a Highway Program.

Regular business meetings are held the third Saturday of each month, 9 a.m. in the winter and 8 a.m. in the summer, in the Del Webb room at the Sun City West Foundation Cameron Center, 14465 R.H. Johnson Blvd. Approximately 160 volunteers attend and enjoy the coffee and donuts furnished by the Sundome Merchants Association.

PRIDES are dedicated senior citizens ranging in ages from 55 to 90 who enjoy their public service.
