

and Understanding Your Automobile. Dance, golf, hobbies, and self-help classes also abound.




## Fiesta Bowl Parade float garners Owl Kachina award

### Par Course 'looks easy'

They may look like playground stuff, but the 18 "stations" of the Par Course at Johnson Center tend to evoke more groans of surprise than squeals of deliaht.

Self-instructional through billboard signs, the course collected a number of new participants when the SC-SCW Fitness Festival invited folks to "take a tour" with SCWester Sam Pearl. Of course, all Westers may use the course anytime and do as many or as few of the exercises as they wish. The purpose is to loosen and limber, rather than to build, muscles. The theory is that you're supposed to feel so good after the exercises that you can skip around the quarter-mile track (also soft, artificial turf) afterwards.

Push-ups, upper left, take on a new meaning on the course with bars of increasing heights offering several levels of accomplishment. Hopping over concrete "logs", center left, is supposed to be done as many times as possible.

Another "simple stop" is Number Nine, where the idea is to lie down and swing leas up, lower left, while hanging onto the various inclined boards. A more familiar exercise is chinning, top right, which usually brings smiles of accomplishment.

Other stops on the course include stretching, swinging from rings, toetouching, jumping jacks, sit-ups, a vault bar, balance beam and parallel

Swedish jogging exercises — with arms swinging in time to breathing concluded the program on the quartermile track, lower right. The Fitness Festival will sponsor a second Par Course session on February 28 (see related story inside).




## Library looks to enlarging community support, services

One of the quietest places in Johnson Recreation Center, the library, is getting ready to make more noise.

Not that the facility is exactly low-profile (what with the landmark bell tower and all), but with a capacity for thousands more books than it presently has, the library is planning a membership drive this spring to call attention to itself.

"We have approximately 2,000 registered borrowers and a circulation of about 300 items per day," notes Librarian Evelyn Cornish. "But there must be more library supporters out in this community who recognize our need to increase our stacks — and therefore our service."

With operational costs as part of the Recreation Centers of SCW, Inc., the library houses 10,000 volumes from the Maricopa County Library, which also provided a grant for purchases. There have been a remarkable number of local donations and





contributions of books and periodicals in the year and a quarter since the library opened, more than 70 volunteers accumulate hundreds of service hours monthly, Friends of the Library provides outstanding support for program enrichment, and the numbers of people who use the library for "a quiet spot" or to enjoy the weekly film series is growing.

Yet Mrs. Cornish, a former school librarian, continues looking for ways to involve more SC Westers in "their" library. "We have developed a service for shut-ins with the leadership of Friends which will take a selection of books to people's homes," she announced. The Friends also have a display showcase near the entrance and a monthly art exhibit is featured in one reading corner.

Reference books, books on Arizona and desert landscaping, along with 50 current magazines and periodicals are sought-after items in the library. Mysteries and fiction dominate the reading taste, but many borrowers also seek books on arts and crafts and financial matters, Mrs. Cornish said.

For those who've never been inside the library, it's open Tuesdays through Saturdays, 10 AM to 4 PM. Most books can be borrowed on the Rec Center Activity Card but there also is a dime-a-day section for current best-sellers. And if paperbacks is your style, the borrowing is by number — just bring back the same number you borrowed.

Special requests are handled through the county inter-library loan service which can search out just about any book in print, although it may take a week or more.

And the answer to one question often asked: Do the bells really work? "Yes," laughs Mrs. Cornish, "they can be pealed by hand or we have an automatic system."

#### Bingo boards bounding

Folks with a "gaming" spirit are enthusiastically welcomed at the regular Friday Night Bingo games which begin at 7 PM in the Johnson Center Social Hall.

Sponsored and coordinated by the Property Owners and Residents Association (PORA) of Sun City West, admission is by SCW or Sun City Rec Card and card-holders may, of course, bring guests.

Play is run by Arizona's strict standards and includes 20 regular games and two paper games. Proceeds support PORA projects.

#### Erma's mom set for fitness talk

Sweetheart Month will be observed by the SC-SCW Fitness Festival with a Valentine's Day Walk-Jog on Saturday, the 14th, featuring a 5,000-meter route and a talk by a sweetheart of a lady, humorist Erma Bombeck's mom. Mrs. Erma Harris of Sun City will put a little fun into fitness for participants.

The event, a regular part of the Fitness Festival and also open to all SC and SCW residents for \$1, will begin at 1:30 PM in the Sun Bowl, Sun City, with warm-up exercises before the walk-jog of just over three miles. Refreshments and the program will follow and "sweetheart surprises" are planned.

Other special events include a film, "The Good Life," to be shown at 9 AM Monday, February 2, in Johnson Center Social Hall before the regular exercise session; a talk by Habits for Life representative Phyllis Sears, whose husband is a marathon runner, at 9 AM Monday, February 9, in the Social Hall before exercises; and a talk on nutrition by Virginia Stucky, a national lecturer who resides in Sun City, at 9 AM Monday, February 23, in Johnson Social Hall with exercise following.

A demonstration on the Par Course (see front page) and Swedish walking exercises will begin at 1:30 PM on Saturday, February 28. Though the Fitness Festival concludes the first week of March, new participants always are welcome.


All in all, a fantastic musical month with something on the schedule to please every ear. Why not gather up a group of friends and plan to enjcy yourself in the Sundome!

## Spectators sight in on events during LPGA days at Hillcrest

When an event like an LPGA tournament happens in your own "backyard," you might as well put on your spectator shoes, a brimmed hat, a belt hook for your canteen and a pair of binoculars and plan to come every

Of course, it's impolite to call Hillcrest Golf Course a "backyard," but the proximity to anywhere in Sun City West is perfectly pleasurable

The choices for watching some part (or all) of the LPGA activities are varied, depending on whether you want to see the lady pros play, see them compete, see celebrities clown around - or even see a clown clowning around. And, by purchasing advance admission tickets, one day out

watching the ladies compete against that exciting course can cost just \$3 - versus \$5 if you purchase a single admission at the gate.

First to the freebies. You can come on over on Monday or Tuesday (March 9 and 10) and watch the girls practice.

A special feature on Tuesday will be a show by "Wedgy" Winchester, a professional golf trick shot artist at 1 PM on the driving range. Thousands of golf fans have been amazed at his long hits with trick clubs, one-handed drives and shots from seemingly-impossible positions. Wednesday, March 11, is Pro-Am Day where the ladies will be playing the course with celebrities and businessmen and women who are supporting the tournament. Celebrities will include Gordon McCrea, Big Tiny Little, Tom Sullivan, Joe Garagiola, Lou Grubb, several Milwaukee Brewers' players and, from the Phoenix Suns, John McLeod, Kyle Massey, Alvan Adams and John Wetzel.

It's important to remember that on watch-the-girls practice days and on Pro-Am Day, everybody is welcome to bring their cameras and shoot as many pictures as they want. But, during the four tournament days, Thursday through Sunday (March 12 to 15), no cameras are allowed.

Admission for Pro-Am Day and the four days of championship competition is a bargain — if you buy the package plans. Fifteen dollars gets you either a Weekly Badge (which one person can wear each day to get in) or a Good-Any-Day book of five tickets (which can be used in any combination — five people on one day or two people on two days and one person on another or any way that works out for you or a group of friends).

These are advance-admission offers only — you won't be able to get the \$15 bargain at the gate; admission there will cost \$5 per person.

If you haven't already been offered these packages through a Sun City or Sun City West service or civic organization brochure, you can come to the Del E. Webb Administration Building, behind the Fountainbell Restaurant in Sun City, through March 6 and buy your LPGA goodies in the lobby. Or, you can buy a Diamonds Box Office LPGA package at the Sundome Box Office or Kings Inn Box Office during their regular hours.

Getting into the tournament will be easier this year since there will be four gates. The main gate (which will be most crowded) is by the Pro Shop; then there's a gate between the Sundome and Johnson Center Social Hall; and there are gates on either side of Crestview Restaurant.

Count yourself in for the LPGA and count on having some great days of enthusiastic entertainment from the lady professionals, from the rest of the spectators and from the artfully sculptured Hillcrest course.

### Brewers' baseball strikes this month at SC Stadium

March is not only the month for the LPGA in Sun City West, it's the month that spring training for the Milwaukee Brewers begins at Sun City Stadium, located at Grand Avenue and 111th Avenue.


Grand 'scaping



Health Fair offers free medical tests

Johnson Center Social Hall will host Health Fair '81 on April 6-10. The free medical screening, which is open to anyone without appointment, will be available each day from 9AM to 4PM.

Persons will be screened for a number of conditions, including glaucoma, skin cancer and blood pressure. The tests also include, for a fee of \$7, a blood test which checks 26 parameters.

Health care professionals have

volunteered their time for the tests; they recommend persons fast at least four hours if they are having the blood test. An estimated 750 persons daily can be accommodated for the tests, which will take 6-8 weeks to process and report on to individuals.

The event is sponsored by KPNX-TV. Samaritan Health Service, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Arizona and Home Federal Savings and is endorsed by the Maricopa County Medical Society.

No eliminations, either; all players will play all rounds. The prize fund is \$3,000 and there will be trophies and special prizes,

Of special interest to all chess buffs, George Koltanowski is chief tournament director. And he will perform his famous "Knights Tour," an amazing feat of memory during a special "An Afternoon with Koltanowski" program on Wednesday. Listed in the Guinness Book of World Records as the world's blindfold chess champion (50 games in 9 hours without looking at any of his opponents' boards once), he is a television personality and chess columnist as well as international chessmaster.

Inquiries about the tournament already have been received from eight states, so it promises to be a "national" event, to which all SCW chess players are invited.

Participating groups received \$2.50 for each \$15 admission package they sold. The charity-dollar total reached more than \$6,250, with nearly 30 groups recipients.



Nearly 45,000 attended the seven days, with Sunday's attendance topping 10,000 for the final round. Below, the crowd was truly impressive from any vantage.








3-way stretch


### Waiting for people



**INTEREST IN CHESS** IN Sun City West hopefully will be stimulated by the U.S. Senior Open, the national chess tournament set for June 8-12 in Johnson Center Social Hall. "We hope it will blossom," said Tom Eads, a SCWester who's been playing chess since his dad taught him at about 11 or 12 years old. "Chess is not exactly a high-pitched activity here, but we welcome both beginner and advanced players.

Meetings of the SCW Chess group have been informal thus far, with about four or five players gathering on Fridays in the Western Savings building. Danny Serber, Ken Werber and Walter Hovt. alone with Eads, are the "nucleus" of the group.

GEORGE KOLTANOWSKI'S special program should draw a lot of interest by itself. Born in Belgium, Kolty is more than an international chessmaster. He is master of memory (and he's 78 years

# Westers hear Webb president's expectations for the community


A positive outlook, even in the face of double-digit inflation and high home mortgage rates, was expressed by John W. Meeker, president of the Del E. Webb Development Co., in his semi-annual talk to SCW residents.

and progress on current projects

Meeker spoke in the Sundome on April 29 and related how the company is working toward building and developmental economy. "Based on our backlog of homes and current sales pace, we can keep our building program at a ten-per-week level for the rest of the year. Our present plans call for us to build only those homes that are sold — without building unsold units to fill out the blocks, as has been done in the past. The cost of money is simply too high."

Meeker said homes in units 10, 11, and 12 are being sold now and that some of the present vacation apartments will be sold in the future "since response to the vacation program has declined."

Numbers of "lookers" through the sales pavilion, however, has increased some 10 percent over last year and Meeker announced that the company will introduce all-new models by year's end. "We have two larger single-family home models underway and expect to add five other units for opening early next year. Also, two new-type townhouse

concepts will be offered, both on and off a golf course."

While a permanent Sun City West sign at the Bell Road entrance to the community has had to be deferred, two new sets of traffic signals, the sheriff's substation and completion of the bridge over the Agua Fria are projects well underway.

Meeker commended the Recreation Centers Advisory Board, elected from among residents, for offering community input and ideas on the operation of the rec facilities. "We look forward to continuing work with the board in developing management and financial policy for the recreation center," he said, adding that the June issue of The Western Star (a rec center newsletter) will contain information about the new budget and a proposed increase in the fee schedule.

"It is in the interests of the Webb Company as well as of the residents of SCW that the fees for the use of recreation facilities be kept at an absolute minimum," Meeker emphasized.

The company will subsidize rec centers' operation until a break-even point is reached and residents take over operation. "It is our intention that when residents assume full responsibility for managing the center that it will be financially sound and economically viable."


The tourney concludes Sunday with three, possibly four, contests, with the opening game scheduled at 5 PM. Trophy presentations will be made immediately after the last game.

The area has a large and growing population and to satisfy as many residents as possible, festival goers are asked to pick in moderation (enough grapes for the immediate family only).



The Sun City West Sheriff's Posse is enjoying its new base of operations — which came "equipped" with a couple lost golf tees tucked in the corners.

"Our headquarters is a portable housing unit that used to be the temporary pro shop at Stardust Golf Course," Elmer Karnuth, commander, explained.

The 12 by 60 foot portable housing unit was lent to the Sun City West Posse' until they can establish a permanent home," said Bob Cannon, DevCo. vice president.

An ''administrative headquarters'' rather than public access building, it is located in the Sun City West construction yard. Posse volunteers also are building a carport-type cover for the two posse vehicles which patrol the community 24 hours a day.

"The Sun City Sheriff's Posse is entirely on a volunteer and community contribution basis," explained John Cherewatti, executive officer. "The 74 volunteers buy their own uniforms. All our equipment — including a radio unit soon to be installed in the headquarters — is donated or purchased through contributions." A fund drive will be held in November.

Posse members are Red Cross CPR-trained, in addition to the training they undertake through the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office. Primary duties include traffic control and patrolling streets to keep a "vacation watch" on Sun City West homes.

#### S.C.W. has needed services

Paramedics and emergency fire protection are now available through a temporary building at the site of the proposed Sun City West Medical Building. Physician's services will also be available in the not too distant future. The building, located at 13902 Meeker Boulevard, was dedicated last month.

The building will provide space for family physicians, urgent health care, and space to be shared by physician specialists and consultants

An Arizona Medical Transport Paramedic unit is stationed at the building as well as a fire fighting unit of Rural Metro Fire Department. The new ambulance unit will provide Sun City West residents with fast and efficient medical treatment and transportation services.

The new unit will be on call 24-hours a day. A Certified Emergency Paramedic and an Emergency Medical Technician will staff it. The ambulance crew is under the direction of and in constant contact with the doctors at the Walter O. Boswell Memorial Hospital emergency room.

## Oakland Ballet Closes Sundome Season, "Billy the Kid"


The critically acclaimed Oakland Ballet will close the premier season of the Sundome at 8 PM, Monday, July 6th.







The spirit of caring is the theme of this issue as, inside, we feature Wester volunteers giving of time and talent for the benefit of others.











At right, Dance Team Beatrice and Philip Schneider gave a smooth performance to the Rhythm Ramblers rendition of One O'Clock Jump.

The Sun City West Racquet Association will host this year's event. It will happen 2PM to 4PM December 8th with the Social Hall as starting point.


