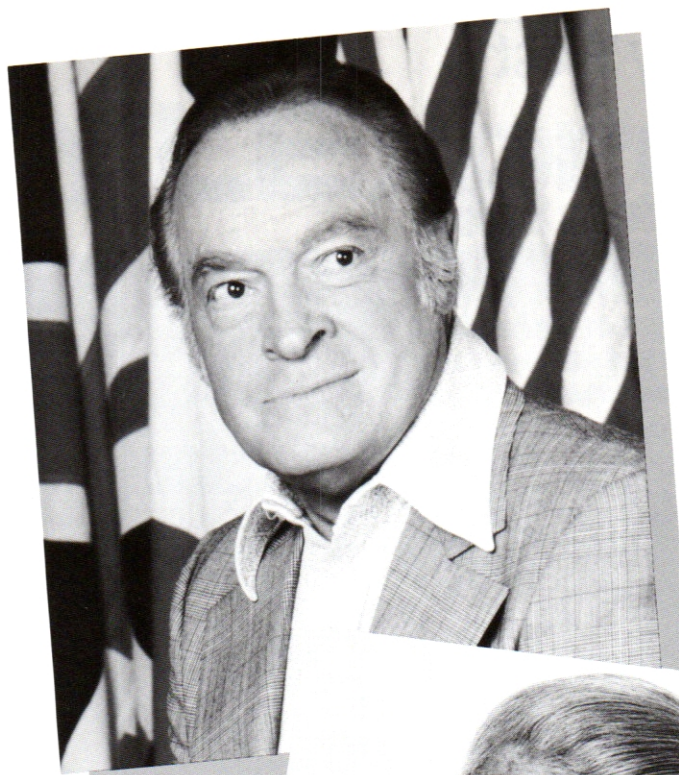
SUNDOME TO CELEBRATE 10th ANNIVERSARY THIS FALL!

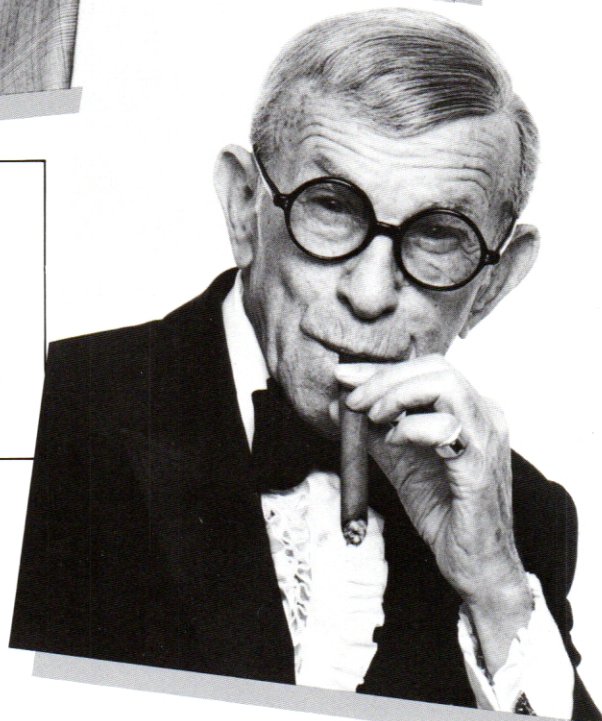

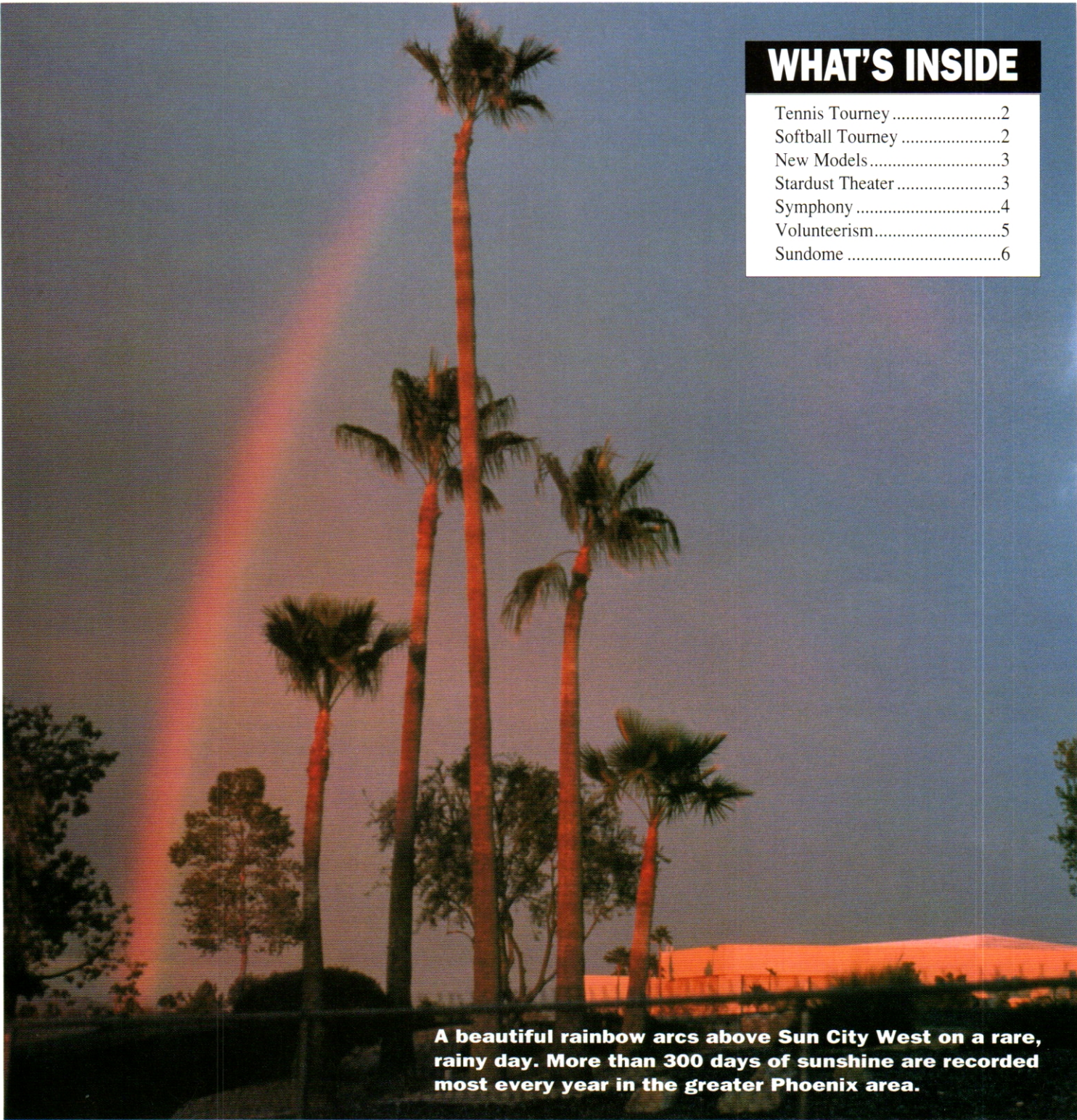

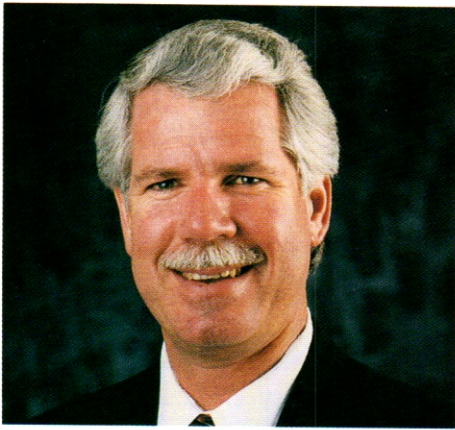

The Sixth Annual Del Webb's Swing Into Spring Tournament is just around the corner. In previous years the tournament has been for tennis matches only. This year, for the first time, the tournament has expanded to include table tennis.

The Seniors Tennis Tournament will be March 29 through April 2 at the Johnson Recreation Center courts. Matches will be held for singles, doubles and mixed doubles for ages 50 and over with men's and women's divisions. Last year's event drew 175 participants and this year over 200 are expected. Tournament Director Al Mandl said the event keeps growing and improving; with their ultimate goal to be the leading Seniors Tennis Tournament in the southwest.

Each year the USTTA (United States Table Tennis Association) selects 8 cities to hold events in and this year Sun City West was chosen. On March 30 and 31 games will be held at the Johnson Recreation Center Social Hall. There will be divisions for men's and women's play ages 40 and over in singles, doubles, and mixed doubles.

TERRACES UNVEILED



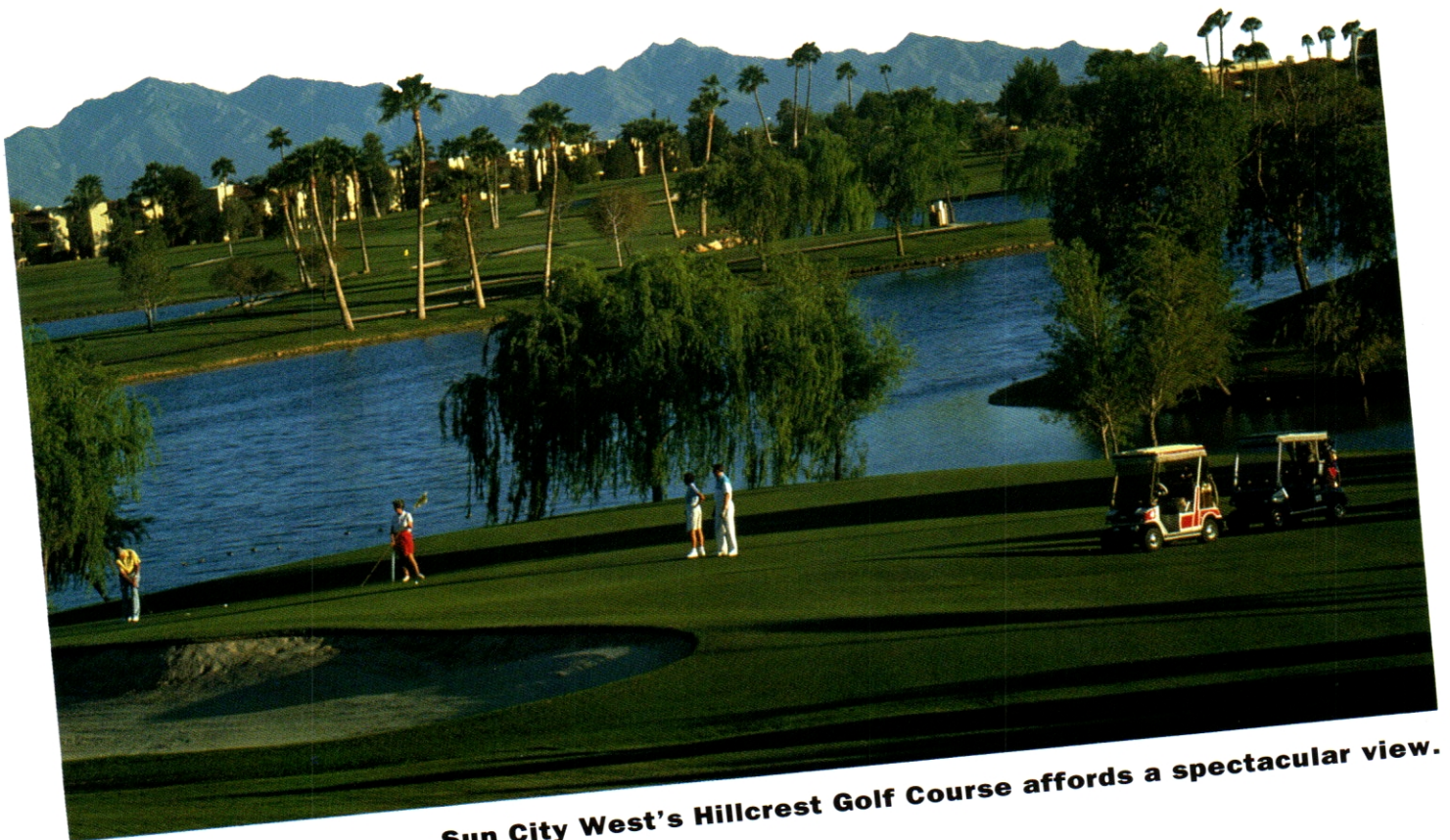
The Royale, 1,710 sq. ft., is priced at \$109,500 and features two bedrooms, two baths, kitchen nook at Arizona room.

Del Webb's Sun City West recently opened its newest models, the Terraces. These innovative single family homes have unique features such as rounded corners and glass block accents.

There are two models from which to choose - the Summerhill, a 1,493 square foot, two bedroom, two bath home and the Royale, a 1,748 square foot plan featuring an Arizona Room as well.

Del Webb designers incorporated the best features from condo and duplex living and created a unique single family concept which frees the homeowners from any yardwork. The initial landscaping is completely installed and a Homeowners Association takes care of all the day-to-day landscape maintenance. In addition to the two new Terraces, there are 18 other model homes at the Sun City West Model Home Pavilion which is open 8 to 5 daily, 9 to 5 Sundays.

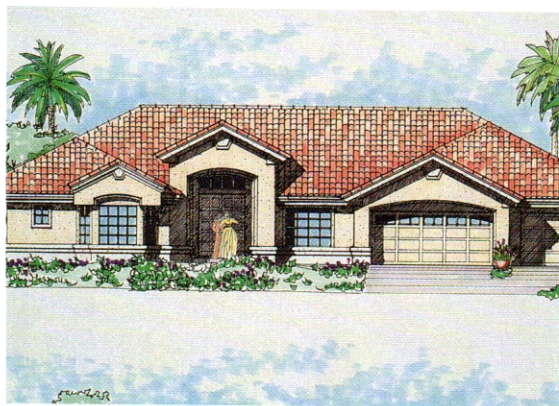

14 NEW MODEL HOMES AND MODEL HOME CENTER UNVEILED

Del Webb's Sun City West has unveiled 14 new model homes and a \$3 million Model Home Center. Ranging from 1,102 to 2,903 square feet, the models are named after Arizona towns.

Nine and ten foot high flat ceilings are used in major spaces in the homes, instead of the vaulted ceilings on standard eight foot walls.

Combined with high stacked glass and covered patios, this design adds light

and gives a feeling of spaciousness to the homes, making them appear larger than their actual square footage.

SUN CITIES VOLUNTEERS ARE HEART OF WESTSIDE FOOD BANK



With a full-time staff of just 16 employees, it is difficult to imagine that the Westside Food Bank is the largest food bank in Arizona. Distributing 14 million pounds of food a year, the food bank's success is attributed to its 660 volunteers, more than 500 of whom live in the Sun Cities.

Pat Andrew, volunteer coordinator of the Westside Food Bank, admits "there wouldn't be a Westside Food Bank without them." Residents from Sun City and Sun City West make up 80 percent of the food bank's volunteer force, working more than 150,000 hours a year.

The Sun City and Sun City West volunteers are such an important ingredient to the Westside Food Bank that when it came time to expand into larger quarters, the facility was moved

closer to the retirement communities. In 1973, when it was just a small pantry in Glendale, the food bank relied heavily on volunteer help from several churches in Sun City and Sun City West. To take advantage of this volunteer work force, the food bank relocated in 1984 to its present site in Surprise - just a half mile from Sun City West and four miles from Sun City.

"We could not operate as effectively and efficiently as we do without the Sun Cities volunteers because of the talents and skills they bring us," says Debbi Dorman, community relations director.

"This is a wonderful release for retired folks," said volunteer C.C. Lucas of Sun City. "It is a pleasure to do something constructive. We are the ones who benefit."

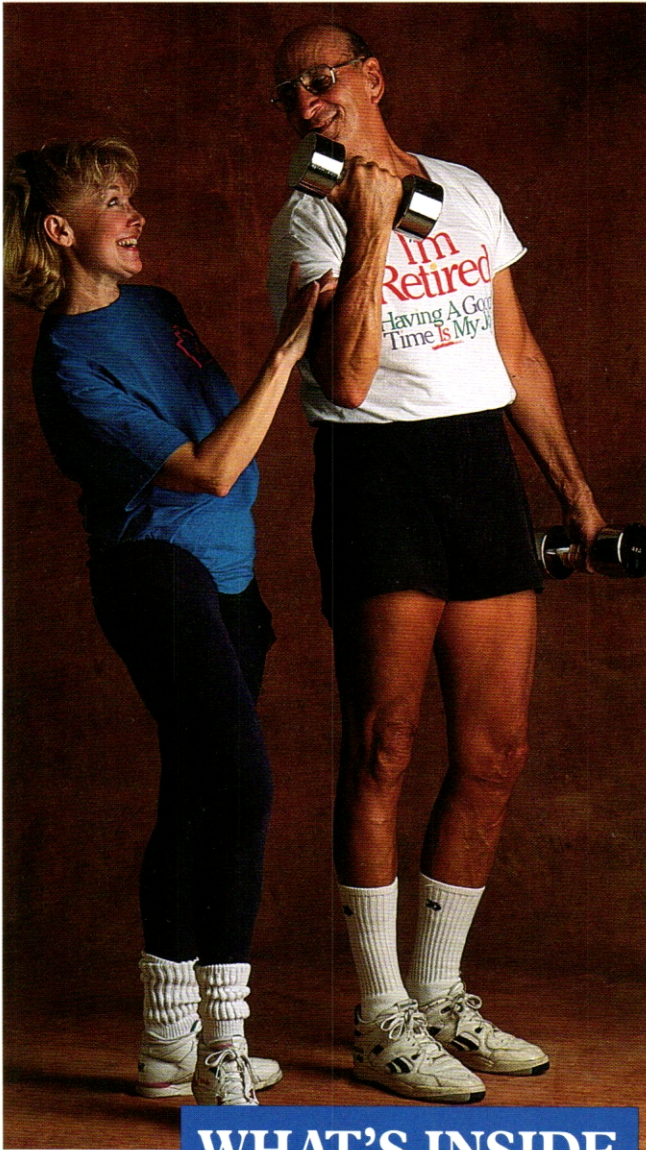

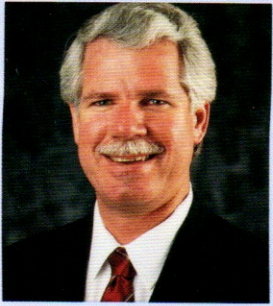

DEL WEBB'S SEMI-CUSTOM PROGRAM LEADS INDUSTRY

While homes are designed to accommodate the lifestyle of the average buyer, Del Webb Corporation realizes that not all buyers have the same requirements. To better meet the needs of its clients, Del Webb developed a semi-custom program so its Sun City West buyers could modify floor plans to reflect the way they live.

"The program was established in 1984 to fill a niche in the market," remembers Del Martenson, vice president of Construction Operations at Del Webb's Sun City West. Most builders allow for small changes, but we go beyond that by increasing square footage and customizing rooms for exercise, crafts, office space, and storage.

Three months before the construction of a semi-custom home is started, the buyer makes an appointment with architectural coordinator Fred Zrmack. The normal building time for a home is approximately four months with an extra month added for semi-custom homes.

"An architect would usually charge 7% of the total construction costs to change floor plans," says Zrmack. "We only charge \$2,000 to cover 20 hours of time with the architectural coordinator and additional supervision and administration."

Approximately 100 Sun City West buyers a year utilize the semi-custom program.

For the past ten years, when Sun City West residents have needed a convenience item for house guests or medical equipment on a temporary basis, they have been able to borrow it from Lending Hands.

Lending Hands operates solely on donations and with the help of 55 volunteers. Its 11,000 square foot warehouse holds an inventory worth approximately \$200,000. Convenience equipment available at Lending Hands includes items such as roll-away beds, cribs, high

chairs, car seats, strollers, booster seats, and play pens; medical equipment includes wheelchairs, crutches, exercise bikes, and hospital beds. Any Sun City West resident who has a valid recreation card for identification may borrow equipment at no cost, although donations are appreciated.

Lending Hands is located in the Community Services Building at the corner of Stardust and R.H. Johnson Boulevards. It is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

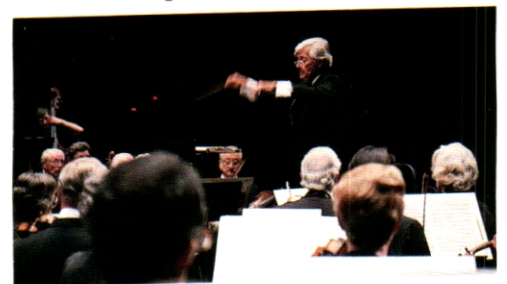

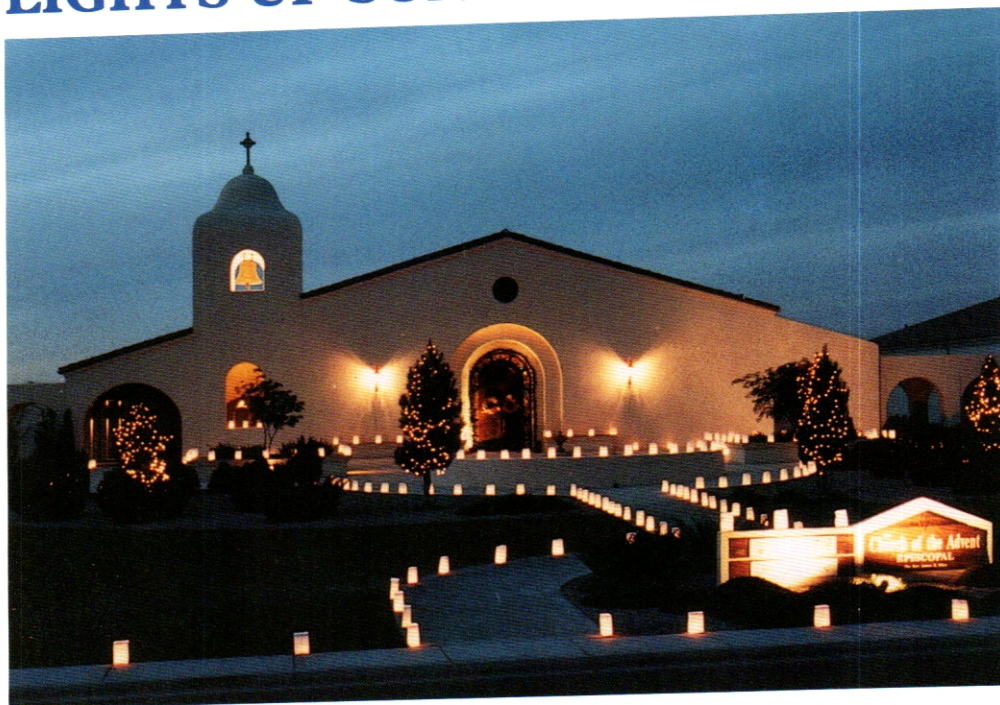

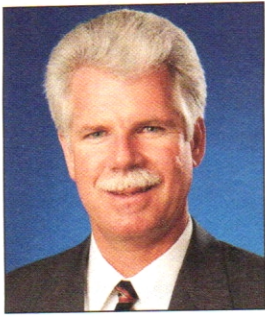

RON CRABTREE'S NOODLE CASSEROLE

(Excellent with veal or any roast.)

- 1 box (12 oz.) fine noodles
- 1/4 lb. butter
- 1 large onion, minced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. freshly ground pepper
- 1 lb. creamed cottage cheese (small curd)
- 3 C. (1 1/2 pints) sour cream
- Grated Parmesan cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook noodles in rapidly boiling water for about 10 min. until tender, drain and put into buttered casserole. Meanwhile, melt 1/4 pound butter in a skillet and saute onion and garlic until transparent. Turn heat off and blend in Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper, cottage cheese and sour cream. Combine mixture with noodles, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and dot with butter. Cover and bake 45 minutes, then uncover and bake 15 minutes. Serve with extra sour cream and Parmesan cheese if desired.

This can be assembled in advance and refrigerated. Make sure that it is room temperature before baking. Serves 8 to 12.

POSSE IS "POINT OF LIGHT" IN SUN CITY WEST

The residents of Sun City West know they live in a kinder and gentler community because more than 200 of their neighbors are patrolling their streets, watching their homes and looking out for their welfare. Now, the former President of the United States knows it too.

The Sun City West Sheriff's Posse, comprised of resident volunteers, received the "1,000 Points of Light" award in 1992 from former President Bush for its commitment to community service. The organization was honored for being a shining example of neighbor helping neighbor and for having profoundly influenced their community.

"Our basic function is crime prevention," said Posse Commander Norm Zadnoff. Commander Zadnoff reports that the Posse volunteered more than 82,000 hours in 1992. Volunteer activities include patrolling Sun City West 24-hours a day, performing home security checks upon request, and checking homes while residents are on vacation.

"Due to the efforts of the Posse, Sun City West enjoys one of the lowest crime rates per capita," Norm said.

In 1991, the Posse also became facilitator of the Neighborhood Watch program. Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention system operated by the residents and sponsored by the Maricopa County Sheriff's office and the Sun City West Posse. Approximately 1,700 people participate in Neighborhood Watch. The residents share information on when they will be out of town, how many and what type of cars each person owns, etc. Armed with this basic information, residents can easily detect and report anything that looks out of place. Residents also receive instruction on how to report suspicious activity and how to call and accurately report emergencies to authorities.
