For those in your family who've never seen Arizona, I'd like you to read some excerpts from a letter recently sent to the editor of our state publication, Arizona Highways, by the Newport, Rhode Island, daughter of a Sun City couple....

Editor, Arizona Highways Magazine

To our new friends in Arizona,

When we spoke with my excited parents, almost a year ago now, no amount of conversation and salesmanship could convince us that Arizona was the fantasy world they believed it to be. They were making plans at that time to move from Wisconsin, their home state, to Sun City. We were certain their plans were wrong for them, and surprised that they could consider abandoning plush greenery and Lake Wissota for sand and heat.

Indeed...my own conception of Arizona was not unlike a vision of the Sahara Desert, with intermittant sprinklings of cactus, sagebrush and retirement complexes.

In November, my husband, David, and I journeyed from our home in Newport, R.I., a little sad to be away from the ocean, on our way to help my Mom and Dad with their move to Sun City and parched earth. At 55 years old, we felt them too young to move to a place which, we thought, would certainly increase their natural aging process.

As we drove our three vehicle caravan . . . U-Haul, station wagon, and Chevy Van into Arizona, David and I were stunned. At a scenic overlook near Flagstaff, we emerged from our separate vehicles with the same astonished look of delight . . . and a single word, "Trees!!" The sighting of my first prickly pear cactus was exciting and I was so amazed at what looked to be a forest of saguaro cactus of which my Mother had spoken so enthusiastically.

What followed increased our surprise - mountain, deserts, countless species of plant life, real houses with real people . . . towns! And suddenly orange and lemon groves and palm trees!

Sun City was a delight. The first days were spent viewing the area, since my parents' home was two days from occupation. I spent most of the tours "eating my words," and occasionally admitting I was wrong. I've never been so happy to be so wrong about anything!

The quality of the homes, the extensive recreation areas, the beauty of the land, the glorious December weather! The architecture pleased us (We live in a city that condones only Colonial and Victorian architecture!) and I was amazed at how lovely the rock lawns were.

My final words of approval for my parents were simply these, "If you get old, it's your own fault."

We had a wonderful and exciting December in your beautiful state. We didn't see much, but what we saw, Carefree, the Petrified Forest, Montezuma Castle, Sun City, was impressive, exciting, and enough to keep us going back until we've seen it all. Or better, become permanent residents!

We thank your state for caring enough to preserve the natural beauty for people like us to enjoy.

It's the same as it was a hundred years ago....that cry today of "Go West, Mister! Go West!" And the cry today is being heard in many parts of America....in Pennsylvania, Illinois, Indiana, New Jersey, Wisconsin, and even in some of California's major cities, such as San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego. And they're all talking about the same WEST... Arizona's new SUN CITY WEST!

Desert growth has been cleared from the land, construction stakes are down and foundation footings are being poured. In five months the lines on an architect's drawing have been transformed to what is slated to be a spectacular realization—a twin community to internationally—known SUN CITY, just a mile away.

Construction by our Company in Sun City West is underway on some major facilities, including the new Johnson Recreation Center, a sunken 18-hole golf course, and a Vacation Special Restaurant to accommodate future visitors who will occupy vacation apartments while looking over the community. The 5,697 acres of the first phase will include approximately 17,000 housing units to accommodate a population of 32,500.

Little more than 18 years ago the original Sun City had its grand opening. From miles around came an estimated 100,000 to 125,000 visitors, and during the first week-end some 272 homes were sold (an almost unbelievable accomplishment in 1960), based on what visitors saw in a half-dozen model homes, a recreational and community center, golf course, shopping center, motor hotel and small restaurant.

We've received correspondence from several future residents who are making plans for their arrival. Take, for example, the MARTIN S. ERBS (MARTY and VI, for Violet) who plan to arrive in May next year and reside at 19402 132nd Drive. Marty plans a May 1 retirement after 39 years in the purchasing profession, the last 27 years in the New Holland Division of Sperry Rand Corp. And the Erbs have an interesting avocation-domestic and foreign travel. Each of the past eight years Marty and Vi have hosted an international tour, working through local travel agencies to make arrangements and then leading the group on tour. Right now they're leading a tour through Japan, Taiwan and Hong Kong. Once settled in Sun City West they'd like to continue that activity.

Another pair of future West residents, the FEOLAS (BRANDISIO AND ANN) of 49 Claireview Court, San Francisco, expect to occupy their Sun City West home the latter part of this year, and Ann says after 25 years in the Bay Area, her hubby is anxious to get back to the desert. She also is among a number of persons who have sent suggested street names for the new community, since the Del E. Webb Development Co. has been confronted with an edict of Maricopa County supervisors that ONLY street names not presently in use anyplace in Maricopa County can be considered for Sun City West. However, certain north-south thoroughfares MUST BE NAMED with numbers, the supervisors also have ruled, such as 100th Ave., 100th Drive and 100th Lane in Sun City. The Peolas number in Sun City West will be 19626 132nd Drive.

A recent request to Sun Citians as well as those planning to reside in Sun City West has brought more than 5,000 suggested street names. A Dallas, Texas woman submitted 1,100 suggested names for streets. Of course, in the flow of names from around the U.S., there were some real zingers, such as Hanky Panky, Kickapoo, Pollywog, Gizmo, Fettish, DoDo,

Wow, and even Unbelievable. But there were some beauties, too, which likely will be appearing on some new street signs, according to the Development Company's Dave Westmoreland, Chief Street Namer for some years. And Dave will welcome, with thanks, added street name suggestions.

Further news which likely will interest future Sun City West residents is that Sun City's very active Lions Clubs already have organized a first club for Sun City West, under direction of Tom Clewes, past International Director, and Dick Borchardt, past President of Suntowner Lions. Club President is Chatfield "Chat" Nielsen. The club meets noon, Mondays at Melody Lane in the Grand Center in Sun City. For more information contact Chat at 933-3695 or you may write him at 9413 Briarwood Circle, Sun City, 85351.

And word from the CARL G. REMMELS of 315 South Second Street, Elkhart, Indiana, 46514, is that they'll be retiring to Sun City West in a little over two years. A retired U.S. Marine Corps Fighter Pilot, he has for 16 years as director been endeavoring to "sell" the controversial Office of Civil Defense at Elkhart. Once in Arizona he hopes to do office work at a Phoenix airport fly in an instructional capacity of the instructional capacity. a Phoenix airport, fly in an instructional capacity or to just fly his 1946 Piper J-3 "Cub" around the valley. Mrs. Remmel anticipates raising some beautiful roses at her new home after being a professional tax consultant 22 years. Carl wrote that he "cannot think of a name for your Sun City streets, but after flying so much in the Midwest and its crummy weather, I'd call my street 'Forever VFR' meaning 'Forever Visual Flight Rules', where the sun shines always."

The first PERMANENT RESIDENTS of SUN CITY WEST are going to begin moving into their new homes during the first couple of weeks of OCTOBER, and more than 100 Sun City West residences will be awaiting their occupants that month. And there'll be more than their dream homes....for there's going to be MUCH, MUCH, MUCH.....and then some.... TO BE PROUD OF!

The original Sun City, which will greet its final residents about year end and achieve a population of about 48,000, has long been the talk of Arizona, of the U.S. and even visitors from many foreign countries. But with thousands of construction workers today streaming over Sun City West and its improvements, the time is near when this new retirement city will become the topic of conversation wherever people congregate.

With more than 9,000 reservations already recorded for its new homes, Sun City West is mushrooming $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of world-famous Sun City, with more than 4,500 workmen striving to set new standards in resort-retirement living.

Already over 50 per cent complete is the Sun City West VACATION HEADQUARTERS. This complex will place visitors in 326 luxurious guest suites. There also will be a restaurant, cocktail lounge, banquet room, registration and information offices, a television viewing room, beauty salon, gift shop, swimming pool and tennis courts.

And today construction is well underway on the largest community facility ever built in Arizona, the R. H. JOHNSON RECREATION CENTER for recreation, arts and crafts, social events and cultural pursuits. It is named in honor of the Del E. Webb Corporation and his dedication to the furtherance of the late Del Webb's ideals of vitally active living for people of retirement age. It is due for completion early next summer.

Also rising is the massive Sun City West LIBRARY BUILDING, featured by a Spanish style bell tower, and due to house administrative offices for the community library association, beautifully furnished reading areas, and space for 40,000 volumes.

And then there's the SUN DOME, a 6,800-seat center for the performing arts. Site work has been completed. Groundbreaking will signal construction in SUN CITY WEST of this largest theater building in Arizona.

A GRAND CHAMPION GOLF COURSE has been carved out of the desert and farm land. Some 2 million yards of earth were moved to create a rolling valley that is to become the first of six 18-hole golf courses in the first phase of Sun City West. and that first phase involves development of 5,700 acres for a projected population of 32,500. Total land area to be developed in Sun City West is approximately 13,000 acres (as compared to 8,900 acres in the original Sun City).

Which means residents of Sun City West are going to have plenty to talk about and MUCH TO SHOW! And now about some of our Sun City West people......

The ROTHENBERGS of Brooklyn, N.Y. (SIDNEY AND RENEE) are going to be delayed a bit in getting to Arizona to claim their Sun City West home, but Sidney isn't letting any grass grow under his feet. He dispatched to our Street Naming Department a list of 173 suggested street names and said he feels he can create some more if needed. Their delay, he says, is because they haven't yet disposed of their Brooklyn home. But they're packing for the trip and hope to be along in a couple of months or so.

FRANCIS D. SCALZA of Linden, N.J. is conscious of the campaign to obtain suggested names for streets in the new Sun City West, but he feels the community's new golf course is going to be every bit as important, and it, too, should be named. He sent along his suggestion—GRAND VIEW GOLF COURSE. Any others?

We're still attracting residents from Florida, and newest arrivals—this time to Sun City West—will be FRANCES T. AND NORMAN AUGER as soon as their garden apartment at 19007 134th Drive is completed. MILLY AND ART PETERSEN of Racine, Wis., should be in Sun City by this time, living in rented quarters at 12807 Sun Valley Drive until their new Sun City West home at 13212 Marble Drive is completed. It was an auspicious and long-to-be-remembered event . . . the move-in of the first permanent residents of the spanking new Arizona retirement community of SUN CITY WEST. 

Agreements have been reached by Del E. Webb Development Co. and Recreational Centers of Sun City on future use of recreational facilities in both communities. Limited use of Sun City recreational facilities by Sun City West residents and reciprocal use by Sun Citians of Sun City West's golf course is part of the agreement. Another phase states that Sun City residents moving to Sun City West may use Sun City recreational facilities until their memberships expire. To be eligible, those Sun Citians must have been Rec Center members for at least six months. Other Sun City Westers and Webb's vacation special visitors will have guest privileges for bowling, billiards, shuffleboard, swimming pools and mini-golf facilities until June 1, 1979. Webb will pay \$3 per person for each 30-day period for those who request those privileges. Webb will allow Sun Citians to use the first Sun City West golf course from its opening date (still undetermined) to June 1, 1979, at Sun City West greens fees rates. The agreement also provides for transfer of the shooting and picnic areas of Heading Rance to joint tenancy of Rec Centers Associations of Sun City and Sun City West. The ranch facility now includes trap and skeet, a rifle and pistol range, archery and a picnic area with covered cabanas, dance floor and stage. Webb also has agreed to install there a trailer pad, septic tank and utilities for use by a fulltime caretaker. John Meeker, president of Webb Development Co. expressed appreciation for the "neighborly attitude" exhibited by the agreement and added, "We feel there are many ways the two communities will be of mutual benefit in the future. This sharing at the very beginning is a positive step."

A \$1.8 million phone center is under construction by Mountain Bell at Grand Avenue and Union Hills Drive to serve the residents of Sun City West. The electronic switching center is expected to be fully operational early in 1979. The 4,000-square-foot, one-story building will initially serve some 3,500 customers and can be expanded to a capacity of 25,000 lines.

WILLIAM E. & IDA M. JONES of Detroit, Mich., who visited Sun City twice before deciding "the climate, the hospitality, plus the beauty of the place was well worth the change", expect to arrive here in late December or early January to occupy their new Sun City West home at 13239 Beardsley Road. Their Sun City visits were in September, 1977, and June, 1978, and they not only liked what they saw but were anxious to return. William retired from the Detroit Board of Education in 1976 after 30 years as supervisor and administrative assistant. Ida retired in 1963 after 22 years with the U.S. Government, then returned to further duties for six years in research with the University of Michigan and Wayne State University. She most recently has served seven years as an area worker with RSVP, the Retired Senior Volunteer Program. She is due now to retire in time to prepare for the move west.
