






FROM THE PRESIDENT.....

RESIDENTS MEETING UPDATE

On Nov. 23, we held an open Residents Meeting at the Sundome. The purpose of these meetings, which we intend to hold at least annually, is to provide you with an opportunity to learn about the activities of the Del E. Webb Corporation and to show you present and future plans here at DEVCO.

The turnout was good, but we recognize that many of you were not able to attend. I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date on the meeting and let you know what action is being taken in response to some of the questions. The following is a brief synopsis of issues raised on which some action is still ongoing:

...We have started home sales in Unit 10 (the southeast corner of Phase I). Several factors have delayed us from beginning construction in this area, but we are now committed to fully developing Unit 10.

... We announced that the budget for the next recreation center has been increased from \$2.5 million to almost \$5 million. The new center, which will begin construction in May of 1984, will include a unique indoor-outdoor pool which will be the largest pool in the Sun Cities, a number of craft and meeting rooms and a large picnic area with a band shell

... It was suggested that a light be added at the intersection of Beardsley Road and Meeker Boulevard. The design and location of such lights is the responsibility of Arizona Public Service Co., based on specific criteria. We have asked APS to investigate the possibility of adding a light at this location.

... In response to a resident question, we have contacted the Crestview Restaurant and requested that a nosmoking section be established. Although we no longer manage the restaurant, we think the no-smoking idea is an excellent one and will encourage them to implement this suggestion.

... As a result of the meeting, we have decided to make the 20-play punch cards for Hillcrest good on weekends from April through December.

The Residents Meeting is an important part of our involvement with the community. I would like to thank each of you who attended and participated. Your concern and involvement helps us make Sun City West the best possible community.

IMPROVING DRAINAGE

The recently concluded construction on R.H. Johnson Bo_Jlevard will alleviate problems with standing water. DEVCO removed two single-grate catch basins in the roadway and installed four larger ones that increase drainage capacity ten-fold. Additional drainage work has been completed or is planned for 125th and Buntline, 125th and Conquistador, 124th and Banyon and along Desert Glen, 132nd, 133rd and Parkwood Avenues.






NAME THE REC CENTER

As you can see from the plans above, the Sun Cities will soon be the site of the nation's first senior adult education center. Arizona State University, which has conducted classes in Sun City for several years, will be moving to this new complex in May of 1985.

The center, located between Sun City and Sun City West. will include 10 classrooms, a gerontology research center and administrative offices in its first phase. The entire center will occupy a 36-acres site donated by the Del E. Webb Development Co.

Because this is the nation's first senior adult education center, ASU officials are relying heavily on the communities' input about classes, instructors and the campus itself. Dr. Obadiah Harris, ASU retirement program director, sees the project as a cooperative venture. "The Sun Cities are a tremendous resource not only in the development of a curriculum but also in the development of research projects." Harris said.



Educators from across the country will be watching this new education center very closely. Harris says it will be viewed as a role model for future centers. The facility will utilize the latest in video and computer technologies, including two-way visual communications with the main campus in Tempe.

Many members of the center's faculty will be residents of the Sun Cities, according to Harris. They will be specially selected and trained to provide students with the information they desire. Most of the classes will be non-credit but others will be degree oriented.

Those sales, of course, bring with them benefits for DEVCO and for you. A glance around Sun City West is proof of those benefits.



NEW FACILITIES PLANNED


Camino Del Sol Health Care Center, pictured below, is one of two new facilities planned for Sun City West. Americare Southwest will operate the Camino Del Sol Health Care Company, located next to DEVCO's new administration building on Meeker Boulevard. The 120-bed facility will offer skilled and intermediate care nursing as well as personal-care beds. This extended-care facility will also feature social and activity programs for its residents. Construction will begin very soon. Madison House, a project of the Danmor Company, will be a 196-unit catered living apartment complex. It will be built near the intersection of Spanish Garden and Lava Drives. GOLF CART PERMITS

Effective immediately, a valid Sun City West golf cart permit will be honored at all four Sun City West golf courses. No trail fees will be assessed. This policy change will be in effect until June 30, 1985 at which time it will be reviewed.

Anyone wishing to renew their cart permit after June 30, 1984 should purchase their permit at the course which they intend to play most often after June 30, 1985. 




















COPPER COOKER'S MURAL

WORLD FAMOUS

We at DEVCO like to boast about Sun City and Sun City West as "The World's Premier Adult Communities." That boast, however, is well founded in fact. It's probably no surprise to you that Sun City and Sun City West comprise the largest concentration of senior adults in the world.

The Japanese have been particularly interested in the Sun Cities because our concept differs so dramatically from their culture. While they have become adept at copying much of our industrial and manufacturing technology, it's doubtful they'll ever adapt the Sun Cities concept to Japan.

These are only a few of the instances in which we have hosted foreign journalists or builders. When you decided to make Sun City West your home, you did indeed become part of a "World Famous" community. I think you should all find a certain amount of pride in the fact that you live in Sun City West.


The center will be comparable in size to that of Thunder bird Plaza in Sun City, with special attention given to providing ample parking space and six convenient entry-exits.





Since the Sundome opened its doors four years ago, the Celebrity Forum lecture series has stood out as one of the most impressive collection of speakers in the Valley of the Sun.


In fact, in 1982, the Sundome's lecture series was recognized as the country's best by the International Platform Association.







RENOVATIONS, MASS MAILINGS KEEP SUNDOME STAFF BUSY

Since the Sundome closed its doors for the summer months last June, its staff has been occupied preparing for the center's fifth season. A major part of that preparation is the approximately \$40,000 that is being put into various physical improvements and

During August, members of the stage crew completely rebuilt the facility's stage floor — a floor that watches some 100 shows come and go each season. About 500 man-hours, 27,000 drywall screws, 17,000 feet of pine, 5,600 square feet of Krommenie — the surface material — and 350 sheets of plywood were necessary to build a stronger, more durable stage floor. Although the improvement may not be at once apparent to the patron, it will have a definite impact on the overall efficiency of backstage operations.

Other summer projects have included the inspection of the stage rigging and lighting system, refinishing woodwork, cleaning carpet and repairing seats.


In addition, the center's box office staff has been busily publicizing the upcoming season via a 23,000 piece mass mailing — a task requiring both time and patience.




LIBRARY HOSTS SPECIAL PARTY OCT. 21




Ticket holders who are unable to use their tickets are asked to return them to the Sundome box office.




