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
Exhibit celebrates life of Del Webb

The Sun Cities Area Historical Society is preparing for the community's 50th anniversary by sprucing up its headquarters with a fresh look, expanded exhibits and a brand new name.

The most noticeable change comes in the name of the organization's museum, located in one of the first homes ever built in Sun City. SCAHS officials announced this week that the building's name has been changed to the "Del Webb Sun Cities Museum," in honor of the founder of Sun City.

The announcement was made at the organization's annual meeting held Monday at Oakmont Recreation Center. SCAHS officials say the name change and other steps recently taken by the organization will allow the SCAHS to play a more visible role in the community's 50th anniversary celebration.

"For some time now we have considered the use of the magnetic name of Del Webb in conjunction with 'museum' for a more meaningful identity to the house," said Da-

vid Verble, president of the SCAHS. *

With the help of Pulte Corporation, a new sign has been created and will soon greet visitors to the museum. The museum is located at 10801 Oakmont Ave. The house was one of five model homes available to buyers to view the day Sun City first opened, Jan. 1, 1960.

The SCAHS purchased the house in 1989. The building serves as SCAHS headquarters and home to literally thousands of photos

and artifacts related to the history of Sun City and Sun City West.

The house has slowly been restored to its original condition and today it also serves as a museum, offering visitors a glimpse at life in Sun City in the early 1960s. The house was repainted over the summer and restored to its original color.

In addition to changing the name of the museum, the SCAHS has a number of other projects planned to boost the organization's visibility in 2010:

A new exhibit highlighting the life of Del E. Webb will soon open. The exhibit will trace Mr. Webb's career as a builder, baseball team owner and Las Vegas resort operator. A number of personal items once belonging to Mr. Webb will be on display for the first time.

 The SCAHS will use "traveling displays" to highlight the community's history.
 Displays will be featured at libraries and other public buildings throughout the Sun Cities.

- A series of open-house events are planned for 2010, with the first scheduled for Jan. 1, 2010, exactly 50 years to the day when Sun City first opened to the public.

- A 1960's-era three-wheel golf car has been donated to the SCAHS and fully restored to its original condition. The golf car will be on display at the museum during special events.

-- The SCAHS will publish a commemorative 50th anniversary magazine later this year. The publication, "Reshaping Retirement in America," will detail the history of Sun City using the organization's vast collection of photographs. The magazine will sell for \$5, but given away free to all SCAHS members.

- The SCAHS has uncovered long-lost advertisements created and used by the Del E. Webb Corp. to promote the community in its infancy. The advertisements are on display at the museum.

"Though still under the umbrella of the

SCAHS, a new name, a comprehensive exhibit of Del Webb accomplishments, expanded Sun City West displays and a new look at the role Marinette played will be coming soon," says Mr. Verble.

Bill Pearson, SCAHS vice president, calls the museum a "jewel in the desert" that is still relatively unknown within the community. Playing a larger role in the celebration of the community's 50th anniversary will not only boost visibility of the historical society, but also create a better understanding of Sun City's rich heritage.

"With the opening ceremonies for Sun City's 50th anniversary just weeks away, there is a need to shine a spotlight on this magnificent jewel in the desert and all the remarkable artifacts inside," says Mr. Pearson.

"What better way to do it than by starting with a name change to recognize the genius behind its creation, Del Webb."

The museum is open 1-4 Monday through Friday. Call 974-2568.

Historical society unveils new name

In an effort to increase visibility and membership, the Sun Cities Area Historical Society has renamed its building, the first model home in Sun City, to the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum.

A temporary sign is in place at the house, 10801 W. Oakmont Drive, and Historical Society Vice President Bill Pearson said the Pulte-built block sign is on its way. As for the reason for the change, Pearson said it came from a meeting of the board earlier this year.

"We were kicking around the idea of a name change because we thought a new name would give us a little extra pop," Pearson said. "We all agreed, we do not have enough exposure in the communities, and we need to fix that."

Pearson, David Verble, president; and Bret McKean and Edson Allen, trustees, shared some of the changes coming to the museum at the group's annual meeting Mon-

day at Oakmont Recreation Center in Sun City.

Pearson said the historical society only has slightly more than 100 members.

"With over 40,000 households in Sun City and Sun City West, we can do a lot better," he said. "There is enormous potential for growth."

Pearson said the change is happening in conjunction with the 50th anniversary of Sun City for two reasons: to take advantage of the opportunity to bring attention to the historical society, and to remind people what Sun City is all about.


"We can never, ever lose sight of our history, because our future is tied into how we came to be," Pearson said. "As we move forward, it is important that we remember what made Sun City the best retirement community in the world in the first place."

torical society has a chance to bring in a lot of new members next year.

"We can re-create and reinvent ourselves, and we can re-energize the community," Pearson said. "All we have to do is get the people out to the

museum, because once they do they will fall in love."

Pearson said the museum will be open for longer hours and will open after many 50th Anniversary events for anyone interested in heading over.

"A lot of people don't know where the house is even located," Pearson said. "It's been the best kept secret in Sun City, but that's going to change. Our goal for this year

is to be open and available a lot more often."

In other business, Norm Dickson of Sun City and Noel Willis of Sun City West were elected to the board of trustees.

They will be installed next week.


Historical Society slates annual meeting

The board will also discuss upcoming changes to the museum, new exhibits and displays scheduled for 2010 and activities



Heritage Palmeras welcomes new hang-out

Just inside the main entrance and off to the left, The Heritage Palmeras used to have a gift shop.

But it was not especially popular with the residents, so management got together and came up with a solution. At 3 p.m. today, they will have a ribbon-cutting ceremony for The Heritage Club, a new gathering and meeting place for residents of Heritage Palmeras and the public.

"The truth is, as a gift shop the space just wasn't very well utilized," said Program Director Trisha Walter. "We wanted a place where residents could gather and socialize, and now we have that."

The name has a dual meaning, she said. It is called the Heritage Club, both as a nod to the diverse heritage of the residents and as homage to the heritage of Sun City, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary in 2010. Hanging on the walls of the club are several photographs of Sun City as it looked when it first opened. Walter said the photos were donated by the Sun Cities Area Historical Society, which will send a representative to the ribbon cutting.

The historians will be here to talk about Sun City, which should be really interesting," Walter said. "The response from the residents has been really great



so far, and we expect they will be very happy with what we've done."

Walter said the change from gift shop to meeting area began a few months ago. Now that it is finished, she said she expects residents to be in and out all day.

"We have coffee and pastries and things here all day long, so we think it will be a pretty popular spot for those who want to relax and, say, read the newspaper," she said. "In addition, every couple of weeks we'll host a happy hour here, with champagne or other

Painters donate labor to spruce up historical society

Tom Albrecht received a call from the Sun Cities Area Historical Society asking for a bid on a painting job.

Albrecht runs Albrecht & Son Painting and Drywall, and operators of the historical society, located in the first model home in Sun City, wanted the building repainted to its original color.

"We came out and took a look at the place, and I came back and told them we would do it for free." Albrecht said. "I just felt like it was the right thing to do."

On Thursday morning, a crew from Albrecht & Son was at the historical society, 10801 W. Oakmont Drive, repainting the building in time for Sun City's 50th anniversary.

Albrecht said the significance of the planned celebration was a factor in his decision.

"I know they are expecting a lot of people for the 50th anniversary, and they want to look their best," Albrecht said. "I thought it would be a good thing to do for the community."

Paul Herrmann, 50th Anniversary Committee mem-

ber and executive director of the Sun City Visitors Center. said the paint job is part of a plan to make the historical society a Sun City focal point.


"This is their opportunity. and they are going to take advantage of it," Herrmann said. "It's very exciting because they are trying to use the 50th anniversary to put themselves on the map."

Herrmann said he is impressed with the leadership at the historical society.

"They're going to be announcing some changes. and I think they're really going to be a nice asset to the community, especially during the 50th anniversary year," Herrmann said. "Their membership is not where it should be, and it's sad. We have about 40,000 or so homes in the Sun Cities, and their membership is in the low hundreds. That needs to change, and I know they are working very hard to do that. I think this is going to be a very big year for them."

Whatever changes the society makes, it all begins with a fresh coat of paint.

"We've been in business here for 20 years now," Albrecht said. "We feel we're a






part of the community. So, of course, we want to give back to them."



Golf memorabilia provide history lesson

Bob Lucas opened an egg carton and exposed a roomful of people to golf history.

Lucas, a Sun City Grand resident, displayed golf memorabilia and discussed the game's origins on Wednesday during the Sun Cities Area Historical Society's spring meeting in Sun City West.

With the course at Hillcrest Golf Club as a backdrop, Lucas provided a glimpse into golf history and his love of memorabilia associated with the game.

"I bought my first wood-shafted putter at a flea market in the 1970s," Lucas said of his personal golf collection. "Before long, I had over 9,000 clubs and was renting three storage sheds to keep them.

"I had to learn how to sell them or eat them."

The egg carton contained golf balls from every era, including wooden balls used during World War II and leather balls filled with goosefeathers.

"Believe it or not, the leather balls could be hit anywhere from 150 to 200 yards," Lucas said. "It was similar to a baseball, with the stitching on the inside."

Clubs evolved along with the golf balls, going from wood to various types of metal.

"Balls were destroyed if they were hit too hard in the early days of golf, so metal clubs were used only to get players out of trouble on the course," Lucas said. "As the balls got harder at the turn of the century, irons became more popular."

Early irons had smooth surfaces. Grooves, which gave golfers more control of their shots, were placed on irons around 1905.

"In 1921, Jack Hutchinson won the British Open with deep-grooved irons," Lucas said as he passed around such a club for visitors to inspect. "After he won the tournament, the ruling body of golf outlawed deep-grooved irons."

Lucas has traveled around the world as a collector, frequently attending big events such as British Open.

"My wife and I used to own a store in Geneva, Ill.," Lucas said. "She would sell women's clothes and I would sell golf memorabilia.

"I think it was the only store of its kind."

One of his most-prized possessions is a wood club with a gutta-percha head. Gutta-percha comes from the sap of a Malaysian tree and once was used to make golf balls. The malleable substance is

still used to today as dental filling.

"I discovered there are only five in existence," Lucas recalled. "I bought it on eBay for \$500 and sold it for \$4,000."

Frank Housel of Sun City West brought one of his golf putters to the session for inspection.

From 20 feet away at the podium, Lucas identified the manufacturer and provided a brief history of the club for Housel.

"For me, this club is more of a novelty than anything," said Housel, who learned from Lucas that the putter had been made in the 1960s. "I've looked up information and it's worth anything from \$15 to \$100."

Through the years, Lucas' collection has expanded beyond golf balls and equipment.

The Sun City Grand resident has acquired golf postcards, prints, photos, tees and even sheet music with golf-related songs.

Lucas said he no longer fills storage sheds with golf memorabilia.

For the Sun City Grand resident, the hunt appeals more than the acquisition.

"You hang things on a wall for a while and then you move on to something else, Lucas said. "Everything is for sale, except my wife and my dog. And my dog died."

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Freeman provides walking history

As Sun Citians approach volunteerism for the 2010 Sun City 50th Anniversary celebration, volunteers take their cue from the serious time and effort that past volunteers have given towards the success of previous anniversary celebrations. Volunteers of the 50th and prior efforts will be saluted in this monthly column.

The Hats Off salute this month honors a very special volunteer who has devoted countless hours to become the walking, talking encyclopedia of Sun City - Jane J. Freeman.

Through her efforts, along with co-author Glenn Sanberg, the history of the first 25 years of Sun City came to life for the community's 25th Anniversary celebration. The book, entitled "Jubilee - A History of Sun City," takes the reader from the desert that was to become Sun City and moves forward with recordings of who did what, when it happened and how it happened. She devoted a year and a half of her life to the research, typing and finalizing of this historical book so that future Sun Citians would know, understand and appreciate the beginnings of their communitv. Ms. Freeman seemed destined for a life of giving to others as she sought a college degree in education. At the University of Virginia she completed her doctorate degree in education, Ed.D., and moved to New York State where she met her future husband, Leslie. She held the position of Dean of Students at Rockland Community College in Suffern, N.Y. They were married on Dec. 20, 1958. She has two step children, Toni and Les, Jr. Both children are now retired. Toni lives in New York state and Les, Jr. in Montana.

When Mr. Freeman retired in 1970 the Freeman's moved from New York state to "get away from the cold and ice." They purchased a golf course home on Prairie Hills Circle and settled in to an active retirement lifestyle. She fondly remembers the security they felt in their new Sun City home. They left doors and windows open and were never concerned about locking them at night.

After the death of her husband in 1977, Ms. Freeman became

even more involved in the community. She has repeatedly been recognized for her dedication to the community

and her giving spirit. She was recognized for over 25 years of service to Meals on Wheels. She received Interfaith's Minnie Harlow Humanitarian Award in 2003. In 2005, she received Emeritus status from Sun Health for 15 years of service. In 2007, she was recognized by the Valley of the Sun United Way for her community involvement.

In addition to awards, Ms. Freeman has also served, in various positions, for many Sun City organizations. She is the former First Vice President of the Recreation Centers of Sun City, Inc.: She served many years on the Sun City Library Board of Directors and is past President. She is the past President of both the Sun City Community Fund/United Way and of the Sun Health Foundation Board of Trustees. And she is the former Board Chairman of the Sun Health Extended Care Services.

Ms. Freeman holds Emeritus status with the Sun Cities Historical Society. The Society began in part when Ms. Freeman and other concerned residents learned that the Del Webb Corporation office was contemplating discarding unwanted files and documents once the build out of Sun City was completed. These pieces of history were rescued and gave birth to the Historical Society for the preservation they deserved.

The above lists just a few of Ms. Freeman's volunteer achievements. She has served in over 25 significant positions during her Sun City residency. Her numerous efforts were rewarded in 1981 when she was awarded Woman of the Year by the Daily News-Sun.

When asked about how the writing of the history of Sun City came about, Ms. Freeman laughs and says "people got tired of me continuously, asking questions about the community and told me I should write a book" -- so she did just that. She started by becoming the Sun City ombuds-

man with the Northwest Valley Paper Council (sponsored by the Independent and Daily News-Sun newspapers) where local issues and events were discussed. From these beginnings she and co-author Glenn Sanberg collaborated to give the Sun City community an official history book. For those interested, this book is available at the Sun City Historical Society, 10801 W. Oakmont Drive, Sun City.

Ms. Freeman also used her research and writing skills to co-author a 25 year history of Boswell Hospital. In response to a question regarding why she volunteered to be so involved in the community Ms. Freeman jokingly responded "because she was asked to and it sure beat doing housework", but follows that closely with the statement that it is because of the wonderful people she has met through volunteerism. She is the definition of a "people person".

Though small in stature, Jane J. Freeman has an enormous giving heart and the community of Sun City has truly benefited from her tireless efforts and generous commitment to volunteerism.

Historical society travels down memory lane

Golf car show attracts antique, custom models

Golf cars come in all different shapes, colors and sizes.

Just ask Elaine Robinson, who never thought she'd drive a pink golf car. The Sun Citian bought the 1988 Yamaha from a neighbor.

"I'm having such a blast driving this thing around because it's the only golf car of its color that I've seen around here," Robinson said.

Robinson showed off her car Saturday morning at the Sun Cities Area Historical Society's first Golf Car Show in the west parking lot of the Oakmont Recreation Center at 107th and Grand avenues. The event also included two golf exhibits with one showing photos from the early days of Sun City area courses and another featuring antique golf clubs and memorabilia from the collection of Bob Lucas, who lives in Sun City Grand.

More than a dozen golf cars were featured at the event from antiques to the custom-made models, and visitors had the opportunity to vote on their favorites.

Sun Citian Kay Pittenger won the People's Choice Award for her 1929 Model A Ford car, while Herb Carson received the Oldest Operating Golf Car Award for his 1972 Westinghouse which had seven horns on it.

Kim Woehler of Glendale show-cased his "leisure cart," which was considered one of the first golf cars in Sun City. He purchased the electric car — a 1960 Autolette — from a former Sun Citian, who had the vehicle that originally came with the home.

Woehler said he wouldn't "technically call the vehicle a golf car but a leisure cart."

"They used it as a smaller compact car to get around on whenthey didn't want to use their cars, then it evolved into something else," he said.

He's still surprised that it has remained in mint condition over the years.

"It was really taken care of because the original paint and wheels are still in top condition," he said.

Gunther Franke, a Sun City West resident, featured his red 2006 CA Roadster, also known as the "Music Machine." He bought the custom-made vehicle from an owner in the Midwest.

The vehicle features a DVD player with a large sound system and a hydraulic lift "that makes it seem like a low-rider."

"It's a really fun vehicle to drive," he said. "This is just like driving a miniature sports car around."

Historical Society keys into 1st Golf Car Show

Even golfers in the Sun Cites who don't come close to shooting par will have an opportunity next month to wow spectators by driving their golf cars to an event sponsored by he Sun Cities Area Historical Society.

The society is searching for he oldest, operating golf car to xhibit at the area's first Golf car Show on Feb. 7.

The free event, conducted a cooperation with the Recretion Centers of Sun City, will lisplay old and custom cars rom 9 a.m. to noon in the west parking lot of the Oakmont Recreation Center, 107th and Grand avenues.

Last year, the Historical Soiety had an antique car show the shopping center parking that across the street from its ofce, 10801 W. Oakmont Drive. ormer president Ed Allen said ney ran into trouble when oranizing this year's show.

"The woman who owns that nopping center did not want s to use the parking lot again," llen said. "We wanted to do it gain, but without that lot, we st would not have enough oom."

Allen said the idea of using the Oakmont parking lot came up, but even that would be too small for cars. Normal-sized cars, that is.

"We realized we could fit probably 20 golf cars in there with plenty of room for people to walk around, and the idea kind of took off from there," Allen said. "In addition to the show, we're going to have a golf car display at the Historical Society, too. It's going to be pretty comprehensive."

Besides ogling the cars, the show will provide some of the history of the ubiquitous mode of Sun City transportation.

For example, did you know three-wheeled golf cars were common on Sun City's streets and golf courses in the 1960s, but there was a tendency for them to tip when going around corners. That led to the popularity of today's four-wheel models.

Another interesting bit of information from Steve Pohle of Pohle Neighborhood Vehicles in Sun City and Sun City West is the important role that Sun City played in introducing the concept of "neighborhood vehicles," with golf cars being used

for more than golf.

The Historical Society will be open and will feature two golf exhibits: one showing photos from the early days of Sun City area golf courses, and a second featuring antique golf clubs and memorabilia from the collection of Bob Lucas. At one time. Lucas owned more than 9,000 antique golf clubs, along with balls, tees and other memorabilia from the 19th century. Moving to Sun City Grand, he pared his collection to only a few hundred clubs and some of these will be on display on Feb. 7.

Golf car owners who don't drive older models of cars won't be left out of the show. This is also a chance for owners to display some of the more unusual looking golf cars.

Coffee and light refreshments will be provided, and awards will be given for the oldest operating golf car, and for the most popular custom car.

Arrangements are being made to transport Sun City West golf cars to the show site by trailer. To enter your golf car, call the Historical Society at 623-974-2568, or Ed Allen at 623-975-1815.

Historical books, DVDs available at Del Webb Sun Cities Museum

A soon to be out-of-print book is among those for sale in the Museum. *Along the Old Vulture Road*, by Albert F. "Al" Tudor will no longer be published since his recent death.

It includes cattle tales and trails from Wickenburg to Phoenix along Grand Avenue, aka U.S. 60. Cost is \$10.

Two years ago the Historical Society, thanks to a grant from the Constance W. McMillin trust, was able to reprint *Del Webb: A Man/A Company*, by Margaret Finnerty.

It was written in 1991 and revised for the second time by Tara Blanc and Jessica McCann in 1999. A second printing came in 2000, and Pulte Homes gave the Society permission to reprint in a dark blue soft cover in 2008. Cost is \$20.

The fledgling Sun Cities
Area Historical Society entered
the publishing world the year
after it was formed in 1987
with *Churches of the Sun Cities*, by Emil C. Fisher, who
carefully penned ink drawings
to go with short stories about
all the area churches built up to
that time. Cost is \$1.

The first major history of Sun City was the bright red soft covered *Jubilee*, the 25th Anniversary of Sun City, Arizona, written in 1984 by Jane Freeman and Glenn Sanberg. The book is available for \$20.

In 2003 the Society sponsored Edson Allen's soft cover *Sun City West Silver Celebration*. The book covers the journey from Lizard Acres to lush oasis in its 289 pages. Cost is \$5.

And the most recent publishing effort is *Reshaping Retirement in America, Sun City, Arizona*. It was published this year with Society members Edson Allen, Jo Ruck and David Verble as consulting editors. It summarizes how the nation's first active adult community pioneered a lifestyle that created a model for generations of

retirees to come.

The salient events of history are capsulized in a journal format. (Cost \$5, or free with Museum membership).

The Society also sells the DVD, *The Beginnings*, a film shown in potential retiree communities touting the lifestyle of the Sun City pioneers enjoying life in the Arizona desert.

It is shown to visitors of the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum in what may be the smallest theater in the U.S.A. – the former sales building/refreshment shack/Sun City Saints dressing room. Cost is \$10.

The public is invited to an historical and dramatic program featuring actress Tanya Griffith in the Oakmont Recreation Center 1-2:45 p.m. There will be birthday cake on the patio 12:30-3:45 p.m. and visits to the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum next door, at 10801 W. Oakmont Ave., noon-4:30 p.m. All who attend the program will receive a Sun City anniversary coin "party favor."

Tanya Griffith, a Sun City resident for 23 years, will portray Del Webb's field secretary, Maxine Newman. Ms. Griffith has performed as more than 300 celebrated women nationwide before and during her arrival in Sun City. Currently, she limits her engagements to the Valley only. Her favorite personalities include Eleanor Roosevelt, Mary Todd Lincoln, Gertrude Stein and Grandma Moses.

"I am very pleased to be able to participate in Sun City's 50th Anniversary celebration," said Ms. Griffith, who will donate her

two short performances to the Historical Society, as she did ten years ago.

There will be programs at 1 and 2:45 p.m. for 150 people each. Also, Sun City Player member Jim Gatscher will present an illustrated program on "Del Webb, The Man, the Company." At the 1 p.m. program, SCAHS president Bill Pearson will introduce a few former Del Webb executives and employees, and descendants of the first family to occupy the model home, which now serves as a museum.

Historical Society founder Jane Freeman will cut the first piece of the giant birthday cake decorated in red and black, Del's favorite colors. It will be baked and decorated by the bakers at Safeway, Sun City's first gro-

The Del Webb Sun Cities Museum next door is one of Sun City's first five model homes and houses displays of Webb the man and the giant construction company he founded. A second gallery features the history of baseball and golf in Sun City. Also there is a colorful new display on Marinette (the small community where Sun City was built) complete with real cotton bolls.

Guests are urged to dress for both indoor and outdoor events and allow plenty of time for parking vehicles either at Oakmont Rec Center parking lots or on Oakmont Drive.

Builder Del E. Webb died of cancer at age 75 on July 4, 1974, just after he had completed Phase II and the "world's largest working sundial;" that was the year he opened Phase III and the year before Sun City's 15th Anniversary.

'IT ALL BEGAN IN MARINETTE'

The story of the cotton-growing operations that preceded Sun City was provided by Amanda Monreal Durant, who grew up in Marinette and now lives in Sun City. Shown pointing to her house, Durant provided this schematic of Marinette as it appeared in 1958 — a year before Del Webb's company began construction on a different way of life. Durant's parents ran a store, and her mother served as the postmaster. The Boswells frequently stopped by to check on the operation, and one day Walter O. Boswell asked the 8-year-old her name. "Amanda," she replied, to which he said, "That's too big a name for such a small girl. From now on, we'll call you Mandy!" See "Mandy's Marinette" — and trace the history of the town back to 1895 — at the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum, 10801 W. Oakmont Drive, from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

When it comes to the history of the Del Webb Corp. and the Sun Cities, few people are as learned as Marjorie Johnson. After all, she lived it.

"I've been in the Del Webb business for most of my life," she said. "I was with Del Webb at the corporation from 1961 until about 1985 and then with the Webb Foundation after that. I've spent the best years of my life at Del Webb."

It is fitting, then, that Johnson serves as a docent at the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum in Sun City. Twice a month on Mondays, Johnson gives tours in the first model home in Webb's first retirement community.

"I just started recently, but it's been very fun," she said. "I donated several items and pieces of memorabilia to be on display and was asked if I would like to give tours. So

Johnson, 83, is the widow of R.H. Johnson, president of the Del Webb Corp. from 1967-81 and a famous man in in his own right. It is no

surprise that, when tourists find out who Johnson is, they get stars in their eyes.

"I've had a few people ask to take pictures with me," she said. "They want to hear stories about Del Webb. I believe it is very unusual now to meet someone who actually knew Mr. Webb. Talking to me about him makes him actually exist somehow, like he's no longer a figment of their imaginations."

Johnson and her husband, who died in 2008 at the age of 92, were instrumental in the growth and involvement of the Del E. Webb Foundation, which has contributed primarily to health-care oriented organizations. DEWF has given more than \$65 million for medical research, medical facilities and education.

The foundation has contributed millions of dollars to the Sun Health Foundation for expansion of both Del Webb and Boswell medical centers.

The foundation provided the \$1.6 million needed to fund the Sun Health Del E. Webb Health Center of Wickenburg.

The Johnsons also were involved in the development and continuing support of the Del Webb Center for the Performing Arts in Wickenburg.

Johnson said she will be at the museum from 1 to 4 p.m. May 24. The museum is at 10801 W. Oakmont Drive.



Sun City's history clicks on website

The Sun Cities Area Historical Society has committed to sharing Sun City's past with residents and outsiders alike, but it always comes back to the same issue.

"We have all these amazing things to share, but getting people to come out to the museum — that's the problem," said Judy Baerg, office manager. "So that's why we cre-

ated the website."

She conceded it was "not very good."
When the society decided to put
nore of its focus and effort into the Del
Webb Sun Cities Museum, Baerg said
hey knew they needed a more effective
online presence.

"Our goal is to share Sun City's hisory, and the museum is our most efective tool. But we weren't doing everyhing we could," she said.

"I think what we realized was that we vere doing a very good job of cataloging all this information but not a very good ob of sharing it. And like Bill (Pearson, resident) always says, "What is the use of having all these great pieces of listory if nobody knows about them?"

As a result, what used to be a webite with contact information and little else has been transformed into an online archive, a database of much of the museum's pieces with more added every day. The new site went live about six weeks ago, and Baerg said it is already drawing many more visits.

"We have hundreds of ads, brochures, all kinds of things from the beginning of Sun City, all available to view on the site," she said. "We're not finished yet. We have about 600 items in there now, with probably thousands more still to be added, but it's a good start."

The site also includes a blog written by Pearson, called Sun Cities Today. The intention of the blog will be to focus more on present-day Sun City and what lessons from its history can apply today. Pearson wrote in an introductory post that he envisions the blog as a meeting place of sorts for people interested in Sun Cities history to have meaningful discussions.

On top of all that, Baerg said the

society is preparing a new display for the museum, one dedicated to Sun City West.

"We're planning to finish it sometime in November. We'll have a big gala opening to celebrate," she said.

The goal, she said, is simple: get people in the door.

"Our whole focus here is on getting people to the museum. Once they get here, it is so easy for them to get lost in all the history."

The museum is located at 10801 Oakmont Drive in Sun City. Summer hours through November are 9 a.m. to noon on Thursday and Saturday as well as 5 to 8 p.m. on Friday.

Beginning in October, the museum will be open from 1 to 4 p.m. week-days.





Historian, author shares tales Nov. 6

Residents may only know a few Arizonaborn folks, but those who attend the Saturday Nov. 6 Sun Cities Area Historical Society membership meeting can add Ruth Jordan Van Epps to their lists.

Ms. Van Epps, of Sun City West, will share her early life in Sedona, and on the Hopi Reservation with members and guests 1-3 p.m. Nov. 6 in the Oakmont Recreation Center auditorium at Del Webb Boulevard and Oakmont Drive.

Her pioneering great-grandparents came by covered wagon in 1875 to settle in the fertile Verde Valley. Their grandson Walter Jordan relocated to Sedona as a large orchard grower and raised his daughter Ruth there. She earned a degree in education at the University of Redlands and masters degrees in education and counseling at Arizona State University.

She and her first husband lived on the Hopi reservation in Northern Arizona, and she used her social work skills with both the Hopi and Navajo tribes. Later she formed Tsegi Tours offering customized tours featuring Arizona history, ancient cultures and the Navajo and Hopi reservations. Other programs included contemporary SW Native American cultures and crafts and Early Arizona.

In addition, Ms. Van Epps was an educator at many levels and conducted seminars and training classes. She helped to develop the MesaFirst Offender Shoplifting Program, which was used in Gilbert and Mesa public schools, Maricopa County head start and at Patricia Stevens Career College.

As she grew up listening to stories of the early days in the west, she became interested in preserving history. She collected stories told by her father to add to those of other old timers and used her great-grandfather's journal of his 1875 wagon trip as the basis for her book Following Their Westward





History Display

s the nation's very first active-adult retirement community – and arguably still the world's most popular – Sun City has a long and rich heritage.

Like the mythical Phoenix Bird rising from the ashes, Sun City sprouted from the cotton fields of Marinette to give birth to an entire new retirement industry that continues to thrive today, 51 years later.

Many residents are familiar with their adopted hometown's most visible and famous images – namely the abundance of golf courses and recreation centers that continue to make Sun City a magnet for new retirees.

But for those who want to know more about the community's past, a trip to the Sun Cities Del Webb Museum may be in order. Located at 10801 W. Oakmont Drive, the museum is home to historical memorabilia and archival photos that offer visitors a first-hand look at the successful growth over the past five decades of both Sun City and Sun City West.

The house is living history in itself: The museum occupies the first of five model homes ever built in Sun City. The home was unveiled on opening day, Jan. 1, 1960. Outside, the home appears today much the same as it looked on that cold January morning 51 years ago. But step inside and you'll be transformed into a virtual time machine.

The museum has painstakingly restored the living room and kitchen to an early 1960's appearance. Throughout the house are numerous exhibits telling the story of Sun City and its sister city, Sun City West, which opened in 1978.

Photographs and mementos line the walls and fill the rooms. Among the rotating exhibits:

The life and times of Del E. Webb, the builder of Sun City and Sun City West. The exhibit features unique, one-of-a-kind personal items on loan from the R.H. Johnson Foundation and the Del Webb Foundation, including many artifacts from his days as owner of the World Champion New York Yankees.

Marinette: The cotton-farming community that once existed where Sun City now sits.

A look at the advertisements and promotions created by the Webb Company over the years to market Sun City to the rest of the world.

The story of professional sports in Sun City, including spring training and a world champion women's softball team.

The history of Sun City West, from Lizard Acres to the second largest retirement community in the nation (next to Sun City!).



Sun City Area Historical Society hosts meeting in Sun City West

s the community prepares to say fare-versity. well to the Sundome Center for Performing Arts, the Sun Cities Area Historical Society will pay tribute to the Sun City West landmark at its spring membership meeting April 20.

The meeting takes place 1:30 p.m. April 20 at the Sun City West Heritage Tradition,

19303 New Tradition Road.

Guest speakers will be Ed Allen and Don Tuffs, both of whom are members of the Sun Cities Area Historical Society Board of Trustees. The SCAHS operates the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum, a museum showcasing the history of the Sun Cities and located in one of the first model homes built in Sun City.

The speakers will present a program focusing on the history of Sun City West with special emphasis on the life and times of the Sundome Center for Performing Arts. The title of the talk is "From Feed Lot to Sundome Fans."

When it first opened, the Sundome Center was the largest single-level performing arts center in the nation. World-renowned artists, world statesmen and former presidents as well as local clubs and organizations are among the performers who have stood on its stage. The facility was originally owned by the Del E. Webb Corporation but sold many years ago to Arizona State Uni-

The theater was recently sold to private owners who plan to demolish the facility to make way for a proposed retail shopping

Ed Allen and his wife Loretta have been wintering in Arizona since Ed's retirement in 1996. Ed's career was in advertising and sales promotion. He soon became active in the Sun City West Visitors Center. He later was enlisted by the Sun Cities Area Historical Society to write the history of Sun City West. Two years later, with the help of a committee of researchers, the book was published in time for the community's 25th Anniversary.

Don Tuffs has spent career in the Sun Cities. In 1978, as a member of the Del Webb Development Company's public relations department, he photographed the groundbreaking of Sun City West. He later started a number of clubs and organizations prior to the opening of the R.H. Johnson Recreation Center and became the first manager of the Sundome Center for the Performing Arts.

The April 20 is open to the public. Admission is free.
