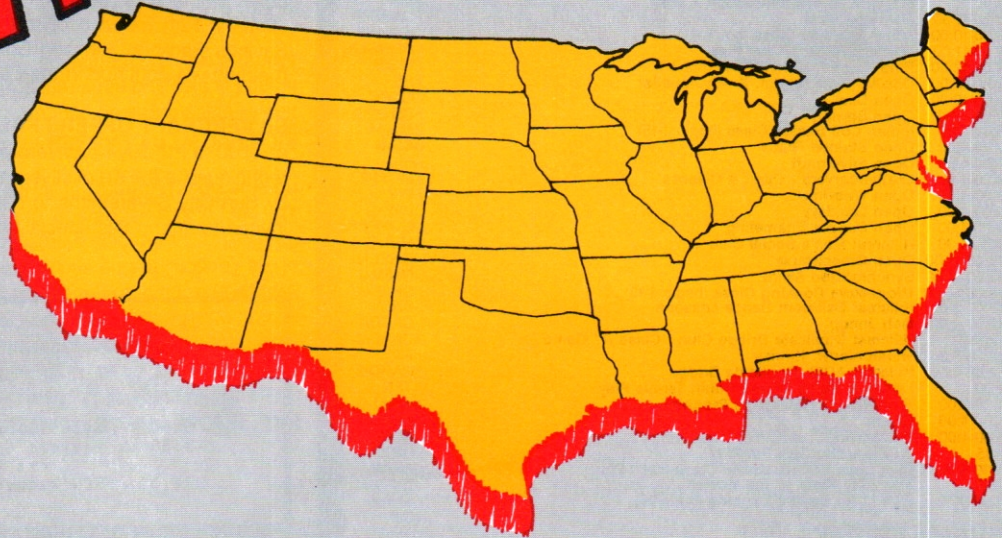

### SALES

At the time of this writing, we were about to close the books on 1986. In retrospect, it was a very good year for Del E. Webb Communities and Sun City West. We are approaching the 900 sales plateau, which would be our best year since 1979, and our sixth consecutive year of increased sales.

A number of factors are contributing to the success of Sun City West, and among them are low interest rates, superior product and a well executed marketing campaign.



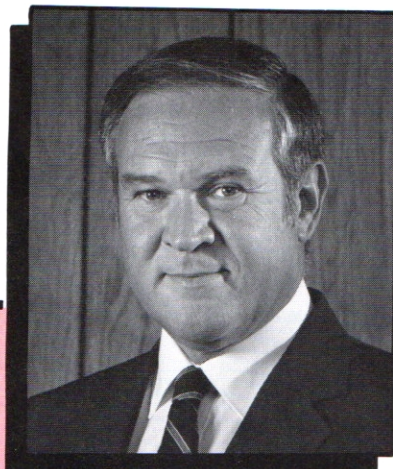
Yet, when all is said and done, it is your referrals that continue to make Sun City West so popular. Please accept our sincere thanks for your referrals.

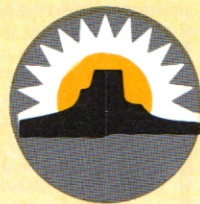

## SOUTHWEST HISTORY

Imagine more than a century ago forging your way westward. No roads. No bridges. You come across a major problem: the Glen Canyon (now a part of Lake Powell). You need to cross the Colorado River, but how?

This month marks the 107th anniversary of the Mormon pioneer crossing of Glen Canyon. More than 200 settlers lowered an entire wagon train, horses and all, to the river some 1,000 feet below.

The annual "Hole in the Rock" commemoration will be held January 23 - 24 at Wahweap and Bullfrog Marinas at Lake Powell. Historical lectures have been scheduled for both nights, in addition to the special boat tours with guest historians. The boats will take you to the very location where the pioneers made this monumental crossing. Crude steps, carved by the Mormons, can still be seen. The tour includes a hot buffet lunch aboard the Canyon King paddlewheeler.

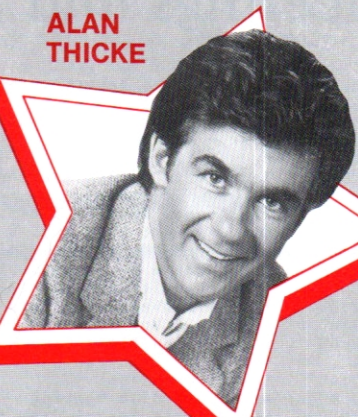

The **1987 ARIZONA CLASSIC** is a prestigious 54-hole championship event with universally recognized celebrity participants. A one-of-a-kind sporting spectacular with broad and deep appeal, the CLASSIC is expected to draw more than 50,000 spectators to Hillcrest Golf Course.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT....

### LIFESTYLE



In all the research that we have conducted during the last few years, we have found that the number one reason people choose Sun City West as their new home is the lifestyle. More specifically, it's the recreational opportunities that comprise the lifestyle.

I'm sure this comes as no surprise. In a community built around six golf courses, two magnificent recreation centers and the Sundome, one would expect recreation to dominate the selection process. Sun City West has built its reputation on providing more of the amenities residents desire.

It's exciting to walk or drive through this community during the winter months. It gives a person full appreciation of how frequently these facilities are used. I often make the drive from our Administration building to our Sales Pavilion. As I pass the jogging track, lawn bowling greens and Par Course, they seem to bustle with activity.

And yet, this is only a small part of the picture. I know other elements of the recreation centers are receiving comparable use. To a large degree, I see this activity as a compliment to Del Webb Communities.

No other developer has the experience we do with the adult market. Over the years we have identified activities which residents enjoy, activities which receive a high rate of use. When you're developing a community of 25,000 people, you have to keep in mind the preferences of the majority.

At the present time, we are analyzing the use requests for recreation center number three. It will be built at the corner of R. H. Johnson and Stardust Boulevards. The center will occupy a site similar to Beardsley Park and will cost about \$5 million to build. The big decision is what we put in the center.

When we designed Beardsley Park, we did so with the help of a resident advisory panel. It proved to be a successful relationship and we will continue that relationship through the development of rec center number three.

As you may have read in the newspapers, our tentative plans call for construction to begin in the Fall of 1987, with completion sometime in late 1988. We know we can't satisfy every request, but we will do our best to continue to provide new, exciting, and most importantly, enjoyable activities for the people of Sun City West.

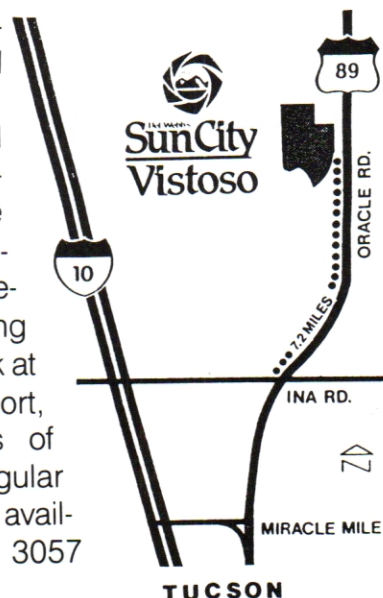
### SUN CITY VISTOSO OPENS TO THE PUBLIC

The tournament is governed by

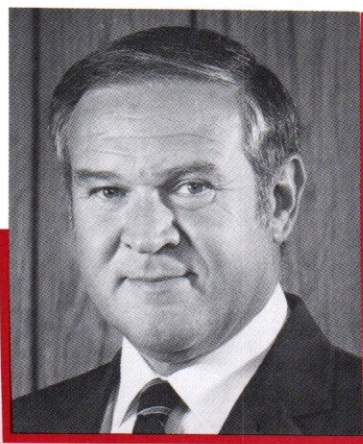

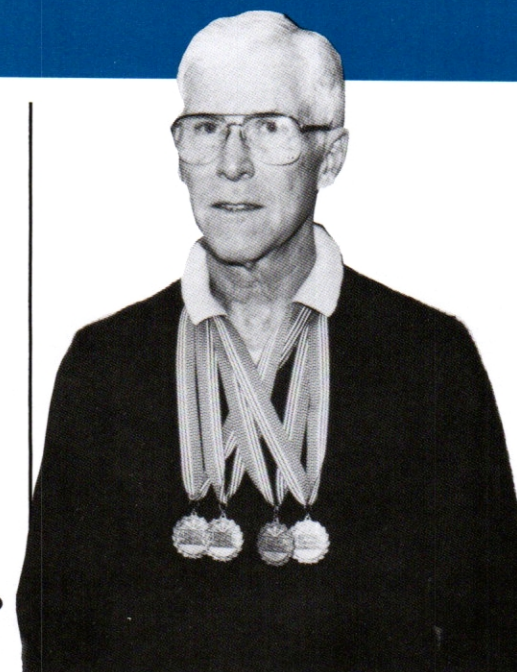
## WESTER WINS FOUR GOLDS

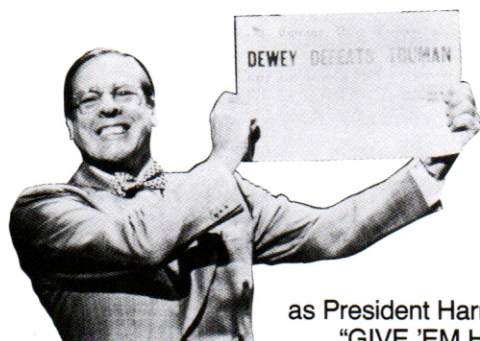

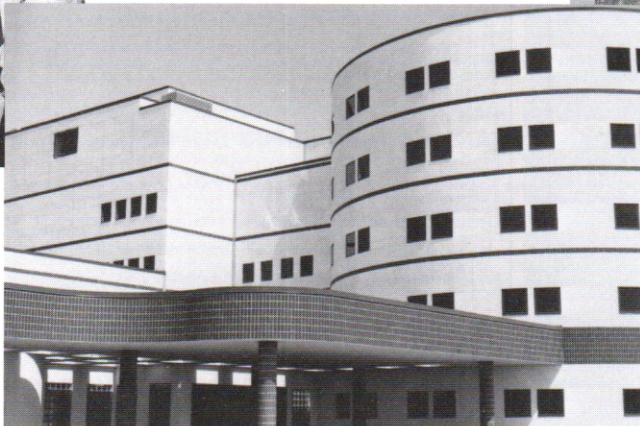

## DEL E. WEBB MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

**C**onstruction on Sun City West's hospital, the Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital, is now 70 percent complete and right on schedule for its January, 1988 opening. The exterior of the structure is virtually finished and the bulk of the remaining work involves finishing the interior which will feature Southwestern themes and colors in its decor.

The total cost of the hospital project is roughly \$45 million. Financing is being provided through a privately placed bond issue and community support. The Sun Health Foundation

is conducting a \$9 million capital campaign, and to date has raised more than \$7.7 million toward that goal.

The campaign was given early momentum when Del E. Webb Communities donated the land worth more than \$3.2 million. Del E. Webb Foundation, the charitable organization which was personally established by the late developer of the Sun Cities, made a gift of \$3 million.

The volunteer chairman of the capital campaign is Stan Hungerford

of Sun City West. The campaign has focused mainly on identifying and soliciting substantial gifts in the four, five and six figure range to this point; however, the scope will soon expand to include virtually the entire Sun City community. Joe Davisson, vice president and manager of the Sun City West branch of United Bank, has been named chairman of the Sun Cities Community Campaign in support of the hospital, and will work closely with Hungerford to achieve their \$9 million goal.

Several weeks ago, I had the opportunity to address residents at an Open Forum Meeting sponsored by the Sun City West Recreation Centers Advisory Board. I saw this as a chance to update residents on progress and plans for Sun City West.

For outdoor activities on a hot day be sure to:

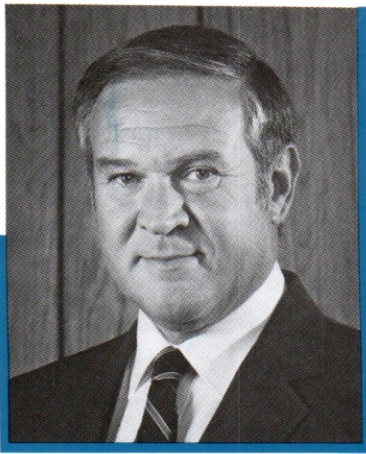
- Exercise less than normal for a week until you become adapted to the heat

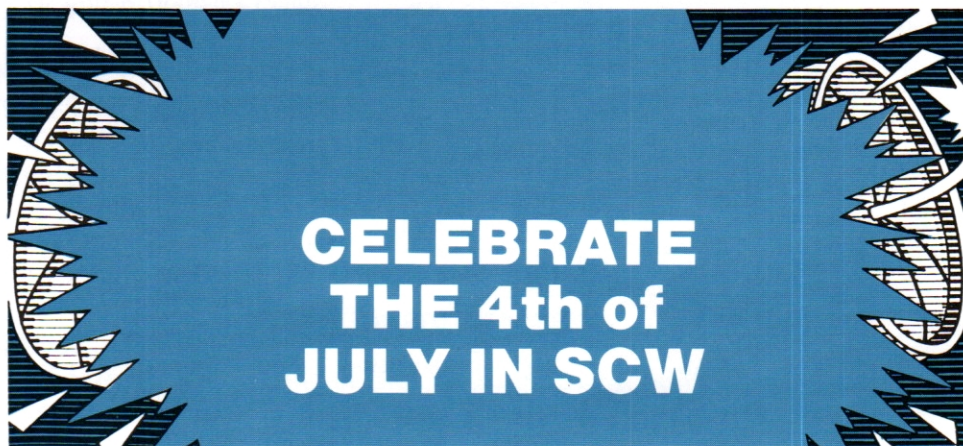
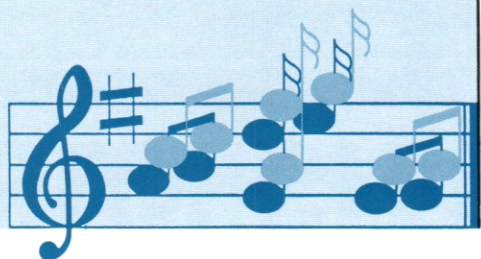

# SUN CITY WEST'S THIRD RECREATION CENTER UNVEILED

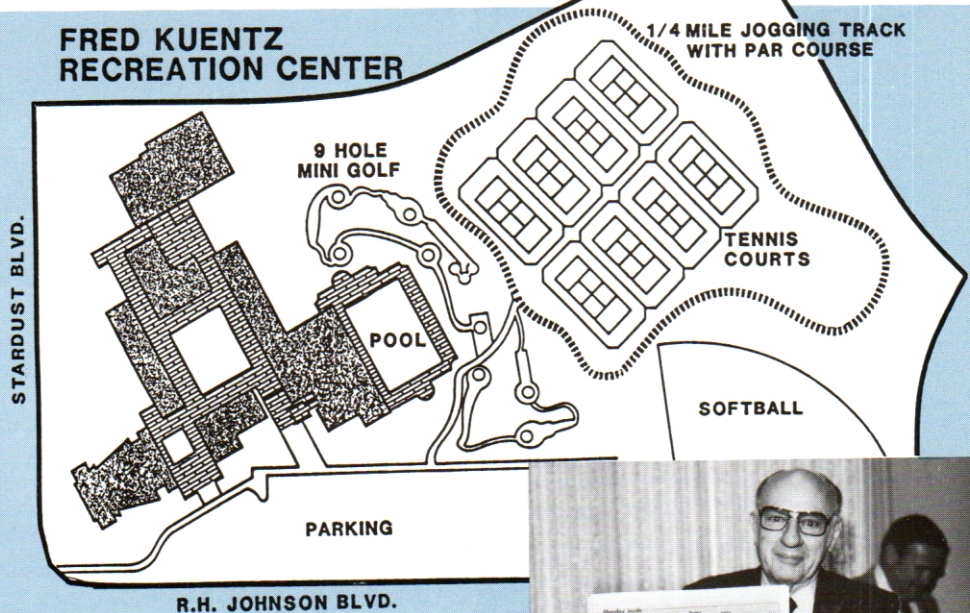

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

### HILLCREST REBOUNDS

Those of you who played Hillcrest Golf Course in May or June no doubt noticed the course was not in the best of playing conditions. I am pleased to report the problem has been rectified and the course is returning to its championship form.

On April 27 the well pump shorted out below the water line, shutting the whole system down. Our pump was inoperable for over a month while we awaited a

new one. With unseasonal temperatures soaring over 100° and the Bermuda grass trying to return for summer play, the situation was critical.

Each winter we seed Hillcrest with Rye grass because it's too cold for the preferred Bermuda grass to grow. The Rye grass was beginning to die off and the lush Bermuda grass was coming in when our well went out.

Because the transition between Rye and Bermuda requires extra water to give the new grass a firm start, our construction and maintenance crews took quick action and opened up unused irrigation lines that connect all of the Sun City West golf courses. Each night Echo Mesa and Pebblebrook golf courses pumped

water to Hillcrest, but this was not enough. Consequently, the course took a beating and the water levels in the lakes were far below normal.

The new pump has been installed and is working properly, the course is greening up nicely and the water levels in the lakes has returned.

We hope you will stop by and play Hillcrest, especially now that the summer rates are in effect.

PRIDES have about 225 members. An average of 125 appear each Saturday for work during the winter months, and this drops to about 75 average during the summer months. Many of the Pride's members work on other days of the week to correct problems that occur from storms or other unscheduled events which require immediate attention.

The PRIDES' primary function is to maintain the landscaping and pick up debris along R.H. Johnson Boulevard, Stardust Boulevard, as well as the outer periphery of Sun City West along Bell Road, El Mirage Road and Deer Valley Road.

Each year the PRIDES provide over 13,000 hours of labor in community betterment work. The only pay for this being the personal satisfaction of serving the community.

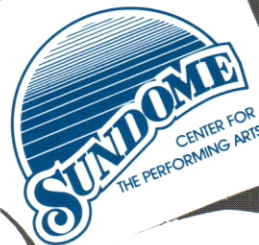

## SCW COMMUNITY SERVICES BUILDING TO OPEN IN SEPTEMBER

Construction is moving along ahead of schedule on the new Sun City West Community Services building near the intersection of Stardust and R.H. Johnson Boulevards.

The 10,000 square-foot first phase of the project will house Lending Hands, the local non-profit agency that loans such things as cribs, strollers and medical equipment.

The first phase will cost an estimated \$400,000 and should be completed some time next month. Meanwhile, the Sun City West Stained Glass Crafters are prepar-

ing a beautiful window to be displayed over the main entrance to the Community Services building.

Work will soon begin on the second phase to house the PRIDES, a thrift shop, a 200-person capacity meeting hall, and the Sun City West Foundation office — the fund raising entity for the building and other community projects.

Phase three will be constructed within a couple of years, depending upon the availability of funds, and will house Interfaith Services' Adult Day Care Center. And, a fourth phase is planned for a later

date although no specific organization has been targeted to occupy the space yet.

While the land was donated by Del E. Webb Communities and the building is being constructed at cost with Del Webb acting as general contractor, it is truly the people of Sun City West who made this building a reality.

Fundraisers such as Monte Carlo, Luminarias, Christmas card sales, carpet remnant sales and the new cookie cookbook are contributors to the Sun City West Foundation, formerly known as the PORA Foundation.

# Your Recreation Centers Advisory Board's Q&A

*This "Q & A" column has been designed by the Recreation Center Advisory Board to help you learn more about the operation of the facilities and any upcoming changes.*

**Q:** How did Recreation Centers of Sun City West Inc. come into being? How is it organized and managed?

(In what follows, Del E. Webb Communities Inc. will be referred to as Webb; Recreation Centers of Sun City West Inc. will be referred to as the Association.)

**A:** On Aug. 28, 1979, the Arizona Corporation Commission issued a charter to the Recreation Centers of Sun City West Inc. establishing a non-profit corporation to function as a Home-Owners Association to acquire, construct, manage and maintain property for the benefit of residents.

The Articles of Incorporation specified that the Association would be managed by Webb for the first eighteen months, but after that time, if the Association became self-supporting, management of it would be turned over to a nine-member Board of Directors elected by residents. However, before the eighteen-month period was up, a near-unanimous vote by residents on Nov. 21, 1980 gave Webb the authority to continue to manage the Association for an indefinite period in the future. The Articles of Incorporation were amended to reflect this. The Amendment also established a nine-member Advisory Board to meet with Webb's Governing Board and act as a communications link between Webb and Association members.

In December 1980 a Master Agreement between Webb and the Association defined the duties and responsibilities of the parties regarding the ownership, use and maintenance of all recreational facilities. In essence, it states that the recreational

facilities are for the use of Association members only; that as facilities are completed they will be deeded to the Association and therefore will be owned by the members; that the Association is responsible for the maintenance of all facilities and agrees to retain Webb as manager for the Association.

The Association is operated as three separate divisions: the Golf Division, the Bowling Division and the Recreation Centers Division. A three-member Governing Board appointed by Webb directs the operation of the Association by establishing policies followed by the General Manager. Under the direction of the General Manager, income and expense records for each Division are kept in separate accounts so that they can be monitored individually.

Greens fees that support the Golf Division, line fees that support the Bowling Division and the annual \$89 assessment paid by all Association members that supports the Recreation Centers Division, adjusted from time to time for changes in the cost of living, are set at levels that will make all three divisions self-supporting when our population reaches 25,000. Until the divisions are self-supporting, Webb will subsidize the Association's operations by reimbursing the Association for the difference between revenues and expenses.

**J**oin your friends and neighbors in an inter-denominational celebration of Thanksgiving at 10:30 a.m. Nov. 26 at the Sundome.

The service, sponsored by The Sun Cities Ministerial Association, will feature Bishop Thomas O'Brien of the Phoenix Catholic Diocese, the Luke Air Force Base Color Guard and a 250-voice choral group.

The hour-long service is one of the largest celebrations in the country on Thanksgiving morning.

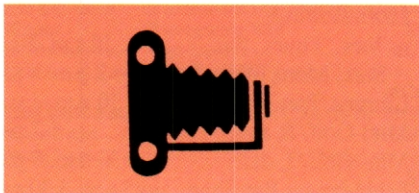

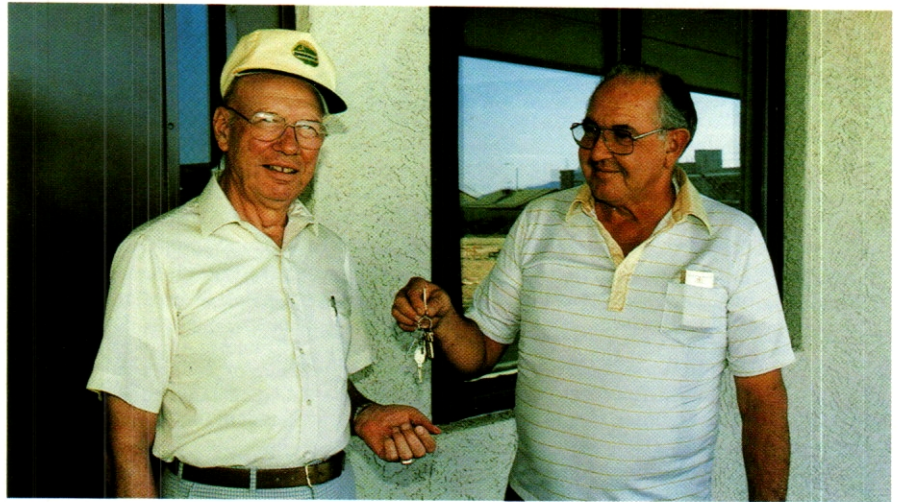

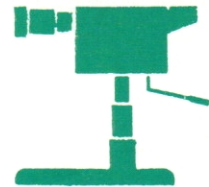

**S**un City West is fortunate to host the state's largest luminaria festival on Christmas Eve. The beauty of this event is unsurpassed.

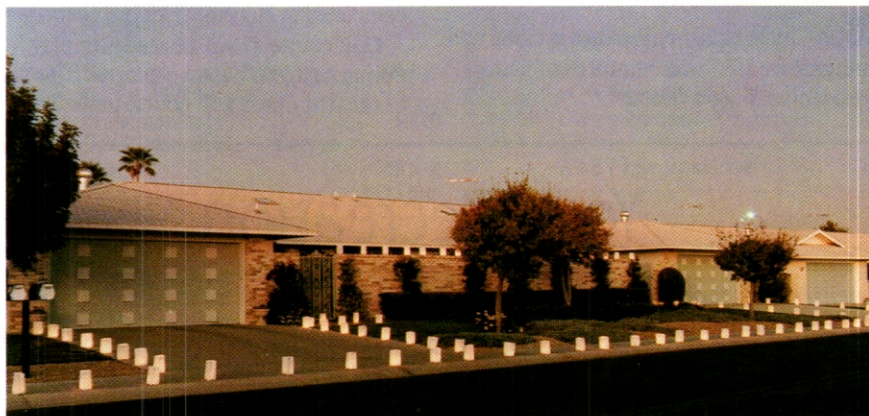
A luminaria consists of a paper bag, sand to weigh it down and a glowing candle. Lining streets and driveways, the luminarias present a visual fantasy.

The Sun City West Posse Building has been completed and is occupied by the group that allows Sun City West to enjoy one of the lowest crime rates in the U.S. Right next door is the new Community Services Building, which is currently home to Lending Hands and will ultimately house a number of non-profit organizations.

# Your Recreation Centers Advisory Board's Q&A

*This "Q&A" column has been designed by the Recreation Center Advisory Board to help you learn more about the operation of the facilities and any upcoming changes.*

(Del E. Webb Communities Inc. will be referred to as Webb; Recreation Centers of Sun City West Inc. will be referred to as the Association.)

**Q:** Why is Webb's yearly subsidy of the Recreation Centers of Sun City West, Inc. needed and when will it come to an end?

**A:** Webb's marketing strategy of building recreation facilities ahead of the time when they will be fully utilized has been successful for more than 26 years. The availability of golf courses, arts and crafts rooms, a library, meeting rooms, swimming pools, tennis courts, etc. are appealing to those looking for an attractive area

where they can retire, buy a home and start doing the things they never had time for.

Webb realizes that setting annual assessments for Association members that would be high enough to support the operation and maintenance for all these facilities would be prohibitive, particularly in the early stages of the development of Sun City West. Therefore Webb establishes reasonable yearly assessments for all titleholders of residential property, then manages and operates the recreation centers in a businesslike way while maintaining all properties in excellent condition. Until the population of Sun City West reaches 25,000, Webb will pay the Association, owners of all recreation center properties, the difference between revenues and costs, as determined by an independent auditing firm. That commitment has been written into the Master Agreement between Webb and the Association.

Eventually the three divisions of the Recreation Centers will be self-supporting, no subsidy will be needed

and Webb will hand over management of all facilities to the Association's elected board of directors.

Webb's yearly subsidy also would cease before our community reaches 25,000 if a majority of Association members vote in December of 1988 to take over control of Recreation Center properties; such a vote will also be taken in December 1990 and 1992. The Management Agreement between Webb and the Association would no longer be in effect, no subsidy would be forthcoming and operation of the Association would be in the hands of an elected board of directors.

The performance is free and open to the public.



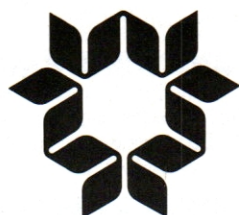
## ART MUSEUM HOLIDAY EXHIBITION

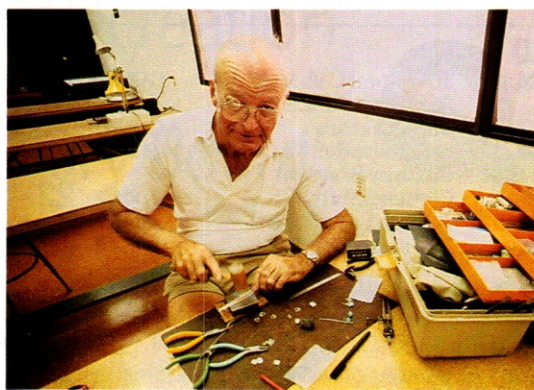
