





Pro-Am Day admission is \$6 with the shows being included in the day's activities.







With 230 members, 40 of whom are monitors, the club cranks out a number of aift items for the Village Store. Best sellers are exterior wall decorative sets of roadrunners and saguaros. Knowing that newcomers often will find the need for additional storage space, the woodworking group also makes garage cabinets.

It is estimated that at least half the membership had pursued woodworking prior to coming West. And, in fact, quite a number had small shops at their former homes. For most, however, the Johnson Center Woodworking Shop offers greater variety and sophistication in equipment. With so many newcomers to the craft and experienced members taking on more ambitious projects, the club appreciates and makes excellent use of two expert

The regular monthly meeting is 2P.M. the second Monday of each month in the Lecture














### Tap Dancers Delight in Class









Del E. Webb was both a prophet and a pioneer. At the age of 60 he began developing the active retirement concept. Sun City was the town that helped change


America's viewpoint on retirement.




SUN CITY WEST — From the air, this community of 8,000+ still has plenty of room to grow. It is projected to have a population of 62,000.



### LIBRARY CONTINUES TO GROW


