

SPAA 1990-91 fund drive goal is \$230,000

Encouraged by the success of its two previous be able to to keep the curtain raised at the Sunfund-raising drives, the Sundome Performing Arts Association has set its 1990-91 campaign goal at \$230,000.

The target is 15 percent higher than last year's drive goal of \$200,000. Due to the overwhelming response of both business and community members in the area, SPAA exceeded its 1989-90 goal by more than \$20,000.

SPAA First Vice President Hal Drosethes is chairman of the campaign effort, which began Oct. 1 and runs through June 30, 1991.

"Our goals this year are to raise at least \$230,000 and to boost our membership in the seat sponsor category by an additional 500," Drosethes said.

Seat sponsors contribute \$100 a year for five years. Among the benefits earned by seat sponsors is the placement of a personalized nameplate on their Sundome seat.

"The theme of the '90-'91 campaign is 'Help Keep the Curtain Raised," he added, "and with the continued support of the fine and generous people of Sun City and Sun City West, we will

The Nina, the Pinta, and the Sundome by Jim O'Connell, Executive Director, ASU Public Events

About 498 years ago, Columbus sailed the ocean blue.

I know, it doesn't rhyme. It comes to mind because, when Cindy Millikin and I recently attended the first booking conference of the 1991-92

season, agents were touting a number of new attractions celebrating the 500th anniversary for that historic voyage. One or two may end up at the Sundome or Gammage for our enjoyment—those that seem to us to offer solid cultural and entertainment value. Certainly, the story of a determined explorer heading off in new directions and bumping into lands undreamed of—this has the elements necessary for a variety of compelling events.

As we sort through the possibilities, I find myself thinking about Queen Isabella. She bought the boats, provisioned the expedition, commissioned its captain to act in her name and return with the finest fruits of the Indies. Yet she had no idea what he might find, claim or bring back. Her faith in Columbus was rewarded in ways she could never have anticipated.

Ten years ago, Del Webb Development Corporation stood on the shore while the Sundome set sail. A unique facility in a unique and changing community, the Sundome sails uncharted waters, returning time after time with the finest fruits of many lands for the nourishment and enrichment of the mind, the heart and the soul.

The artist, whether a performer or a creator, is no less an explorer than Columbus. Equipped with palette and brush, the painter cannot know what vision will take shape on the canvas. Until hammer meets chisel, the sculptor can only guess at what form lies in a block of wood, marble or granite. The novelist, the composer and the poet face blank pages armed only with a dream; where the dynamics of character, rhythm, situation, rhyme, harmony, and inspiration will take them can only be discovered as ink and paper meet. The musician, the dancer and the actor, however well rehearsed, find new expression in their interaction with every audience.

You and I have taken Queen Isabella's place on the shore as our artists search for new ways to express the human experience in a changing world. Our tax dollars provision their expeditions, so we long for the authority to tell them to stay away from the ugliness, to bring back only what is enjoyable, hopeful and comforting. But we can no more do that than Isabella could order Columbus to go straight to the Indies and stop nowhere else. Columbus kept his course as best he could under the influence of tide and wind; our artists follow their dreams under the influence of experience and inspiration.

As the Sundome begins its second decade of service to the community and the arts, you might jot a note to your legislators. Let them know that decency oaths and other promises to go-here-not-there, claim-this-not-that mean little when the waters are uncharted. And remind them that, since before Isabella's time, governments have always funded explorers. Without them, new worlds would lie undiscovered, and we would all be poorer for that.

P.S. The members of the Sundome Performing Arts Association (including Del Webb Development Corporation, I am pleased to say) have provisioned the Sundome's expedition for two years now. We at Public Events are extremely grateful for that. You need not wait on shore like Isabella, however. The sails are set, the adventures lie ahead. Climb aboard and explore with us!



The tile version of the ASU seal sits atop the archway over the main entrance of the Sundome and is especially attractive when it is lit at night.





Sundome, SPAA honor volunteers

Few organizations can boast the kind of volunteer support enjoyed by the Sundome. SPAA and the Sundome recognized the contributions of the volunteers at a luncheon in May.

ASU Public Events Executive Director Jim O'Connell pointed out that Sundome volunteers have contributed more than 14,000 hours of service, an amount equal to 13 business years, which is a period of time longer than the 10 years of the Sundome's existence.

Helen Marie Flory received a plaque in honor of the countless hours she has spent in her role as organizer of the volunteer corps. Lucille Hudgens was presented with a special pin marking 1,500 hours of service to the Sundome. Six other volunteers received service pins for 300 hours. A dozen volunteers have accrued more than 200 hours apiece and 28 others have topped the 100-hour mark.

Since its organization two years ago, the volunteer staff of the Sundome has grown from a handful of helpers to a talented pool of more than 200. Services performed by volunteers also have expanded.

Campaign donations fund Sundome improvements

Recent improvements at the Sundome have been made possible by SPAA's annual fund-raising campaign. SPAA campaign money replenishes the Sundome's capital replacement fund, which covers the cost of various improvements made in and around the theater.

Two recent improvements are readily apparent to visitors in the Sundome courtyard. A new fountain and a replacement set of sunscreens were installed in July. The new 7½-foot fountain cost \$1,900 and is expected to grace the courtyard for at least another 10 years. The set of 34 sunscreens hangs from rafters running atop both sides of the courtyard. Colored turquoise, peach and cream, the sunscreens cost \$5,700 and, with the expert care of the Sundome maintenance staff, are expected to last about six years.

The largest and most expensive improvement is a new set of curtains for the Sundome stage. The set consists of 10 pieces, including two main curtains. The curtains cost \$26,000 and replace the original set, which lasted three years beyond its life expectancy.

"The Sundome has a reputation around the country as a very attractive theater with high-quality equipment," said Larry Edmonds, Sundome facility manager. "It's really nice to know that whenever we need something to maintain the quality of the Sundome, we have a ready source of funding available to meet that need."

Tops in Blue opened the season with a near-capacity house.



Lobby Restroom Remodeling to Begin Soon

t's always easy to find something positive to say about Sundome performances ... unless you were hoping to use the restrooms during intermission. Then you'd probably encounter some long lineups and a chance to consider why such a large facility wasn't built with enough restrooms.

Thankfully, with lobby restroom remodeling set to begin in July, restroom lineups should decrease dramatically. "The restroom remodeling will result in a 400 percent increase in women's toilets and a 300 percent increase in men's fixtures," reports Colleen Jennings-Roggensack, Executive Director of ASU Public Events. "In addition, we will be adding two unisex restrooms. These restrooms will have the latest technology in plumbing fixtures required by the Americans with Disabilities Act."

Funds for this \$880,000 project will be provided by Arizona State University and the Sundome Performing Arts Association. "The Sundome Performing Arts Association's \$440,000 contribution towards the lobby restroom remodeling was made possible by our strong community support, says President Dick Bloechl. "We are grateful to the West Valley community — and to ASU — for making these long-awaited changes possible."

Sundome's \$5 Million Improvements Set the Stage for Success

ou may have wondered why the Sundome doesn't offer the lavish Broadway shows found at Grady Gammage Memorial Auditorium in Tempe. The reason is the stage. "We've got a huge auditorium with a modest stage," explains Sundome Performing Arts Association president Dick Bloechl. "Right now we simply don't have the ability to put on the complex and highly technical productions — such as *The Phantom of the Opera* or Disney's *Beauty and the Beast* — that are available at other facilities."


This modest stage creates two problems. First, it means that West Valley residents must drive to Gammage Auditorium in downtown Tempe to see many of the popular Broadway-style shows. And secondly, it limits the Sundome's entertainers to those whose acts do not require a sophisticated facility. Unfortunately, as entertainers' needs become increasingly elaborate, the Sundome's stage and cramped behind-the-scenes facilities become a bigger problem.

Fortunately, there's a solution. It's \$5 million in capital improvements which will transform the Sundome into a world-class performing arts center. Funds are being raised as part of the Arizona State University Campaign for Leadership. Together, ASU and the Sundome Performing Arts Association are hoping to raise \$4 million in private funding, which will add to a \$1 million commitment from ASU Public Events.

To Sundome patrons, the benefits of these renovations and additions will be in the wide range of shows they can see. But to the musicians, entertainers and Broadway productions performing at the Sundome — the behind-the-scenes changes will be spectacular.









Selecting Crowd-Pleasing Programs is Full-time Work

ver wonder how great acts such as Dolly Parton or Victor Borge find their way to the Sundome stage? It's a complicated process that begins with Steve Potter, the Programming Coordinator for ASU Public Events.

Steve is ASU's combination of a talent scout and booking agent — always on the lookout for talent that will please Sundome audiences.

He often begins his search with suggestions from Sundome patrons, who have enjoyed acts at other venues and recommend them for the Sundome. "People see my name in the program and call or send me letters," Steve explains. "I get some good ideas from Sundome patrons."

But most of the time it's not that easy. Steve attends two conferences each year that showcase available talent. Steve also travels to places such as Las Vegas and Branson to view talent. And he relies on his professional colleagues in the Western Alliance of Arts Administrators (where he's on the Board of Directors) and the Arizona Presenters Alliance (where he's president) for recommendations and reviews. In addition, he's on the telephone constantly with agents who are promoting their clients.

Once Steve is interested in an act, he has to make sure it's suitable for the Sundome. Often, the Sundome's physical facilities are inadequate for the more technically demanding shows and performances.

Every one of Steve's suggestions is reviewed by a programming committee, which is composed of marketing, technical, operations, outreach, business office and

education personnel. They estimate the audience size, together with the show's potential revenues and expenses, and develop a profit and loss statement for each show. If the show is not expected to turn a profit, it's not booked. "The entire staff needs to buy into a performer," says Steve. "We need to work together to market it, sell it and push it — otherwise the show won't be a success."

Once an act is approved, there are still many hurdles. The first one is the Sundome's size. Entertainers like to play to packed houses, which is much easier in a typical 2,500 seat facility than in the 7,000 seat Sundome. Even though Steve explains that sections 1 and 6 are not sold, entertainers want to sell the remaining 5,500 seats — which is often not possible — and to be paid accordingly.

And then there's timing. Some acts are popular every year; others are better seen every two or three years. Performers also get sick, change roles and decide that they're no longer going to tour. Shows that are promoted on the strength of a lead become less popular when the lead is replaced.

In the end, a successful performance is a team effort. "I book the shows," says Steve. "Marketing creates the demand. The Box Office sells the tickets. The Operations Department gets the equipment set up so that the show will happen. The House Staff prepares for the night and the Business Office settles the finances. And then we start all over again with the next show."

The stage will be enlarged and an area below the stage hollowed out to create a "trap". A fourth wing will be added to accommodate the large number of entrances and exits required in elaborate shows. And the fly space above the stage — now a modest 35 feet high — will be increased to 90 feet. With the addition of a complex rigging system, the Sundome will be able to handle complicated scene changes. A new lighting system and sound enhancements will further enrich each performance.


Stars and crew will be more comfortable. Star dressing rooms will double in number from two to four, and chorus dressing rooms will be added to accommodate 150 people — a vast increase from the 30 dressing stations now available for chorus members. Storage rooms will be added to enable on-site storage of scenery and props. And performers will relax backstage in a newly constructed Green Room.

The Sundome capital campaign will fund two changes that every patron will be sure to notice — additional restrooms and an orchestra pit. The insufficient number of restrooms, long a complaint of Sundome patrons, will be eliminated through a 327% increase in restrooms. And the addition of an orchestra pit will mean the stage view will no longer be obscured by the conductor or musicians.

According to Sundome board member and

capital campaign co-chairman Birt Kellam, the Sundome capital campaign has already raised \$1.5 million dollars — including \$300,000 from the Sundome Board members plus significant gifts from the Del Webb Corporation, The Coleman Foundation and The Thoresen Foundation.

"The Sundome capital campaign will ensure the Sundome's future," says Colleen Jennings-Roggensack, Executive Director for ASU Public Events. "It will give the West Valley community a premiere arts facility that they, their children and their grandchildren can enjoy for many years to come."

Behind the Curtain with Paul Nakel


ost people don't know who Paul Nakel is," admits Sundome Director Smokey Renehan. "But they sure know when he's not here."

Paul Nakel — also known as the voice of the Sundome — has been the facility's volunteer announcer for the past four years. Despite his fifty years of broadcasting experience, Paul is one of the Sundome's least visible volunteers. He's often referred to as "that voice" or "that guy out there."

That "guy out there" is a big time broadcaster. Paul was inducted into the Polka Hall of Fame in 1990 and was credited with establishing Cleveland as the "polka capital of the world." He was also acclaimed as "America's number one polka jockey." In addition, Paul is a member of the Broadcast Pioneers and was inducted into the Broadcaster's Hall of Fame in 1992.

Paul comes from the days in radio and television when one person did it all — news, talk, sports and musical shows. He worked at WHK in Cleveland beginning in 1938. Twenty years later, he joined WJMO, the Elyria-Loraine Broadcasting Company. Under his direction as vice president and general manager, the company grew from one station to five before Paul retired in 1984.

For Paul, the best part of working at the Sundome is a chance to meet entertainers that he interviewed years before — such as Edie Gorme, Frank De Vol and Victor Borge. "When Victor Borge was in town three years ago, I introduced myself," Paul recalls. "I said 'I don't expect you to remember, but I interviewed you in 1947 or 1948 in a station in Cleveland. Victor Borge, who was jesting of course,

looked at me and said 'What do you mean I don't remember! Where have you been?"

Paul and his wife Beatrice retired to Sun City West in 1985. The couple have been married for 55 years and have three sons and three grandchildren.

Del Webb: The Man Behind the Corporation



or most people living in Arizona, the words "Del Webb" are synonymous with a successful real estate company. But few people know the "rags to riches" story behind this successful entrepreneur.

Born in 1911 in Fresno, California, Del Webb was the oldest of three sons. His father was a farmer who built a successful rock and gravel company, only to encounter a dishonest subcontractor and lose his business. To help support the family, Del left school after his freshman year and went to work as a carpenter's apprentice.

But Del's love was not carpentry — it was baseball. By the time Del was 13 years old, he was 130 pounds and 6 feet 3 inches tall and considered one of the best first basemen around. He chose only to work in companies that had a baseball team and

supplemented his carpenter's salary working as a semipro ball player.

In 1927, when Del was 16 years old, he caught typhoid fever. His weight dropped from 204 pounds to 99 pounds. He was forced to stay in bed for 11 weeks and it was another year before he could work. When he was well enough he moved to Phoenix and resumed working and playing ball. Unfortunately, Del discovered that his pitching arm hurt and he decided to give up baseball. He channeled his enthusiasm into his work, quickly progressing from a carpenter to building superintendent to contractor. Del started his company in 1928, and quickly became known as a personable young man that provided careful work and accurate estimates.

In 1945, Webb merged baseball with business and became co-owner of the New York Yankees. Here he merged his love of baseball with his meticulous business practices.

Del Webb began working with Howard Hughes and the Hughes Aircraft Company in 1950. As Howard Hughes got more reclusive, Hughes and Del Webb remained friends. Estimates are that Del Webb received more than a billion dollars of construction work from Hughes, simply because Hughes wouldn't talk to anyone else.

In 1960, Del Webb decided to develop a unique community northwest of Phoenix designed exclusively for retired people. Although many people said it would never work, Del Webb bought the land in what's now Sun City from rancher James Boswell. Del Webb's plan was to build the common amenities first, so that the recreation center, public buildings and shopping centers were complete before a single home was sold. Sun City opened on New Years Day, 1960 and had more than 100,000 visitors in the first three days. The first weekend recorded sales of 237 houses, worth more than \$2.5 million. By month end, more than 400 houses had been sold. Sun City opened in Kern California in 1961, and in Florida and Perris Valley California in 1962. Sixteen years later, in October 1978, the first homes were built in Sun City West.

Under Del Webb's direction, the company built more than just communities. He built the U.S. Pavilion for 1964 World's Fair, as well as hospitals, museums, casinos, sports stadiums and hotels. He built underground missile silos and air force bases. He also built shopping malls and office buildings and just about anything else you could think of.

Although Del Webb appeared to be in perfect health, he had a small tumor removed from his lung in March 1974. A few months later, after complications from undergoing exploratory surgery after being diagnosed with prostate cancer, Del Webb died on July 4, 1974.



Sundome by because the theater does not have the production space to meet their technical requirements. In addition, many star performers are reluctant to perform in theaters lacking the sophisticated rigging and lighting systems required for contemporary staging.

How will the funding be used?

The investment will add a full-fledged orchestra pit and lift; a new stage with 30 percent more scenery space; elevated fly space; new chorus and star dressing rooms, a green room, offices, wardrobe area, maintenance and storage areas; new stage rigging, air conditioning and lighting systems; and a 327 percent increase in the number of restrooms.

How much of the \$5 million has been raised?

When the campaign was launched in Fall 1997, the Sundome Performing Arts Association committed \$500,000 and ASU Public Events pledged \$1 million. An additional \$300,000 in gifts and pledges were made by the members of the Sundome Board. Many generous individuals, the Del Webb Corporation, the Thoresen Foundation and the Coleman Foundation have also made sizable lead gifts. To date, more than half of the campaign goal has been achieved.

How long will the campaign take?

The community fundraising will take approximately two years. The actual renovations will require about nine months after the fundraising has been completed.

How can community members become involved?

Performing for You!

From the President



t's ironic that most of us don't talk much about money. Yet the things that are most important in our lives — including our education, first automobile, wedding day, first home, raising our children, and retiring — all require an outflow of cash. The truth is that we spend much of our life engaged in earning and spending money, even if we choose not to talk about it.

As president of the Sundome Performing Arts Association, I'm forced to talk about money. That's because SPAA is the major fundraising organization for the Sundome. As such, one of our mandates is to raise money. I'm proud that we've raised more than \$1.25 million for such things as the Sundome's sound system, video enhancement system, infrared hearing systems, lobby re-carpeting, and lobby restroom expansion and remodeling.

Today, the need to raise funds is even more critical. A generous donor has pledged \$1.1 million toward the Sundome's \$5 million capital campaign, providing that we raise an additional \$1.25 million by the end of this year. It is a challenge that must be met!

So I promise that you'll be hearing more about the Sundome's financial needs over the next year. Quite simply, raising these funds is essential to the survival of the Sundome, and I think that's worth talking about.

\$1.1 Million Pledged to Sundome

n November 13, 1998, an anonymous donor pledged \$1.1 million to the Sundome, bringing the total funds raised to \$3.75 million. This gift was the largest ever since the Sundome itself was donated by Del Webb Corporation to ASU in 1984.

But this generous gift had strings attached. The Sundome must raise an additional \$1.25 million by December 31, 1999.

Otherwise, the \$1.1 million pledge will be rescinded.

The additional \$1.25 million must come from the community. "Without a viable Sundome, the cultural and economic climate of the West Valley will deteriorate," said Birt Kellam, SPAA first vice president and co-chair of the Sundome capital campaign. "We need everyone — including individuals, families, businesses, clubs and community organizations — to make an investment in the future of our community by helping us meet our fund-raising goal."

The Jewel of the West Valley

For many years, SPAA volunteers have worked tirelessly to educate West Valley residents about the importance of the Sundome Center for the Performing Arts. Known internationally as the world's largest single level auditorium, the 7,000-plus seat Sundome offers an exciting variety of programs and activities to more than 300,000 patrons each year — including students who are introduced to the arts during special matinee performances, armchair travelers who explore the world through international travel films, and neighbors who showcase their talents during community talent shows.

But the Sundome provides more than entertainment. Sometimes called the "Jewel of the West Valley," realtors report that the Sundome is one of the area's top selling points and directly increases the value of the surrounding homes.

Changing entertainment requires critical renovations

Unfortunately, the jewel-like Sundome has been slowly losing its sparkle. Many aging performers, long adored by Sundome patrons, are no longer touring. And more contemporary performers — as well as the Broadway-style productions — have

Outreach Programs: Introducing Children to the Arts




If you drove by the Sundome mid-morning on December 11, you would have seen the parking lot filled with yellow school buses. Inside the Sundome, more than 5,000 students enjoyed a matinee performance of the *Mariachi Christmas Show*. The cost? A canned food donation to the St.Vincent de Paul Society.

The *Mariachi Christmas Show* is the first of three performances dedicated to introducing children to the performing arts. On March 26, students will enjoy *The Dinosaur and the Ant*, presented by the Bits and Pieces Puppet Theater. On April 5, Saturday morning cartoons will come alive during a performance of *Schoolhouse Rock Live!* The 1999 shows will cost students \$1.00, thereby providing many young people with their first — and for many, their only — chance to see a live performance.

"Because the Sundome is owned by a public university, one of our pillars is community service," explained Michael Reed, Outreach and Education Coordinator for ASU Public Events. "We want to make the Sundome accessible to young people, especially as there are getting to be more and more younger children living in the area."

been unable to perform at the Sundome because it lacked the large stage and sophisticated equipment needed to host these technically demanding shows.

To remedy this problem, Arizona State University and the Sundome Performing Arts Association, as part of ASU's *Campaign for Leadership*, have been working to raise \$5 million for renovations to the Sundome. Funds will be used to construct an orchestra pit and lift; a new stage with 30 percent more depth; a 100 percent increase in "fly" space; new dressing rooms, wardrobe area, a green room, maintenance storage and assembly areas; new stage rigging, air conditioning and lighting systems; and expanded restrooms for patrons. The result will be a facility that is physically and technically capable of presenting such large scale productions as *The Phantom of the Opera*.

Community support critical

"We are counting on residents of the West Valley to help us raise the remaining \$1.25 million," said SPAA president Sandy Goldstein. "When the campaign was launched in Fall 1997,

SPAA committed \$500,000. An additional \$300,000 in gifts and pledges were made by members of the Sundome Board. Many generous individuals, the Del Webb Corporation, the Thoresen Foundation and the Coleman Foundation also made sizable lead gifts. Now it's time for SPAA members, residents of the Sun Cities, and the rest of the West Valley community to contribute to this campaign."

The Sundome is asking people to be creative in helping to raise the needed funds. "Once the public realizes how close we are to our goal, and how soon we can break ground to begin the renovations, everyone in the community will figure out some way that they can help," said ASU Public Events executive director Colleen Jennings-Roggensack. "We want the entire West Valley community to know that they shared in the Sundome's success, that they made this happen for the sake of themselves, their neighbors and their community."

What are the benefits of the Sundome Box Office's new ticketing system?

According to Sundome manager Smokey Renehan, the new system allows the Sundome to serve you much more efficiently. With the new ticketing system we can:

1. Process season subscriber renewals more quickly. With the old system, we were unable to begin processing until the established deadline. That sometimes caused a delay of one month or more in your checks clearing or your credit cards being charged. Understandably, this led to concerns since subscribers did not know if their orders

had been received. With the new system, we can process, print, and mail your renewals within a week of receipt.

2. Exchange tickets more easily. If you need to exchange your ticket for the Gammage Valley Broadway series, we can now handle that transaction for you at the Sundome. To change the date or time of a performance, simply notify the Gammage Box Office at 965-3434 and then call the Sundome Box Office at 975-1900. With our new system, the Sundome can now work with Gammage to process the exchange and print your new ticket.
